Asara B'Teves



This Tuesday, December 18th, is the fast of Asara B'Teves. Asara B'Teves was the tragic day on which Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Yerushalayim.

During Shacharis, the Sheliach Tzibbur says Aneinu. After Chazaras Hashatz, the following are said: Selichos, Avinu Malkeinu, Tachanun, Krias HaTorah ("Vayechal Moshe"). During Mincha, the following are said: Krias HaTorah ("Vayechal Moshe"), Haftorah ("Dirshu Hashem,") Aneinu during Shemoneh Esrei, Birchas Kohanim. For nusach Ashkenaz, Sim Shalom replaces Shalom Rav. Avinu Malkeinu is recited after Shemoneh Esrei.

"'Ani Yosef, ha'od avi chai?' Velo yachlu echav la'anos oso, ki nivhalu mipanav."

"'I am Yosef, Is my father still alive?'
But his brothers could not answer
him because they were startled by
his presence"(Bereishis 45:3)

The Midrash expounds on this Pasuk saying "Woe is to us from the day of judgment, woe is to us the from the day of admonishment... when Hash-

em will judge each and every one of us according to who we are" What does the Midrash mean that we will be judged "according to who we are"?

R' Moshe Chaim Luzzato in Mesilas Yesharim begins his monumental work by explaining that the primary function of man is to recognize his unique purpose in the world. As Chazal explain in Sanhedrin 38a, a man was not minted like coins, uniformly stamped with the same imprint. Rather, Hashem created each and every person unique. Differences in our strengths, interests, and values enable us to carry out the mission that is exclusive to us. Thus, when the time of judgment arrives, we will not be evaluated in a standardized fashion, nor will we be compared to our peers. Hashem will show us our unique talents and strengths, and show us how we may or may not have lived up to our fullest potential. Therefore, as the Midrash emphasizes, we are truly judged based on the full extent of "who we are".



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
