Continued the kitchen and saw my onefrom front and-a-half-year old Shimale was standing on the counter,



a kettle of hot water in his hand, trying to pour water from the kettle into his bottle! The kettle is heavy, the bottle light; Shimmy was almost losing his balance, and in another second he was liable to end up with a severe burn from boiling-hot water!

The minute I saw this, I caught him, saving him from a fall and a burn, and perhaps also saving myself from a court order due to parental negligence. This Shimma'le of mine - he should be well and use all his strengths and great creativity to serve Hashem yisbarach. It seems I'm raising one of the great kochos, who will light up the world in coming years. He was saved by a miracle.

That whole process took mere seconds, and then I went to the front hallway to solve the mystery of the knocks on the door. I opened the door of my home, and before my eyes stood an entire family, wearing Shabbos clothing, looking tired and bedraggled.

"We rented the apartment upstairs for two weeks," the father said. "The door locks with a combination. I wrote the code on a piece of paper and put it into the pocket of my everyday suit. The problem is that we just got back from a wedding and I'm wearing a Shabbos suit. The code is inside the house, and I have no idea how to get in. You have the code. Can you possibly give it to me?"

I readily gave him the code, which would open the apartment for him, and he apologized. "We had heavy traffic on the way from Bnei Brak to Yerushalayim, and instead of the drive taking an hour, it took two hours. I wouldn't



wake you up now, but I saw the light was on and heard someone schlepping a chair, and so I realized someone was awake anyway and would open the door." "May you be blessed from Above!"

I told him. "You were a Divine messenger to save my son!" I was so amazed by the incredible hashgachah pratis; how Hakadosh Baruch Hu arranged that they would arrive exactly when my son was in danger and wake me up, and that this family would be able to get into their rented apartment to get some sleep. THE TRUE DOCTOR





We were a young couple, barely out of yeshivah and seminary, and we were new parents to a sweet baby. Something about her behavior didn't seem right to us, and we took her to the doctor. The doctor examined her and he announced. "You must go to the hospital immediately! She needs emergency surgery. You don't have to take an ambulance, but it's urgent that you get there ASAP."

We walked out of the doctor's office shell-shocked. We had never imagined that this is what we would hear. Not long before that, we'd been holding on to our parents' apron strings! We called them up immediately. My parents were away on a long trip, and they didn't have their cell phones with them. My wife's par-

> ents were not available at the time to answer our call, and we understood that there was no one else who could take responsibility for the decision. We were the parents, and now the responsibility was ours alone. What to do?

I remembered that there was a family with a similar story, who had taken a private doctor, but the surgery was not so successful. My wife called her aunt, who told her that it was very important to take care of the problem, lest such and such occur, and we should hurry up. Which hospital? Perhaps it was really critical to take a private doctor? There was no one to answer our questions, and at that point I told my wife, "I decided to take a private Doctor - the best and

biggest Doctor there is: the Ribbono shel Olam. He will be our daughter's Doctor." I reminded her of the Nefesh Hachaim's segulah, concentrating fully on the words "ein od milvado."

We took a sefer Tehillim, and we prepared to go. We went home, packed a few items, and went downstairs to the main road. There an avreich from the neighborhood called out to me from his car, "Do you need to get to Yerushalayim?" This was special hashgachah pratis. Never before had he offered me anything like this, and here he was offering something I had not even asked for.

He took us to the hospital, and there the

emergency room experience began. We waited for about three hours, and I saw that it was almost shekiah. I went out to a nearby shul to daven Minchah, and my wife, seeing that the baby was asleep, stood up to daven as well.

One cannot compare a Minchah uttered when life is peaceful to one uttered in times of difficulty. She day-

ened from the depths of her heart, slowly and patiently, before the great Doctor on High, and it was just then that the nurse finally called our family name; the doctor had arrived. My wife heard the nurse calling her, but she said to herself, We decided that we're taking a private Doctor. I'm talking to him now; it makes no sense for me to stop a discussion with the big Doctor in order to speak to a flesh-and-blood doctor. She continued her tefillah without hurrying, and when she finished, she asked the nurse what was happening.

"The doctor was here. We called you and you didn't come. Wait now until he comes by again." We waited. Three more hours passed, and finally, the doctor arrived.

He looked at the girl, examined her, and said, "She really needs surgery, but now it's already late. Come tomorrow."

"But they told us it was urgent."

"If it's so urgent, how is it that you didn't come over to the nurse the minute she called you? I came especially for you, and you didn't come. Because of this, you'll have

to wait till tomorrow."

He had decided to teach us a lesson, and I saw this as a nisayon to see whether we would regret having davened Minchah slowly.

We stayed at our parents' home in Yerushalayim overnight, and in the morning we ordered a taxi to take us to the

hospital.

Ordinarily the taxis arrive quickly, but this time there was a serious delay. We waited and waited until it finally arrived, and we went to the hospital.


This time we were greeted by a friendly doctor who was wearing a kippah. He checked the baby, and he cried out in surprise. "Listen – the problem has been resolved. You can see how most of what needs to come out already came out on its



What hashgacha!





The soldiers under him saw how much it bothered him, and the next morning, all the soldiers, including the not yet religious soldiers, lined up to put on tefillin!



I'll come join you. Invite Me, and I'll be there in your midst. And, remarkably, the


Jewish people responded by employing the best of their abilities and the entirety of their resources for one singular purpose—to invite HaKodosh Boruch Hu to this world.

Rav Avigdor Miller asks a very interesting question. Our parashah goes into such tremendous detail about the construction of the Mishkan. Pesukim upon pe-

sukim, discuss how to make it's Keilim and the correct dimensions of its struc-



structure. Yet why is it a mitzvah to build a Mishkan in the first place? What is the

purpose of the Mishkan?

The answer to this question lies in the chapter of Tehillim, mizmor shir chanukas habayis. Although this mizmor opens with the dedication of the Beis Hamikdash, the actual mizmor contains no mention of the Beis Hamikdash. It is devoted to David Hamelech thanking Hashem for all the good He has bestowed upon him. Why is this so? Rav Avigdor Miller explains that this is because the purpose of the Mishkan, and what would later be the Bais Hamikdash, is a place to thank Hashem!

This is the essence of a Mikdash and the underlying theme behind its unique Halachos. For example, the bread should constantly be on the Shulchan, to the extent that even when last week's bread was changed, the new bread should be be placed first. Rabbi Miller explains that this is to remind us of the fact that we constantly have food on our table! It is such a great gift that we have all the food we need. He points out that although Chazal tell us that there were 250 miracles that occurred at krias yam suf, there are really thousands of miracles that occur during the production of our food! Every bite we eat consists of so many miracles.

The Menoras Hamaor, one of the Rishonim, records a fascinating account of a certain Tzaddik. Each time he used to eat, he wore an elegant piece of clothing and gathered all his students together who also wore their finest clothing. They then used to sing songs of praises to Hashem. The Tzaddik was asked why he made this ceremony each time he ate, it was just a meal. He explained

- There is no individual in Klal Yisrael for whom hidden miracles do not occur each day. (Rabbeinu Bechayah, Shemos 30:12)
- Even though Hashem has thousands and myriads of angels who praise Him, He only desires the praises of Klal Yisrael. (Midrash Mishlei 14:28)
- With every breath that we breathe, we should praise Hashem. (Bereishis Rabbah 14:11)
- The first rule in serving Hashem is to thank Him that is the basis of everything. (Rabbi Avigdor Miller, Ohr Avigdor Shaar HaBechinah)

that if he was imprisoned or traveling and lacked sufficient food, he would be willing to pay a large amount just for a bit of bread and water. Baruch Has em, he lives in peace with such a wide variety of food available. "If I would need to plant and harvest, he continued," how much would I need to work, as Adam Harishon did. Now when I arise in the morning, I have everything I need. I am so appreciative that I want to ensure that it is a meal of thanksgiving to Hashem".

