Reb Chaim told him about the pressure and poverty that his mother was dealing with, and how the askanim from the tzedakah fund were being moser nefesh in order to help her, and how he was about

to fly abroad in order to collect money urgently for her.

"What could I do?" the avreich asked.

"What do you mean, what? Hakadosh Baruch Hu is the Father of orphans and the Judge of widows. Cry out to Him, daven to Him, do something!"

The avreich took these words literally. He davened with all his heart over the situation of his mother and his orphaned siblings, and he anticipated the yeshuah.

The avreich contacted Reb Chaim and told him about the surprising developments. Reb Chaim was amazed. He would not need to travel! He could cancel the tickets!

He was excited, and he could not stop thanking the Creator of all worlds, Who



hears the sighs of every Jew from the depth of their hearts, and sends His yeshuah speedily, in ways that no one could even dream of. "It is not to be believed, but it's the truth," Reb Chaim told his friend in America, where he intended to stay for several days. "If I hadn't met the son on the way to Shacharis, he would not have known about anything and would have told the philanthropist who called him that everything was okay with his family. Look at the Hand of hashgachah here!"

The friend rejoiced with him, and Reb Chaim continued. "There is only one problem with my canceling the flight," he said half-jokingly. "I promised my daughters that I'd buy them dolls in America, and they're really waiting for them. I think I'll have to disappoint them."

FRIENDLY REMINDER

A Yid related:

On Monday night of Parshas Vayechi, I had a dream: A Yid I had known several years earlier appeared to me. He reminded me of his name, and he spoke to me strongly. "You're holding my money!" he said.

I woke up in a terrible state. My heart was beating wildly; I felt these were not simply words. I asked my wife, "Do you remember so-and-so? Do we owe him money?"

"Yes, yes," she said. "We owe him a large sum of money, I don't recall exactly how much, but I remember that it's close to \$10,000."

With a little more probing, the picture became clear. Several years ago I was in very difficult financial straits, and my business was collapsing. I declared bankruptcy. This was a very difficult time – I wouldn't wish such an experience on anyone. The



last person I bought merchandise from on credit was that Jew who appeared to me in the dream. In all the confusion, I had neglected to add him to my list of creditors. I forgot about him and about the debt entirely, and now he had come to demand his money back.

Immediately after Shacharis I called his factory, but the factory was closed. I reached him only after a long series of phone calls.

"Do you recall that I owe you money?" I asked him after I'd identified myself.

"Yes," he responded, and he said, in the exact tone he had spoken in the dream, "You're holding my money!"

"I want to repay the debt," I told him. "Can you calculate how much I owe you?"

He made a quick calculation and came to the sum of \$7,800. I could hear a sigh of relief in his voice. "You called at the very last minute," he told me, and he instructed me to give the money to his father, who lived in my area.

I did everything I had to do in order to return the debt. The fear that had engulfed me ever since I woke up from that dream finally loosened its hold on me. I was thrilled that I'd been able to return the old debt. I



didn't know what merit stood by me that enabled me to receive such a clear reminder in my lifetime.



Otherwise, there was no chance that I'd have remembered it on my own, and thus I was saved from ending my life as a debtor, chas v'shalom.

I called to inform him that the debt had been paid, and I asked, "You said I called just at the last minute – what did you mean by that?"

"I'll tell you," he said. "My situation is very difficult now. Yesterday I broke down, and I felt I couldn't handle it anymore. While davening Minchah, I screamed out to Hashem from the depths of my heart that He save me. 



Hashem can make even a small child find something valuable.


A couple of minutes after hearing this story, a child was look-





I told him that when I was a kid, all the children used to meet at the corner of Caldwell Place, and there was a rock there, and we called it "the big rock." And decades later I came back, and I saw that it hardly reached my knee.

Hopefully, as our understanding of the true depth

of life increases, so too does our appreciation of Tzur Chayeinu, the Rock of our lives increase. And the older we get, the Greatness of the Tzur Yisrael - Rock of Israel, veTzur Olamim - the Rock of the worlds/of Eternity, only grows in our minds.



Good Shabbos!

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Parashas Ki Sisah discusses the precious mitzvah of Shabbos. We all love Shabbos. It is such a tremendous gift from Hashem



and a day of immense holiness. We get to take a break from the busy week, eat delicious food and spend more time with family and friends. Yet what exactly should our avodah be on this day?



The answer to this is found in the perek of Tehillim dedicated to Shabbos. This perek begins, "mizmor shir - leyom Shabbos" and right away says, "tov lehodos LaHashem," it is good to thank Hashem. The Radak explains that this juxtaposition sheds light on the essence of Shabbos, a day to thank Hashem! He explains that during the week, when we are so busy with work, it is very hard for us to pause and to reflect on our countless blessings. However, being that Shabbos is a day when work is forbidden, it is the perfect opportunity for us to reflect on our many blessings and express our gratitude to Hashem.



Rabbi Avigdor Miller said that a famous violinist will achieve much more recognition when he plays in a concert hall as opposed to when he plays in a subway station, where people are busy and will not stop to appreciate the beautiful music. So too on Shabbos when we abstain from work and have a slower paced day, it is just the perfect time to appreciate our blessings.

How exactly do we utilize Shabbos as a day of appreciation? One suggestion is to fix a time during the Shabbos meal to express our gratitude to Hashem and to possibly go around the table asking those present to say what they are grateful for. Another way is through the mitzvah of Oneg Shabbos. The Ramban

- When we praise Hashem with a pleasant voice and intent, we merit to enter Gan Eden. (Ohr Zarua, Shabbos 42:7)
- Appreciation enhances our joy of life. Without it, one goes through life like a person in a drunken state, not feeling the pleasure and enjoyment of our many blessings. (Kuzari 3:16)
- When Klal Yisrael speak about the wonders and awesome phenomena of Hashem...the angels praise Him for having such a precious nation. (Zohar vol. 2 p. 40b)
- Mankind was created to praise and to thank Hashem as well as to serve and fear Him. Those who do so are upholding the world. (Shitah Mikubetzes, Berachos 6b)

teaches that to eat the food we enjoy on Shabbos is a mitzvah from the Torah! When we partake of these enjoyable foods, we should pause to appreciate the delicious tastes and textures that are a gift from Hashem solely for us to enjoy.

Furthermore, we praise Hashem by singing, such as through zemiros and during kabbalas Shabbos. Singing on Shabbos has tremendous power. In fact, the Midrash teaches during the week the malachim sing praise

to Hashem but not on Shabbos since we sing to Hashem in their place. Each time we sing on Shabbos we replace the malachim! This is truly incredible!

