Even though it was very hard for R' Hershel, he was mekabel on himself. Baruch Hashem the disease disappeared!



Reb Shaya felt bad that Hash-





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


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em didn't listen to his Tefillos that he davened that he shouldn't have to take out a loan.

We mentioned that the average amount of pressure that our molars can exert is 162 pounds per square inch. Even though this is a substantial amount of pressure, we find many animals that have much stronger bites.

An average dog has 230 pounds of pressure, a lion – 650 and the championship goes to the hippopotamus, who has 1,820 pounds of pressure per square inch. That is more than 11 times the pressure that a human has!

You might ask, since the stronger our teeth are, the easier it is to eat hard food, why didn't Hashem make our bite stronger? Perhaps we can suggest that excessive strength would be dangerous for people. The bite of a dog, which is just 70 pounds of more pressure than a human, has the ability to break bones. This is an important feature for animals that kill and hunt, they have to take apart raw meat for their meals. For a person, not only is this unnecessary but it could be very dangerous. If a person had this potential, he would be able to bite off a finger, c"v. It occasionally happens that a person bites his finger or his tongue and if we had excessive pressure in our jaws this could have tragic consequences c"v.

This can also be applied to young children, who sometimes bite other children. Hashem protected us by not giving us excessive power in our jaws. Rather, Hashem gave us sufficient pressure that we need in order to eat the types of food that we need.

When we compare the amount of pressure we can exert with our teeth to the amount of pressure that is necessary to bite and crush our food, Hashem's intelligent design stands out very visibly. If all our food was created very soft, like watermelon and cottage cheese, all the powerful pressure that we have in our teeth would seem superfluous and unnecessary.

On the other hand, if our food was created very hard and tough, and the pressure in our bite would not suffice to crush it, we would have a major problem eating.

Hashem arranged that all of our food is not too hard and is chewable within the range of pressure that our jaws provide. This is despite the fact that many of our foods are quiet hard.

From all the thousands of different types of natural food that we have – fruits, vegetables – can you think of any food that is just too hard to eat in its natural form? I can't.

They are all soft enough for us to eat. We don't have to cook them, grate them or blend them to make them softer and edible. We are able to eat them and chew them as is. Hashem made our food tailor made, to match the pressure our teeth supply.

I hope that this article won't be needed and we will be celebrating the three weeks with dancing in the Bais Hamikdash.

As I am writing this article, I am visualizing all of our readers dancing in the streets of Yerushalayim, as they are heading to the Bais Hamikdash to celebrate. However, just in case Chas V'shalom this is not the case I am here to give some chizzuk [The truth is that working on tzipisa l'yeshua visualization is a good exercise].

The Navi tells us that when Moshiach comes, the day of Shiva Assar B'Tamuz will be transformed into a Yom Tov and Tisha B"Av will also be transformed into a great Yom Tov. The Seforim add on that the days in-between will be Chol Hamoed [that's three weeks of trips - to the Bais Hamikdash of course. Where else?]

Now this needs to be explanation. These weeks are weeks of Aveilus, weeks of sadness. These days represent the Churban Bais Hamikdash. They also represent two thousand years of pain and suffering in Galus. We could understand that when Moshiach comes the three weeks of aveilus should disappear. But of all days of the year, why should these days become days of joy? A Yom Tov no less.

So to this question there are different answers. We will take one amazing approach that will The unbelievable power of a good word By R' Y. Friedman

give us chizzuk in the great Mitzva of Tzipisa l'yeshua.

Recently, I was at a Yartzeit Seuda. It was a nice meal. At that Seuda the family of the deceased and many of his friends attended. I was asked to speak and I agreed.



When I got up to speak I posed the following question. I said that I understand the simple reason why we have a delicious meal at a Yartzeit Seuda. Because we need to get together, and this is how we get friends and families together. However, the question is what is the reason why we get together on the Yartzeit.

I believe that we can say as follows. Chazal tell us that after one year, a person starts forgetting. During the first year, people learn Mishnayos and do things l'iluy nishmas the deceased, and we don't want this to taper off. Therefore, after the year is up we get together and we bring the memories back to life, so we will continue to do things l'iluy nishmaso.

On that note we can say that the day of Tisha B'av and the three weeks that precede Tisha B'av, are the days that we refresh ourselves in regards to the Bais Hamikdash and Moshiach. At this time we talk a lot about the Churban and the Bais Hamikdash and we yearn for it intensely.