Another aspect of the Mishkan that expresses our appreciation, is the Menorah. The mitzvah to keep the light of the Menorah burning is to remind us to be grateful for the tremendous gift of light that we constantly enjoy.

Rabbi Miller points out that the longest berachah that the anshei knesses hagedolah enacted was to be grateful for light, yotzer ohr. This berachah contains references to the angels and how they recite kedushah. Why is this relevant to this berachah? The malachaim are just in complete awe of the amazing phenomenon of light and are constantly praising Hashem for this.

The sun is a glowing ball of energy which sends us its rays with tremendous power; The light travels at a speed of 186,000 miles a second and even though the sun is 930 million miles away the light gets to us in minutes! Hashem positioned the world in the exact place that we can benefit from the sun. If the



world was any closer it would burn and any further it would freeze.

The benefits we receive from the sun are truly immeasurable.

Rabbi Yisrael Salanter was once seen gazing at the sun with tremendous awe and excitement. He was overwhelmed with appreciation of the miracle of sunlight and was able to feel happy for the world at large, since everyone benefits from this amazing gift.

This week let us appreciate: Silverware. Many foods are very hard to eat with our hands. We can get burned and it would be

very messy. Fortunately, we have silverware to help us eat in a safe and refined way. We have the option of knives, forks and spoons, perfectly adapted to help us eat with ease.



When teaching the young students in my second grade class about happiness, I usually find that the children have a hard time understanding and explaining the definition of the word "Happy," and the general concept of "Simcha-Happiness."

If I would let them act it out, to try and show me what they think "it" is, it would look something like this:

Tzvi starts off with dancing and singing. Dovid is meanwhile, twirling wildly and clapping his hands. Pinchos joins them, while begging me for some music, and to use my microphone. Here comes Aron following suit with making loud, weird noises, wild gestures and motions. Check out Shloimie, as he bangs his chair and desk. Simchi is over there, jumping up and down, and shaking a large box of plastic jungle animals. Okay, now Shabsi grabs a hold of Dovi and they start running around the room. Ari is going from making a headstand, to doing cartwheels between the isles. Shmuel heaves a pile of cards up into the air, spreading them like confetti, all over the room. Elimelech starts chasing Kalmy with the broom, and Eliezer trails in back of them carrying the garbage can. On the side, watching, looking, and cheering on, are Yehudah, Naftali and Mordechai, all roaring from laughter!

It would be a pretty hilarious, and chaotic scene, to watch, but, what really is that thing, called "Simcha?!"

We are accustomed to hearing analytically that "Simcha is a state of



mind." The question is how do we reach that. How do we get our mind to be in a state of Simcha?

In class with my students, we together go through a process of backtracking step by step, to the root source of being happy. We then return forward, towards a clear explanation of what happiness means.

I ask them, "What is happy?" Laughing? Acting silly or wild? They agree that the answer to that, is definitely "no."

Is simcha Dancing? Is it Smiling? The children usually say "yes."

"Well then," I ask, "is it the actual dancing & singing, or is Simcha some sort of feeling, that causes you to smile, or dance?"

We then go in reverse to the beginning of all this. We try to delve a little deeper into the inner workings that drive and turn the human's emotional gears towards happiness.

I ask them "When do we feel happy? When do we smile, or dance?"

We retrace our steps further, until we all agreeingly reach the realization that "feeling satisfied" is the root.

The simple fact of realizing, and focusing on the good things that we have, and constantly enjoy in our daily life, is the first step towards feeling satisfied. When we appreciate what we have, simply just the way they are, we gain a state of mind of satisfaction.

Now we can move forward, towards acquiring Simcha.

We then start off, going full force, full speed, full throttle, and full blast, on our journey to Simcha, with speaking about the seemingly simple things in life that we usually take for granted.

Family, friends, food, clothing,



house, heating & cooling, fresh water, plumbing, electricity, health, doctors, medicines, cars, buses, toys, games, Seforim, Limud Hatoirah, Tefilah, Mitzvois, Neshama, Shuls, Yeshivos. etc.. on and on.

We together come to the conclusion of this practical application of Marbim B'simcha to start thinking and speaking more about the good things we do have, and start feeling more satisfied with them. We have to Realize, Appreciate and Thank Hashem!

Our Family's "Thankfulness Mentor."

Our family loves when Reuvain Chaim joins us for the Shabbos meal. He makes sure to compliment and show his appreciation to every family member, regardless of their age, who helped out prepare the Seudas Shabbos.





This one is thanked for peeling the soup vegetables, the other is praised for mashing, or salting the eggs. Whoever helped out in the process of making the kugel from beginning 'til end, or with spicing the cholent to perfection, will also get a special thanks.

He thanks for the D'var Torah or story that someone said. For the Zemiros, this one gets his recognition for his loud rendition, and that one for his harmony and the third for singing along quietly. He even spends time to carefully read my article, printed in The Spring Hill Times, always finding some nice things to point out, and then to compliment me on them. He's a genius in looking at anything, and seeing something positive to say, in an appreciative way.

Reuvain Chaim always points out the good side of things. If the food is more spicy than usual, he'll say "Oh that was exciting." If the salad is seasoned simply, he'll say "Oh that tasted so healthy." The Challah, the soup, chicken, salad, side dishes, dessert, nothing goes unnoticed, or unappreciated, everything is just perfect. He even takes note of what topping was used on the Challos. Was it Poppy seeds, Sesame seeds, or was it the Everything topping? He takes the time to look, taste, and thank. If he didn't manage to thank a certain family member attending the seudah he'll ask us to relay his thanks when we get a chance. This man is a living lesson, that Hashem sends us, for our entire family. A lesson in thankfulness, and realization of everything good, that is all around, and always

surrounding us.

The more thankful we are, the happier we can be!

However, the best happiest feeling

we can possibly have, is "Feeling close to Hash-em!" That'll give us the most



simcha, ever possible! The most well-known phrase, from the Sefer Messilas Yesharim, is "Ha'adom Lo Nivrah Elah L'Hisaneig Al Hashem U'leihanois Miziv Shechinasoi!" Loosely translated as, "Man wasn't created, only for, this one and only purpose: For him to have pleasure from being close to Hashem, and His Divine Presence!"

When we praise Hashem, we start developing a stronger and closer relationship, which is a great pleasure for our Neshama. The more, the merrier! We must take note, and learn from others, who have already established this special type of emotional, and spiritual pleasureful relationship, with Hashem.

THE INTERESTING NOTE

Last night when I was in Shul to daven Maariv, I noticed an interesting note written on a tissue, lying on the table. With great interest I took note, of this note of interest. Someone had purposefully left it on that table, at that place.

