A few days later, he learned that if he would've gone to Eretz Yisroel on that flight,

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


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he could've been arrested! He was supposed to take care of getting exempt from the army before he left the country and he forgot to do it.

es.


Ovens, washing machines, driers, alarm clocks, air conditioners, computers, phones and all other electronic gadgets all worked perfectly.

So he called up the yeshiva, they said there's no mistake!



I have some stories from the Bitachon hotline. I'd like to share them with you.

The first story goes like this:

A man was looking for a job. Meanwhile, a new job opened up. The man called up the owner, and he said, "I need a job, could you hire me?" The owner said, "But you don't have the skills or this."

Then, the man said, "Could you just do me a favor?"

The owner said, "fine, I'll hire you."

Later, after that, the man was struggling so much and making mistake after mistake.

Later, after that, the man called up the owner and said, "I want you to give me a raise." The man answered back, "you want a raise?! Are you joking or something?"

The man answered, "it is because I'm working so hard."

Then the owner answered, "I know you are joking right?!"

Then, the man answered back, "I want you to give me a raise because I'm working so hard, and making mistake after mistake."

Then the owner answered back, "that's exactly why I don't want to give you a raise."

The owner didn't care that the man was working so hard. He just wanted the job to be done. What is the message to this story? What is the

lesson?

Let me tell you what it is.

Remember how the man was trying his hardest to do the job, and he could not do it?

That's hatzlacha.

Hashem is not like the owner of the job that cares if the work gets done or not. Hashem wants us to just try, and that brings more Olam Haba.

That's the 1st story.

The 2nd story goes like this: A certain person did not like a certain lady, and he would always annoy her. One day she went to the store and got him a present. Why did she get him a present, when he would always annoy her?

The answer is: it was not really 'him' annoying her. It was Hashem causing her to be annoyed, coming out of his mouth. It was Hashem giving her a test. Hashem was giving her a kaparah, and she was shicker from simcha!

That's why she gave him a present!

We discussed chewing. Let's continue on and discuss the chewers – the teeth themselves.

When we look at the teeth, Hashem's wisdom and chessed is very apparent from their shapes and their positions.

I'm sure we are all aware that our teeth are not all identical; rather they are different sizes and shapes. Let's familiarize ourselves with the teeth. To put it simply, we can divide our teeth into two categories; some work as cutters and some work at crushers.

Hashem gifted us with 32 teeth – 16 on top or our mouth and 16 on the bottom. There are 6 teeth in the center of our mouth that do the cutting job. On both sides of the cutters there are 5 molars that crush the food. In other words, from one set of 16 teeth we have 10 crushers and 6 cutters.

We often begin eating by cutting off a piece of food, like when biting into an apple, a sandwich or a carrot. Then we continue to chew it. We do much more chewing than biting. Perhaps that is the reason that Hashem gave us more crushers than cutters. We have almost double the amount of crushers because we use them much more when eating.

In order to bring out the importance of having these two different types of teeth, cutters and crushers, let us imagine what eating would look like if we only had one type.

Our 20 molars, that we refer to as crushers, do the main part of chewing. They grind the food into small fine pieces that are ready to be swallowed. If all of our teeth would be sharp edge cutters it would take much longer for our food to be transformed into a size that we could swallow. It's like trying to mash a hardboiled egg with a knife. It's doable, but the job that a masher does in 3 or 4 times — the knife would need to do it in 30 times.

Now let's examine the flip side. If we only had crushers and not cutters it would be much more difficult to bite into a piece of food. It's like trying to cut a carrot with pliers. The flat surface of the pliers creates a lot of pressure and it's great at squeezing, but it is not so good at severing.

Our cutting teeth are very important when we take a bite out of hard food, but it also makes biting into soft food considerably easier.

Thank You Hashem for giving us both types of teeth!

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Chizuk Corner

The unbelievable power of a good word By R'Y. Friedman

I once saw an unbelievable saying that goes like this. "Torah is Hashem talking to man, while Tefilla is man talking to Hashem. You need both of them for the dialogue."

What a profound statement! Torah is known as the D'var Hashem. Hashem talks to us through the Torah, as he tells us what His ratzon is. Tefilla is us talking to Hashem. This is how we have a complete connection with Hashem.

