There was a bright Yeshiva student in Lakewood who got married. At the end of one of the Sheva Brochos seudos, the Zeida of the choson got up and gave a speech that went something in the following lines: "I would like to tell you about an incident that happened in Europe. By kicking me out of the cheder, the principal is sentencing my descendants to a bad path. That is not right!" The principal, who was present in the room, was very moved by the words of that boy and accepted the boy back into school."

Then, the Zeida looked up at everyone and said, "I am that boy! Now, look at my grandson, the choson, who is a tzazdik and Ben Torah. See what happens! You never know who might come out from someone."

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Parsha Pearls

יָהִי בַּיָמִים הָהֶם וַיִּגְדַל מֹשֶׁה וַיֵּצֵא אֱל־אֱחָיו וַיַּרָא בִּסְבְלֹתָם ...

Now it came to pass in those days that Moshe grew up and went out to his brothers and looked at their burdens....(Shemos 2:11)

Commenting on the words "and [Moshe] looked at their burdens", Rashi writes: "He directed his eyes and his heart to be distressed over them."

First of all, notice that Rashi does not say that Moshe was distressed over them, but rather, "He *directed* his eyes and his heart to be distressed over them." In other words, Moshe steered his heart in the proper direction, to be distressed over his brothers. The Torah is teaching us that a person can be in charge of his heart.

Also it's interesting to notice that in the same verse, the Torah says, "Moshe grew up." This perhaps is hinting to us that a Jew reaches maturity when his focus is on the welfare of other people. So next time, you catch yourself being self-centered, whisper to yourself, "Grow up!"

יָרָאָךּ (שְׁמַח בְּלְבּוּ "...and he will see you and he will rejoice in his heart." (Shemos 4:14)

Rashi comments on the above verse and explains, Hashem was saying the following to Moshe about Aaron: "Not as you (Moshe) think, that he (Aaron) will resent your attaining a high position. [In contrary! Aaron will rejoice for you!]" Midrash Tanchuma says on this verse: "The heart that rejoiced over his brother's greatness will wear the Urim vTumim".
