minutes from Clementon. Every day she travels in to Camp Chavaya which is located in Lakewood, New Jersey. The ride takes an hour and fifteen minutes. But that day, since there was a trip in Clementon, it didn't make sense for her to go all the way from Cherry Hill to Lakewood and then back to Clementon, so her parents drove her straight to the park.

R'Avromi asked her for her name, and she said: Serebrowski. He recognized the name. He knew of a Rav in Cherry Hill by that name. He gave her a wristband.

She took the wristband and went back to the car in the distance. She then came back with the wristband on her hand and went inside to wait for her camp.

Many hours later, at 9:00 that night, the last shift of camps were leaving the park. The bus for Camp Oros just wouldn't start. The driver tried this and that, but the bus just wouldn't turn on. They got a tow-truck to come over and give it a boost, but it didn't work. The only option was for a 'rescue bus' from Lakewood to come and pick them up. But at that time of night it wasn't easy to get through to the bus company. At first they thought a bus from Lakewood was sent but then they heard it wasn't sent. Then they were told that it was on its way and would be there in 45 minutes, then they were told that the bus was still in Lakewood... They didn't know if the bus would ever arrive...

The park was already closed, so the girls were in the parking lot

outside. It was dark. It was hot and there was no air conditioning on the bus. They had no water and there were no bathrooms. They were in the middle of a non-Jewish city at 10:30 at night. They weren't even sure if the bus was coming.

The girls were on the bus, singing kumzits songs, but something had to be figured out.

R' Avromi started wracking his brains to figure out who he knows in the neighborhood.

He tried calling Chaveirim in Philadelphia, but they were too far away. He knew of a Rav in Cherry Hill who he had spoken to a couple times. He called his cell phone but there was no answer, he was on vacation.

Then he realized, "One second, this morning there was a girl here in Clementon - Serebrowski from Camp Chayava, her father is a Rav here in Cherry Hill!" So, he called up the camp, and asked them for the Rav's phone number. They gave him his phone number. R' Avromi called and the Rav picked up right away. R' Avromi introduced himself. The Rav said, "Yes, I saw you in the distance while I was sitting in the car when my daughter came to get the wristband from you."

R' Avromi explained the problem. The Rav said, "Don't tell me anything else. I'm going to load up my car with food and drinks and bring it to the girls."

R' Avromi said, "Thanks so much. Good to know we have that option. Let me speak to the camp and I'll call you back."

After speaking to Light Up's director, they realized that it didn't make any sense for the girls to stay in the parking lot any longer. It was hot, dark, and there were no bathrooms.

Rabbi Serebrowski, eager to help, didn't even wait for R' Avromi to call back – he called him three minutes later. "What's the story, I'm ready to get going already."

R' Avromi told him that the girls really need to be taken to a place to stay where they can wait for the rescue bus to come.

Rabbi Serebrowski said, "You know what we're going to do? I'm going to send out a text message to my community. Everyone will come and pick up the girls."

He sent out a message to his community. Many of them were already in bed, but they were all so excited to help!

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


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Before you knew it, 12-15 cars came rolling up to the Clementon parking lot, with Yidden of all different levels of Yiddishkeit. They picked up the fifty tired and hungry Lakewood girls and brought them to the Shul in Cherry Hill. The Shul was air conditioned, it was lit up, there were bathrooms, there was food and drinks.

Rabbi Serebrowski made a barbecue with a hundred franks. Each girl got two franks. They roasted marshmallows, and they were able to make phone calls to their parents, whatever they had to do.

They stayed there until the bus from Lakewood finally came to pick them up.

Baruch Hashem, the girls loved the trip, they had a great time, it was an amazing water park, then they had a kumzitz on the dark bus, then this amazing Bar-B-Q.

But the most amazing thing is the Hashgacha. In the past many years, R' Avromi and his father have brought tens of thousands of kids to Clementon. This was the first time he knew of a kid from Cherry Hill coming to Clementon, and it happened at 9:00 that very morning. It was Hashem being makdim the refuah l'makkah. Hashem knew that later on that day they were going to need someone from Cherry Hill to help out. So, He arranged that that person, who was going to be the Shaliach to help the stranded girls, would have his daughter come and speak to R' Avromi, so that R' Avromi would remember later that day about the girl from Cherry Hill.

