ON THE DAY OF THE FINAL INSTALL-MENT

My name is Aharon Klein, from Bnei Brak. A relative of mine told me about an amazing process that took place over the past five years. This is what he described:

I was not born the way I am today. I was zocheh to discover the light of truth during my teenage years, and to learn in a yeshivah. The time came for me to establish a home, and Hakadosh Baruch Hu brought me my proper zivug. We both wanted to establish a Torah home, and I longed to learn in kollel as an avre-

ich. This was especially important to me, more than for someone who was born in a religious home, for I felt I had to make up for what I had missed.

"You're asking for a nice gift," my grandfather answered me, "and I'm willing to give

it to you." I was really happy that I would now have what I needed for the wedding expenses, but then my enthusiasm



continued and said, "I'll give it to you in 60 payments of 3,000 shekels each!"

He did not ask if this seemed right to me, and like a good, appreciative grandson, I said "Thank you!" I did not understand at that moment how much good was hidden in this. I only felt bad that I was not getting all the money in one shot, and I would still have to find a solution for the immediate need to cover all the wedding expenses.

I went to my other grandfather, who is a traditional Jew. I did not ask him for a

gift, only for a loan, which I would return in 60 monthly installments, using the checks from


other mv grandfather.

thing I needed. The wedding was celebrated properly, and we were zocheh to establish our home in joy. After the wedding, the second grandfather told me, "You don't have to return the loan.

And that's how it was. The payments were spread over five years. Each month 3,000 shekels went into our account, and thus I was able to delve into Torah peacefully, without worrying about parnassah. My grandfather, who, unfortunately, did not keep Torah and mitzvos, gave me money each month in order to

TRUE "PROTEKTZIA"

R' Yankelowitz* relates the following:

I have three wonderful children. I sent them to a specific Talmud Torah with the thought that this institution was suitable

for them, but as time went on, it became clear that it was not. I suspected that my children were



being negatively influenced there.

I sat with my wife, and we thought about what to do. We connected one fact to another, we brought up the difficulties and our suspicions, one by one, and the conclusion was clear: We would move our children to a better Talmud Torah, and the sooner the better. The Talmud Torah we then chose was truly excellent. Children from the very best families learn there. "I want our children to have friends like these," my wife said, "so that our children will grow up to be like them."

We were in total agreement about our children's Talmud Torah. Only one "small" issue remained: The menahel had yet to inform us that they were accepted.

We are a young family, not well-known,

and not connected to the specific type of families who send their children to this Talmud Torah. What were the chances that they would agree to accept our three children, especially after they had learned in that other Talmud Torah that was so vastly different? I knew that through natural means, there was no chance, so I turned directly to the chief Menahel – Hakadosh Baruch Hu, Who teaches Torah to His nation Yisrael. I went to Har Hamenuchos and davened near the tzivun of Mori V'rabi zt"l. I asked Hakadosh Baruch Hu to have pity on me and my children, because I desired to do His will, to be mechanech my children that He'd given me, to serve Him and to learn His holy Torah in purity. I begged that my children would be easily accepted into the Talmud Torah. After a long hour of davening I went back home, ready and prepared for the next hishtadlus calling the menahel of the Talmud Torah.

The next day I called the Talmud Torah and asked to speak to the menahel. "What can I do for you?" he asked respectfully.

"My name is Yankelowitz, and I want to transfer my three sons into your cheder."

"B'imchah rabbah," The menahel answered. "I'm waiting for you in the office." I went to his office, and the menahel asked me for the exact age of every child. "This child will go into Rav Cohen's class, this child into Rav Levy's class, and this one into Rav Yisraeli's class."

With that the conversation ended, and my wish had been granted. Starting the following day, the children would be going to the Talmud Torah where we wanted them to

I was totally amazed by the way things had worked out. It seemed very strange that the menahel did not even call us for an interview, did not ask to see the children or test them. When our plans don't work out we ask "Why?" but when good things happen we do not. I've never heard anyone say, "I don't know why Hashem is doing this to me – why am I succeeding in making a generous parnassah?" or, "Why are my children bringing home tests with grades in the nineties?" People ask questions only when something doesn't succeed for them.

I thanked Hashem, and as far as those questions that nonetheless arose in my heart – I quieted them down. If you are given something good, take it. Don't ask questions.

A few days later, I found out how my children had slipped so easily into the Talmud Torah I wanted. A week after my children started learning in that Talmud Torah, a call came into the office. "Hello, this is Yankelowitz. I want to put my children into the Talmud Torah."

"Classes are full," they told him, "and besides, it's impossible to take in children in the middle of the year."

