Continued free, and then he'd be able to from front record himself. He asked me to accompany him with my music. "I do this for parnassah, not free of charge," I told him.

"It's so that we'll have a recording of how we work together," he said, trying to convince me. "It's very important to me."

I asked my Rav if it was correct to use this time for playing, and the Rav told me, "It's your brother – your twin; helping him is the right thing to do, especially in this case, because there is no one else who can do it." I agreed.



My brother called the boy's father and said, "I saw that you're making a bar mitzvah. Maybe you'd like me to come with my brother, and we'll play and sing at the event?"

There was no response at the other end of the line. My brother waited and

waited, and finally he asked, "Are you with me?"

"I...I...I have no words. Are you for real? You'll come with your brother and play for free?"

"Yes. Does that work for you?"

"Work for me is not the word. You simply don't understand what happened here."

Then the father started telling my brother everything that had happened to them over the past month: "My son, the bar-mitzvah boy, very much wanted a band at his bar-mitzvah. We are not people of means, and everything connected to the bar mitzvah, from the tefillin up to the dessert, we are bringing with true mesirus nefesh. We're preparing everything ourselves, homemade food in the simplest hall, and it's just not possible for us to add 6,000 shekel for a band. I explained this to my son, but he stubbornly insisted. "If you can't help me," he told my wife and me, "I will ask the Ribbono shel Olam to help me."

During the past month he went to

the beis hachaim in Tzfas every day and davened at kivrei tzaddikim for Hashem's help in honor of his bar mitzvah, and each time, he asked that there should be a band at his bar mitzvah. This has been going on for thirty days.

My wife and I saw how much he wanted this and how much he was davening, and we were really afraid. What would be? He was sure that Hashem would help him. and we see the reality. I had already informed him that I had no intention of paying for it. No generous donor had offered us the money we needed, and then suddenly...this call. Hashem heard the boy's tefillos! You are the messengers of the Creator yisbarach!"



It was an especially happy event. The bar mitzvah boy's face shone with joy. The recording was only a sibah – a secondary reason for us to perform. We saw the Hand of the Mesoveiv here – the Navigator of all occurrences. We had the zechus to be part of an amazing display of the fruit of emunah – bitachon.

I am a Yid from Monsey. My son had fluid in his ears, and the doctor gave us a referral for surgery to insert tubes in his ears in order to drain them. I told my neighbor about this.

> He responded with this story: "Listen to what happened with my son. The doctor gave us a referral for this very same surgery, and I made an appointment for it in Manhattan. On the day of the appointment we got up very early and traveled for two hours. The boy was fasting. We were stressed and nervous and anxious to have it all behind us. The doctor checked him and said, 'He has an infection. We can't do surgery when there's an infection. Go home, and come back when his infection is cured.""

> This neighbor's story was really unpleasant. I learned a lesson from it, and I decided I would make sure there was no infection anywhere in his body. Immediately after I made an ap-

pointment for the surgery, I also made an

appointment with our family doctor, to examine him a few days prior to surgery so I would not be sent home because of an infection.

Close to the day of surgery, the doctor examined my son, and ba-



ruch Hashem, everything was fine. We set out calmly for surgery, my son fasting, and we arrived at the special clinic. We went in to the doctor, and only then was a strange mistake discovered: This clinic did not do these types of surgeries! The doctor where our appointment was scheduled does not deal with this at all. He does all sorts of things related to ears, but surgery – no.

Thus, exactly what happened to my neighbor happened to me as well, only for a different reason that I could not have anticipated. I saw that when Hakadosh Baruch Hu wants something to happen, no hishtadlus will help. I don't know why we had to go through it and what we had to be mesakein, but clearly, the entire backand-forth, the preparation for surgery and the need to reschedule the appointment, this time at the right place – everything is from Hashem yisbarach. The chochmah is to rely on Him and not on our own hishtadlus.

With much mazal tov, I attained the status of "mechutan."

It was right before my oldest daughter's wedding and I desperately needed 20,000 shekels. I went to a certain gemach, where I was given a form to sign detailing the rules of the gemach. I read the large and small print, and I had a question about ribbis. I asked my question to the head of the gemach, but he barely heard it. "Why are you asking questions? This gemach has existed for several years, and no one has ever had any problems." I saw there was no one to talk to, and I decided I would not take the loan. I did not want to take a chance of transgressing the prohibition of ribbis.

Then, just moments later, my phone rang. My friend asked how I was doing, and he told me, "There's a Yid here who wants to donate money in honor of a wedding. How much do you need?" "Twenty-thousand shekels," I responded.

Before long I received the entire sum that I needed, as a gift! Not a gemach or a loan, but a complete



THE MISSING ENVELOPE

My job is to collect tuition from the parents of the Talmud Torah of London. In our school, parents don't arrange an automatic withdrawal from their bank account; rath-

er, I need to call them to remind them and make sure the money comes in.



Before Pesach, I called one of the

parents, a prominent Jew, and reminded him that he had a tuition debt, and we wanted to pay the melamdim before Pesach, so they would be able to cover their Yom Tov expenses. The gvir agreed that this was very important. "I'm bringing the money today," he concluded.

The day passed, and the money did not arrive. Several more days passed, Pesach passed, we counted the omer and lit a bonfire for Rabi Shimon, and the money still hadn't arrived. Just before Shavuos I called the gvir again and asked him, "Where's the money?"

"What do you mean, where's the money?" he asked. "I brought it to you on that very day."

"Impossible."

"What's impossible? I myself came with my car to your house. I saw your son, a small child, going out of the house, and I gave him the envelope with the money. There were 2,000 pounds sterling in there!"