We also express our gratitude to Hashem on Shabbos when we recite nishmas kol chai. This beautiful tefilah describes our heartfelt gratitude to Hashem, with phrases such as "if our mouth was as full with song as the sea...we wouldn't accurately be able to express our thanks to You and 'it is the obligation of all creations ...to thank and praise You." Saying Nishmas is very powerful. In fact, there is a very old tradition from Rav Yehudah HaChassid that anyone who needs a yeshuah should pledge to recite Nishmas with a minyan.

A boy exploring the countryside with his friend innocently entered a pool of water, unbeknown to him that it was quick-sand. As he fought to get out, he sunk deeper and deeper, until his face

was almost submerged and he thought his end was near. When this was happening, his mother was attending a seudas hodayah and recited nishmas kol chai out of gratitude that her son was healthy and doing well. The boy saw out of the corner



of his eye that his friend was throwing him a stick, he grabbed onto it and by no means short of a miracle his life was saved. When his mother heard about the miracle, she asked "What time did all this happen", "at 4:30 he replied". His mother exclaimed in disbelief, "this was exactly the time I was reciting Nishmas Kol Chai our of gratitude that I was blessed with you as a son!

Let's thank Hashem for: Refrigerators.

הרצים יצאו -דחופים בדבר -המלך. They're running and flying and getting צוטומאלט. Indeed חז"ל say that Persians have no מנוחה like a bear.

A person can always think that a person like המן is not guilty for his actions since he can't help himself. However, when המן became angry at ארדכי המן – he restrained himself, and he went home first. Showing self-restraint was perhaps the proof that would get killed soon.

In this week's Parsha, Klal Yisroel did the worst Aveira in their history, the Cheit Ha'egel. The Meforshim are bothered; we are talking about a generation in Klal Yisroel that was the Dor Deah. They were Zoche to see the Nissim of Mitzrayim.

They were surviving in the Midbar with Nissim Gluyim, including the Mann falling from Shamayim. How can we understand that they fell so low, that they did the Cheit Eigel? How can our brains comprehend such a concept?

Let us answer this with a Mashal.

Let's say you want to talk to the president. So you need his phone number. Do you think in your wildest dreams that you will be able to get it? And lets say you somehow manage to get his personal number; do you think he will pick up for you when you call? Not in a million years. Who is able to talk to him? Maybe the prime minister, mayor, governor or the president of a different country. But for the simple plain person like you? Why would the president ever pick up the phone for you?!

With this we can understand the explanation of the Meforshim to answer this question. They write that the mistake of Klal Yisroel was, that yes, of course they saw the Nissim Gluyim going on during the Makkos in Mitzrayim, on the Yam Suf, and now in the Midbar. However since they understood and realized that Hashem is so great and perfect, and we are small imperfect human beings, they thought to themselves, do we have a direct line to connect us to the Almighty? Who are we to do that? How can that be? We aren't Choshuv enough for that. Therefore, they thought that a mediator was needed. They felt like they needed someone as great as Moshe Rabbeinu to bring their requests to Hashem. Because we are simple people, and we can't go straight to Hakadoish Baruch Hu. We aren't on that level. So that is why, when they saw that Moshe Rabbeinu was gone, they got scared. What is going to be? We need someone to help us get through to Hashem. With this in mind, they made another mediator r"I, and the terrible Cheit Ha'egel came out of it.

So the Meforshim say, that the message for us is loud and clear. We need to realize who we are. We're the children of Hashem. He thinks about us at every moment. His love for us is endless. Each and every one of us is a Ben Yachid by him. He is our loving caring Father. Therefore he wants a personal Kesher with you! He wants you to turn to him. He prefers you go directly to him, as you are his precious child.

Don't just look for someone else to be your spokesman. He wants you to feel so loved, so cared for, and watched over. He wants you to feel such a real tangible connection. To feel like when you need something, you can go directly to Him.

They asked Harav Nosson Wachtfogel Zt"l, the Mashgiach of Lakewood, if he can say over an encounter that he had with the Chofetz Chaim. Reb Nosson shared, "I was once by the Chofetz Chaim when someone came to him for a Bracha. This man was desperate for a Yeshua. The Chofetz Chaim responded, "I am happy to give you a Bracha, but before I give you a Bracha, I want you know that the first thing you need to do is turn to Hashem yourself. You should go straight to the boss. He wants to hear from you, his precious child."



We see from this story, how a person should never think, that who am I to go to Hashem. He is

your Father, Who loves you unconditionally, and He wants to hear from you. The more a person realizes he can turn to His Father the Ribono Shel Oilam, on a direct line, the more Hashem will show him openly how He is his true loving caring Father that truly cares for him, and He will give you all your needs on a silver platter.

A Yid called up and shared: We own a house, and at first we started off in the basement and rented out the home to a

family. After a while we B"H had our fifth child, and the basement was getting way too cramped. We decided it was time to move upstairs. I notified my tenant that we would like to move upstairs as soon as possible, and he should please find himself a new place to live.

He responded by telling me that he is happy to work on this. They started looking for a new home to move into, but they weren't successful. Weeks turned to months and they still had not found anything. We started putting pressure on them, explaining







to them that we really want to move in already. We gave them a deadline to move out, but the deadline came and went and they still weren't out. This was dragging on and on, with us being desperate to move upstairs. We felt so lost, we didn't know what to do.

Two years went by, and they were still parked upstairs. Our parents started telling us how ridiculous this was, and that we must take care of this at once. They were insisting we literally throw them out, by changing the key. One sibling was pushing us to go to a Din Torah. Another one wanted us to hire a lawyer to evict them. But one great-aunt had a whole different perspective. She said, "You know that when you are angry at them, then it means that you are angry at Hashem.

Because He is the One that runs the world, and is making this happen. So take my advice and take people out of the picture. Turn straight to Hashem, and nobody else, and tell Him you want to move upstairs."

We realized that this piece of advice is more beneficial than all the advice that we had heard from everyone else the past two years. I turned to Hashem, and asked him to take care of it.

A couple of days later I got a phone call from the tenant. He told me that they B"H found a new home, and they would be moving out immediately. For two years I couldn't get them out. I tried all different avenues, but to no avail. But as soon as I turned to Hashem, he showed me how he took care of it chick chock, and that very same week they moved out.

A Yungerman shared: I invested some money by someone that I thought I could trust. After a month, I contacted him to ask him for some of the money. But he turned it down. At that point I realized that he was not a trustworthy person at all.

I was trying to figure out, what should I do now? I realized that Hashem was sending me a message. The only trustworthy and reliable thing in the world, is my loving caring Father Hakadoish Baruch Hu. He is in control

of everything from beginning to end. He wants me to realize that he is running the show, and He is in charge. He wants me to turn to him, and only him! I worked on taking this person out of the picture, and I put the burden on Hashem. I davened and turned to him to help me.