It read as follows: "How do you al-

ways Daven with such Hislahavus? Please call me at 347-***-****

Obviously someone had been davening at that table with great Kavanah. The one who wrote the note wanted to learn the secret of such a pleasureful davening experience, that he had witnessed!

Ah! L'Hisaneig Al Hashem! What a geshmack!

I guess the person it was intended for didn't notice the

note, when he finally finished his intense davening. I actually found that precious note the next night still lying under the table, waiting for me to pick it up, and share that note and message, from a heilige searching soul, with you!

Now, back to my classroom.

For a better understanding of this lesson, I also use and apply the flip side of Choidesh Av, when we lessen our feelings and expressions of happiness, by thinking of what we don't have, i.e. the Bais Hamikdash, Geulah, Kirvas Eloikim, etc. That helps in our understanding of how we go about gaining Simcha, when we turn back to clarify the opposite approach in the Choidesh Adar.

The Gemara actually uses that difference in parallel, when it mentions the increasing happiness in the month of Adar. "Just like we lessen our happiness in the month of Av, so do increase our happiness in the month of Adar."

I then finish my lesson in class, with saying, that, "YES! Singing, smiling, and dancing are all ways of expressing happiness and joy, but it is not Simchah by itself, without the inner happy feeling."

DAYS OF NISSIM

Rashi Hakadoish in his commentary on the Gemarra of "Mishenichnas Adar Marbin B'Simcha," says, "These are days of Nissim for Yidden, Purim, and Pesach."

Hashem showed us in the past, great Nissim in this time of the year, the coming Chodoshim of Nissan, and Adar.

It's the time of the year that The

Great Geulah-Exodus of Yetzias Mitzrayim took place! With all the wonderous Makkos for the Mitzriyim our oppressors, and all the best of everything for the Yidden!

Years later, at the time when the story of Purim took place, Hashem showed us His great love, by saving us in a wondrous way, hidden within natural looking events. All that went on, step-by-step, was perfectly planned by The One Above, until the final great downfall of

Haman Harasha together with the other evil Reshaim. The Teshuvah, and tremendous salvation for all the Yidden with Mordechai and Esther at the lead

was awesome and astounding! All this eventually led to the rebuilding of the Second Bais Hamikdash!

What a great showing of love from Hashem, to His Chosen Nation, the Bnai Yisroel!

We must be very wary, not to worry. As a warrior we must declare war against worry! That can be detrimental to our happy state of mind. It can rob us of our Simcha. (Orchois Tzaddikim)

Our defensive most effective secret weapon of warfare against worrying, is Bitachon! We must trust Hashem that He'll do the best for us! He'll warrant and guarantee our security.

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Do Mitzvos!



A few weeks ago we discussed how every person has a twenty four seven organization which is our family life.

Last week, we discussed that in addition to our families we are busy doing Chessed all day every day. This is whether we are learning or working.

This week I would like to take our chessed to the next level, but before we do I will preface it with a story that I heard from Rav Eitan Feiner Shlit"a who heard it from the one of the children themselves.

The story was that when Rav Moshe Halbershtam zt"l was Niftar there were a lot of money laying around that belonged to Yesomim and the children did not know where to find it.

The children were very pained by this, and they went to



their father's Kever to daven that he should reveal to them the whereabouts of the money. (Editor's Note: please discuss with your Rav if and how one may make requests of Niftarim)

Sure enough, Rav Moshe appeared to one of his children in a dream, and revealed the

whereabouts of the money.

After he finished, Rav Moshe zt"I told his son that since he was given permission to come down to this world, he was given permission to reveal something important. He told him that there are three things that he will tell him.



- 1. That this world is upside down and we don't realize who and what is chashuv in the eyes of Hashem. Some people may think they are at the bottom, but in reality they may be at the top and visa versa.
- 2. Hashem has a tremendous joy when his children come together with achdus to do a Mitzva together. Especially for Tefilla and even more so on Shabbos and Yom tov.
- 3. We cannot fathom the tremendous nachas ruach Hashem has when one Yid does a chessed for another Yid with love and mesiras nefesh.

After relaying these precious messages from heaven, Rav Moshe Halbershtam returned to his place in Gan Eden.

When his son awoke at first he wasn't sure if the dream was true, but when he found the money in the exact location he knew that the dream was for real.

Rav Eitan concluded as follows. "What can be a sweeter thing in the world than bringing a nachas ruach to our Father in heaven, and now we know how to do it. That is Chessed with love and mesiras nefesh.

There is an ancient story of a Rebbe that arrives in a town and he smells a very strong aroma of Gan Eden. He follows the smell, and he arrives at the house of an old Yid by the name of Reb Chaim.

He knocked on the door and he was ushered inside. The Rebbe told the Reb Chaim that he smells an extreme smell of Gan Eden emanating from this house.

Then the Rebbe pointed to a closet and said that it's coming from there. The Rebbe asked Reb Chaim what's inside? Reb Chaim then takes out clothing of a priest. Ah! "Yes said the Rebbe this is where the smell is coming from". The Rebbe asks the elderly Yid for the story behind it.

To make a long story short Reb Chaim recounted that when he was a young man he was a Gabbai Tzeddaka and he would raise funds for many different causes.

Once, after he had collected money for a certain cause from his town someone approached him with an urgent cause that money was needed as soon as possible [I believe it was hachnasas Kallah or pidyon shevuyim]. However, he was at a loss because he had just raised money from his town and he knew that they wouldn't give him twice within the same week.

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R' Chaim walked through the streets wracking his brains for an idea. He passed by an inn and he saw a Yid that was far removed from Yiddishkeit and he was partying with his friends. Reb Chaim knew that this man was well to do.

Seeing no choice Reb Chaim went over to this fellow with much trepidation and asked for a donation. At first the fellow burst into laughter at this joke, but then this fellow had an inspiration. He said, "I will give you clothing of a priest to wear. If you walk around the town with us wearing these clothing then we will give you the full money." His friends nodded in agreement.

With iron clad feelings of love and mesiras nefesh, Reb Chaim agreed. They put on him the priest's clothing and led him through the streets. To add salt to his wounds this story took place right before Yom Kippur.

Imagine the horror and dismay the people had when they saw Reb Chaim walking around in the priests clothing with the so called Jew and his friends laughing at him.

True to his word, the fellow gave Reb Chaim all the money he needed and Reb Chaim brought the money to the Yid that was waiting.

The Rebbe said "now I understand why these clothing have the fragrance of Gan Eden. It's through these clothing that you did tzeddaka and Chessed for another Yid on the highest caliber." My friends we must admit that this story seems to be beyond our reach. However, the truth is that many times we do chessed with extreme love and mesiras nefesh, and we should be pumped and full of joy, because we are bringing a tremendous nachas ruach to Hashem.



Let me give one example. When someone makes a wedding many relatives will come all the way from over seas.

They drop everything and they come running.

Then they come to the wedding and they sing and dance



throughout the night. When one is dancing and singing at a wedding he is performing chessed with his entire body and his neshama. He dances with his body, and he

sings from his Neshama.

Bringing up children is loaded with love and mesiras nefesh as we explained a few weeks ago.

In the zechus that we are Misameach and give chizzuk with so much love and mesiras nefesh to everyone, and especially a Chassan and Kallah, Hashem should bring to fruition the nevua of "Yasis alayich Elokayich kimsos chassan vikallah" bikarov Amen.