"Okay, I'll ask my son," I said, and with great difficulty I held back from lashing out at the gvir and offering my opinion of his behavior. Since when does anyone give over such a large sum through a small child, and depend on him to deliver the sum to the right place? Where was his head? We were talking about the equivalent of tens of thousands of shekels. It didn't make sense that he would act so irresponsibly!

My son remembered nothing of the whole affair, and I decided to try asking the Jewish neighbors in the area if they had seen the envelope. I knocked on house after house, until we came to the home of an avreich, and I asked him, "Did you see an envelope with money here on Erev Pesach?"

"You're talking about an envelope containing 2,000 pounds sterling?"

"Yes, yes," my eyes lit up. "Exactly that."

"Listen to what was going on then," the avreich related. "Right before Pesach I was fired from my job. I had no income, and I had absolutely no idea what I would do. How would I cover Pesach expenses? I stood and davened to the Creator of all worlds and asked Him to help me. Immediately afterwards, I went out to the yard and discovered an envelope there with 2,000 pounds inside. This was simply a gift from Shamayim. I took the money with joy and bought everything we needed for Yom Tov."

"That money was tuition, meant to be used to pay the melamdim," I told him. "We need to return the money to the Talmud Torah."

"I don't have such a large sum now," said the avreich, "but I can pay it back in installments." I called the gvir immediately and told him, "I found the money. An avreich who lives in my neighborhood saw the envelope on his lawn and thought that this was a gift from Shamayim in honor of Pesach, and he said he'd return the sum in installments."

"He doesn't have to pay it back," the gvir answered. "The money is completely a gift to him. I'll give you a new envelope."

This time the envelope came all the way to me without any intermediaries in the form of young children. Only the message echoes on: Sometimes Hakadosh Baruch Hu makes a person lose his proper logic in order to carry out a hidden mission, in order to uplift someone who is poor or unfortunate. 


When they came to pick up the cholent, it was the exact moment when Mrs. Solomon took off the crockpot to serve her family.

from the Bitachon Hotline and listened to the yesodos. He said, "Hashem can get me the siddur."





Suggestions for the case of Yehudis who was told to come to the doctor's office ontime, and then waited two hours to see him.

• The doctor was late because there was an emergency.

• There was another woman in the waiting room and Yehudis had the chance to make a Kiddush Hashem during their conversation.

• It gave her two hours that she has been searching for to continue saying her Tehillim.

• She got a nap in which as a mother of growing children does not happen with such frequency.

• After she came into the doctor, she realized how high level he was and would be much more likely to follow his advice.



• She could focus on the fact that the doctor is obviously giving people the amount of time they need for him to properly diagnose them. Now, she could be confident that he will give her the requisite amount of time she needs as well.

• Doctors also don't want to run late, because they know that not only does this frustrate patients, but it also puts their schedule late, making them leave work late. Maybe the electric went out when the doctor arrived at work, or maybe there was a plumbing issue, or maybe he got stuck in traffic. Sometimes they are waiting for their assistant to arrive, and they can't work properly if the assistant isn't there. Many things happen in offices that are out of the hands of the doctors which is why they run late.

• Alternatively, Yehudis could politely ask the secretary what happened that the doctor was 2 hours behind schedule. Sometimes they will explain the reason. Additionally, the secretary may have made a wring appointment for Yehudis.

• The lesson now is that in the future if she has an appointment at the doctor or dentist and waits longer than 15 minutes, she can ask the secretary if the doctor is running on time or what the wait time would be. This way she can decide if she wants to wait or come back.

• People will have a lot less frustrations if they anticipate a long wait. When you know something is going to happen, it makes it that much easier to handle. Additionally, she could use this as an opportunity to work on her savlanus.

Our parashah opens with the mitzvah of lighting the Menorah in the Mishkan. Last week we brought from Rav Avigdor Miller that the purpose of the Mishkan is to thank Hashem and this is the reason behind all of its practices. So, the purpose of the Menorah is to thank Hashem.

How is this so? The Cohanim



The Cohanim need to ensure that the Menorah is continually lit and not even a second is allo

a second is allowed to go by that it isn't burning. This is a way of expressing our gratitude that the sun is constantly providing us with light.

Chazal teach that each moment Hashem recreates the world, so the sun is constantly being renewed just for our benefit. Elaborating on this idea, the Alter of Slobadka writes that when we observe the sun, we should be continually aware that Hashem is personally shining it; specifically for us to enjoy. Each time, we walk outside Hashem is shining the sun just for us! This is solely due to Hashem's endless love for us, regardless whether or not we are deserving. In the beautiful words of the Kli Yakar, 'even the biggest Tzadik who performs all the mitzvos, still isn't deserving of the great kindness of Hashem, that the sun shines on us each day!'



Really, words can't really describe how much we gain from the sun. It provides us with warmth, light and plays a great role in the production of our food. Hashem positioned the world in the exact place that we can benefit from the sun. If the world

was any closer it would burn and any further it would freeze. The sun lights up the planet, helping us enjoy the beautiful

The Torah lists all the begadim that the Kohen Gadol wears. One of them is the Choshen, and another one is the Eifod. The Torah writes, ולא יזח- החושן מעל- האפוז. You have to make sure that the Choshen rests on the Eifod, and they are not allowed to be removed from each other. They have to always be attached to each other.

Reb Moshe Feinstein Zt"I in his Sefer Darash Moshe asks, why is it that when it comes to the clothing of the Kohein Gadol, we only see that these two garments, the Choshen and the Eifod need to be attached and connected? What is the connection between these two things that they cannot

be detached, and what is the message and lesson that Torah is coming to teach us?

Reb Moshe answers based on the Gemara, that the Eifod of the Kohein Gadol was worn to bring Kapara for the great sin of Avoda Zara. And the Choshen was worn to bring a Kapara for the sins of cheating and stealing.