Moreover we keep three weeks of Aveilus commemorating the great loss that we had. The point is that as we say "im lo eshkocheich Yerushalayim" We don't want to forget Yerushalayim. Therefore, every year we get together at this time for remembrance, but the goal is to remember all year.

The GR"A writes famously that the Churban Bais Hamikdash was like the death of the Jewish people. Just like death represents the separation of the soul and the body, the Bais Hamikdash is like the soul of the Jewish people. When we lost it, it was like we lost our soul. He says that since then, the process of the body withering began and there is very little left.

In sync with this theme, the GR"A writes that he could understand what a Rishon is about. He can understand what the Gaonim were about, and he can even understand the Amoraim. He could even grasp what a Tana is about. But a simple Ehrliche Yid in the time of the Bais Hamikdash that he can't fathom. That's because they had the Bais Hamikdash, our Neshama.

This in in sync with the famous words of the Arizal that says that before Moshiach comes we will enter the fiftieth level of impurity which is even further than Mitzrayim.

Now when one hears such words of the GR"A on one hand we can become depressed. "I

thought that I was an amazing Yid but we are so far away from where we should be as the GR"A teaches us. We are like dead people r"l."

But in truth we can get chizzuk that will bring us to tremendous heights like never before.

I will give a Mashal. There was a mighty king that had a spoiled crown prince. He was so haughty and spoiled that if not for his age you could have mistakenly thought that he was the king.

One day, due to his haughtiness he did something extremely naughty that almost triggered a rebellion in the kingdom. When the king heard about this he was furious and he banished his son from the country.

When the prince refused to leave, he was banished by force to a far-away land. Secretly, the king sent a spy to check up on the prince every now and then.

The prince didn't know where to go or what to do as he wasn't accustomed to a lifestyle of taking care of himself. He started wandering around telling people that he was a prince. Everyone laughed and mocked him.

After a while, he started begging for food and he became a broken person. He became a beggar like everyone else, and he used to live in the homeless shelter. He almost forgot that he was once a prince.

One day he was in the homeless shelter. The poor people were drinking some wine and they started a discussion about The unbelievable power of a good word By R'Y. Friedman

the king. One beggar started saying what a mean king he was. Another started mocking the king's way of talking. Another was saying how greedy the king was.

The prince was lying on his bed when realization hit him that they were talking about his father the king. He got up from his bed and started shouting on top of his lungs that they were liars and they dare not speak about their beloved king like that.

When they heard him say that they started beating him up. Yhey said that if he doesn't take back his words they would kill him. He responded, "I will never say anything bad about my father the king."

All of the sudden the door burst open and the King and his entourage appeared and the prince ran into the embrace of his loving father, "you have passed the test". "Long live the prince," and all the beggars bowed down to the king and to the Prince.

The Nimshal is that we the Yidden lost our Holy Bais Hamikdash and we are almost not recognizable as the crown prince. Hashem has put us into a Galus where we live amongst the non-Jews. We are broken and have been beaten and we are so far away.

However, despite all that we stay strong and we stand up for Kevod Shamayim. We show Hashem that despite how far we are we still love Hashem our father. This creates the greatest Nachas Ruach to Hashem. This has the power to bring us home to where we belong, into our Father's arms.

Another point is that when we hear such words from the GR"A our hearts should be swelling with yearning. Can we imagine that we can enter an era that the heilige Vilna Gaon who was from the biggest Gaonim to say that he cannot fathom us. When we are Zoche to Moshiach then we will be like that Yid who the Gaon could not fathom.

Even greater. The Vilna Gaon seemed to be referring even to a simple Yid that wasn't so learned. When Moshiach will come the Rambam tells us that every Yid will know tremendous amounts of Torah and this includes the secrets of the Torah. How can we not yearn for this time? When it comes to money we all want to be a billionaire or at least a millionaire, so why should our Ruchniyus be any different?

Getting back to the original question we can understand why these weeks are going to be transformed into days of great joy. That's because these days kept us connected to Yerushalayim. It's these days that kept us from forgetting about the Bais Hamikdash. It's through these days that we can constantly be Metzape l'yeshua.

May it be His will (which it is) and our will that Moshiach should come speedily and the three weeks will be transformed into the longest and biggest Yom Tov ever, Amein! Parashas Masei opens by listing all the places where Klal Yisrael encamped during their forty year in the midbar.