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THE ROLLER COASTER

RETURNING HOME FROM SHAB-BOS OUT OF TOWN, our family was traveling down the Outerbridge Crossing. For those that don't know, the Outerbridge is very narrow. At one point, the van gave a little jerk that caused us to swerve, somewhat dangerously. B"H we

Pushed around among the mobs of

people, waiting for the Rebbe's tisch to begin, R' Shimshon Pincus attempted to make his way up to the head table, trying to be next to the Rebbe. This, however, didn't last too long. As soon as the Rebbe entered, R' Shimshon was pushed to the side, having to find himself a seat amongst the "regulars." While he was being pushed, he saw a young child being pulled in and placed at the head table.

THE MISTAKEN VISIT

Over the course of a year, his evening group learned through an entire mesechata, and it was time for the siyum. They

arranged grand siyum, plenwith ty of food, main dishes and sides, and wine whiskey, etc. The festivi-



ties got a bit out of hand, and while one of the attendees was a bit tipsy, he made his way up to the front and started to tell the crowd his story.

He was raised by Holocaust survivors, who unfortunately were resentful toward doing mitzvos. All his parents had done for him in terms of Yiddishkeit was to give him a bris, but nothing more than that.

In his twenties, while he was unaware of religion, he got connected with a group of big investors, making him very wellto-do at a very young age. One day, he was invited to a meeting that could have potentially brought in a big profit. Little did he realize that the "investors" were actually federal agents out to catch him for certain illegal investments he'd made, of which he'd just confessed to. He was put into handcuffs, brought to jail, and was only released after being served a sizable bail and a court date.

He left the jail in Manhattan in tears over the potential twenty-five-year sentence he was facing for his mistakes. He immediately consulted expert lawyers in the field, but they weren't too promising.

While he was returning home, he stopped in a restaurant to grab a coffee. As the tears were dripping into his coffee, he got a tap on his shoulder, and an elderly-looking man was standing over



him, asking how he could help.

"The judge is my grandfather!" the young lawyer declared. "Knowing that this was the first case that I was presented with, he judged it favorably."


When the boy returned to the Rebbe, to tell him the yeshua, the Rebbe said that all I ask of you is to start putting on tefillin, and so he did.

When the prince who had hired Reb Avraham finally ascended to the throne, he invited the Jewish craftsman to his coronation and gave him a place of honor—despite the discrimination against Jews in Yemenite law, which forbade Jews to own property and even prohibited them to sit in the presence of a non-Jew. In response to his subjects' shock, the newly crowned king shared with them the incident of the golden urn and then added pointedly, "Would any of you have done what this man did and refrained from taking the urn for yourselves?" On that day, Reb Avraham Badichi's integrity made it clear that the Jewish people were completely unlike the nations around them (Aleinu Leshabeach, Parashas Shemini, quoting Sefer Yehudei Teiman).

Just before Yetzias Mitzrayim, Bnei Yisrael were commanded to approach their Egyptian neighbors and ask for their gold, silver, and other valuables. The Torah relates that the Mitzrim's response was the product of a miracle: Hashem caused them to develop feelings of affection for the Jewish people and to willingly give up all of their valuables to the Jews. The Midrash, however, teaches us that during makkas choshech, the plague of darkness, the Jewish people entered the homes of the Egyptians and located all of their valuables, so that if the Egyptians would later deny having an item, the Jews would be able to retort that they had seen it and even identify its location.

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It is difficult to understand why it was necessary for Bnei Yisrael to search through the Egyptians' belongings. If Hashem planned to make the Mitzrim miraculously predisposed to give away their wealth to the Jews, why did He also instruct the Jews to prepare for the

possessions but had not stolen a thing, even after they had suffered bitterly at the hands of the Mitzrim for so many years. The Mitzrim were profoundly impressed by Bnei Yisrael's integrity, and this caused the Jewish people to find

eventuality that they might deny owning certain valuables? Ultimately, the Mitzrim freely relinquished all of their possessions, and the Jews had no need to use their knowledge of where the Mitzrim's valuables were hidden.

knowledge of where the Mitzrim's valuables were hidden. The Sifsei Chachomim offers a powerful answer to this question: In truth, it was Bnei Yisrael's actions during the plague of darkness that caused the Mitzrim to be so generous to them. When the people of Mitzrayim saw that the

erous to them. When the people of Mitzrayim saw that the Jews had been inside their homes while they sat helpless during the plague of darkness, they realized that Bnei Yisrael had had a perfect opportunity to rob them of all their

favor in their eyes.

With these events, Hashem conveyed a simple, unequivocal message to the Egyptians: Hashem had chosen the Jewish nation for good reason, and their sterling character was what made them deserving of the many miracles that Hashem performed for them.

Our redemption from Mitzrayim and the resulting kiddush Hashem, then, was contingent on our maintaining

absolute integrity and an ironclad commitment to truth. And just as this was the case in Mitzrayim, it is the case in our current exile, as well. We must do our utmost to be truly upstanding people who act with absolute integrity, in order to ensure that we are worthy of being the beneficiaries of Hashem's miraculous redemption.

In Review: Immediately before the Jewish people's redemption from Mitzrayim, Hashem tested their integrity to make the Egyptians see why they were worthy of being redeemed. Today, we are on the verge of experiencing our final Geulah, as the long galus is coming to a close. It is of vital importance for us, just like our ancestors of millennia ago, to resist any temptation for dishonesty. By doing so, we will be worthy of being the she'airis Yisrael who survive to see the return of our people to Eretz Yisrael.

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

People can sometimes feel resentment to different people in their life that they feel may have mistreated them. They




may point fingers "that person didn't understand me" or "that person ruined my life.

A few years ago, Rabbi Y. A. shlit"a started giving a daily 2-minute audio shiur by phone about the wonders of the human body. (To hear it call or text 313-NIFLAOS [313-643-5267]). The reason was that his grandfather, Rabbi Nosson Appelbaum zt"l, had always spoken about how Hashem created our bodies with such wisdom and was so full of gratitude to Him for his good health. When he was *niftar* at the ripe old age of 98, after a life of unbelievable good health, his grandson wanted to continue his legacy. Here is his story, based on an interview by Rabbi Yoel Gold (as printed in the *Vechol Maaminim* leaflet, issue 340). Rabbi Appelbaum related:

"I was drafted into the United States Army during World War II and was sent to serve on the island of Guadalcanal, in the Pacific Ocean. One evening, Japanese bombers suddenly appeared on the horizon. It was brief and brutal: they showered their bombs onto the base where I was serving, and then disappeared. Six American soldiers died in that attack; dozens were injured, myself among them. I lay in the ruins of the building I had been in, seriously injured and only partially conscious. The world around me was burning, and I felt like I was losing the sensation in my hands and legs. It's hard for me to



describe what I felt like when I looked in horror at my hands, which were hanging at my sides like two burnt pieces of flesh. It was a sense of mounting dread, a fear for my existence. I nearly choked on the dust that I inhaled, and coughed incessantly in an effort to gasp a bit of oxygen into my lungs. In the interim, I found myself talking to the *Ribono Shel Olam*, for the first time in my life, from the depths of my heart. I cried tearfully, soundlessly: "Please, Hashem! Give me back my hands! Please...I can't feel my hands, please restore the sensation to my hands!" From the depths of the pain I added, "I promise that after I get out of this inferno, I will dedicate my life to serving You as a loyal servant!" To this day, I have no logical explanation for the miracle that occurred a few seconds later; after I was sure that even if I would be spared, I'd remain crippled for the rest of my life, I suddenly got back the sensation in my hands and legs."