So says Reb Moshe, that the connection between these two Begadim is loud and clear: Any person that lives with Emuna and Bitachon will realize that whenever he does Hishtadlus to try to get something done, he should not get emotionally involved in his Hishtadlus. He should not care if it works out or not. It is not what gives us anything anyway.



What gives us Hatzlacha in life? Only Hashem. He is the only koach in the world that brings us anything. It has nothing to do with our Hishtadlus.

Therefore, living with Bitachon will cause us to never have a nisayon to steal and cheat. We will never have Sinah, hate people, or make Machlokes because of money.

All the people that get emotionally involved in their Hishtadlus, and because of money they fight, or hate each other, and have Machlokes, it's because they believe in Kochi V'otzem Yadi. They believe they need to fight for their survival. This concept comes from Avoda Zara! Because they believe in a koach other than our loving, caring Father, the Ribono Shel Oilam. But a person that lives with Bitachon realizes that there is no other koach other than Hashem! With that you'll be able to have the recipe in life to relax and enjoy, and you won't get carried away with your Hishtadlus. You will never worry about someone cheating you, because you realize that this is impossible. You won't ever have stress, worries, fears, Machlokes or Sinah, because of money. Because who is in charge of money? Only Hashem, and no foreign koach. He is in charge of giving us everything.

Therefore the Torah tells us to connect the Choshen to the Eifod. It teaches us that when you live with Emuna and Bitachon, and you don't live with Avoda Zara, you will never have a nisayon to cheat and steal. Only someone that lacks Bitachon will find himself in hot water. He'll feel like he has to find ways to outsmart people and come up with trickery or different kinds of Hishtadlus that Hakadoish Boruch Hu wants us to run far away from.

Let's bring out this Yesoid, with two amazing stories:

A Yungerman shared: My wife has a playgroup and she made up beforehand with the parents that for any day that the parents don't send a child, they won't be charged for that day. Since we felt that if they aren't coming that day, they don't need our services, so we shouldn't charge them.

Unfortunately, there was one parent that was taking advantage of the system. Each day she would find a different friend to watch her child. Like this she would not have to send to the playgroup and she would save herself hundreds of dollars. We started to get very resentful of this parent, since she was undermining the system, but we didn't know what to do. We knew that if we would confront her, it would cause a lot of friction.

Then we caught ourselves. Is she bringing our Parnassa? Do we have to deal with this? It is only Hashem, and it has nothing to do with that parent. We were Mekabeil to just forget about it, and to relax and enjoy. We reminded ourselves of the Chofetz Chaim that says that if a person is Mevater for peace, not only will he not lose out, but he will get double and triple, from a different place. A few days later, I opened my mailbox, and I found a check for 1,600 dollars! Someone gave me a check out of the blue. A lot more than what we were losing out from that parent!

Another story was shared by a Yiddishe Mamme: I hired someone to do a job for me, and he charged a certain price. Afterwards, I realized that he completely overcharged me. I got very upset. I wanted to share my frustration to all my friends, but then I caught myself. Why am I getting so emotionally involved? Everything is from my loving caring father, and it has nothing to do with this worker. Why should I get so carried away over a few dollars?! Shortly afterwards, I made a simcha B"H. Unexpectedly, a friend comes over and said: "I would like to sponsor half the Simcha!"

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THE GIFTS OF THE PAST, ARE THE PRESENT DAY'S PRESENTS

The Year 1880, Location: Lodz, Poland

It was a heavy laborious day for Shmeryl, with lots of physically draining, straining work. For Shmeryl, to gain the status of being the most popular "Treigger"-Porter of the town, it took a lot hard work. He was the quintessential, "naturally born" Treigger, with his broad-shouldered muscular body, that Hashem had blessed him with. It took a lot of stamina, and endurance, to do such hard work, throughout the long hours of the day. Lifting, and



loading heavy boxes onto wagons, then unloading and carrying them on his back, up to apartments, were all very strenuous work. Shmeryl thanked Hashem for his strong muscular

body every day! He even tried to sing some "Boruch Hashem Songs" through the day as he worked.

After a long day of hard work, with sweat pouring out of every pore of poor Shmeryl's face, he finally sat down to happily enjoy his simple supper. His daily, weekday-workday regular-routine evening meal, was a portion of salt preserved Schmaltz Herring, smoked preserved salmon (lox), or whitefish. He barely ever ate a fresh piece of fish on a regular day. That was reserved for the rich. As for him and his family, fresh fish was strictly a Shabbos delicacy.

He B"H had enough money to buy himself a few thick slices of bread, and he ate them together with the strong- tasting fish. If he was lucky, he had a sour pickle to go along with his meal. The bread was heavy and chewy with a dark color, due to the large amount of whole grain and lots of cheap bran or Pumpernickel that were mixed in to the recipe. He enjoyed every bite as it filled and satiated him and he continuously thanked



Hashem for his sustenance, as he ate.



When Hashem sent him his way a piece of white bread, he rolled it together with his usual dark bread. Somehow it spread that special taste, at least in his imagination, through the entire Black Bread. This way he felt even more thankful to Hashem! His Birchas Hamazon was full of gratitude to Hashem, for his simple life sustaining meal.

Beans costs a few kopeks more, so that was for the Shabbos treat - the "Cholent". Instead of beans, he ate a boiled, or baked potato, along with a fresh piece of onion, or garlic, for lunch or supper. When Fridays came around all the weekday food was specially redesigned to have a dif-

ferent look and taste for Shabbos. His wife would grate it all t o g e t h e r



then add salt and bake it or fry it with a little fat or oil she had managed to procure with her weekly savings. She had scrimped and set aside the entire week every extra Zloyte/ Grushen/Kopeck, to have some extra money for a little bit special food, L'kuvoid Shabbos.