Perhaps we can say that although we know that women can learn some Torah, but in contrast to a man learning Torah it's not the central part of

their Avoda. Perhaps we can suggest that a woman can get her connection with Tefilla itself. On the contrary a man needs both to get a strong connection.

Our limud HaTorah al-



ways could use chizzuk, but perhaps in a certain sense [on a basic level] our Tefilla can use even more chizzuk. Let me give a Mashal for this.

When one gives a speech for an audience, the audience has to pay attention to the speaker, which can be challenging at times. However, we cannot compare it to the challenge of the speaker. The speaker has to prepare. He needs to work on the delivery. He also needs to be dynamic and sometimes has to be prepared for questions.

Similarly, when one learns Torah, mainly he needs to tune into the D'var Hashem [similar to the listener in the mashal]. Regarding Tefilla we need to be prepared and we need to put more energy into creating the connection.

There is a story told of a man that approached a Rav before Mincha with an urgent matter. The Rav assured him that he would speak to him right after Mincha. The Rav asked the man are you davening now? The man responded, yes. The Rav said "ok tzeischem leshalom".

After Mincha the man approached the Rav and the Rav extended his hand and said "Shalom Aleichem". The man told the Rav," before I tell you about my issue I want to ask the Rav a question. Why did the Rav tell me tzeischem lishalom earlier, and now the Rav tell me Shalom Aleichem. What's going on?

The Rav smiled and said that when he saw that this man's mind was preoccupied with his issue and he was going to daven so he figured he was going to travel to the place where his issue was. The Seforim teach us that "we are where our thoughts are", because that is who we are in essence. Therefore, I wished you tzeischem leshalom.

Chizuk Corner

The unbelievable power of a good word By R'Y. Friedman

This story may sound comical but many of us can perhaps relate to this story. Therefore, with Hashem's help, let us embark on a journey of chizzuk in this amazing area of Tefilla, so we don't miss such an amazing opportunity that comes up three times a day. Hopefully, we will be zoche to connect to Hashem like never before through Tefilla. Let us begin.

One common reason why some people may have difficulty concentrating, is because they have difficulty staying focused. It can be a condition, or simply because of today's technology. Whatever the reason may be there is a basic exercise that you can do before you start davening [or learning as well].

Take a white piece of white paper and either make a small dot or a letter. Then focus on this dot

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or letter for ten seconds or more depending on how intense the issue is. You need to let go of your entire life and put your focus on this black dot. If it feels too easy then add some more time. This will give you some help in your focusing.

Let's move on. In this week's Parsha it says "Beha'aloscha es haneiros etc. yairu". Rashi teaches us that "we are supposed to kindle the lamp until the flame goes up on its own". There are deep concepts in these words.

I would like to say that this is our Avoda when we start davening as well. We should hold the candle there and keep holding it until the flame catches. Fire represents Mesiras nefesh. We will start with one Bracha at a time. After we finally light the fire then it will become easier, because the fire is lit.

It's similar to a rocket ship taking off with a burst of fire and loud explosions. All that is to break out of gravity. Once the rocket leaves gravity then it's much easier to rise.

Therefore, if we start off Shemonei Esrai with fire and joy then hopefully, the rest of Shemonei esrei will follow through with kava-



na.

Perhaps that can be one reason our Chazal mandated us to be mechavein by the first Bracha, and that's to give us the chizzuk to get out of gravity, so we can stay focused and connect with the rest of Tefilla.

If we are focused on our Tefillos we will notice that a large percentage of davening is yearning for the Geula and and the Bais Hamikdash. Chazal tell us that indeed we can be zoche to the Geula with the Koach of Tefilla.

In the zechus that we work on being mechazek our Avodas Hatefilla we should be zoche to vesechezana eineinu bishuvcha letziyon b'rachamim. Amein!

Living With Appreciation

Towards the end of our parashah, Miriam relates to Aharon her concern that Moshe separated from his wife Tziporah. For this she was punished with tzaraas and was sent outside the camp for seven days.

The Chafetz Chaim observes that Miriam didn't have any negative intent, she only desired to defend the honor of her sister-in-law Tziporah. She greatly admired Moshe and invested a lot of energy helping raise him when he was young. Furthermore, this comment was not said in public, only in private to her brother Aharon.

Yet, she was still punished, showing us how severe lashon hara is. It is a mitzvah from the Torah to remember this incident, helping us be more on guard not to speak lashon hara.