A few weeks later, after extensive rehabilitation, Rabbi Appelbaum was released to his parents' home. He did not forget his promise... When he entered the shul in his area for the first time in his life, the first thing he encountered was the bulletin board, which had a sign posted with a list of Torah *shiurim* that were regularly given at the shul. Rabbi Appelbaum decided at that moment to join one of the *shiurim*, and to this day, he has not stopped learning.



Rabbi Appelbaum's day began early in the morning, when he awakened with gratitude to Hashem for giving him life. He recited "Modeh Ani..." with a special niggun that he and his family used for many years. When Rabbi Appelbaum was asked about the secret of the special brachah he had merited - such a long life with good health – he modestly pointed to a colorful placard hanging over the sink in his room. It had on it the words of Asher Yatzar in large letters, with beautiful illustrations that depict the remarkable miracles that accompany the proper function of the body, for which we thank Hashem in this brachah. He declared: "In the last fifty years, I have never, even once, made the brachah of Asher Yatzar by heart – I say it only from the text! I recognize the tremendous miracles Hashem has done for me and my body and I try to thank Him for it at every opportunity, with utmost sincerity."

There is nothing that can be possibly hidden from Hashem and we do not want to live in any way that we would even think that we have reason to have anything to hide in the first place!

The Story: The Chofetz Chaim once asked the אמרי אמת by the first הנוסיה. כנסיה גדולה says that anytime it says the word "אחרי" in the Torah, it means it is distanced. If so, asked the חפץ חים, when it says אחרי ה' אחרי ה' הובא, when it says אחרי ה' הובה in the Torah, what is the explanation to stay distant when going in the ways of Hashem?

The אמרי אמת answered, "Someone who feels that he is distant from Hashem, it is a סימן that he is close to Hashem. Whereas, someone who thinks that he is close, it is a סימן that he is not. "עכ"ד

These words need explanation. The אמרי אמת did not mean that frum Yidden don't feel a closeness to Hashem. What the אמרי אמת meant is that a frum Yid is always feeling "I wish I could feel closer, I feel so small compared to what I could do. What the אמרי אמת was saying was that the fact that we feel small and we may not feel that close connection to Hashem as much as one who is in truth less close, is not coming from a חום הסרון in us, but it is the biggest מעלה in the world! The very fact that we don't feel that close connection to Hashem is a other ware in truth so close to Hashem!

shidduch for his daughter. He approached the Rosh Yeshiva and asked him to point out the best bochur. The father of the girl said, "I want the bochur who is the biggest "מבקש". That



bochur grew to be the Steipler Gaon, one of the greatest people of his time. The lesson from this story is that the secret to greatness is not talents or anything else, rather to become great, the main thing is to have the ביקוש will climb way higher and exceed all of his peers.



True Goodness

When a person desires something new, he tends to "oversell" it to himself, exaggerating its value and importance. Then, when he finally gets it, he quickly forgets about it and moves on to the next thing.

It appears like his imagination tricked him; what he wanted was not that great, after all!

However, perhaps that is incorrect. Perhaps the things we want really are great! The reason we quickly forget about them is because it's simply too hard to enjoy what we have. It sounds funny, but it takes effort to enjoy something. We must focus and pay attention — and there is a good reason why it's hard to do that.

Enjoying life is an important part of avodas Hashem, and therefore the yetzer hara fights hard to prevent it. He tries to get us to forget what we have. He makes our mind lazy, unable to focus on the good in our lives. He convinces us to spend all our time chasing after the "next thing."

So, in reality, our true perception is before we get something. At that time, the yetzer hara has not begun to fight us. He is happy when we obsess about what we don't have!

Isn't it incredible how easy it is to think about what we lack? A person can focus on something he wants for years with barely any effort. But as soon as he gets it, it takes a lot of effort to focus on it for just a short while! This proves that a person is fully capable of paying close attention to things, if not for the yetzer hara's sneaky tactics.

Before a person gets something, he can accurately assess its value. If he would lose it afterwards, he'd no longer have the yetzer hara fighting him, so again he would remember how good it was — even though he didn't enjoy it when he had it!

This is why the cycle of infatuation/disinterest takes place even with things that are immensely and objectively valuable, such as a spouse or a home. Regarding a wife, the pasuk says, "[One who] finds a wife has found good." Everyone acknowledges the value of a good wife. Yet, because of the yetzer hara's tricks, a man might have no appreciation for his wife, even if it took him many years to find her! If he would lose her (chas v'shalom), he would regain his perspective and greatly mourn what he lost.



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

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A GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST







Hashem gave us the ability to scream loudly and catch people's attention even when they are not standing next to us. Let's take a closer look at this special ability.

When a person speaks in a regular voice, it can only be heard clearly if you are standing close to him. Every meter you distance yourself from the speaker, dramatically decreases the amount of decibels - which means, the volume of the sound. If you stand 10 or 20 meters away from the speaker, you can barely hear anything at all. We would expect that if we have the ability to raise our voice, then the sound would travel a little bit further, maybe 30 or 40 meters. Yet, Hashem gave us the unique ability to scream very, very loudly, which carries the sound quite long distances.

A person's voice can be heard from a powerful scream, on an average of 180 meters. That's very far, and it's many times more than regular speech. Let's also add and remember that a person can also focus the direction of his voice. He can direct his scream to the north, south, east or west – whichever direction he feels will be the most effective, this serves as an important protector from damage which can rally to his defense and help people who are far away.

Until now we discussed the ability to scream loudly and protect ourselves from dangerous people

and dangerous situation. This is something that we do quite rarely. There is another application of raising our voices which is a tool

which we use quite often. Whenever we see somebody about to do something unintentional that will cause some small damage or disturbance, we call out to him in a raised voice. "Watch out!" "Be careful!" or

"Watch your step!" – to grab his attention.

For example, if he's about to brush a glass cup off the table, or tip over a container of milk or close the door on someone's finger, etc. it's important to get his attention immediately. The way we do

this is by raising our voice. We are only able to do this because Hashem gave us the ability to change the volume of our voice. Since we change from our usual tone, this serves the purpose of grabbing his attention, getting him to stop for a second and avoiding pain or inconvenience that was prone to happen.

Often the chessed of calling out is two-fold. It protects somebody from getting hurt and it also helps the potential hurter from hurting others. It's distressful to know that you unintentionally caused another person pain. Even though this is not a vital function and life will go on even if the milk spilled or the glass broke, it's a chessed Hashem we all benefit from numerous times and it deserves our recognition.

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In many ways the Beaver does some amazing feats not possible without Hashem being be-



hind them, as we shall see. But to accomplish those feats their anatomy (their organs and limbs) also has to have unique features rarely, if ever, found

in similar creatures. Put together by Hashem in this most uniquely structured animal.

Beavers are large brown furry rodents with small eyes, small rounded ears, large orange teeth, and a large flat, scaly tail. They weigh between 44 to 60 pounds. They are about 3-4 feet long. Beavers live in ponds, lakes, rivers, marshes, and streams all across North America.