E v ery Erev S h a b bos, the h o u s e w a s filled with a



heavenly warmth and aroma as the Challos baked in their brick oven. They prepared all the special foods with joy, excitement, and anticipation for the heilige Shabbos. They usually were lucky enough, to have the opportunity, to be able to actually bake their Challah with white flour! Ah! Mechaye! L'Kuvoid Shabbos Koidesh!

In contrast to their weekday bread, the Shabbos Challah was only slightly kind of heavy and chewy. Rather than the airy and fluffy type of Challah typically made with yeast, theirs' was a little heavier, thicker, and more chewy. That was due, to the substitution of the yeast, with a piece of their own homemade sourdough. They used that instead of buying the stores ready-made yeast.

His wife's homemade piece of sourdough, did almost just as well as a job as the yeast, to get the Challah dough to rise, so "Why spend the money?" they would ask. They would gladly forego the Geshmack of the airy fluffy, light Challah that the rich people ate. They were happy with what Hashem gave them!

Shmeryl with his steady Avoidah of strengthening his Emunah and Bitachon, always had lots of happiness, by being happy with his lot.

THE GREAT TURN-AROUND

Little did Shmeryl know that a century later his diet of food would cost more and be more sought after, than the rich man's type of food of his times! MORE than that expensive, enticingly envious type of food that he was so carefully watchful not to be jealous of!

Who would ever believe the turnaround in the food market, and food industry!

#1- Whole wheat and multigrain breads, matzos, rolls and challos, plus cereals with



bran are so popular now! All are loaded with fiber, and are much more costly, trendy and classy nowadays, versus the fluffy white bread varieties! Wow! Shmeryl's bread is now the more expensive type!

#2- A little container of salted/

pickled herring, or smoked lox, or whitefish, Shmeryl's simple food of the past, have now became a del-



icacy. They can cost a nice-few-dollars, even more than a slice of fresh fish! There are about twenty to thirty types of herring/lox/whitefish, on the shelf in the deli store.

#3- A few sour pickles, don't cost a few nickels anymore! There are a full array of choices.





Fully-Sour, or Half- Sour Pickles, Hot & Spicy Pickles, Dill Pickles or Israeli style pickled in Brine, etc.

#4- A 9" by 13" size baking pan of ready-made Kugel or Cholent, are no more the pushete food of the Shmeryls of the yesteryears. They can cost a nice penny!

#5- Shmeryl could never have known, or even wildly imagined, how much money and time, people would be spending these days to buy or to create, make, and bake their own, special sourdough Challah! They now wish to use their sour-

dough, over the readymade yeast! V'nahafoich hu!

Shmeryl known all this, his dreams and his nisayon of fantasizing to have those other foods and fluffy Challos would have been a lot less, or maybe even totally gone! He had the specialty food of the future!

Shmeryl's nisayon of jealousy (like with all of us) was in a certain sense only an illusion! It was only a nisayon for him, because of the fact, that in his days, those foods had a value of a specialty status. They all seemed so special. To pursue them, to get some for himself, seemed so elusive to him. The fact that it was only meant for those who were well-to do, and well-off to afford to buy them, made it look so tempting to have. Boruch Hashem, he was able to overcome this nisayon of illusion. B"H he knew to be satisfied, and happy. #6- Even less did Shmeryl ever dream or imagine, that people would one day in the future try to mimic his motions of hard work by lifting, pulling, and pushing free weights or by going on exercise machines!

"What"? Shmeryl would have asked. "They would actually pay money to do the same hard strenuous work that I did!?"

He wouldn't have believed that people would do all that. "Just for attempting to strengthen their various muscles, they would be exercising on stationary machines?!" he would've asked. People now takeh try to put to work and exercise each and every single dingle muscle. Beginning from their hand muscles, biceps, triceps, and flexors, they continue on to their torso muscles, Trapezius, Latismus Dorsi, and Pectorals and their abdominal muscles too. The doctors at the hospital weren't convinced that prolonging his life was worth it. "The quality of life he is looking at," they said, "is nothing to compare to what he was used to. He won't be able to perform even basic tasks. He will have to undergo many long years of physical therapy and surgeries just to give him a chance. Why give him that suffering?"

They all conceded to this grim outlook except for Dr. Fried, a Yid. "Who are you to decide on his quality of life? Who said your quality of life is any better? Do you really have a good life? Is your life so good that it's worth living?"

He went around the table, asking the doctors to rate their quality of life from one to ten. As expected, the answers weren't so positive. Some said that they had lawsuits lingering against them that didn't give them any peace of mind, while others had various troubles at home. Eventually, Dr. Fried calculated that the average quality of life from among the doctors there was a paltry six. That was how happy they were with their quality of life.

He then suggested they ask Simchah what he felt was his quality of life, and thus they proceeded to the ICU. Simchah could barely speak, but when asked to rate his quality of life, he responded, "Ten."

"Ten?!" they repeated, astonished.

"Ten plus!"

Even in his semi-comatose state, Simchah was completely satisfied with the life that Hashem had given him! Dr. Fried had made his point.

One of the disproven doctors asked Simchah how he could be so happy knowing his bleak future. Simchah answered: "How can I not be so happy?! Hashem is giving me life. I'm able to do mitzvos. What more could I ask for?!"

"Don't even ask. I awoke at 3 AM, like every morning, but my shoelaces weren't in my shoes. It took me two hours until I found them. I had to search all over the house...Apparently, one of the grandchildren played with my shoelaces.

"Then I went to the mikvah, and someone came and stole my clothes! It took a long time before someone brought me clothing so that I could leave the mikvah."

The son moaned about the difficult time his elderly father endured, but Reb Zalman then said, "Actually, none of that happened. My shoes had their shoelaces in them, and no one stole my clothes at the mikvah..."