The Magen Avraham (60:2) teaches that we should specifically remember what happened to Miriam, when we say the words lehodos lecha, to thank You, in ahavah rabbah each morning. What is the connection? Why specifically here do we remember this?

The Magen Avraham explains that the entire reason why we have a mouth, is to thank Hashem! The ability to speak is a tremendous gift and should be used in a positive way by thanking Hashem. Therefore, we see how specifically when we recite 'lehodos lecha' we should remember the incident of Miriam, reminding ourselves of the correct use of the gift of speech.

So each time we thank Hashem we are fulfilling the reason why we have a mouth! When we say thank you Hashem for these scrumptious apples, this refreshing cup of water, this delicious ice cream, we are using our mouth for the reason why it was created. Phenomenal! This can bring us yeshuos lemalah min hatevah, as we see in the following story.

A concerned father was going through a very difficult time due to the fact that his 2 oldest sons were still single. They had such special qualities and he longed for the day when he would dance at their weddings. After attending a shiur on the importance of speaking positively and expressing gratitude, they resolved to change their perspective and became very positive and grateful people. They focused on all the blessings they have received going into great detail. They always said "Baruch Hashem", "chasdei Hashem" and constantly thanked Him.

Not so long after they had adopted this attitude both of their sons were engaged!

The man went to the Rabbi who gave the shiur that helped change their perspective, telling him about their yeshuah and thanking him for what he taught them.

This in turn was mechazek the Rabbi and he resolved to strengthen his gratitude. He was recently diagnosed with a hearing condition and his hearing was severely deteriorated, he decided to focus on all the blessings in his life, despite this difficult predicament. He spent the next week devoting countless hours expressing his tremendous gratitude to Hashem.

At the end of the week, he received a call from the hospital that one of the doctors thought that maybe there was one more thing they could try to help improve his hearing. The procedure was performed and sure enough his hearing greatly improved! (Chai batodah)

The "Everyone is on a Diet" became a popular trend not too long ago.

Before that, there was simply much less food available.


People therefore ate less and appreciated every piece of food that they had. They were thankful to Hashem for what they had.

Back in the days when farming was slow, hard and laborious work, the results were a much smaller crop and bounty.

There was a lot less growth, resulting in a lot less produce.

Then came the hardships of transporting goods.

The transportation of the produce was painstakingly slow.



To ship anything overseas by boat, from one country to another, was a very risky, dangerous and costly thing to do.

To transport foodstuff over land and across countries, by hitching loaded wagons to oxen, horses, and donkeys was very bothersome, time consuming, and again... costly.

People were, for the most part, forced for good reasons by Hashem to be limited to eating the produce that was grown in the nearby area and vicinity.

Now add to that, the fact that there was no refrigeration, freezing, canning, vacuum packaging, and chemical preservatives.

The result was of course, that most of food that was storaged, didn't last for long periods of time.

Back then, you basically were restricted to enjoy only the crop that was grown at that time of the year. It was the "fruit of the season" that our ancestors had and enjoyed and thanked Hashem.

That's how it came to be, a lively celebration, when the next season's fruit was available for human consumption.

In the Toirah there are many mitzvos regarding the celebration of the new crop.

מנחת עומר - for the new barley, שתי הלחם - for the new wheat, for the newly ripened -ביכורים fruit ,נטע רבעי - for the young new fruit bearing trees,

תרומה, מעשר, תרומת מעשר, מעשר שני, מעשר עני,

Even the mitzvah of simcha on Yom Tov is connected to the happiness of the new crop. חג הקציר, חג האסיף, חג הביכורים

Even in later years it was still a time of rejoicing, a time to make a brocho "shehechiyanu v'kiymanu v'higiyanu lazman hazeh on the new fruit!

If one received fruit that was not common at that time of the year, it was exciting and surprising.

My father-in-law a"h was from pre-war Galicia. He recounted his memories of once receiving a banana from some far away country, through a relative of his.

"We would eat a tiny bit and then close up the banana peel so it should still look like it's whole". It was a major treat!

About two thousand years ago, there was the great tzaddik Rabbi Yehuda Hanassi, who was famously wealthy.

The Gemarah points out the extent of his wealth.

His great wealth enabled him to have imported vegetables, to the point of, "He always had raddish and lettuce on his table" (of course for others to enjoy)!

It's hard for us to imagine how that would describe wealth!

In our times this specialty of availability sounds so simple!

