It was late at night when the famous Jerusalem *tzaddik* Rabbi Aryeh Levin heard a knock on the door. When he opened the door he heard from two men standing there that a thief was right now in the process of stealing the contents of a store in the Machane Yehuda Market. Since they themselves were afraid of starting up with such an outlaw, they came to enlist the aid of Rabbi Levin. This great man, who was renowned for his ability to influence people in a gentle manner, quickly got dressed and rushed to the scene of the crime. When he arrived he saw that the thief had already succeeded in completely removing everything from the store's shelves and was preparing to take it all away.

"How dare you steal," the rabbi challenged the thief, "when the Torah prohibits doing so!" The thief was so moved by the combination of gentleness and force in which this was said that he asked the rabbi what he should do now with all the goods he had removed from the store. The answer was that he must return them to the shelves and that the rabbi would help him do so. When their work was completed Rabbi Levin made a special *mi sheberach* prayer for the thief who had so gallantly fulfilled the Torah command to return stolen property.

**Hints & Answers\*** **HALACHA CHALLENGE:** According to HaRav Shlomo Zalman Auerbach zt"l one still fulfills the halacha of having *makom kavua* for tefilla even though he *davens* Shacharis in one shul during the week and in another shul on Shabbos. [source: *Halichos Shlomo*, Tefilla chapter 5, Devar Halacha #2] **Electronic RHYMES:** "above" **RIDDLE:** The *minhag* in such situation is to label the *milchik* utensils. The reason is as follows: Suppose the custom had been to mark the meat plates. Let's say someone forgot to do it and served his guest a dish with meat sauce (in meat plates), but it was not obvious that the sauce was fleishig. A guest, who noticed that the host has plates of the same pattern for both meat and dairy, did not assume that the host forgot to do label the meat plates. So when he was served that dish in a non-labeled plate, he assumed that it was dairy or parve food. When he came home, he ate dairy food, without waiting the required time between meat and dairy. That's why, to avoid such situations, the custom has become to label dairy plates. | \*Menucha answers are not to be taken as final decisions in *halacha*.

## Ask at Your Shabbos Table

**Ask around your Shabbos table:** We know that each one of the daily prayers (Shacharis, Mincha, Ma'ariv) has its unique power. Which prayer has the power to be answered immediately?

**Answer:** Mincha. Chazal tell us that the prayer that Yitzchok Avinu went out to pray in the field (in this week's parsha), was tefillas Mincha. The *Kli Yakar* points out that from that episode in the parsha we see that Mincha is very a powerful prayer. He comments that in that tefilla, Yitzchok Avinu asked Hashem to help him find his *zivug*. Right afterwards, the Torah says "He (Yitzchok) lifted his eyes (after he completed his tefilla); and behold, camels were coming." Riding on one of those camels was Rivka – Yitzchok's *zivug*. We see from here that Hashem answered Yitzchok Avinu's Mincha prayer immediately! Since *ma'ase avos siman l'bonim*, this relates to us also: Mincha has the power to be answered immediately!