When R' Avromi spoke to Rabbi Serebrowski, Rabbi Serebrowski told him that there was even more Hashgacha in the story.

Their plan in the morning was to meet the camp at Clementon, and his daughter would have gone in together with her camp. But they got confused with the timing so they got to Clementon Park a half an hour early. Only because of that did R' Avromi see his daughter when she came to the ticket window. Otherwise, she would have gone in with her camp and he would never have known about her!

Further adding to the hashgacha, his Shul had scheduled a barbecue for a few days prior. They grilled chicken, and burgers, but when it came to grill the franks, it started pouring. They had to stop the barbecue. The Kehilla was a little dissapointed, but a week and a half later, he knew why they had so many extra franks in his freezer, to give to these girls!

Rabbi Serebrowski said that it was an amazing experience for his Kehillah. They were all so happy to mobilize and rescue the girls! People even from the other side of town jumped out of their beds and came to help out their fellow Jews in their time of need. They were thrilled to do it, and it was an experience they would cherish for years to come.

So he davened!


P.S. The second he finished davening, he went to board, and they were about to close the doors. He was the last one they let on!

We are told in this week's parashah, "you are children to Hashem your G-D... a treasured nation" (14:2). We see from here that the term a "treasured nation" comes as a result of the fact that we are Hashem's children. We were given the Torah and are fortunate enough to have a relationship with Hashem and lead meaningful spiritual lives! What an enormous gift; out of billions of people the King of the universe chose us to be His representatives on earth! A parent cares so much about his children and loves them unconditionally and will do anything for them. So too, Hashem is our loving caring Father and is always looking out for us. One time, a father took his children to receive berachos from the world renowned gadol, Rav Aharon Laib Shtainman. representative on this earth, out of so many people. I was so full of joy and appreciation that I couldn't hold myself back, and recited this blessing right away!'

Q. Sometimes when people give me mussar, I agree that I need to improve. However, after hearing how deficient I am, I feel very low about myself and lose any motivation to improve. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. In order to work on any area of growth you have to be emotionally healthy – you have to feel very good about yourself. In our generation people are very fragile, and any bit of criticism crushes their self-esteem. In such a state, a person is not able to improve. First, he needs to restore his self-image.

Therefore, the first thing you have to do is to blow yourself up like an elephant! Think of all your ma'alos. Think: if that person who criticized me would know how special I really am, they would respect me to no end. Tell yourself that you don't care what other people think about you; you know that you're gevaldig!

Only after you're feeling good about yourself, can you think about what the person said, and if there is any room for you to improve.

Q. I have eczema all over my

face. I'm very self-conscious about the way I look and it's also very embarrassing. How should I handle my situation from the perspective of emunah and bitachon?

A. Hakadosh Baruch Hu is the 'Master Artist', and He is the one who designs each person's face. Therefore, the way you look is actually magnificent! If someone has an issue with it, he simply does not have good taste!

The only thing a person has a right to be embarrassed for, is doing an aveira. But about looks?! There's nothing to be embarrassed about displaying Hashem's beautiful portrait.

And when a person begins to appreciate the way he looks, not only will he feel good about himself, it will actually enhance his physical appearance!

This is a well-known fact that has been proven by studies; when a person enjoys the way he looks, the body begins to produce enzymes to make him look more handsome.

Q. I am a teacher. During the course of the year, I invested all my energy to help my students in the best possible way, and I was certain that everyone was advancing.

However, at the end of the year the principal approached me and said that although many students moved forward ,some students became weaker.

Now I feel terrible; not only did all my efforts not help some students, but I even caused them to reverse their progress. How should I deal with the disappointment?

A. The Yetzer Harah tries to trap us by making us focus on minor failures and ignore the major accomplishments. Don't fall for his trick. Take pleasure in all the students who grew through you.

Regarding the minority of students who receded, why do you feel bad? Because you think that you were the one who made them fall back.