We can now Boruch Hashem go to the supermarket throughout the year, at every hour of the entire day (and some places even through the night) and buy literally, any type of food that we can dream of having.! ישתבח שמו

"Don't overcharge your body!"

You'll wind up with carrying around lots of extra (stored calories) charged battery packs, which by the way, may weigh you down, (and wait, it'll also weight you up).

Food is a neutral thing, it's static energy, a stationary energy charge.

It really matters how you use it.

It can pull you up to Hashem or down to the earth.

When used as Hashem intended it to be it'll lift you up to being קדוש, in essence, closer to Hashem.

The powerful positive attitude with which eating is then associated, will naturally control and support good eating habits.

Shabbos foods are a great way to treat your children and yourself with that special connection to Hashem and that'll really be the greatest way that they'll experience להתענג בתענוגים.

On Shabbos we can add one more dimension to the spiritual side of the food being so delicious.

lt's the idea that you are eating לכבוד השם.

Meaning to say that you are a person who is celebrating the מלכות שמים.

We Yidden are the ones who proclaim to the world that Hashem created the world and He continues to run the world!

Down to the tiniest speck of creation is being constantly con-

trolled by the מלך מלכי הקדוש ברוך הוא.

We celebrate His מלכות by eating a scrumptious meal, all the while singing and speaking about Him running the world so perfectly in the best way possible.



That's why we are not allowed to show sorrow on Shabbos.

Since that could be interpreted as someone who is ו"ח unhappy with the way that the מלך העולם is running His world.

So as we eat the delicious food we have in mind to keep thanking Hashem for our mouthful of geshmake food, and we also have in mind celebrating Hashem's malchus.

At the same time we can verbally say לכבוד השם or לכבוד השכינה or אלכבוד השכינה which is The Divine Presence that is much palpable on Shabbos.

That'll give your family a chance to recharge for the whole upcoming week with a feeling of closeness to Hashem.

Now we're going to have to appreciate the third meal too.

It's challenging to have a third meal on Shabbos and actually enjoy it.

We're sometimes reluctant or not so sure if we can get to eat that third meal. It's a חיוב. So we do it. But let's try to do it correctly.

"Shall I?" and "I should" do "dis", creates the long Word "shall-I-should-dis" or Shalishoodis.

I would like to share with you a interesting p'shat of the nature of the name שלש סעודות.

Grammatically correct would be סעודה שלישית.

The reason for calling it שלש ois that when you aren't so interested in the third meal and then you go ahead and eat anyway, it throws light on all the meals that were eaten on Shabbos that they were all with having Hashem in mind and מלכבוד שבת and דלכבוד שמים.

Therfore we call it שלש oעודות since it gives the credit for all three!

Let's fully understand the importance of connecting to Hashem through food.

I once heard from Rabbi Avigdor Miller that the correct way to implement this approach of appreciation of food is, to put down the fork or spoon as one chews on a mouthful of goodness from Hashem.

Your mind is then more likely to be able to keep up with the idea of appreciation to Hashem, for the food as we eat.

Let's have a REAL OINEG SHAB-BOS!! All שלש סעודות!

OUR GENERATION!

We are still on a high from the Yom Tov of Shavuos. The day that we refresh our commitment to Hashem's Torah and mitzyos.

I would like to share with you an incredible eye-opening story:

Before the war, the Chofetz Chaim saw the town baker one day looking very down and broken. He asked him if there was anything he could do to help.

He responded: "Every day I make fresh and delicious bread for the city, but all I hear are moans and complaints. Each one has a different reason why he dislikes the way I bake: this one says that it's overdone, this one says it's underdone, the next says it's too salty... I can't handle all the grumbling!"

A short while later, the Chofetz Chaim met the baker again, but this time he was beaming with joy and happiness. "What changed?" asked the Chofetz Chaim. "Did your baking improve since the last time we spoke?"

"Not at all," the baker responded. "Now that there's a war, and bread is hard to come by, everyone who gets even a simple piece of bread is happy, and therefore no one

grumbles anymore."

After hearing this, the Chofetz Chaim said that the same is true with our generation. In comparison to the previous generations, who were giants, we might believe Hashem doesn't consider our avodah anything of note. However, as we approach the end of galus, that we don't have these giants, we must remember how Hashem is extra happy



with any mitzvah we do, big or small.