A couple of days later, this person called me back, and told me that he has all the money for me, and I can come pick it up.

How do we understand this? What changed? The answer is, if we realize that our only pull

is by Hashem, and we truly have all the pull in the world by Him, then anything can happen. No matter what the situation is, he can help us out, 1-2-3.

Internalizing the message: How would my life look like, if I pictured Hashem as my loving caring father, who loves me, and is available for me at any time? What can I do in order that it should be more tangible to me that he is a true father, full of care, that is happy to do anything for me? How much greater will I become if I invest in the effort to reach this level?

IN REAL LIFE

The truth of the matter is, that in real life, both of those, same, abovementioned principles, tend to be true. Sometimes we are too overwhelmed, and confused to try and figure things out, on our own, to reach our own decisions, on how to deal with various situations. We would like it "plain". We want it to be "clear cut". Remembering my affection for that solution book, I searched and found one at one of the local toy stores. I bought it for my younger children to ease their frustration when playing with this challenging toy. I find it interesting to watch how they use it.

My children take some practical advice from the solution book, and follow their step-by-step instructions. They however don't want to give up on the challenge totally, so they continue on their own trying to figure out how to get the colored boxes in the right place without messing up what's in place already. They still want to get the thrill of accomplishment by figuring it out on their own!

This Solution Book doesn't leave you with any challenge of obedience and subservience. There isn't any Yetzer Hora struggle! Either you follow the rules or you don't. Finished! Therefore, by following the book, you blow the thrill of reaching the aim, and end goal of this toy/game.

Not wanting to miss out on that pleasure, they flip-flop, between peeking for hints of correct moves, and then shutting the book and continuing on their own!

Hashem gave us the chance of having both: the solutions, and the challenge at the same time!

"A Gram of a Parallel= A Parallel o' gram= A Parallelogram"

A parallelogram in the shape of a cube?! This sounds interesting and amusing.

I found an interesting parallel between using the Rubik's Cube Solution Book, and L'Havdil, following the guidance of Hashem's Heilige Chochma, His Toirah.

THE TURNING CUBE

Upon looking at the pages in the solution guide, there are steps that seem to be taking you in the opposite direction, and down the wrong path to your goal. They seem different than you would rationally think to be the correct way to go. By twisting and turning, rotating the slabs of colored cubes clockwise, or counterclockwise, to the right, to the left, forward or in an inverted turn toward yourself, you can really think, "This makes no sense at all". It may seem as if you're moving things away from where they are intended to be. It looks like things are going to be winding up, in total disarray.

In the end you realize, that you had to turn away from your destination that you wanted to reach, for the ability of the cube piece to regain its correct position and then you can return it perfectly to its correct place that you originally wanted to bring it to.

LIFE'S TURNS





We may tend to sometimes feel frustrated, by being turned in a certain direction in life, that seems counter to the intended, planned goal, and destination we wanted to reach. Hashem



with His Great Unfathomable Chochmah is rearranging things to be in their correct place. As a result, weare are going to reach our end goal, in a better way.

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#1- When you're on top, with things seeming okay the way they are, we're sometimes met with an overturn of our position, and we are turned down, finding ourselves underneath! We then may also feel as if we're being twisted and turned around, for no apparent reason! Bear in mind that it's all From Above! When we will be turned back on top, we are going to be in a much better position than we were before that overturn! Only when being on bottom were we able to be realigned, toward something better.

#2- When we're clearly instruct-

ed by Daas Toirah to take a seemingly left/wrong turn in life, OBEY! and do so! Rely on Hashem! It'll turn out to be only for the best!

#3- If The Shulchan Aruch states something to be an apparently correct move, i.e. a turn to the right/correct, just OBEY! Not because we decide it to be the right thing to do, but because the Word of Hashem says it to be so! It might look like, "these things

we anyway understand on our own to be correct," but the Way of the Toirah, is the safest way to go! It'll definitely get all the pieces into the right place! With no mistakes!

#4- When we are instructed to turn clockwise/forward in time - to look or think ahead, just OBEY! Look, think, move, and forge ahead!

#5- If we are commanded to do a turnaround counterclockwise/returning to something in the past, just OBEY! It won't mess you up! It'll bring you closer to your destination!

#6- When an outward turn/towards others, when caring, sympathizing or helping is recommended and commended, OBEY! You won't lose out a bit! You'll have enough time for yourself too!

#7- When The Toirah advises an inverted twist/ towards yourself, just OBEY! It'll ultimately bring the all, and the everything, into their correct position.

IN REAL LIFE

That stern, tough turn, can make my stomach churn and my face burn. It looks like a U-turn, or a downturn. Oh! I thought I'll learn, Oh!! I thought I'd earn. To understand it all, I yearn. Then, I discern that when things return to an upturn, the outturn is with no more concern of life's "sunburn", or "windburn", for eterne. Hashem caused the whole overturn, to situate me now with serene unconcern!



"STOP THE TRUCK!"

R' Meir Abuchatzeira would generally avoid riding in cars, but one time, when he happened to be on the highway, he did something peculiar that carried a deep lesson. When the car he was riding



in came behind a Coca Cola truck, R' Meir instructed his driver to speed up so that they could pass the truck and bring him to a stop.

The driver hesitated. "Doing that would be very dangerous," he explained to R' Meir. "It not only endangers the car, but it endangers our lives and anyone behind us." But R' Meir insisted that he must do it; and so the driver sped up until he was in front of the Coca Cola truck. Then he slammed on the brakes, causing the truck behind him to suddenly stop just short of hitting their car.

As you can imagine, the driver of the Coca Cola truck was not so happy. "Why did you brake right in front of a racing truck?" he demanded to know. "It's unsafe and unlawful!"

R' Meir was sitting in the passenger seat, and so he answered. "I told him to do so. I am dehydrated and I'm in need of a drink. Could I have a bottle? I'm offering you to buy out the truckload, because of my dehydration."

The driver was flabbergasted. "That is not the way to ask for a Coca Cola! No matter how thirsty you are, rabbi, you don't stop a speeding truck!" He angrily jumped back into his truck and sped off. Very soon after, the truck got into an accident from which the driver did not come out alive. That's the last thing we know about the driver.

R' Meir later explained himself. When he had first seen the Coca Cola truck, he saw the malach ha'maves hovering over the driver. The only thing that would spare his life would be to do a mitzvah, so R' Meir offered him a zechus to be saved. By giving him a drink, an act of chessed, the driver could've saved himself. Unfortunately, he declined, forfeiting his chance, and thus he was taken to the Next World.