Beavers have long, sharp teeth known as incisors that are used for gnawing and chewing. These teeth are always growing so it is important for the beavers to keep them trim by continuously gnawing on trees and branches. The incisors on beavers can grow as much as 4 feet per year! Beaver teeth are so strong that they are able to chew through large tree trunks.

Beavers have tremendous cutting pressure with their teeth because of the unique shape of their skulls and the muscles attached to the jaw. These exert a powerful lever action, at least twice as powerful as the jaw strength of humans. Their front teeth grow continually and are kept worn down by constant gnawing. The front surface is very hard enamel that wears down slowly. The backs are of a softer



material that wears down a little faster. This somewhat unequal wear gives the teeth a chisel-like edge, great for cutting the bark, and beneath

the bark, of trees. The sixteen molars (back teeth) used to grind the beaver's woody food seldom show any sign of wear. The molars are uniquely shaped to be able to grind the wood into digestible fibers.

Beavers mostly love to eat the bark, and right beneath the bark, and the leaves from the trees that they help knock down by chewing through the tree trunk. At times they'll also eat plants, grasses, and some aquatic plants as well. However, they don't eat the actual wood of the trees. With the leftover wood they create dams and lodges. Although they are found in or around water most of the time, they do NOT eat fish. They usually prefer trees between 2-6 inches in diameter. A busy beaver can chew through a 5-inch willow tree in 3 minutes! A pair of beavers take down about 400 trees per year!

The beaver has several special waterproofing devices that go into operation as it submerges under water. Special valves in the ears and nostrils can be snapped shut to keep out the water. Even though we humans also swim, but we don't stay underwater for too long. Beavers typically stay under water 3-4 minutes straight and when fleeing from predators they can stay under water for as much as 15 minutes straight! Therefore, they need these extra protection valves. They also have special see through eyelid membranes (called nictitating membranes which is like a third eyelid) that slide over the eyes like goggles to protect their eyes from all the dirt in the water, and it helps their underwater vision. Very few mammals have this special eye protection.

They are also able to gnaw and chew underwater without swallowing water because of the specialized design of their mouths. Behind the incisors, their furred lips form a loose flap that is able to close shut behind these teeth, leaving them exposed for use but stopping water from entering the mouth. Another unique breathing feature is the passage from their nose to their throat. This important airway connects directly to the upper lungs, permitting the beaver to chew and swallow, and breathe through its nose at the same time. We can't do that. When we swallow, we can't breathe at the same time that we swallow.

They also have a very unique digestive system.

Although many other kinds of animals can digest the cellulose found in plants, beavers are more dependent on it than most other animals. Beavers are able to digest about 30 to 35 percent of the cellulose contained in the woody material they ingest (which is a very high percentage) partly because of special digestive secretions in their stomach and partly because of colonies of special digestive bacteria that are found in their gut. They also have an especially long and extended lower digestive system that is thereby able to handle the woody material that passes through it.

The front and back feet of the beaver have 5 digits/fingers which enables then to hold on strongly to branches and other material. The back feet are webbed. They are from the very few mammals that have that. This enables them to swim much faster and with much more power per movement of their feet.

A unique "feature" that is found on the first two digits of their rear feet is a unique double claw, sometimes called a split nail. Here, a thin second nail lies closely next to a larger main nail, creating a narrow slit. Beavers are able to move these double claws like a clamp and this feature has at least one important function—it gives a beaver added efficiency when comb-

ing and groom-ing its fur.

This action also helps spread

spread oil over the fur, which is crucial for helping repel water from their fur.

The two sets of double nails differ slightly in construction. The inner nail is larger and rougher along the edge, forming what beaver experts call a "coarse comb." The outer nail is smaller and has a finer, minutely serrated edge. This nail is called a "fine comb."

Beavers are known for their thick, heavy fur which encases the beaver and it gives it a remarkable advantage in its watery environment. This warm outer blanket also helps it survive in extremely cold weather. Beneath the fur is a thick layer of fat that is crucial for keeping them warm in the winter.



Like many heavily furred mammals, beaver fur consists of two coats. An inner, or undercoat, consists of extremely fine, soft hairs that form a dense pile over the entire body except for the feet and most of the tail.

Growing through the underfur are longer guard hairs that extend up and beyond the inner layer. In adult beavers, guard hairs are typically about two and one half inches in length and these hairs are much thicker and coarser than the hairs found in the undercoat.

Beaver's guard hairs are normally shiny, a condition enhanced by the spreading of oil on to the fur, produced in their oil glands. This is not the same fluid that is produced in their castor glands (which have a special unique scent unique to each family, and it's used as a marker to show that this is their families territory). Both sets of glands are found close together under the tail. Because of the oil spread on to the fur, their hair has a slick, smooth feel to it, just the right texture for gliding through a

wet environment. If not for the water repellent oil, the waterlogged heavy fur would be a huge drag on their swimming capabilities.

Finally, we will discuss its completely unique tail. It is wide and flat and it is basically hairless, and it has a layer of dark, tough skin.

No other creature has anything like it (with the exception of the platypus). The tail is used for a few important functions. Firstly, it acts as a rudder helping it steer the beaver while in water. The tissue in the tail is a fatty substance that is important to the beaver as a source of stored energy in times of food shortage. The densely, concentrated network of blood vessels in the tail also helps the beaver control its body temperature, radiating excess heat when it is too warm and limiting heat loss when the outside temperature is too cold.

On land, it forms a sturdy base, creating a stable tripod in conjunction __, _,

with the two hind legs

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when beavers are standing to gnaw on trees, a common activity.

Beavers also rely on their tails to create loud slaps on the surface of the water, the standard beaver alarm.

Now, if you were paying attention, you would have noticed that just about every part of the beaver is SPECIAL, it's unique. How can an accident put together so many uniquely, special parts of this amazing beaver? Review the article and you will see how every step of the way there's tremendous uniqueness to this animal.

We will see in the next article what amazing things this unique beaver is able to construct with its unique body structure that Hashem gave it.





- 2. Maintain a safe distance from fights a minimum of 1000 miles.
- 3. Drown yourself in all the good Hashem gives you and be as uninterested as possible in anything else.
- 4. Someone said something hurtful? DON'T be hurtful back. It's extremely flammable!
- 5. Laugh it off (inside).










Rabbi Zevy Golombeck - A Life with Bitachon Did you know that encouraging others is a form of pumping people up?

There are so many ways to encourage people!

We can:

- Share with people how much Hashem loves them!
- Share with people how exciting it is to do Mitzvos!
- We can dance and sing because we are the chosen Nation!



- We can remind people how internally good they are!
- We can share how Hashem is, was, and always will be. Hashem neither sleeps nor slumbers and is always watching over us and showering us with Ahava Rabba – lots of love!

A few months ago, I was eating by my brother for the Shabbos day meal. Right before Benching he said how exciting it is to Bench and how we should really dance when we Bench because Hashem gave us such delicious food. Before Benching, my brother turned to his two-year-old saying "Thank You, Hashem for the delicious _____ (fill in the foods that you just ate). Since then, my appreciation for Benching has sky rocketed. I literally love to sing and dance by Benching. I listen to the words I am saying in Benching and realize how much of a gold mine it is. Some of the gems are when we say "Hashem is good and Hashem is our Shepard...He has done good for us...He is doing good for us and He will forever do good for us. He has bestowed, He bestows, and He will forever bestow upon us Chein, kindness, and mercy; relief, salvation and success.... livelihood and sustenance; compassion, life, peace, and all goodness... it's such a gorgeous Brocha! I love washing for bread now because my brother pumped up benching, and now I feel so pumped when I Bench! Before I Bench, I also love saying what my two-year-old niece says "thank you Hashem for the delicious _____ (and naming foods I ate)

This is an example of pumping people up by sharing how exciting a Mitzva is!