Even if it is not on the level of the previous generations, Hashem nevertheless is still very happy with them.

Many times when we're approaching mitzvos we are confronted with a Yetzer Harah questioning us: "Does Hashem really want your mitzvos?" "He had so many previous tzaddikim, he doesn't need yours."

All these thoughts are directly from the Yetzer Harah.

These are thoughts that he sends because he knows the value of our actions.

Let's explain this a little more. Had our mitzvos not carried great significance. there would be no reason that he send these thoughts, why would the Yetzer Harah - A Malach, care about our mitzvos. The only reason that he's sending these thoughts are due to their infinite value. This is a threat for him. He therefore has to fight this with all his power and cause us to feel how our actions don't bare much value. When we think these thoughts we automatically don't function properly. We don't do the mitzyos with the same excitement. Once we don't function properly, the Yetzer Harah is happy that he succeeded. His purpose is that he should weaken our commitment, but by cherishing the mitzyos, we are going to win him.

We must remember that the value of our mitzvos are very great, and not let the Yetzer Harah dissuade us.

Furthermore, because we are further from Matan Torah this gives the value of our actions so much more meaning.

Impressed by the pitch, Shlomo pledged a donation much more than he would normally give.


The lady then began to berate him, saying his donation was insignificant and he should be embarrassed to give that amount. He just wanted to take back the whole donation.

Over a year ago, my daughter **Esther bas Sara Miriam** *shetichyeh* (a young mother), was diagnosed with the *machalah*, and needs a lot of *tefillos*. I joined together with R' Yossi Hecht, founder of "ASHER TO THE YATZAR", and we began Bezras Hashem a monthly leaflet to help people understand what this beracha is all about and thus say it with more feeling and *kavanah*. Two Minutes a Day Keeps the Doctor Away!

The Seder Hayom (a mekubal in Tzfas at the time of the Arizal) writes: "One should say asher yatzar with great kavana, word after word, and think about the great kindness Hashem does with us each time we use the facilities... If a person does so, his entire life he will never get sick, and will never need a doctor, nor his cures." Perhaps the reason is that Hashem sees we appreciate our healthy bodies, so there is no need to remind us through sicknesses.

Rav Shimshon Pincus once asked: "Why is it that we hear about so many people who unfortunately are suffering from difficult sicknesses and ailments? It could be because we are not careful with the *berachah* of *asher yatzar*." Then he added, "I don't mean that we say it mindlessly – I mean we don't **say** it!! We mumble it and skip words, because it is a long *berachah* and we don't have patience for it."

This got me thinking: How long does it take to say asher yatzar properly? I venture to say approximately 20 seconds. This means we need to spend **no more than 2 minutes a day on this berachah**. That equals 14 minutes a week, one hour a month, and over an entire year just 12 hours. Who wouldn't spend a half a day every year to save himself from doctor visits, hospitalizations, operations, medications, physical and emotional pain and suffering!

It is well known that Rav Chaim Ozer Grodzinski (the leading *posek* and spiritual guide of the Jewish nation during the pre-WWII era) was able to hold a pen in each hand and write two different complicated halachic responsa, all while answering questions orally. However, most of us will probably find it difficult to think about the significance and meaning of this beracha if we are doing something else simultaneously. Let us make sure to stop everything we are doing for 20 seconds and say it while *standing in one place*. This small piece of advice can make the world of a difference.

Stories that Inspire

A rabbi was hired by a shul, and since he was a bit more scrupulous about mitzvah observance than his predecessor, many of the senior shul members grew skeptical of some of his practices. It's not hard to imagine their utter surprise upon observing their new rabbi closing his eyes and quietly reciting a prayer after using the restroom. A prayer for that too? They couldn't understand it!

Until one day...

The president of the shul, who was also the leader of the amused congregants, had to have a catheter put in. When the rabbi came to visit him in the hospital, the older man turned to him and said, "Forget Kol Nidrei, Rabbi! Asher Yatzar. That's where it's at!"

In the year 2014, the city of Detroit was hit with major floods. In many homes, basements were ruined and furniture destroyed. With many uninsured families staggering beneath the burden of the sudden financial loss, not to mention the scale of the cleanup job, a group of young man came together to launch the Detroit Chessed Project. The group managed to obtain new furniture and mattresses to replace those that had been lost by many families, and to recruit volunteers to clean out the flooded basements. Since that time, the project has gone on to provide assistance, financial and otherwise, to people contending with countless needs.