"But the donor told me that he spoke to you and got your approval..."

Indeed, one of the big donors to the institution had spoken to the principal about Yankelowitz and asked him to accept them into the Talmud Torah. When I called, the principal thought this was the Yankelowitz he had spoken about. It did not enter his mind that I was some other unknown Yankelowitz, and he accepted my children because of the sponsor's request!!

It was incredible hashgachah pratis that I had called right after the donor's recommendation, and before the actual Yankelowitz he had spoken about called.

Ultimately, the children of the other Yankelowitz, who had the high connections, were also accepted into the cheder.

But I ask you, is there such a thing as a "simple" Jew? That other Yankelowitz placed his trust in the recommendation of the wealthy man, who, with all due respect, is only a human being, while I

trusted in the One Who supervises everything, davened to Him and asked of Him, and indeed, we had protektzia like only Hakadosh Baruch Hu Himself could make. No one else can create protektzia like Hashem!

I was at a loss. How would I inform the widow that she would not be getting the money after all? I thought of an idea, and I told her, "If the chuppah takes place before shekiah, then it will come out on the same day, and you'll be able to

receive the money."

But the almanah answered calmly, and with conviction and emunah, "I learned from my husband that one does not play around with the truth. I cannot promise that the chuppah will indeed take place before shekiah, because there can always be setbacks. If my son's wedding is not on the same day as the gvir's son's wedding, then this means the money does not belong to me. Don't worry about it. Everything's okay."

That gvir found another wedding, and several days later, a different gvir called me and said, "I want to donate \$7,000 for a wedding that will take place during the month of Shevat." I immediately gave him the number of that almanah, and baruch Hashem, she received the money. I was so happy!

But the story doesn't end there. Several days later the first gvir called me, all apologetic. "I haven't slept in several nights. How could I tell a widow who thought I was giving her money that in the end I wasn't giving it? Please give me her bank information, and I'll transfer \$5,000 to her, as we originally discussed."

Ultimately, she got \$12,000 for her wedding expenses, in the zechus of her honesty.



He brought it with him from Eretz Yisrael to Lakewood, and when he got home, he told his mother about it.





What advice can you give please?

Thank you

I'm prescribing 5 medications for you:

1. Feeling shy and uncomfortable around people is painful. Every time you experience it, it is wiping away your aveiros. It's saving you from a trip to gehenim! It's a steal of a deal!

2. Accept the shyness and the discomfort with love and thank Hashem for it. You will be giving Him pleasure that no one else it the world could give!

3. Realize that Hashem accepts you the way you are and loves you. In His eyes you are perfect! And that's all that counts.

4. Even if you aren't able to have a conversation, you can still show love and connect to other people. Just smile at everyone you meet with the most beautiful sincere smile possible and say, 'So glad to see you.' Or 'Good morning/evening/night.' And continue on your way.

Doing this will also generate positive feelings in the people you meet. This will cause them to feel positive towards you. This will make you feel more comfortable around others.



We are told that the structure of the Mishkan consisted of 100 sockets. Does this have any special significance? The Ba'al Haturim explains that Chazal instituted that we say 100 berachos a day, based on the fact that the Mishkan consisted of 100 sockets. What is the connection between the mitzvah to recite 100 berachos daily and the sockets of the Mishkan?

The Chidushei HaRim answers with something beautiful. He explains that although nowadays we don't have an actual



It is so beloved to Hashem when there is a hashraas HaShechinah in this world. The Ohr HaChayim explains that the reason why our parashah is seemingly so repetitive, telling us details about the Mishkan we have already been told, is because the Mishkan is a place of hashraas HaShechinah. It is so beloved to Hashem that there is a place in this world for hashraas Shehcinah, that the Torah repeats the details. The Torah is usually so sparing with words yet a place for hashraas Shechinah is so beloved, that the Torah uses many more verses! So, when we recite berachos and bring the Shechinah into our own Mishkan, it is just as beloved by Hashem.