This story shows us how one kind act can save one from a grave ending, and how stubbornness could otherwise take away this opportunity. (Miracles of the Baba Sali, P. 263)

THE TWO-MILLION-DOLLAR KADDISH

R' Binyamin Cohen is a rabbi in a community in Eretz Yisroel, which has both



religious and non-religious Jews. At one of his nightly classes, R' Cohen noticed a young man standing outside, peeking his head in the window to see when the shiur was over. As it were, when the shiur finished, the man came inside, put on a yarmulka, said Kaddish, and then disappeared.

When this happened consistently for a few weeks, R' Cohen ran after the young man and asked what was going on. The man explained himself: "My father passed away recently and left an inheritance of twelve million shekels. In his will, he gave two million to me, his son, and two million to my sister. The remaining eight will be mine on condition that I say Kaddish during the entire year. But, if I miss even one day, then my sister and I split the entire 12 million evenly."

Determined to get half of the full amount, the sister hired a private detectives to catch her brother missing his daily Kaddish. However, a few months into the year, they reported back that her brother had yet to miss one day!

Realizing that she was dealing with a very determined brother, she approached R' Cohen and offered him a deal. If the Rabbi would somehow arrange that her brother would miss one day of Kaddish, she would give 400,000 shekels toward any of R' Cohen's needs, either to any of his tzedakah purposes or for his own personal use.

R' Cohen didn't know what to do. He knew

he could do a lot of very good things for the community



with that money, things that would have an impact much more than the brother's single Kaddish. Anyway, he reasoned, the young man saying Kaddish wasn't doing anything else spiritually. Still, he brought the matter before R' Aharon Leib Steinman zt''l to ask him what he should do. R' Aharon Leib didn't agree with R' Cohen's logic at all. "If one day of Kaddish is missed, their father won't have a Kaddish said for him. You don't know what the father would prefer - a Kaddish or all that 'honor' from the tzedakah you give. Since you don't really know what is prefer-

able, you can't do it." Con R' Cohen suggested

that perhaps the man saying Kaddish and nothing else is an embarrassment to Torah. After all, he doesn't keep any other mitzvos or learn a word of Torah, so just this one act of saying Kaddish actually makes him look very bad in Shamayaim. R' Aharon Leib responded with sharp words. "Are you the Torah? Do you know that the Torah would rather - 400,000 shekel over one Kaddish?"

R' Cohen was convinced and left it at that. He never tried to foil the brother's Kaddish.

One day, the brother didn't run away after Kaddish but instead approached R' Cohen and asked, "How is it that you are so kind to let me sit outside every night, not partake in any of your classes, and yet you don't chase me away?"

Knowing that the young man was only coming to the shul to secure his extra eight million shekels, the rabbi responded, "I'm offering precious stones, gems and diamonds. If you don't want them, it's your loss, not mine."

"Diamonds?!" the boy asked, his interest piqued. "What kind of diamonds?"

"I'll tell you what," answered R' Cohen, realizing that this just might be the "hook" he needed. "Come to our next class tomorrow evening, and you'll see what type of diamonds I'm talking



about."

The man did just that. The newcomer was warmly welcomed, heard the rabbi's "diamonds," started attending more frequently, and as a result, relates R' Shlomo Farhi shlita, he renewed his commitment to Hashem. He began to become observant and fulfilled many more mitzvos. In the end, he made it through the entire year and never missed a Kaddish for his father, thus earning the remaining eight million shekels. Now, no one could foil his plans anymore.

Indeed, R' Aharon Leib's lesson stands strong and firm: we don't know the value of even one Kaddish. We cannot decide the value of one mitzvah. In this case, that mitzvah began the boy's journey toward Torah and mitzvos. (Heard on Stories to Inspire, R' Shlomo Farhi)

SAVED THE GADOL HADOR

The yeshivos in Europe were unlike the yeshivos in our days. Today, the yeshivos take full care of all the needs of the bachurim, but it wasn't so in Europe. The yeshivos didn't have dormitories; most bachurim were away from home, and so boys would sleep on the benches in the local shul. Even then, the benches weren't enough for all the boys; often only the older bachurim had the privilege of sleeping on a bench(!), while the younger bachurim slept on the floor.

One particular thirteen-year-old boy, who was having a hard time sleeping on the floor and was thus getting tired of yeshiva, got a telegram from his elderly uncle. It read: "We are offering you to take over our successful business. We don't have any descendants to continue it, and you're the most capable relative to continue it, so please come and we'll set you up."

The boy was very tempted by the offer. Sleeping on a cold stone floor on a wintery night wasn't so enjoyable, and with uncomfortable sleep every night, he asked himself what he was really getting out of yeshiva. "I can't continue like this, enough is enough. I'm going to take him up on the offer."

The night before he left, the door of the shul opened, and a woman who'd just lost her husband walked in with a stack of blankets. Her late husband owned a blanket shop, and she was giving the bachurim what she hadn't sold from her business. All the bachurim, especially this boy, happily took her gift.

Many years later, in 1976, the Rosh Yeshiva of Ponovezh, the great Rav Elazar Menachem Man Shach, called his grandson into his office. "We need to go to Haifa today," he told him. "There's a woman who passed away, and I want to be at her levayah."



The grandson complied, and they drove through the rain to the cemetery in Haifa. However, the grandson was surprised to see how few people were there; **R'** Shach and he completed the minyan. This perked up the grandson's curiosity. "Why is he partaking in this levayah?"

The rain persisted through the levayah, and after she was buried, everyone



quickly made their way back to their cars. The grandson brought R' Shach to the passenger seat, but R' Shach didn't immediately get in, instead he stood out in the rain for more than a few moments. Eventually, he **Continued on** got back into the **next page**

car, and they drove back to Bnei Brak.

R' Shach was aware of his grandson's wonder, and so he explained himself. "This woman was responsible for making me who I am. If not for her, I wouldn't have continued in yeshivah, and I wouldn't have become 'the Rosh Yeshiva.'

"This lady was the woman who gave us the blankets that night when I was ready to leave the yeshiva. I had been so cold, so fatigued, and was ready to take up my uncle's offer. When she arrived and gave us those blankets, it gave me the courage to stay on, and I declined my uncle's offer."

"But what was the reason," asked the grandchild, "that you stayed out in the rain when we'd gotten back to the car?"

"I wanted to remember how it felt laying on the stone floor every night during those cold wintery nights, and what her gift had spared me from feeling. That way, I could properly appreciate what she did for me." (R' Joey Haber)

There are several lessons to take from this story. First is the way R' Shach showed his hakaras ha'tov, going all the way to Haifa amidst his busy schedule. Also important is how R' Shach wanted to feel the discomfort of the cold and rainy day to properly appreciate the chessed that she did. But what I want to bring out is the effect of her good act. Her chessed had an unbelievable effect that saved the entire generation.