Reb Zalman imagined difficult scenarios to help him be happy with Hashem's chessed. Through visualizing such scenarios, he'd build an appreciation for what he did have.

These stories help us to think about life in a healthy, happy manner, as it is important to look at life correctly.

NOTEBOOKS SAVE LIVES



News came to R' Aryeh Schechter about a person who had a heart attack after beinformed ing that one hundred thousand dollars of his had been stolen. When he heard the news, he responded that he too had robbed been once of half a million dollars. It had been on Erev Shabbos. and he was staving somewhere far from home. host His that



week recalled that R' Aryeh hadn't acted any different that Shabbos. Only when people came and told the host what had happened to R' Aryeh did the host believe that R' Aryeh had lost so much money.


ven, had found the desk being offered for sale for \$150 by a

non-Jewish woman named Patty. When he brought the desk home, Reb Noach discovered that it was slightly too large to fit through the door of his study, and it would have to be taken apart in order for him to get it into the room. Behind a drawer, he found a large plastic bag. And to his astonishment, the bag contained a thick wad of \$100 bills. Reb Noach and his wife counted the money and discovered that the bag contained the jaw-drop-



ping sum of \$98,000. They knew the money must belong to the seller as she had mentioned that she bought the desk from Staples and had assembled it herself.

It was late at night when they made their discovery, but the Muroffs knew what they had to do. Reb Noach picked up the phone to call the seller and inform her of his discovery. Patty was shocked, unable to believe that someone would actually be honest enough to return such a huge sum of money. "That money was my inheritance from my parents," she told him. "I was just too overwhelmed to deal with it when I got it, and I



put it in the desk. When I removed the money from the drawer some of it must have fallen behind the drawer. When I realized some was missing, I assumed I had misplaced it and I've been looking all over and I couldn't find it."

The next day, the entire Muroff family — both parents and all four

children — climbed into the family car and drove to Patty's house to return the money. Deeply moved, the seller handed them a cash reward, along with an emotionally written card expressing her gratitude. "I do not think there are too many people in the world that would have done what you did," she wrote.

Rabbi Muroff asked Rav Shmuel Kamenetsky whether the story should be publicized, and whether it was preferable to do so in the frum media or via secular channels. The rosh yeshivah advised him to publicize it as much as possible, and even to take it to a national news network. Rav Kamenetsky explained that since every negative story involving a religious Jew receives widespread coverage, it is important to pursue similar coverage for a positive event.

The incident catapulted the Muroffs to national fame. They were inundated with phone calls and requests for interviews, even from prominent news outlets. It quickly became apparent that the story had a major impact on many people who heard it. Among the responses that the Muroffs received was an offer from



a company called Honest Tea Beverages to provide them with a year's supply of their products (in light of the value the company places on "Honesty"), and another offer from a "traditional overnight summer camp" to provide their children with a free summer session.

"Regardless of your decision," the camp owner concluded his letter, "I just want you to know that I appreciate you and am inspired to be a better person because of you."

The mitzvah of hashavas aveidah, returning a lost object, applies primarily to objects that belong to one's fellow Jews. The Shulchan Aruch (Yoreh Deah 266:1) rules that one should not return a lost object to a kusi since it "strengthens the hands of sinners." On the other hand, the Shulchan Aruch goes on, if one's intent in returning such an object is to create a kiddush Hashem, "so that they will admire the Jews and know that they are trustworthy," then this is to be praised. Moreover, when a chillul Hashem may result, it is forbidden to keep an object even if the halachah would not otherwise require it to be returned. The Sma traces the Shulchan Aruch's ruling to the Gemara that states (Sanhedrin 76b) that the pasuk "in order to add the satisfied to the thirsty" (Devarim 29:18) refers to a person who equates returning a Jew's lost object with returning the lost object of a non-Jew. Non-Jews are called "satisfied" because they



do not long to serve Hashem, unlike the Jews, who "thirst" to serve Him. The full obligation of hashavas aveidah is reserved for lost items belonging to our fellow Jews; nevertheless, when a lost item presents us with an opportunity to bring about a kiddush Hashem, it is highly meritorious to do so.

In fact, the reward for this type of kiddush Hashem can be enormous. Sefer Chassidim (sec. 1074) relates that there were many Jews who created a kiddush Hashem by returning valuable items to non-Jews and later became extraordinarily wealthy and successful themselves.

Someone once approached Rav Avraham Pam zt"l with a ques-



tion: A significant sum of money belonging to a non-Jew had come into his possession, and the only way for him to return it would be to mail it to its rightful owner. The owner would never know that a Jew had returned the money, so how could returning it be considered a kiddush Hashem? Despite the aforemen-

tioned comment of the Brisker Rav, Rav Pam revealed that there is potential for kiddush Hashem even in a hashavas aveidah that is not performed in person. "The kiddush Hashem," he told his questioner, "is not only in the impression that you will make on the non-Jew who owns the money. You will also be performing a

kiddush Hashem toward your own family, who will see you acting with integrity even toward non-Jews and will learn from your example!"

On another occasion, a yungerman learning in kollel once realized he had ben-



efited from an unexpected bank error: A check for thirty thousand dollars that had been meant to be put toward his house had never been cashed. This man had been on the verge of leaving kollel due to overwhelming financial pressures, and the sudden windfall offered him an opportunity to remain in learning for another year. He approached Rav Pam to ask if he could be permitted to keep the money, but the Rosh Yeshivah refused to allow it. "That is not the way to remain in kollel," he said. "You must return the money." To the suggestion that it might be halachically permissible to keep the money, Rav Pam replied simply that the most important thing was to be an adam shaleim (Rav Pam, Rabbi Shimon Finkelman, p. 395).