Rashi brings a parable of a king whose son became sick, and had to travel to a distant place to cure him. On their way back, the king affectionately recounted, 'here we slept, here we were cold, here you had a headache'. We are Hashem's beloved children, and He affectionately recounts all the places we encamped on our journey to Eretz Yisrael

Elaborating on this, the Gur Aryeh explains that 'here we slept' refers to the good times when the Jews encamped in serenity without challenges. 'Here we were cold', refers to the times when they thought they were lacking. 'Here you had a headache' refers to when they were in potential danger. However, at every stage of the journey, Hashem, in His great kindness, took care of us with incredible love and concern. The list of places mentioned serves as a testimony of Hashem's tremendous care for us and helps us express our gratitude for this.

The Ba'al Shem Tov teaches that the 42 encampments signify the journeys that each person goes through during his life. Just as the Torah describes the journeys of Klal Yisrael to serve as a remembrance of Hashem's great kindness, we must strive to always be aware of the great goodness that Hashem kindly gives us. In addition to the blessings which we experience constantly, such as the ability to walk, see, and breathe, we also experience blessings at different junctures in our life. For example, the privilege of becoming bar/bas mitzvah, being accepted into the institution we wanted, getting married, finding a place to live, having children etc. These constitute our personal 'encampments'. We can learn from the Torah, the importance of recording the blessings which we experience.

Many find that a particular meaningful way of doing this, is to record them in a journal. Those who observe this practice notice that their lives have been infused with greater happiness.

A young chassan whose family was under great financial pressure for the necessary funds took upon himslef to provide \$5,000, removing some of the strain from his family. However, he had no idea how he would come up with this money. He resolved to start recording in a journal all the incredible blessings which he had experienced in his life. No matter how busy he was, each day he reflected upon the incredible kindnesses he had witnessed and carefully recorded them.

After 2 weeks he received a call from a family friend whom he had not heard from in a while. "I understand you are getting married soon," he said, "is there any money you are still missing?" "Well, I took upon myself to provide \$5,000" remarked the chassan, "and I have not yet come up with the money".

Recap: I had gone from 11 flying high summers at my counselor/lifeguard job in the Catskill Mountains, to being a $(v' \square v)$ injured melamed here in the city day camps. In all the pain and suffering $(\square v)$ I was trying to get my act together, i. e. sending off 4 children to sleep away camp and at the same time, balance my budget and start off the summer teaching job normally.

So... here we were. It was the night before I sent off one of my sons to the airport for his flight to his Eretz Yisroel'dige summer vacation camp (his Yeshiva goes there for the summer). We finally finished the last minute touch ups with his packing and the reassuring emunah and bitachon shmuz at about 2:00 am.

We both fell into an exhausted deep sleep. My son was sleeping on one recliner and me on another. We had set the alarm for 4:00 am.

We awoke two hours later a little bit recharged and on time.

Still groggy, I took my son to the Yeshiva, where the coach buses were waiting. Half asleep, I waived to him good-bye, and returned back to my house.

On the way home, I had to report some common crime of someone using an electric grinder to cut off the locks of a bunch of bicycles. I waited for only a few minutes until the heimishe patrol came by. I finally got home and then davened shacharis. My head was spinning but I had to be at my day camp teaching job soon!

IT WAS MY FIRST DAY OF DAY CAMP. I hadn't properly prepared for "The Day."

I started to regret taking this job. I just wanted to get into bed, sleep well and unwind from the whole tumultuous year. I was feeling overwhelmed.

Suddenly, I remembered a great mashal for the lesson I was going to teach that would help the children understand the concept of "chukah."

It involves a story of a bet, between two rival kings, to prove or disprove how loyal the king's son was to him.

Basically it teaches and brings home the point of listening to Hashem and doing His mitzvos even when we don't understand or comprehend the "why" and "what for."

I got this feeling that Hashem was at my side. Then I figured, "Hey I've taught this parsha lots of times." It was Parshas Chukas, which is sometimes taught at the end of the school year, if you teach chumash by the order of Parshas Hashevua.

I told myself "Be'ezras Hashem it will be fine."

I arrived on time, and the day started well. Hashem helped me with that great mashal on the idea of "chukah" and I continued on feeling that siyatta diShmaya. But I still felt tired and deep down I was really unsure if I really belonged in a classroom.