Story

It is important to pump people up by showing them they can be successful and we get excited by small efforts. Anything small is really huge! I have the privilege to be in meetings with principals, teachers' educators and professionals discussing Hashem's precious children.

One of the things I make sure to share is how we need to set the child up for success. Whatever chart you want to give that child, split the requirements in half and then in half again and then again. Then pump the child up and make sure they will be successful. We usually find a way to bring automatic success to the child.

My father Amush shares this concept from Rav Yisroel

Salanter in relation to ourselves as well. Before Rosh Hashana, he shares whatever Kabbala you are thinking of doing, cut it in half and then in half again.

I was at Rabbi Gamliel Rabinowitz Shlita about a year ago. The way it works is that if you want a Brocha from the Rav, you need to write on a paper a Kabbala you will do Bli Neder and write it down together with your name so the Rav can daven for you. We

were waiting in the waiting room for hours. I noticed that many people were very nervous to write a Kabbala down. I too wasn't sure what to write down as I was worried, I would not be able to do something long term.

I went over to the Rebbetzin and asked if it can be a onetime Kabbala and very small. Her face lit up as she said it indeed could be. I went back to the waiting room and announced to the women that the Kabbala could be very small and it could be ever a one time thing. I shared that I would be writing that I would say Asher Yatzar inside for six times! Everyone felt very pumped and I noticed many women then took the paper to write the Kabbala because it was no longer a weight rather it was so freeing. Everyone felt so pumped!

Klal Yisroel is so amazing and we all just want to be so close to Hashem. Many times, I see clients who feel badly about themselves. One of the things they feel badly about is because they say they don't feel like their relationship with Hashem is good R"L.

I share with them how sometimes I have one spouse come in that says they don't feel so connected to the other spouse. In each case it's because of something different that is going on that gets in the way of the old connection they used to have. Let's take the example of when there is a big stress of finances and the spouse feels that is what is in the way of their connection. Of course, there should be no stress because Hashem provides everyone and Hashem is our bank account and Hashem has unlimited funds for all of us! I say let's do an exercise: Imagine it was right after Sheva Brochos and everything felt amazing. Imagine you had no financial stress, or fill in whatever the stress between the two people is. would you feel more connected to your spouse. I usually get a very positive response such as "yes sure I would feel so connected" Then I say okay great so you REALLY are connected, you feel connected, except the stress is just blocking you from seeing how connected you really are. It's blocking you from remembering how internally good this other person is. It's blocking you from seeing the REAL them, from remembering who they really are. After this realization, we work on igniting the connection.

And this is what I share with people in regard to their rela-

tionship with Hashem. I ask "why don't you feel connected, loved, cared for, watched and protected as Rabbi Golumbeck describes?" They say things like they did Aveiros or they see

pain in the world etc. etc. I say okay let's do an exercise. Imagine you didn't have whatever stress was in the relationship. Do you see Hashem's goodness? For example, you are breathing, seeing, eating have a place to sleep and on and on and on.



When they respond yes, I say let's just remove those blocks for a few moments that you can feel good and feel close and connected to Hashem. Let's just remove those bricks so you can feel how Hashem loves you no matter what, no matter who, no matter when, and no matter where! Once a person feels Hashem's love then everything changes. Once they realize they can just remove whatever is blocking the relationship and they can get as close as they want because Hashem is our best Friend and always there for us, it changes everything.

When we were born before we had anything blocking us, we were purely connected to Hashem and we "saw" Hashem for what Hashem really does for us. It's only the blocks that make us forget "who Hashem is". Once they see it was all just something blocking their getting to know WHO HASHEM REALLY IS, THE MASTER OF KINDNESS TO US ALL, then they can FEEL Hashem's LOVE! It's so amazing how Yidden love Hashem! Once a person feels Hashem's love the person feels their whole relationship with Hashem is so different. In this way we can pump people more and more and more.

I just love to give people support and Chizuk. As an aside: Doing for others makes us feel so good ourselves and fills our own emotional bank account!

Idea: It's so easy to share love with other people.

- Whenever someone walks into the room we can think: "We are so lucky to be part of such a shining nation. Evey yid I meet is so full of Chein and love and a shining gemstone Neshoma!" Thinking this will pump the other person up. Yes even thinking it, how much more so saying it will pump someone up!"
- If someone doesn't yet know about giving their burden straight to Hashem, I ask them to hand me some of their pain or burden by making a physical motion of handing it to me. Then I take the brick and throw it up to Hashem. This brings people a lot of relief.
- Dance and sing and be joyous while you talk about a specific mitzva to pump up your family and friends about doing that mitzva. For example, you can say "wow I am eating Challah on Shabbos. I feel so so lucky because it's a mitzva and a mitzva is worth more than a million dollars!" You can have

the kids each say the highest number they know and share with joy how a Mitzva is worth ever more than that. Our joyous attitude is contagious! You don't have to be shy about be-

ing joyous because you are building a gorgeous house in Olam Habba.

- When you cook or bake you can think about who you can share what you are making with be it a neighbor or friend!
- Text a random person a kind message to pump them up!
- Tell the musician at the next Simcha you go to what wonderful music it is.

Song:

I was in a preschool yesterday to model and share "Twelve ideas of how to enhance your preschool playtime".

I was observing the beautiful circle time when the children were davening. Then it was time to give Tzedakah, and some children did not bring a penny for tzedakah that day. Whoever brought a penny had a song sung for them. Moishy brought a penny, a penny... for Tzedakah today.... The children who did not bring a penny were completely devastated. They looked so sad. I asked the Morah if we can add a song for the children who did not bring a penny. She asked what I meant. I said if Chaim has no penny instead of singing "Chaim brought a penny" we can sing "Chaim loves Hashem, Hashem, Hashem. Chaim loves Hashem and got a Mitzva today". And in this way those children who did not have a penny also get a mitzva. We tried this on the spot and all the faces of the children lit up. One child still said "but I still don't have a penny!" I said a mitzva is worth more than a billion pennies to Hashem and then his face lit up as well and he was pumped! Please share this idea with any playgroups you know!

Here is a song that I sang to myself one year when I was on the way to say a Brocha on the trees. I had not been feeling well that week so I was giving myself Chizuk to go out and say the Brocha by singing this song and my whole attitude changed!

As an adult, I try to sing this song all the time! I try to change up the motions or dance steps as I sing this song. This creates a function called expansion. When we add change to something while we are singing, it helps solidify the feelings associated with it. The more times we sing and add a small change, the more neural pathways we have connected to what we are doing. This helps it become more integrated into our beings.

Feeling Hashem's Love!



There are so many ways to feel Hashems love. Hashem showers us with Ahuva Rabba! Here are a few examples:

I was just so in the mood of a nice fruit platter one day while I

was working. All of a sudden, a client walked in with a beautiful fruit platter and said her mother sent it for me as a gift because it was her last time coming.