We are all occasionally presented with opportunities for hashavas aveidah, whether with objects of great value or those worth only a small amount. Whatever the worth of the lost item is, the value of the kiddush Hashem that can result from returning it is far greater. Let us make sure that we do not lose those precious opportunities to bring more honor to Hashem.

Every mitzvah we do on Shabbos gets us much more schar than the rest of the week!



Therefore, when you realize that, you won't get emotionally involved in your hishtadlus. You won't think, "What am I going to do? Is it going to work out?" Because nothing that you do is doing anything, it's all Hashem! All the results are perfect already.

When you realize that there is no cause and effect, and everything is one big illusion, and Hashem is running a perfect world, then you can live a life of menuchas hanefesh. You can sit back, relax and enjoy! Everything that is going to happen already worked out perfectly! As it says, "HaTzur tamim paalo." Everything Hashem does is perfect!

Many gedolim were very involved in talking to Hashem including the Chafetz Chaim who encouraged others to do the same.



There's a yungerman in my yeshiva who told me that his CD player in his car was broken and he couldn't afford to pay for it to be fixed. He said to himself that he'll unscrew it. He had no idea how he was going to fix it. He's not a repairman but he said that everything is Hashem anyways, this is just hand motions! What's the difference between me and some "technician?" He just unscrewed it and put it back and it worked! How?? You are not doing anything! It is all Hashem!



The Shaar Hatzion explains based off this concept that before you eat you should say that it is not the food giving me koach, it is really Hashem giving me koach. It's not the water that hydrates me, it's Hash-

em. You should have Bitachon every time you eat or do exercise or anything to keep you healthy. This is one of the sheish mitzvos temidios; to believe that Hashem is ECHAD. Which means that everything is nothing more than an illusion, and there is no koach to any hishtadlus that you do; there is no cause and effect! Not even what people say, "That Hashem put a koach in the thing to help you." No. It is nothing. Like Rav Chaim of Volozhin says, "Ein od milvado." Therefore, don't get emotionally involved in your hishtadlus; nothing has to make sense. Your part is just to do hand motions and Hashem will do the rest. The more you rely that Hashem is doing everything from start to finish and everything in between, the more you'll be zoche to more open bracha, chesed and rachamim and nissim geluyim limaala miderech hateva.

What Do The Words Mean? Part 9

[אפילו שעה אחת] אי אפשר להתקיים ולעמוד לפניד אפילו שעה אחת - it would be impossible to survive and to stand

before You [even for one moment]

If you take a look at the beautiful Asher Yatzar signs (please contact us if you would like one) hanging in people's homes, many of them may have three words at the end of the bracha in brackets, and they are "אפילו שעה אחת". This is in order to incorporate Nusach Sephard which has these words. With these words we say that if there were to be a hole in one of a person's vital organs, or if one of the openings into his body would close, it would be impossible to survive for **even one moment**." Now, we understand that if a person gets a hole in his heart he would die immediately. But what about the second part? How would someone die immediately if one of these holes close? We can close our mouth for hours and breathe through our nose? The truth is that because of this question, the Maharam of Ruthenberg ruled to omit these three words, and the Ashkenazi custom follows his ruling.

The Tur (O.C. 6:1), on the other hand, defends this version and explains that we are referring to the moment of birth. The gemara in Nidah writes that when the baby is in his mother's womb, his mouth is closed, so that he will not swallow the embryotic fluid. During the pregnancy, he gets all his nutrients and oxygen from his mother through the umbilical cord. When he is born, his mouth must open immediately, otherwise he would die from lack of oxygen. At the same time, the hole in his stomach which connects to the umbilical cord must close right away, otherwise he would die on the spot. The timing of this must be perfect, and it actually happens when every single baby in the world is born! Wonders of wonders! The fact that we exist testifies to that great moment when we entered the world, and this is what we are thanking for.

The Beis Yosef asks a few questions on this explanation, including the fact that this has nothing to do with using the facilities. Therefore, he gives another answer, that it means that if a person would not be able to use the facilities because the exit is blocked, he can only last a certain amount of time. After that time has passed, he would not be able to exist even for a moment. The same is true when the digestive track is running wild, and not staying closed. After a certain amount of time passes, he would not be able to last even one moment. (The Shulchan Aruch cites both explanations.)

Now, both of these explanations are true facts, so even those who say the nusach Ashkenaz (and don't say ייאפילו שעה אחת) can bear these ideas in mind when saying "it would be impossible to survive."

Hakadosh Baruch Hu granted us the ability to change the pitch and tone of our voices. This not only enables us to express emotion when we speak, but it also opens up a whole new world for us – the world of song.

To sing is to constantly change the pitch of our voices to produce various different notes. These various sounds could be combined together to make beautiful music. If we would only be able to produce one pitch, then singing would not exist. Even if we could change the pitch, but it would require a few seconds, we would also not have songs or singing. Singing is only possible because in less than a second we are able to change our pitch again and again.

Singing is a wonderful function that Hashem gave us. It contains the ability to change our mood, to change the atmosphere in the home or surrounding, and bring genuine simcha. Even someone who does not have a nice voice, or doesn't have an environment that they can sing comfortably, still benefits from this gift. They can listen to somebody else sing. This can be live or through a recording.

Not only does singing bring out happiness and can be a mood changer – singing and the uplifting feeling that it brings can actually improve someone's physical health. Thank You Hashem for this extra present that's included in our voices.

Singing is an important and integral part of our lives today and it's also an integral part of our Avodas Hashem. We take advantage of this gift quite often. Let's take a closer look at this. Every chasuna is accompanied by singing – there's a singer, usually leading the crowd - who sing together with him. Without singing our chasunas would be lacking in the ruach and chiyus.

The focal part of Simchas Torah



in shul is the singing and dancing. What would plain dancing without singing feel like?