Then it happened.. something surreal...

I was explaining the halachos of Para Aduma and I wanted to liven it up for the children.

I was speaking about the color red that is mentioned in the passuk as.. "not the same red color as. . kinderlech, you're used to.. like.. ummm.. (I paused) like the red crayons you use."

ward the crayons box on the shelf, and I continued "like..." And then I got the shock of my life. There on the floor next to the shelf was a large almost lifelike size of a rubber inflated... RED COW!!!

Still shocked and amazed at the Heaven-sent prop that I desperately needed, I just continued speaking naturally "like this red cow but it's more orange - brown."

I then continued explaining the other halachos of totally Red, and again referred to the inflated cow "not like this cow that has a few white spots" "and no missing ear" (like this... I put on a bandaid..).

I even put a boy's bag on the back of the cow to demonstrate the next halacha.

All the while, as I was speaking, I kept on thinking about the hashgacha pratis, and that Hashem knows that it's hard, and is still showing me "I'm with you."

It was like receiving a reassuring hug and kiss from Hashem, by the means of that 'Red Cow'.

There is no denying that feeling when you live through such a story.

That inflated tube was a single remnant from the previous summer, when the head counselor gave out all types of inflated animals to all the children. This single one was an extra, sitting in that room surviving an entire school year! It was waiting for me!

Well, now two years later, I'm starting to see some of the benefits of the whole story especially the fact of staying in the city versus going up to the mountains..

First of all, the city has plenty of goods to offer, over being in the mountains. It's tick free, and there are less mosquitoes, hornets, wasps, and spiders. There are no field-mice, bats, or skunks.

There is better water drainage for rain, better electrical and gas supply. There is better, easier, more accessible and cheaper shopping. We have better major appliances here. There are more shuls and yeshivos available. They are air conditioned at all times of the day.

As a result of my new summer teaching job, my son took some observing lessons sitting in my class, and got himself a teaching job as well.

I learned much more Toirah here in the city.

I had the opportunity to get more heimish with lots of neighbors who are way too busy, to be able to socialize throughout the year. I started seeing people that I knew for so long already, act in a much more pleasant way.

I don't have to go through the yearly readjusting to the city life. The sudden change was a big struggle, and hurdle, to overcome at the end of each summer.

One major improvement to my life is very obvious to me. It's the regaining, and the gaining more of the correct positive perspective on my daily life.

I find myself appreciating a lot more the simple things: My surroundings, my job, my family, food, davening, learning, everything...

It all takes on a new special meaning. In a way, this type of summer does so much more for me. Being able to see life in a more relaxed, slowed down, style and speed of life, leaves a lasting impression on my life for the coming year and hopefully... years!

Now I'm positively sure that there is sooo much more good that has already occurred to me as a result of all this. I'm just not tuned in enough to see it all. I'm also sure that many more good things are on the way as a result of the seemingly tipsy turvy tumblesauce.

From Hashem only comes good. We hope and pray to be "zoiche" to see it with our "fleishige oigen." Like that red cow!!!



What Do the Words Mean?

Birchas Asher Yatzar - Part III

"אשר יצר את האדם <u>בחכמה -</u> Who fashioned man with <u>wisdom</u>

Last week we saw that the basic understanding of the word "*b'chochma*" is that Hashem created the human body with unbelievable wisdom and then we go on to delineate those wonders. However, many *meforshim* give a different explanation and say that we are thanking Hashem for giving man wisdom. At first glance this seems difficult – what is the connection of our wisdom to the rest of this *beracha* which addresses the wonders of the physical human body?

The Eitz Yosef (Otzer Hatefillos) explains that when we look at the human face and see the signs of human intellect, and we see that he stands upright, speaks, and thinks, it shows that he is not a two-legged animal – he is something else entirely! The *meforshim* say that man is really a "miniature world." All the wisdom of the universe is found in some form in the human being. This encourages us to delve into the body and study the infinite wisdom contained in it.

Rabbeinu Manoach (on the Rambam) explains differently. We thank Hashem for the wisdom He gave us, for without it we would not be able to grasp the wonders of the digestive system and the other phenomenal aspects of our bodies. We can take this further. The Rokeach writes that we are referring specifically to the wisdom of Torah. Indeed, if we spell out the letters of "*chochma*" as -'n" "'-n' it equals 613 – representing the Torah. We thank Hashem for creating us in a way that our human physical mind can grasp the Torah, which should be impossible, since it is the Wisdom of Hakadosh Baruch Hu. Perhaps the connection to the rest of the beracha is that Torah literally means "teaching." The Torah teaches us how to live our lives in a way that we are constantly connected to Hashem. It is because we have the Torah that we do not live like most of mankind, who eat, digest their food and expel the waste with nary a thought about the kindness they are experiencing from their Creator.