The mitzvos that we do have unbelievable power to them. Sometimes we're given a picture of the effects, and sometimes not, but the effects are regardless. (Heard on Stories to Inspire)

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In the Midst of Bnei Yisrael

We all know that the halachah requires us to give up our lives to avoid transgressing one of the three cardinal aveiros. There is another case in which the principle of yehareig v'al yaavor applies — when a Jew is being publicly coerced to vio-




late any prohibition, even a minor one. The definition of "pub-

lic," for the purpose of this halachah, is that ten Jews are present. Even a much greater number of non-Jewish witnesses, however, would not trigger the requirement to give up one's life for kiddush Hashem. This halachah seems to suggest that a kiddush Hashem that takes place in the presence of Jews is even greater than one that takes place in the presence of non-Jews. Why is this so?

Meshech Chochmah explains that

a kiddush Hashem performed before other Jews teaches them how to be kedoshim so that they too will be mekadeish sheim Shamayim. This will result in much greater kavod Shamayim than a kiddush Hashem performed before non-Jews. The benefit of a kiddush Hashem witnessed by a non-Jew is limited to the increased emunah of that one person. On the other hand, when a Jew witnesses a kiddush Hashem and is moved to improve his own ways, he himself is transformed into a vehicle for kiddush Hashem. He will observe all of the 613 mitzvos and will go on bringing honor to Hashem over and over again in



Hashem are warranted. This principle should be a lesson for us in the importance of teaching other Jews about Yiddishkeit. It bears noting that, beyond the kiddush Hashem dimension, there are other powerful reasons to attempt to influence others. The Chafetz Chaim (Sefer Chomas Hadas) cites the mitzvah of hashavas

others. In order to achieve that outcome,

even greater sacrifices

for the sake of kiddush

Chaim (Sefer Chomas Hadas) cites the mitzvah of hashavas aveidah, as well as the concept of arvus, responsibility for our fellow Jews, as additional reasons. Chovos Halevavos (Shaar Ahavas Hashem, ch. 6) speaks very highly of a person who motivates other Jews to improve their service of Hashem. "Even if a person were to reach the ultimate level of perfection of his soul in its service of Hashem, and even if he were to be close to the angels in their refined character, their praiseworthy ways, their efforts to serve the Creator, and their pure love of Him, this is not like the merits of a person who guides people on the proper path and redirects the wicked to serve Hashem. A person who perfects only his own soul will have a few merits, but a person who perfects himself and many others will have his own merits multiplied in accordance with those merits of all those whom he has brought closer to Hashem."

A prominent kiruv professional who often consults with Rav Aharon Leib Shteinman shlita once approached the gadol on

Erev Yom Kippur to ask for mechilah for taking up so much of his time. Rav Shteinman dismissed his concerns. "With what can I come before Hashem on

Yom Kippur?" he asked rhetorically. "I'm an old man, and it's hard for me



to learn. This," he said, pointing to a thick tome containing the names of all the students who had been registered in religious schools that year by the man's organization, "this is our sefer hachaim for this coming year. With this I can come before Hashem!" (Jewish Observer, Oct. 2003

Of course, there is an important balance that must be struck. A person must spend time building his own foundations; otherwise, he will not have anything to give over to others. Thus, when a young man once asked the Chazon Ish whether he should leave yeshivah for half a year to take a teaching position, the Chazon Ish instructed him not to do so. The more he learned, the Chazon Ish explained, the greater would be his ability to influence others. On a different occasion, the Chazon Ish told a student, "The Chafetz Chaim learned for many years to become the Chafetz Chaim. After those years, he changed the world in a very short time" (Pe'er Hador 2:207). At a certain point, however, the time comes to give of one's time to others, and when that happens, the Chafetz Chaim promises us that Hashem will not allow that to come at the expense of our own personal growth: "Make His Will your will, and He will make your will like His Will. He will fill your soul with knowledge of



perfection, and the small amount of time will be sufficient for you to make great, sublime achievements beyond the abilities of your own intellect."

Rav Avraham Chaim Feuer was once returning from a Bar Mitzvah with Rav Yaakov Kamenetzky zt"l. Rabbi Feuer, who had recently become the principal of a Mesivta, lamented the fact that his new position had come with a host of added responsibilities, including attending every simchah to which he was invited, that left him little time to learn. Rav Yaakov responded with a smile, "In America, there is an expression: "The customer is always right." The lay people, the masses, are the customers, and we, the rabbis and teachers, are the salesmen.



We are selling them Hashem's Torah and mitzvos, and we must do whatever it takes to make our customers happy and satisfied. For that reason, we must participate in all of their simchos. But we must never forget that we are not really working for our customers; we are working for Hashem Himself, Whose

Torah we teach. What a tremendous privilege, and what endless opportunities for kiddush Hashem!"

Rav Yaakov often commented that a person who creates a kiddush Hashem earns such immense merits that Hashem rewards

him even when his kiddush Hashem results from improper motives. On this note, a man who was considering establishing a kollel in Denmark once consulted with Rav Yaakov because he was afraid to remove his children from the positive influence of Jerusa-

lem. Rav Yaakov told him,



"Haman's descendants became talmidei chachamim as a reward for the kiddush Hashem that was created when his plan was thwarted, even though his intent was evil. Certainly, the children of a person who intends to create kiddush Hashem will become Torah scholars."

There are endless opportunities to earn a share in this great mitzvah. Rav Yosef Shalom Elyashiv zt"l once remarked that every generation possesses a mitzvah that is especially significant for its time. Our generation's mitzvah, he explained, is "to let the Name of Hashem become beloved through you" (heard from Rav Asher Weiss).

In Review: It is a greater mitzvah to be mekadesh shem Shamayim in a way that affects other Jews than it is to impress a non-Jew. This is because of a number of mitzvos that obligate us to influence other Jews to serve Hashem properly, including the mitzvos of hashavas aveidah, arvus, and "lo saamod al dam reiecha." A person who helps others achieve perfection earns spiritual merits that cannot be compared to the merits of a person who works only to perfect himself.

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

What Do The Words Mean? Part 10

Since we say Asher Yatzar several times a day, we must make sure to avoid the pitfall of saying it robotically without feeling. As we mentioned in the past, a very good way to avoid this issue is to take a moment before saying the beracha to think about a different wonder of the body. Another useful method is to learn the various commentaries on this beracha. You will discover many different explanations for the very same words - and they are all true! When the *Anshei Krneses Hagedolah* established the words of tefillah, including this beracha, they had in mind many different ideas and concepts. Every once in a while, let us bear in mind a new meaning of the words and continue to do so until we feel that it has lost its freshness. Then we can switch to a different understanding, thus making sure that we are really expressing our gratitude for a healthy body.