Whenever my neck and shoulder and back are in pain I keep repeating: Hashem is encasing my neck with love. Hashem is encasing my shoulder with love. Hashem is encasing my back with love... and the pain eases I keep on doing this until the pain is getting less and less. One night the pain was still there

so I said "ok I think I'm relying on Bitochon instead of relying on Hashem. I said over and over "Hashem it is only me and you. No one else and nothing else" and the pain disappeared.


The next morning, I was literally drunk with joy, thanking Hashem as my full range of motion improved. I can move my neck. I can move my hands without pain. It's unreal. I love Hashem so so much. He's literally my best friend. As I am writing this article my knee has been hurting for about a week so I decided to say (as I learned from, Rabbi Golumbeck):

"Hashem is great, I love you Hashem my feet are great my feet are healthy my feet are fine! And immediately I felt some sort of click in my knee as something went back into place and it feels much better!"

Q. There were many tzaddikim who were on the highest level of bitachon yet painful things happened to them. There were many great people who were tortured and killed by non-Jews. There were many gedolim who lost children during their lifetime. There were many tzadikim and talmidei Chachamim who never had children or at some point of their lives didn't have parnasah.

- 1. How come their bitachon in Hashem didn't help them?
- 2. We hear on 'A Life with Bitachon' how we are supposed to feel safe and secure in Hashem's Hands. How am I supposed to feel secure and safe relying on Hashem when I see that so many tzaddikim, even with their highest level of bitachon, were still affected? Are we supposed to be malachim and ignore what we see?
- 3. In addition, we say in Bentching, "Hazan es Haolam kulo btuvo.... val yechsar lanu mazon l'olam va'ed." There were many times when people (Yidden and non-Jews) died from starvation. Even today there are many people who suffer from undernour-

ishment and many die from starvation. How are we supposed to understand all this?

A. The Leshem and the Beis Halevi speak about this question. There are different levels of bitachon. The lowest level is that Hashem says, you have wants and needs, I want to make you happy. Rely on me, and I'll give it to you. That's what we talk

about on A Life of Bitachon. Then there's a higher level for Tzadikim. They see everything positive in the first place, so they don't care about what seems to us to be nisyonos. The Chazon Ish said, "I'm the happiest person in the world." That's despite the fact that he had no children or money. He told R' Shlomo Lorincz, "I'm richer than Rothchild." Where does happiness come from? A relationship with Hashem.

There's a famous story that brings out this point. There was a certain person that went to a Rebbe and said," I have this nisayon and this tzara, how am I supposed to be mekabel it besimcha? So many issues, so many problems?" The Rebbe said, "Go to R' Zushe, he knows the answer to this question." He went to him. He looks in his house. He didn't have a penny to his name. His house was falling apart, their clothing was falling apart. His wife wasn't well. He had every issue you can imagine.

He asked him, "With so many issues, how could a person be happy?" He

said to him, "I don't understand the question. I never had anything bad in my life. Everything is so good. I only know what good is. I don't know what bad is." So we see from there, that if a person lives on the highest level, so their simcha comes from living with Hashem, their enjoyment comes from living with Hashem. Hashem is the source of all simcha, the source of all enjoyment. The closer you get to Hashem, the happier you'll be.

R' Chaim Kanievsky had no money, he lived in a little tiny house.

He lived in this old two bedroom with 10 kids. And they mamesh lived in a hole in the wall. And when people wanted to buy him a new oven, a new refrigerator, new mattresses, he said, "I don't want it. I don't want anyone to think that I need these things to make me happy. I don't need it to be



happy." R' Chaim Kanievsky was the happiest person. He used to joke around. He used to laugh. He was always smiling, always happy, never under pressure. So bottom line is, that real happiness comes from living with Hashem. So Tzadikiim loved to go through nisyonos, they loved to go through challenges. They don't need money, they don't need children, they don't need anything, all they need is Hashem. Because of that, that's why



zugt the Beis Halevi, they don't need bitachon to get what they want because they already have what they want. But we're not on that level. We're not so connected to Hashem. So Hashem says: OK, so we're not so connected. So what do you need to make you happy? You need food, you need money, you need a house, you need children, you need all these things. Ohh, that's what you need, then rely on Me and that activates the bracha. Now there's also a third level, the highest level. R' Chaim Volozhin explains that even by Tzadikim that don't need anything, you'll still find that they daven to Hashem. R' Chaim Volozhin explains from Nefesh Hachaim that even though they don't need anything on a personal level, but since they know that Hashem wants to give to them, because Hashem wants to be meitiv, so they'll still daven.

So the bottom line is that Tzadikkim are the happiest people in the world. They have everything they want, and if they ask for

anything, it's because they know Hashem wants to be meitiv. But we're not on that level, so we could ask Hashem for whatever we feel will make us happy, and the more we focus on how much Hashem took care of us in the past, the more we focus on feeling loved by Hashem, that activates the open bracha, chessed, and rachamim, and then Hashem will give us more and more and more.

Regarding people dying from starvation. Actually nobody died from starvation. There's no such thing because food is not what keeps a person alive. People don't live off bread. You know why people live? Because Hashem says that when a neshama comes to this world, it's supposed to do a certain Tikkun. While it's doing this tikun, they'll be alive. When they're finished with their Tikkun, it will be time to leave the world. And when the body's shavach and weak, that means their neshama is getting their Tikkun, and that's how they're fulfilling their Tafkid. So therefore every person has exactly what they need for their Tikkun. The more we focus on Hashem's love, that activates all the open bracha, open chessed, open rachamim.

Mrs. Holstein from Cleveland just called in that her mother was very sick. They couldn't even put an IV into her. They couldn't give any food or drink. And she lived over 14 days without any food, without any drink. Mrs. Holstein from Cleveland, her mother lived over 14 days without any food and drink. What do you mean? Doesn't a person need food

or drink to live? The answer is no, they don't need. You need Hashem. If He wants you to live, then you live. If not, not. Nothing to do with food, nothing to do with drink. People don't die from starvation. When Mrs. Holstein's mother finished her tafkid, that's when she left the world. You see clearly in our generation. This story just happened a month ago in our generation, and there are many other similar stories of people that didn't have food for a long time and still lived. The bottom line is that we have every last thing that we need that's good for our neshama, and the more we focus on it, the more we get open bracha. There's nothing to worry about.

shidduchim. However, she has numerous middos issues which need to be rectified, such as ka'as and patience. On one hand, my duty as her parent is to help her get married. On the other hand, if I help her get married, her husband will suffer from her poor middos?

A. Rav Yisroel Falk responded: If you are capable of helping your daughter perfect her middos and prevent her future husband from suffering, certainly, you should help her.

I was mekabel to bli neder not take the kids during that time, and to only book things for after Tisha B'av (if Mashiach chas veshalom didn't come before then). On the other hand, Kibbud Av Ve'em; my parents wanted to go away and they wanted me to book a place. I didn't know what to do.

My mother asked me again, "Did you book a place?" I said to her, "Let's do it after Tisha B'av." She said, "You're right. Let's wait until after Tisha B'av." I said to myself, "Wow, it's a Neis!" I knew they really wanted to go away; they wanted to rent a home with a pool, and they wanted to go somewhere with the kids. But Hashem saved me! I was able to avoid booking a vacation for the three weeks and still keep Kibbud Av Ve'em. Than you so much Hashem!