This week, when we say the word "*b'chochma*", let us bear in mind the fact that Hashem instilled in us endless fountains of wisdom and taught us how to use it through the wisdom of the Torah.

Once, Rav Shlomo Zalman received an invitation to a bar mitzvah that he could not attend, due to a wedding scheduled for the same night. He sent an apologetic note to the parents in advance of the simchah, explaining that he would be unable to attend the bar mitzvah. They were quite surprised, then, when Rav Shlomo Zalman arrived in the hall on the night of the event.

In response to a query from the father of the bar mitzvah boy, Rav Shlomo Zalman said simply, "I remembered that I had attended the bar mitzvahs of both of his older brothers, and I was afraid that your son would be insulted if I didn't attend his bar mitzvah as well. For that reason, I felt that I had to be here."

On another occasion, Rav Shlomo Zalman was approached by the parents of a fourteen-year-old boy who was mentally disturbed and was causing great hardships for his parents and neighbors. The famed Rosh Yeshivah managed to convince the boy's parents to place him in a specific institution, but then he surprised them by asking to speak with the boy himself. He insisted that it was crucial for the boy's emotional well-being for him to go willingly to the institution, rather than being forced into it. Rav Shlomo Zalman met with the boy and cleverly offered him a "position" as the "rabbi" of the institution. The boy enthusiastically accepted the offer, proud to be playing such an important role. Long after that conversation, he was still performing the functions of a rabbi, monitoring the kashrus standards in the institution and helping others with their tefillin, while his own mental health steadily improved.

Every human being, young or old, has a deep-seated desire to feel important. When we show respect to others, regardless of who they are, we are essentially giving them the most valuable gift they could possibly receive — the priceless sense of self-importance that brings out the best in every individual. Ultimately, this will play a major role in promoting the revelation of Hashem's honor as well.

Takeaway: Giving kavod generously to other people is a powerful means to increase kevod Shamayim. When people are treated with respect, it is like oxygen for their souls, and it makes it possible for them to realize their full potential.

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This story has been called in by Mishpachas Applebaum. She said over that she was still looking to get her



Q. For a long time I've been working on acquiring menuchas hanefesh, but after all my efforts, I feel that I haven't really gotten anywhere. What's the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

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ZEVY GOLOMS

A. Working on middos is part of avodas Hashem. What Hashem wants from you is not results. Results aren't in a person's control. What you can do, however, is 'exercises' in trying to gain menuchas hanefesh. Success in avodas Hashem is measured on how much effort you put in into trying to succeed.

Additionally, Rav Chaim Volozhiner teaches, that when a person accepts a difficult situation Hashem gives him, in that z'chus he will see a yeshuah in that area. Therefore, if after trying you best, you don't see results, be mekabel your situation without שענות, and in that zchus Hashem will help you acquire true menuchas hanefesh.

Q. I have a medical condition in which the doctor said that there's nothing to do. Since I live with bitachon, my attitude is: okay, the doctors might not know what to do. But I have bitachon in the 'Head Doctor', Hakadosh Baruch Hu.

But when I speak with family and friends and tell them that I have bitachon that everything is going to work out, they ask me, 'Are you sure that your attitude is coming from real bitachon? Maybe your calmness is coming from optimism and you're just calling it bitachon'. After hearing that, I started second-guessing myself; maybe my bitachon is not really

sincere, and I'm just trying to be positive?

A. True your bitachon may not be one-hundred percent pure, but practically, it doesn't really matter.

Why not? If there would be hishtadlus to do, certainly Hashem wants you to do it. But if there's nothing for you to do, Hashem wants us to be calm and relaxed. Hashem is our father, and every father wants his child to be calm and relaxed.

From a ruchniusdik standpoint as well, a person who's full of anxiety is not able to serve Hashem properly.

Therefore, of course, the best form of calmness is when it comes from bitachon. However, even if it's not coming completely from bitachon, rather from optimism, positivity or naivety it's still very valuable. And the attitude of positivity itself has power to create a positive effect.