On Chol Hamoed Succos, the group met for a small but festive simchas beis hashoevah. The delectable food, excellent music, and spirited singing created an atmosphere of tangible simchas hachag.

A participant suggested that the members of the group each share a brief account of what each committee had accomplished. The revelations were astounding, even to the participants themselves. One member of the project related that his committee had recruited sponsors for an huge quantity of clothing donations over the course of the year. Another had arranged with a large retail chain store to donate a truckload of bedding, lamps, and accessories each month. A professional caterer then stunned the group by revealing the number of food packages he distributed each week. Suddenly, the rest of the attendees began volunteering to sponsor the costs of the food packages over the upcoming months, one after another. In a completely spontaneous development, thousands of dollars were pledged in the span of a few minutes. Once the impromptu fundraising session had ended, the singing began again and the festivities continued until late in the night.

At the conclusion of the event, as the musicians began packing up their equipment, the host approached the non-Jewish saxophone player, who lived an hour's drive away, to thank him for his time and effort. "I appreciate you are agreeing to stay so late," he said. "How much do we owe you for tonight?"

Visibly moved, the musician said, "Please, take the money and put it toward your wonderful program. I have never seen a display of such generosity and joyful giving in my life. You are the most incredible group of people I have ever seen."

As Jews, we are charged with behaving in a way that will earn us the world's admiration and lead others to recognize the greatness of Hashem. In order to accomplish this, we must go beyond ordinary human behavior. We must learn to display positive character traits that are so incredible that they are clearly recognized as being G-dly in nature. It must be clear to the world that our positive attributes are not the result of our being nice people, but rather are due to our service of Hashem. As Rav Shimon Schwab often commented, "Where mentschlichkeit ends its achievements — at that place, Yiddishkeit begins."

A Gift From Hashem

Based on a story told over by Rabbi Fischel Schachter

Heart surgery is an extremely risky procedure for anyone. When Rav Yosef Shalom Elyashiv ZT'L, at the age of 102, required a heart procedure, no doctor in Eretz Yisrael was willing to take on the risk of performing it. Instead, a world-renowned heart surgeon from America, along with his team of doctors and equipment, was flown in, despite the considerable expense. Upon their initial conversation, the esteemed doctor was amazed by Rav Elyashiv's sharpness. Here was a man of 102 years, asking precise questions with a clarity that surpassed even individuals twenty years his junior.

Thankfully, the surgery was successful, and before the doctor and his team returned to the United States, he made a final visit to Rav Elyashiv. Anticipating this visit, Rav Elyashiv turned to someone and asked, "How do you say thank you in English?" He practiced saying the words "Thank you" multiple times until he could say them fluently. When the doctor finished his visit, Rav Elyashiv expressed his gratitude in English by saying "Thank you."

People around them were surprised because Rav Elyashiv had been communicating with the doctor through an interpreter throughout their interactions. They wondered why it was so important for him to personally say "Thank you" instead of relying on the interpreter to translate "Todah rabba." When Rav Elyashiv was asked this question, he explained a fundamental concept.

Rav Elyashiv referred to a beautiful explanation from the Abudraham. During the chazaras hashatz, the congregation listens attentively as the shaliach tzibbur recites the Shmoneh Esrei. However, when the shaliach tzibbur reaches the bracha of Modim, the entire congregation bows down and says Modim derabanan, a prayer of thanks to Hashem. However, when it comes to thanking Hashem, it must be done personally by each individual. We cannot delegate someone else to say thank you on our behalf because the depth of gratitude varies based on the individual.


Chapter 1: Buying Meah Shearim


The next morning R' Zalmen went to the Turkish owner with a gevir by the name of R' Zundel.



The woman felt like a million dollars! She felt so valued and special, not because of how much money she received but because of how this man made her feel!






Q. I try to be very careful not to say or listen to lashon harah. However, my family members are not so careful to avoid lashon harah. This bothers me to no end; I'm trying so hard to avoid lashon harah, and they're letting their tongues loose and saying whatever they want.

A. What is it that's disturbing you so much? Perhaps what's bothering you is that your family members are showing insensitivity by acting in a way which they know bothers you. Furthermore, they are showing that what's important to you is not important to them, and that shows a lack of respect for you and what you value.