However, we know that their lack of success has nothing to do with you. Your job is to do your best to help your students, and all results are from Hashem. Whatever happened would've happened anyway, and nothing could have changed it.

The truth you still accom-

cause, our success is not determined by accomplishments. It's measured by our efforts. Thus, doing everything in your ability to help your students is actually the definition of accomplishment. And since you wanted to help them the best you could, you get the s'char of מחשבה כמעשה.

Even in this world of lma'aseh you accomplished. Hashem has a policy that in avodas Hashem no effort goes to waste. If you tried to help a certain student, and Hashem saw fit that nonetheless he should not succeed, Hashem will cause a different student to succeed because of your hishtadlus. And that other student's achievement will be accredited to your efforts.

Q. I suffer from panic attacks and social anxiety. Recently, I was in a store and I saw a friend I hadn't seen in a long time. I felt awkward and I was overcome with a panic attack right in front of my friend.

I so desperately want to free myself from these embarrassing panic attacks. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this? A. What generates panic attacks? It's built on 1] worshiping the opinion of other human beings, 2] having a low self-image.

Someone who suffers from these two attitudes can feel uneasy when in the presence of other people; 'what are they thinking about me?' 'What if I'm making a bad impression?'

Combat this by doing exercises in changing these two mindsets. Instead of viewing others like elephants and looking at yourself like an ant, reverse the roles.

Know how incredibly choshuv you are. You have an exclusive tafkid which no one else in the world can fulfil. You were endowed with a set of unique kochos which no one else has. Think about the fact that you're a soldier in Hashem's ranks. Recognize how much you are accomplishing with every mitzva that you perform and every word of Torah that you learn. Realize that the whole world was worth creating just for you.

Then, contemplate how unimportant it is to make a good impression on people. Who cares what human beings think about you? It's ridiculous to allow the worthless opinion of a mortal hold you back from realizing your true greatness.

Remember though, your job is not to have the result of being cured from panic attacks. Your duty is just to do exercises in trying to heal yourself.

Regarding whatever embarrassment you undergo until you master the art of not being an impressionist, tell yourself: the only time a person should be embarrassed is when he does an aveira. There is nothing else in the world which should make you feel embarrassed.

Suffering from panic attacks is not an aveira. It is the way Hashem created you; you did not choose this condition. There is no reason to be embarrassed for being the way Hashem made you.

Tell yourself, 'Hakadosh Baruch Hu is the perfect engineer. And if He made me this way, this is perfect. And only in this way will I be able to achieve my tikkun haneshama. And whatever emotional pain you are undergoing is serving as a kappara for your aveiros.

I looked and looked and couldn't figure out the source of this energetic singing.

Finally, I bumped into the Mexican worker who was mopping the floors of the Beis Medrash Le'Kavod Shabbos, and it turned out...

Yes! You guessed correctly - This worker was the one who was singing so enthusiastically!

I asked him how he knows this song and he replied 'Of course I know it! I listen to Carlbach all the time!'

He then shared with me, "I may not be a yid, but The King is in HERE! (Pointing energetically to his heart)"

I was very inspired by these words. Hashem is our King, our Loving Caring Father, and we can learn from this worker to place Him on our hearts at all times.

I was also very inspired how this worker 'sang to Hashem' throughout the day. Moshe Rabeinu davened 515 times to enter Eretz Yisroel, corresponding to the Gematria of 'שירה' which is 515. The highest and most elevated form of Tefila is to sing and thank Hashem nonstop.

There was a Cheder Rebbi who wanted to teach his class about the power of davening. In front of his class, he dialed the White House. "Can I please speak to the president?" he asked the secretary. "I am sorry, but the president is not available" he was told. He persisted and told the secretary that 'it's urgent and I MUST speak to the president right now'. He received the same cold response.

Yet if we want to speak to Hashem, the King of All Kings, He is available and eager to listen to our Tefilos.

HaGaon Rav Yehuda Mandel says that it helps very much to have a notebook where you write down all of the times that you felt stuck beyond help and then sometime later experienced help from Hashem. He has notebooks and notebooks of how Hashem helped him and took care of him through every challenge and every situation.

Hashem is with us at all times, holding our hand!