Q. About the previous response, what's the source positivity alone, without bitachon, can cause positive results?

A. Chazal teach us [Makkos 10B]: בדרך שאדם רוצה לילך בה מוליכין אותו. The Maharsha explains a person's desire creates a malach to help him see to it that he succeeds.

Based on this concept, Rav Avigdor Miller teaches that when a person wants to be positive, even if it doesn't come bitachon, he will have special assistance to uphold his positivity, and will receive extra bracha from Hashem to maintain this ideal. a goy chooses to work on being happy, Hashem will make him healthy and hearty. It's well known that laughter is the best medicine.

Q. Whenever I hear that something tragic happened to someone I know, such as illness in the family or issues with their children, it throws me off and I start getting scared. What's the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. What generates anxiety? We are dreading that something terrible might happen.

It's important to be aware: realistically, the extent of our worry is extremely disproportionate. The facts are, Hashem's kindness is ten-thousand times more widespread than pain.

Instead of magnifying the few who are ill, just look all around and see a world full of healthy people walking around. And the same applies to all other misfortunes.

Just, the Yetzer Harah has a way of taking negative news and giving the impression that tragedy is commonplace. Newspapers hardly mention positive news because people don't find it to be 'exiting'; people find morbid news much more 'sensational'. Therefore, the newspapers collect all the tragedies from around the world into one place, which creates a notion that misfortunes are commonplace.

We have to recognize that it's nothing but the trap of the Yetzer Harah who's trying to pull us down.

This holds true even with goyim. If If you recall all the things you were

what ended up happening, you will notice that your fears have a very poor track-record. Of all the things you were so nervous about, one out of a thousand did not come to fruition. This can help us realize the fallacy of our groundless fears.

Furthermore, the abundance of brachah we have in our lives doesn't happen by itself. It's coming from Hashem who is constantly taking care of us. This should help us realize that Hashem is our father, and He is constantly taking care and protecting us.

And in the zchus of recognizes that all the good that's in his life is from Hashem, Hashem will continue demonstrating His protection and save us from any misfortune.

Q. I went to a bungalow colony for the summer because I thought I would enjoy myself. But now that I arrived, I see that the families here are not my kind of crowd. I don't feel comfortable around the people here, and I'm simply not enjoying myself.

What I planned out to be an enjoyable vacation is turning out to be a big disappointment, and this is making me feel very down. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. If you're looking to enjoy yourself, you should know that enjoyment does not come from bungalow colonies, and it doesn't come from going to the mountains.

The key to enjoyment is in using

your mind properly. If you train yourself to think correctly, you will be able to enjoy yourself in any situation you find yourself in. And if you don't learn to think correctly, you'll remain miserable no matter where you are.

Happiness is the state of mind of noticing the good which you already have, and taking pleasure in them.

Whatever situation in life a person finds himself in, he can always find something positive to focus on.

Instead of agonizing over that one thing that isn't exactly the way you would like, fill your mind with all the gifts you have that can give you so much joy.

Are you on vacation?

• Are you together with your family?

Do you have food to eat?

• Do you have a roof over your head?

• Are you sick in the hospital?

• Are you alive?

If you focus on how much good you have, you will harness the happiness you have within you, and you will always be full of joy in every circumstance.

And a person who lives with Hashem can take it one step further. In addition to enjoying the goodness that he has on a material level, he will enjoy it in the context that it's coming from his loving father who gave him all those gifts for him to enjoy! But if you choose to focus on what you don't have you will never be truly happy. No matter how good your situation is, it'll never be perfect, and you'll always find reasons to complain.

Even if you don't necessarily feel full of joy and there are things that still bother you, don't verbalize your negative feelings. When you complain and kvetch about your problems, it just makes them bother you even more.

Instead, choose to speak about the good points about your situation, even if you don't feel it. Say, "This vacation is so much fun" – even though you don't feel it. Say, "It's so geshmak to get away for a few weeks" – even though you don't really think that it's geshmak at all. Say, "I love meeting new people" – even if you are naturally shy.

The words you express will have an effect on your brain and your body will react in a positive way. Your attitude will be influenced, and you will find that you actually will begin to feel happier.

Therefore, if you're looking to enjoy life, you don't have to go anywhere and you don't have to buy anything. The tools to lead a happy life are already in your hands! And you'll get s'char for it too!