All this boils down to your pride being hurt. The antidote is to work on not becoming affected by kavod from people. Tell yourself: הכבוד הבל הבלים'. I don't care about kavod from people — especially people who speak lashon harah. True kavod comes from Hashem being pleased with me. When I'm working so hard to avoid lashon harah, Hashem is so proud of me'.

Perhaps you feel frustrated because you're trying so hard to serve Hashem by avoiding lashon harah, and it seems like Hashem is making it extra difficult by making lashon harah spoken in your own home.

The remedy for this is to ask yourself: 'what is avodas Hashem? giving a nachas ruach to Hashem. The way Hashem gets the most nachas ruach is when I'm serving him despite opposition. When I'm faced with nisyonos and I stay strong nonetheless, this is what gives Hashem the greatest nachas ruach'.

Additionally, take this challenge and 'turn it into a business'. Use this opportunity to thank Hashem that He gave you the wisdom to know what the right thing is to do, and although you're around people who are testing you, Hashem is helping you stay strong and overcome the challenge.

Q. I am a yungerman in kollel and, Baruch Hashem, I'm very matzliach.

Recently, I was diagnosed with a certain medical condition which is making me weak and it's difficult for me to concentrate. As a result, I can't learn and grow as well as I used to. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. Perhaps you aren't able to learn the way you used to, However, your opportunities to grow close to Hashem are as great as ever. You have the opportunity to work on the core of avodas Hashem: emunah. Work on trusting that your situation is tailored for you by your loving and caring father, Hakadosh Baruch Hu.

The Gr"a teaches that when someone serves Hashem in an area which he's good at, it doesn't fully show his devotion to Hashem, because he's naturally inclined to serve Hashem in such a manner.

The test of a true oveid Hashem is when a person is put in a position that he's not used to, and still serves Hashem to the best of his abilities in his current situation. This is the way a person can truly reach his shleimus.

As per your condition, do exercises in positivity. Accept the mindset: 'I'm feeling great!' Act as if you have koach. Learn as if you could concentrate. Hashem created an unbelievable phenomenon that when a person speaks positively and thinks positively, the body receives the message that it's healthy and begins to repair itself.

enings and I put

a lot of effort into having kavanna by shmoneh esrei.

However, there is a person who sits next to me who does things which disturb my kavanna. This makes me very frustrated. What's the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. Hashem does not need results. He sees that you're trying your best to have kavanna, and that's all He cares about.

The יערות דבש says that, on a certain level, you will get even more s'char, than if you would have succeeded in davening with kavanna. Because, if you would've had a good davening, you would take pride in your accomplishment. You would feel good about yourself, and the mitzva would not be one-hundred percent pure. But when you want to have a good davening but didn't, there are no exterior factors that detract from the mitzva.

Next, turn your 'failure' into a 'business'. Use your lack of kavanna as a means to strengthen your bitachon. Had you had a heartfelt davening, you might think, 'I'm okay. I had a good davening, and in that z'chus Hashem will answer

me'.

But now that you didn't have a 'good davening', your only resort is to go with straight bitachon, 'Hashem! I didn't have a good davening. There is nothing I have to rely on besides for you, Hashem'.

By doing this, you're taking your setbacks, and utilizing them to climb places you never would have gotten to otherwise.

Q. I am a teacher, and among the topics I teach is the concept of s'char v'onesh. However, people told me that in our generation, it's not healthy to emphasis s'char v'onesh. Is this correct?

A. Rav Moshe Feinstein Zatzal writes that the main obligation of chinuch is to teach emunah. A central part of our emunah is the knowledge that Hashem is our loving Father, and He made this world in order to give kindliness to us.

We have to drill into the bones of our children and students how deeply Hakadosh Baruch Hu loves us and how much He's thinking about us and taking care of us.

The reason there is opposition to teaching about s'char v'onesh is because the students often walk away with the message; 'Hakadosh Baruch Hu is a dictator with a stick in his hand, ready to get you if you do anything wrong'. This attitude can create unhealthy tension towards avodas Hashem.

However, if you succeed in communicating to your students that everything that Hashem does is out of kindness, you can explain how the concept of onesh is another aspect of Hashem's rachmanus. When Hashem needs to give an onesh, he is returning the person's neshama to its pure state.

We can compare it to a baby who got soiled, and his loving mother bathes him with soap and shampoo. Even though the baby cries, we understand that the baby needs to get clean, and what the mother is doing is the greatest act of rachmanus.