A Shabbos Seuda or a Yom Tov Seuda is usually accompanied by Zemiros. This adds life and richness.

One of the special parts of Davening on Shabbos is singing

Lecha Dodi and Kel Adon.

The truth is, it's even more basic than all of the above mentioned examples. Whenever a chazzan davens for the Amud, he hopefully doesn't daven in a mono-tone. Even though he's not singing the whole time, he's constantly changing his pitch.

The same thing applies to every yachid who is davening or saying Tehilim with a little bit of feeling; he's constantly changing his pitch. Leining with the Trup is also a form of singing, and it makes Krias HaTorah more alive and attractive. Many people learn Gemara with a niggun; this keeps them alert and focused, and makes the learning more animated.

Singing is an important tool in our Avodas Hashem that we constantly use.

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The Amazing Beaver

In part 1 we spoke about the special anatomy of the beaver that Hashem created

them with, that enables them to be able to knock down trees very quickly and they are able to break the tree into many pieces.



Now we will learn how Hashem has given beavers amazing instincts. Here are quotes from articles about beavers.

Their instincts allow them to "go about their tasks like experienced craftsman" and "for it is well known that beavers are not only EXPERTS in the building of dwellings (their lodges) but they are also experts in hydro-engineering" and "a skilled hydro-engineer could not regulate the water level any better [than a beaver can]. Hydro means water and a hydro-engineer must take courses in college to learn how to manipulate and control the flow of water for various uses. You and I, without going to school could not be a hydro-engineer, but a beaver can do it without school. That's because of the instincts that Hashem has put into them.

What are instincts? Instincts are things that are automatically done (behaviors) that were not learned. They are pre-programmed information how to do things that, for our purpose we will say, are built into the creature's brain (DNA).

A perfect example of an instinct would

be the spider's ability to spin extremely complicated web structures without ever having seen it done before-



hand! How is that possible? Hashem put all the information into their minds, how to carry out that function. Instincts are very often absolutely amazing and it's as clear as day that it could NEVER EVER have come about by accident. Beavers instincts are also a great example of this.

Hashem made it that beavers look to set up a "house" (called a lodge) for their family. But beavers have many predators that want to kill them in order to eat them such as wolves, coyotes, or mountain lions, that they need to escape from.

Beavers don't walk or run fast, so they are at a distinct disadvantage when walking around on land. But, as we learned in the past article, beavers were made by Hashem to be able to function extremely well under water. And guess what? Their predators DON'T function well in water. In fact, they won't go into water at all. So, there's actually a few things that will help the beavers by being near water. It helps so that even when they go on land, they always stay very close to the banks / edges of the river. So, if a predator does show up, they will just jump into the water to escape. Therefore, to protect beavers, Hashem put into their instincts the desire to set up a shelter in middle of the water which will ensure their safety. But in order to be able to do this properly they first have to have the water level high enough to be able to build a big enough lodge to keep their family ABOVE the water level. In strong flowing rivers this can't be accomplished. So, the beavers look for slower moving rivers or streams that also have a sufficient amount of trees growing near the edge of the river, since these trees are going to be their food and shelter.

Once they find such an area, they will go about building a dam.

What's a dam? A dam is structure that is like a wall. It will stop the flow of a river or stream. For the beavers purpose, they want to stop, or at least considerably slow down the flow of the running water so that the water level goes up enough for them to make a big enough lodge for them to live in.

OK. So, how do you make a dam? I surely have no idea. But the beaver knows exactly how to build one. And they are as busy as beavers in doing so! (Did you ever hear that line – he's as busy a s a beaver?) Beavers will often work for 26-29 hours straight without stopping!

Here's a basic description of what they do to build a dam. Keep in kind that they are up against running water. Usually, to start things off they look underwater for tree roots or larger rocks, or any other protrusions on the bottom of the river to use as an anchor for the initial sticks that they start off with. (Don't forget, the beaver is able to look underwater the entire time with their protected see through eye lids, to what they are doing.)

Then they ram strong sticks into the bottom of the stream, next to these protrusions with considerable force. (Would you have thought of that? Would you have any idea how to stop flowing water? Beavers know EXACTLY what to do.)

Then they place a bunch of twigs in between the spaces between the sticks.



Those are weighed down with heavier sticks and they use forked branches to hold things up and they will also use crosspieces to hold things in place. It's also reinforced and anchored with heavy rocks. After that's finished, all the many



gaps must be filled watertight or else the water will leak out and the hole will just get bigger and bigger and eventually the whole structure will break down.

They "know" this, so they fill the gaps with fine twigs and reeds and other plant material that they get from the nearby river banks. Then these materials are covered up with lots mud or clay which will be the finishing touches to complete their work of making a watertight dam! (Very often, when necessary, at the extreme ends of the two sides of the dam, they will make the wall a little lower so that water can slowly escape from there.)

The average dam in North America is from 50-100 feet long and two to five feet high! There are many dams that are much, much bigger in length and height. The beavers, using their hands and/or teeth,

drag the pre-cut branches and pieces of wood from the bank of the river where the trees come from. They eat the outer bark and the cellulose right under the bark and the rest of the tree is cut up with their teeth and used for dam and lodge building. They just keep dragging material from the river bank (or close by) to the dam area, until the job is done. A 35 foot dam can be built by an average family of beavers in ONE WEEK!

Now, besides for creating the ability for the beaver to build a lodge in the water, there's actually a huge benefit from the dams that beavers build to the entire area. (Hashem killed two birds with one stone.) Beavers are considered a "keystone specie". A keystone specie is an animal that has a very beneficial effect on its environment, out The outboar son be of proportion to the number of animals that created it. A few beavers can make a huge beneficial effect for many animals. Beaver wetlands (wetlands are the land surrounding a river or lake) are found to effectively home 50% more species than wetlands that were not created by beavers. Obviously, Hashem had in mind these improvements as well, when giving the beaver its instinct to make dams. To be continued IY"H.