In this light, I would like to cite the explanation of the Aruch Hashulchan (O.C. 6: 3) on what we have seen so far in this beracha. He writes that we say cqccd in order to refer to the openings needed for ingesting our food and for expelling the waste. Then we say it again to include the other openings such as the nose and ears, which are so crucial for daily living. However, the main intent is on the ones related to digestion. We then continue and say cdcdcdd d to refer to the stomach, small intestine, and large intestine which hold the food while it is being broken down into its various components. Then we say it a second time to refer to the other vital cavities such as the heart. Here again, the main thrust is on the ones needed for the digestion of our food.

We saw in the past that the Levush (O.C. Siman 6) explains that for us to digest food Hashem created us with three complex systems: 1) The Receiving Tract: This refers to the mouth where the food is prepared for digestion. 2) The Digesting Tract: Here the food is broken down into microscopic parts that can be absorbed into the blood stream and carried throughout the body. 3) The Expelling Tract: Here the body gets rid of the waste products and harmful toxins that would damage our magnificent body. We therefore continue and say שאם יפתח אחד מהם אי אפשר להתקיים If they were to open, meaning, if the openings or cavities would be even slightly larger, or if they were to close, and the openings and cavities would be even a drop smaller, we would not be able to function normally. Hashem created these openings and cavities in an exact manner and size in order to facilitate these three systems so that they can interact in perfect tandem. The design and plan of even the smallest part of one of these limbs is a great testimony to the endless wisdom and kindness of our Creator!

A Meaningful "QUOTE" BASED ON the Sefer Chovos Halevavos "SHAAR HABITACHAN"

The Quote: IT IS a דבר ידוע that it is not so effective to appoint two people to fulfill the same job. As the גמ' says in גמ' AL ACHAS KAMA VKAMA - when it comes to בטחון – if one is in Hashem and also others, so his בטחון is very impaired, and this may be a reason alone that he would be unsuccessful."

The Lesson: WHAT MAKES THIS SO INCREDIBLE AND AMAZING, one may ask "what's the big deal to rely on Hashem and a human? [Chas V'Shalom] The answer is that we see here that reliance by definition means that I am relying on one! There is no such thing as fully relying on two. אָקרירא ולא קרירא דבי שותפי לא קרירא ולא קרירא ולא המימא (The job won't get done properly! Therefore, to rely on Hashem means that we ONLY and ONLY rely on Hashem because there is no one to rely on but Hashem anyway.

The Story: *If we rely on Hashem, we are able to be moiser nefesh for Toras Hashem.* THE VILNA GAON HAD A BROTHER, Rav Avrohom, who lived in a town near Vilna. After Rav Avrohom's children got married, they moved to Vilna. As Rav Avrohom and his Rebbetzin got older, naturally, they needed their children's help more often. Their children tried to help as much as they could, but it was hard as there were no taxis or easy way of transportation. Their children begged them to please come to live with them in Vilna. Their father was almost convinced, but their mother would not agree to move. They asked, "Why?" and she finally agreed to reveal her reason. She explained as follows, "When I was a trick to Tatty, my father was a rich man, and he bought us a big nice house, and he also gave us money for all our expenses to live on every month.

The years went by and the family got bigger, and my father wasn't able to support us anymore. Tatty was learning Gemara all day. What should we do? 

CHAPTER 2

The Torah Obligation to Enjoy Olam Hazeh

In this chapter we will prove that Hashem wants and expects every person to enjoy his life, and that enjoying life is a Torah obligation.

The Desire to View Judaism as Hard

One of the tricks of the yetzer hara is to convince a person that a life of true avodas Hashem means a life without gashmiyus pleasures. The yetzer hara causes people to think that Hashem does not want them to enjoy this world. The yetzer hara does this by pointing out stories of tzaddikim who constantly fasted or statements from Chazal that seem to indicate that Hashem wants us to live a life of pure prishus. The yetzer hara hopes that a person will despair because such a lifestyle is nearly unattainable for most people.

For example, the mishnah in Pirkei Avos (6:4) says, "This is the way of the Torah: Eat bread and salt, drink water in measure, sleep on the ground, live a life of suffering, and toil in Torah." When a person reads this, he may despair, thinking to himself, is this what Hashem wants of me? I can't even imagine living this way for two days, let alone an entire life!

So, he gives up. I know logically that ruchniyus matters are a better investment, he thinks, but I cannot possibly control myself for so long. I am certainly going to fail. I cannot earn a place in Olam Haba. At least let me enjoy Olam Hazeh!

Some people may have a different feeling about life in Olam Hazeh. They think that life here is intended to be unpleasant, full of challenges and difficult people. In their belief, only Olam Haba is a place of pleasure and enjoyment. Although they recognize that this world is valuable (since it provides the "ticket" to Olam Haba), they think it's like a necessary evil — comparable to an unpleasant job that one does to receive a paycheck. Neither of these attitudes are correct. We will soon see that Hashem wants us to enjoy life very much! Hashem wants us to view His world as a marvelous place to live and He desires that we greatly enjoy our lives. Stories about tzaddikim or teachings of Chazal are no contradiction to this. They just need to be understood

properly.

(Regarding the above mishnah, Rashi explains that it's not telling wealthy people that they should live a life of suffering. Rather, the meaning is that if one is so poor that he only has bread and salt, and is forced to sleep on the ground due to a lack of bedding, still he should not refrain from laboring in Torah, for eventually he will [merit to] labor in it in wealth.

It's clear from Rashi that this mishnah is directed toward a poor person. If one can learn Torah and enjoy physical pleasures, he is certainly allowed to do so.)

If a person would recognize the truth, that being frum is not a contradiction to enjoying the pleasures of life, the yetzer hara would lose a great deal of his leverage. This book was written to help overcome that yetzer hara.

Not an Aveirah

So, is it wrong to enjoy the pleasures of this world? No!


The following ideas are not true:

• Hashem created the pleasures of this world to test us, to see if we will avoid them or not.

• All physical pleasures lead a person down a path of materialism and away from Hashem.

• A person should only desire ruchniyus. Any gashmiyus one enjoys stems from human weakness, is sinful, and will decrease his Olam Haba.

Concepts like these may arise logically from seeing that the Torah stresses the value of ruchniyus pursuits over gashmiyus ones. These ideas can then be "proven" by stories about the prishus of gedolim (most of them from previous generations, who were far above our level), who regularly fasted or lived on "bread crusts and water." It's critical to realize that statements from Chazal or stories about holy tzaddikim must be understood correctly, in context. They should be studied in great depth. We cannot draw our own conclusions on these matters.



We must realize that gedolim, especially those in past generations, were on extremely high levels of kedushah. Even the average frum Jew a few generations ago was far more elevated than we are today. There was also much less materialism available in those days. Fasting every Monday and Thursday may not have been as difficult a challenge for a gadol from a hundred years ago as it would be for us nowadays. It's not fair to compare ourselves to them. Doing so may cause more harm than good.