When the students understand the concept of s'char v'onesh as an act of love from Hakadosh Baruch Hu, it will make their relationship with Hashem even stronger.

Hashgacha Pratis

I want to share this hashgacha pratis story.

I remember the amazing story from R' Yisroel Brog (grandson of Rav Avigdor Miller, and Rosh Yeshiva of Tiferes Avigdor in Wickliffe/Cleveland, OH) that you had printed in this year's Succos edition.

He had related about how money that he had invested, over the years in kollel, for his

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children's chasunos, had disappeared due to someone's astonishing lack of caring, and that he said that now he has nothing other than bitachon, and that money started coming to him in most unusual and astonishing ways.

For example, when he was making one shidduch, and the mechutanim asked about support, checks suddenly began arriving at his house. He found out that a friend had made a small business deal with someone, several years prior, and had earmarked the profits to him. The businessman had forgotten about the deal, but now that his office was moving and they were digitizing the documents, he realized that there had been profit, and he sent the checks to Rav Brog. They arrived just when he needed them! (He also explained that he didn't think there was anything wrong with saving up money; one is allowed to, but that we see that bitachon is an even greater 'savings account'!)

The story I had is as follows: I produced tapes and CDs for years, and now USBs. I did a job for a mosad that wanted to give out USBs with shiurim as a gift by their dinner. The total cost for me to produce several hundred copies - with engraved logo and a nice printed tag, was about \$500. And for 15-20 hours of set-up work that went into it (for naming the files to show properly in the display of the MP3-player, and raising the volume to be able to hear properly, and also literally about one-hundred emails back and forth!), I charged another \$500.

Now, before Shavuos, I went to a wine store, and bought about \$250 worth of wine and beer that I mostly gave to a yeshiva in my neighborhood, (of 'bais medrash/yeshiva gedola'-age), and I also bought about \$250 worth of cut-up fruit platters, nuts, and chocolate that I gave to both that yeshiva and to several shuls in my neighborhood for Shavuos learning.

The dinner of the mosad took place about one week before Shavuos, and the check arrived at my house in the mail on Shavuos; I opened the envelope with the mail on Motzoei Shavuos!!!

We also know that Chaza"l say (Beitza 16a) that all of one's earnings are set for him from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur - except for the expenditures of Shabbosos and Yomim Tovim, and the expenditures for his children for learning Torah — that if one decreases, They decrease for him, and if one increases, They increase for him.

Rash"i explains that the yearly amount of money is set, and therefore, one should not spend too much on various matters, as he will not get more money. However, the aforementioned expenditures are not set – how much he will receive for it and from where the money will come, rather, whatever he is used to spending for these matters, he will

receive back either right away or after some time!

(I imagine we can say that spending on others' children for Talmud Torah is no less than on one's own. So, for Shavuos this year it was for all three – as Shavuos came out on Shabbos!)

This brings to mind a maaseh I heard from Rav Avraham Abba Freundlich, morah horaah in Lakewood. He told a story he had heard from Rav Shneur Kotler Zt"l, who related it a number of times when he learned by him in the yeshiva.

Rav Shneur grew up in the shtetl, and in that vicinity, there were two chadarim. One was in their shtetl, with the being in a neighboring shtetel. The cheder in the neighboring shtetl was known as somewhat of a better mosad. Most people sent to the local cheder, however, an almana with several boys sent to the neighboring shtetl. It cost her extra for the higher tuition and for the coach, yet, she somehow managed to afford it. People would ask her in wonder why she bothers and how she is indeed able to afford it, and she would reply with emunah peshuta, "What is the question; Chaza"l promise that one will be able to afford it!"

Shockingly, it came out that all of those who spent their hard earned money on these underground sprinkler irrigation systems, LOST THEIR TREES during Hurricane Sandy, while the others who didn't spend this money, KEPT THEIR TREES.

Rav Finkel explained, "Those trees who had their water available to them at all times, because their owners installed advanced underground sprinkler systems, never needed to spread their roots to look for water and nutrition. Therefore, these trees never developed deep and firm roots, and they fell to the strong winds of Sandy. In sharp contrast are the trees whose owners didn't install these irrigation systems – their roots needed to spread out more and more deeply into the ground in order to locate water and nutrients for survival. These deep roots proved stronger than the mightiest of hurricane winds,"