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Rabbi Zevy Golombeck - A Life with Bitachon



"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Ray Yehuda Mandel Q: How come we barely find anywhere in the Torah Hashem praising Klal Yisrael and bringing out their strong points? We find mostly that their faults and mistakes were highlighted. When one learns the chumash, one can get an impression that the Yidden weren't such good people c"v.

Why is Hashem k'vyachol focusing on all the negatives? If Hashem loves us so much shouldn't there be more open love in the Torah?

A. Hakadosh Baruch Hu praises Klal Yisrael by saying, "banim atem I'shem elokeichem, chayim kulchem hayom." R' Avigdor Miller says, if you would realize what a compliment that is, that Hashem said, "You are my son," you wouldn't be able to stop dancing from simcha. Mamleches Kohanim V'Goy Kadosh. Am Segulah. The Torah is full of praises that Klal Yisrael is Hashem's chosen nation. All criticism is just an outcome of "banim atem I'shem elokeichem," like it says, "Es Asher Ye'ehav Hashem Yochiach." Hashem gives

more mussar to Klal Yisrael because we're his children, and Hashem cares about us more!

A healthy body becomes stronger from healthier food and an unhealthy body needs other kinds of food. In the olden days,

they were such gezunt, strong healthy people. They had a healthy relationship with Hashem. You know what healthy means? Knowing that Hashem loves you. When a child walks in the street and gets a patch from a parent, it shows love. During the times of the Torah, Klal Yisrael viewed all criticism as a hug and a kiss, as Hashem showing them how much He cares about them. That's what motivated them. R' Avigdor Miller explains that Klal Yisrael was really on the highest level, they were the Dor Deia, and they were doing everything almost perfectly, but the littlest microscopic thing would shter their neshama, and they knew how important it is for the neshama to be connected to Hashem, so they were happy with the criticism to become even more perfect. Klal Yisrael grew and shteiged from this criticism.



The Chozeh m'Lublin explains that nowadays, before Mashiach, it says in the end of Sota, "yiras hachet yimasu." He explains it's not derogatory, it just means that before mashiach, we're going to connect to Hashem only through positivity, only through




simcha, only through ahava. Nowadays, if you tell a person Hashem's not happy with us, it will make a person not want a relationship with Hashem, because we don't feel Hashem's love. We're in a situation of hester panim, in galus, and we're not gezunte people who feel Hashem's love so easily, we have to focus on love.

R' Yechiel Perr, the Rosh Yeshiva of Far Rockaway, said over, that the talmidim of R' Yisrael Salanter said that R' Yisrael Salanter would say that the way to connect to Hashem is by learning about gehinom, but the Talmidim said over, that they felt that it didn't work for them anymore, it just scares us off, they needed something different. R' Moshe Feinstein writes in Darash Moshe, that you have to focus on positivity, that's the way to connect to Hashem.

When a mother is giving a bath to a little baby, and he's crying, he doesn't want to go in the bath, do you view that as cruelty, or do you view that as love? You view that as love. In the olden days, they viewed everything as love. Nowadays, we're not that




healthy, we don't feel Hashem's love as easily, so in order to feel Hashem's love, we have to focus only on open love and positivity. So it comes out that there's no such thing as negative, everything is positive from start to finish, it's just that they had different lenses. Nowadays, we need a different diet.

Q. Whenever my husband presents his liss opinion on a specific matter and I feel otherwise, I tend to come across forcefully, and the conversation erupts into a heated argument. What is the right way to go about this type of situation?

R'ZEVY GO,

A. Why do arguments become heated?

1. Oftentimes, it comes from the middah of kavod; when your husband challenges your opinion, your kavod is at stake; 'you think I don't know what I'm talking about?! I'll show you who knows better.' And instead of arguing about the subject, the real debate becomes: 'who knows better?' And each party fights to defend their pride at all costs.

The antidote for this is to internalize that הכבוד הבל הבלים'. What's so important about being right?

When you're in a discussion, the way to be intrinsically honorable, is to recognize that perhaps the other party is right. Even in the event that you're sure that you're right, nevertheless, give the other party a good feeling and let him 'be right'.

2. Alternatively, the reason someone will argue forcefully is because he wants to make sure things are done his way. And he's concerned that if he doesn't come across strongly, the other party will not listen.

The remedy for this is to know that all results are from Hashem. Engaging in a discussion is only an hishtadlus to bring about positive results.

With this in mind, you will conduct the conversation within the realm of proper hishtadlus; you will talk calmly and reason



together. Having a heated conversation which generates unpleasant feelings is not the correct hishtadlus, and it certainly will not help you to get things done your way.

On a practical level as well, the facts are exactly the opposite. Forcing your view, will not convince the other party; 'A man convinced against his will, is a man of the same opinion still'.

The way to give weight to your view is by showing the other party that you under-

stand where they are coming from. Then, respectfully and calmly propose your view.

What if you suspect that if you continue the discussion the tone will become negative?

Rav Avigdor Miller Zatzal would advise: whenever you suspect that your comments will generate an unpleasant discus-



sion, the best reaction is to say nothing. Even if you know that what you're being told is incorrect, the right thing to do is to keep your mouth closed.

When you do that, not

only will you receive s'char for controlling yourself, but keeping quiet and avoiding debates is also the recipe to maintain a life of physical health and happiness.

If you're discussing a matter of ruchnius where you cannot simply cannot keep quiet, nonetheless, do not argue and debate. Rather, tell your husband, 'I see where you're coming from, and I respect your opinion. However, I view things differently. Therefore, let's agree upon a Rov to whom we will present our question to, and we will act according to da'as Torah'.