The idea that in order to be holy, a person must totally separate himself from gashmiyus is not a Jewish one. In fact, a quick calculation reveals that a frum Yid is commanded to have at least 235 seudos every year, not including kiddushim, shalom zachars, chasunahs, siyumim, or other seudos mitzvah! (Shabbos-208 (52 seudos x 4-including melaveh malkah), Pesach-8, Shavuos-4, Rosh Hashanah-4, Erev Yom Kippur-2, Sukkos-8 and Purim-1) These are in addition to the very "gashmiyusdik" mitzvos of buying wine and nice clothes for Shabbos and Yom Tov (and jewelry for the women). And these are the mitzvos! Permissible areas of physical enjoyment extend much further. The following quote from Rav Avigdor Miller disputes the idea that all gashmiyus is a nisayon:

The Chovos Halevavos says that love of Olam Hazeh is a rival to the love of Olam Haba; you cannot have them both in one heart. That doesn't mean you shouldn't enjoy life — you can enjoy everything. But when a man puts effort toward materialism, so much love for his home, so much love for luxuries, so much love for expensive things, then there's no place left for Hashem. (Ohr Avigdor Mesillas Yesharim, Vol. 1, p. 352.)

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


Let's take advantage of this special gift that Hakadosh Baruch Hu gave us - the gift of singing, which is good for our guf and nefesh.

In addition to singing, Hakadosh

Baruch Hu granted us a similar ability - the ability to hum. Hashem gave us the option to produce sound through two dif-

ferent cavities. We can produce sound through our mouth and through our nose. Primarily, we use our mouth for singing and for speaking. Humming is usually done through the nose with our mouth closed.

You might have never thought about this difference. Why do people hum instead of singing?



Humming has certain advantages that singing doesn't have. People often prefer humming to singing because it's quieter; it does not project your voice to a distance. Sometimes people want to quietly hum to themselves without being heard and making a scene. Because Hashem gave us the ability to hum though our noses,

we have this extra option.

Humming also helps singers and musicians find the correct note even when they are in a crowd. When we hum internally, we are more focused on the sound that we are producing as opposed to the sounds around us which can be loud and distracting.

> The advantages that we listed by singing also applies to humming. Humming helps stress levels, calmness and blood pressure, to mention a few of the advantages. So the next time you feel stressed out, before you lash out at someone or book an expensive vacation, why don't you

first try to hum a niggun? It's safer, cheaper and healthier.

The Amazing Constructing Beavers.

Part 3 of 3

In the last article we mentioned how beavers have all the knowledge and ability to be able to stop (significantly slowdown) moving streams. The idea was for them to be able to raise the water level high enough for them to be able to make themselves living quarters called a lodge. These abilities are 100% instinctive. Many experiments have been made where beavers were taken away from their parents at birth. When old enough to go out to build a dam they were released into the wilderness. They knew how to knock down (fell) trees with their specialized teeth as well as any experienced beaver. Even more, they built a perfect watertight dam in moving water without any mistakes. They also went on to build a typical lodge without having ever seen a dam or lodge since their birth! Amazing!

Once the dam is built, the beavers immediately go on to build their lodge. There's tremendous "wisdom" and planning that goes into these lodge structures.

First, they build a huge mound of sticks, twigs, rocks, leaves, branches, and vegetation that looks like a littler isolated island in the pond. Then, they hollow out the living area and the entrances from the water.

The walls can end up being two to three feet wide! Then the outside and inside of the walls are plastered over with mud and other debris that dries out and makes for great insulation and a very strong, safe, and protecting wall and roof! However, low and behold, at the very top of the roof, they don't plaster it shut. Why not? This is to leave over a small lose pile of twigs and branches at the top of the lodge. This acts as their ventilation source since the walls are so thick and properly insulated that no air enters through them! Do you think they could figure all this out by accident and thereby leave over a ventilation source in the roof? Of course not! This and everything else wondrous that they up onto the first level and dry themselves off. The floor is covered with grasses, some fresh and some dried out, and wooden chips are also on the floor covering. There they will groom



do is all through instincts that Hashem pre-programmed them with.

If you look carefully at the drawing, vou will see that on both sides of the bottom of the lodge there's underwater entrances. As we mentioned, the idea of the lodge is to have a safe place from predators who can't go underwater. The beavers swim up these entrances which are somewhat long tunnels. (They are longer than the picture indicates.) Since the tunnels get a lot of wear and tear with the beavers constantly going in and out of these tunnels, therefore they are lined with lots of mud, which solidifies into a strong clay, so that they can go up and down without it breaking. There's usually one entranceway that is much wider than the others. That's because they always need to bring in food, which are branches, so they need a wider space for that transfer. They will trim down the branches once they are in the lodge.

As they enter the lodge there's basically two levels. The first level is just a little above the water level. There they come themselves. It's also where they eat. On a slightly higher level is the sleeping quarters. They make a bed out of the wooden chips and shredded particles that are all by-products of their previous hollowing out of the mound. There's usually plenty of room so that they can even stand straight if they want to.

The beavers also plan ahead for the winter. In the fall time, right near the lodge, they will store away a very large amount of tree branches with leaves on them. From this stash of branches, they will bring some into their lodge every few days to eat from them. They typically shove the stick branches deep into the mud and put things on top of them in order to hold them down for later use. This is great planning skills put into their instincts, of course by Hashem.

Okay. So, these are the main points about the beaver that I wanted to write about. The amazing construction knowledge, and water regulating knowledge that they have is IMPOSSI-BLE to have come about by accident!



That's common sense. The instructions to all these abilities are clearly put into their brains by Hashem!

However, I must briefly discuss three more things. One is that as the below picture shows, sometimes beavers will

make their homes in the _____ er and they won't make a lodge. If the water of the river is high enough, they will make these bank burrows. The idea is similar to a lodge, and a lot easier to make! The "plan" is that the beaver has to be able to have enough depth in the water that it could easily dive in and swim around AND be able to have enough depth to also be able to drag large logs and branches underwater to make the dam and the lodge. If there's not enough depth in the river as is, that's when they are "forced" to make a dam in order to raise the level (depth) of the water in the river. That will also lead to needing a lodge. The tunnel is from under water and it goes many feet up into the bank of the river. There too they will have two levels or perhaps two separate rooms, one for the eating and grooming and one for sleeping and a little air vent as well.



The next point to know is that when they knock down trees and they are a bit too far from the edge of the river, then in that general area they dig out of the ground a thin canal, about two feet deep and one to three feet wide. This gets connected to the river, which fills them up with water so that once the tree is broken into pieces, they can easily transport those pieces of wood by

floating them through the canal into the river. This helps them avoid the unnecessary dragging of the heavy pieces of wood to the river. Once again, we see planning and creative work being carried out, all pre-programmed into the beaver by Hashem!!

The final point to be made is about their ability to stay up to 15 minutes under water! [The average time they stay under water is three minutes, but when escaping a predator, they want to hide under the water for as long as possible, and they can stay under water for up to 15 minutes. How are they able to this? Only a few animals are capable of staying under water for such prolonged time.

This is due to several factors. First, when these animals dive in the water, they slow their heart rate and — obviously — stop breathing. Their bodies also adjust how their blood flows, keeping it away from their extremities and instead concentrating blood flow mainly around their brains, hearts and

muscles, thereby providing more oxygen in the blood for the main organs that need it.

More importantly, these animals have proteins called myoglobin, which binds with oxygen in their muscles. Humans have myoglobin too, but not in the quantities that aquatic mammals do. The high levels of myoglobin in their muscle tissue give beavers a larger sup-

ply of oxygen to draw from while under water, allowing them to stay under for longer. In diving mammals like beavers, myoglobin is 10 times more concentrated in muscle tissue than it is in humans. All these processes help them have greater usage of the oxygen in their blood.

Now, how do they "slow their heart rate"? Do you know how to slow your heart rate? It is clearly pre-programmed by The Hashem that when they dive in the water their heart should slow down. This is IN SPITE of the fact that they are swimming underwater, and usually quite vigorously, which as we know would usually cause the heart rate to quicken quite a bit. Nevertheless, Hashem made their heart slow down for its survival.

"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Ray Yehuda Mandel Q: The seforim (Nefesh Hachaim and others) are full of how our actions words and thoughts have a tremendous affect on the on the olamos elyonim and on the entire creation. We hear all the time on 'A Life with Bitachon, to take people out of the picture because they do nothing.

It would seem from the seforim that a person has tremendous influence on the world.

A. The answers to these questions is when it comes to avodas Hashem Yisborach, a person has to be a juggler, he has to know how to live with two seemingly contradictory concepts at the same time.

Chazal want people to have the attitude that if a person does a mitzvah they're building worlds, and if a person does not do a mitzvah then they're bringing churban to the world. You know

why Chazal want us to have that attitude? It's to show our chashivus! To show our gadlus! Can you imagine a president of the most powerful country, he feels like Mr. Macho. He can press a button and activate all kinds of nuclear bombs chalila. He says the word war and all the soldiers go to combat. He feels like he has all the power. Just one word – can you imagine? A ruler like Putin says one word and it gets carried out that minute. Someone with that kind of power feels like a million dollars. They feel like I'm it! I'm everything! I'm where it starts! And that's why Chazal tell us these things. Our attitude should be that we should be machshiv our actions. We should be machshiv ourselves. And that will motivate us because everything can be used in a healthy way to motivate us to see how much kochos we have and how much good we have and how much we can accomplish.



At the same time, the truth is that everything that happens in this world is ratzon Hashem and dvar Hashem. The truth is that emunah and bitachon means that Hashem created the world already knowing everything that was going to happen in the world. Hashem is perfect and everything He does has to be perfect and will be perfect and therefore whatever happens in the


world is exactly how Hakadosh Baruch Hu wanted it to play out. It's all part of Hakadosh Baruch Hu's master plan. Everything is merumaz in the Torah. Torah means Dvar Hashem. It's all the ratzon Hashem and dvar Hashem. Therefore you have to believe that everything you do, Hashem wanted it to happen. He knew it's going to happen, and it's perfect. Because everything

With that, the quarters just slid through one, two, three, and the washing machine started working!



This left me thinking negatively about my husband, 'what's wrong with him? Why doesn't he have any friends?'

Also, now that he doesn't have friends to invite, the simcha will be very empty. How can we celebrate if only a few people will attend? What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. As far as your husband not being a 'people person', you should know, every personality type has ma'alos and has chesronos. Your job is to focus on the advantages of your husband's quality of not being very sociable.

• When the husband is a 'people person', oftentimes he's busy with all sorts of people, and he doesn't have time for his wife and family. When someone is not very sociable, the less time he spends with other people, the more time he has for his family.

• When someone is not always around people, he saves himself from machlokes, ona'as deverim, lashon

hara, and other interpersonal issues that sociable people struggle with.

As far as your concern that only a few people will join your simcha, you should know that there are two ways people can enjoy making a celebration:

One way is by showing off to others



what a beautiful simcha you're making, how many people attended, which Rabbanim came etc.

However, when the focus of your simcha is on the impression you're making on others, your happiness is artificial. It's nothing more than enjoying the kavod that people are giving you.

Such simcha is not really satisfying. And in fact, it's actually not possible to achieve full simcha in this manner. No matter how hard you try to impress

people, people aren't going to give you as much kavod as you would like, and that will tarnish the whole simcha.

However, the true way of enjoying a simcha is by zeroing in on the reason for the celebration. Find a quiet corner and let your heart be filled with joy. Say, 'Baruch Hashem I have children. Baruch Hashem I have a reason to make a simcha. 'Baruch Hashem I have so much good in my life. Hashem, You love me so much. Your care for me is endless.' This is the deep inner simcha that we should aspire to attain when making a simcha.

Therefore, instead of feeling bad about not being able to have a large superficial simcha, the type that you won't walk away feeling happy about anyway, go for the true simcha! Rejoicing in appreciation of how good Hashem is to you, and thanking Hashem for your being able to celebrate.

And in this true simcha, the less people that attend the less distracted you will be, and the more time you will have to spend time with Hashem.

On the way back from eretz yisroel to Newark airport we went to check in our luggage. That's when the airport per-



It's been over forty years since that fateful phone call, and I now thank Hashem that I have thousands of Talmidim, all because of a dime and a friend who understood the meaning of the Torah's Mitzva to be just environ understand the burden with your friend.

I once visited HaGaon Rav Shmuel Kamenetsky Shlita in his Yeshiva, in Philadelphia. After the meeting, as I was walking out of the building, a Bachur ran after me and said that the Rosh Yeshiva would like me to please return to his office. I was very curious! I couldn't figure out why the Rosh Yeshiva was sending me a special message and asking me to return! Upon returning to the Rosh Yeshiva's office, it all became clear. The Rosh Yeshiva said, "You have been here waiting all afternoon and didn't yet eat supper. Please go down to the Yeshiva dining room and eat supper with the Yeshiva." I learned a priceless lesson that day of true אהבת ישראל and the Rosh Yeshiva's genuine care remains with me





to this day.

We see from these stories how precious every single Yid is to Hashem!

And we also see how priceless every Mitzva that we do is! With just a phone call, or a few kind words, we are transforming worlds!

We have no idea how valuable every word of Torah and Chesed is in Hashem's eyes!

Hashem loves our Torah!