Why did Chazal institute that we recite at least 100 berachos daily? The Tur writes that in the times of Dovid Hamelech there was a plague that caused 100 people to pass away each day. Dovid Hamelech saw with rauch hakodesh that this plague could be stopped if the people would recite 100 berachos daily. Shortly after he enacted this, the plague miraculously stopped! There-

- There is no individual in Klal Yisrael for whom hidden miracles do not occur each day. (Rabbeinu Bechaya, Shemos 30:12)
- Even though Hashem has thousands and myriads of angels who praise Him, He only desires the praises of Klal Yisrael. (Midrash Mishlei 14:28)
- Each Jew should strive to remember the kindnesses that Hashem does for him on a constant basis. (Sefer Charedim 9:23)
- If gratitude ceased to exist, how would the world carry on? (Akeidas Yitzchak, Ki Sisa 181)



fore, Chazal instituted that we recite 100 berachos daily. How does reciting 100 berachos daily have the power to stop such a deathly plague? The Levush explains that the plague was caused by a lack of gratitude for our constant blessings. Bnei Yisrael were taking for granted the countless gifts that Hashem showered upon them each day. Therefore, reciting 100 berachos, expressing their gratitude constantly throughout their day, is the perfect rectifi-


cation for this!

Hashem loves us more than we can possibly imagine and each second He showers upon us countless gifts. After all we are alive! Not to mention the numerous other benefits we constantly gain from, we can see walk, talk, the list just goes on and on. Reciting berachos is a great way to express our gratitude to Hashem for all our many gifts. The Rambam teaches that the reason why Chazal enacted so many different berachos in order that we can constantly remember Hashem's kindness throughout our day. Being meticulous in reciting these berachos has such a great impact. The Zohar teaches that one hundred berachos that we recite daily are keys that open Hashem's treasury to shower countless blessings upon us. As a result, we will receive physical abundance and reach spiritual heights.

The Ohr Zarua writes that a man who recently passed away appeared to a Rav in his community in a dream. The man was wearing a beautiful crown made of leaves and told the Rav that he was faring very well in the next world and was regarded in Gan Eden with the highest respect. The Rav was surprised as this man was known for being very simple. He explained that he was always particular to say his morning Berachos in a pleasant voice. Due to this, he merited a high place in Olam Haba with a beautiful crown with leaves from Gan Eden. The Ohr Zarua commented "I am publicizing this story in order that people will internalise the importance of saying berachos pleasantly, thereby meriting Gan Eden." (Ohr Zarua vol.2, 42)

Let's thank Hashem for: Planes. What a miracle! How a vehicle made of metal can transport tens of people at great altitudes across the world's vast oceans in a matter of hours is truly wonderous. We can visit friends and family in far distances with relative ease and comfort, something previous generations would never have dreamt of.

Rashi in this week's Parsha (39,33) brings down from Chazal: Hashem saw that Moshe Rabbeinu didn't have any part in the building of the Mishkan. So he told Moshe that his Cheilek should be to erect the Kerashim. Moshe turned to Hashem and exclaimed, "How can I raise up these heavy Kerashim? I don't have the strength to do such a thing?" Hashem responded to Moshe by saying, "You just have to go through the hand motions, and I will be the one to stand them up."

The Meforshim are bothered. If Hakadoish Baruch Hu wanted Moshe Rabbeinu to have a Cheilek in the Mishkan like the rest of Klal Yisroel, why is this helping? Everyone else in Klal Yisroel actually did something, but Moshe Rabbeinu was just pretending, as if he was doing something. In reality it was absolutely zilch. So how is that considered that he had a Cheilek in building the Mishkan?

The answer is, that in reality there is nothing we are actually doing. It is all an illusion. Because whatever outcome there is from any action

we do, is coming from Hashem.

Let's give a few cases to explain this concept: When you turn on the faucet, it is not your turning of the knob that causes the water to come out, rather at that exact second, Hakadoish Boruch Hu makes it appear. If Hashem wouldn't want that, then no water would come out no matter how hard you try. The same is true with every step we take. Whether it's opening the door, blurting out a word, crossing the street and everything else in the world, big and small.

It comes out that all we are ever really doing, is the hand motions. Because everything from start to finish is from Hashem. All results, outcomes and accomplishments are up to Hashem. So whenever we are doing something and we see a result, it is because Hashem decided that the result should happen.

If a person lives with this mindset, he realizes that anyone in Klal Yisroel who helped the build the Mishkan didn't really do anything. All they were doing were the hand motions. And Hashem was telling Moshe that by moving his hands to raise up the Kerashim, he has the same Cheilik in the construction as everyone else.

The only difference was that by Klal Yisroel it looked like it was real that they were doing something and by Moshe it was more obvious that it was Hashem.

This is what it means to live with Bitachon. To realize that Hakadoish Boruch Hu is doing everything. If a person lives with this mindset, he will able to live a life full of Menuchas Henefesh. Because he knows that it's all Hashem anyway. He is running an amazing, perfect world where nothing can go wrong. Our job is just to do the hand motions, and everything else is already perfectly planned by our loving, caring Father, the Ribono Shel Oilam.

A Yid shares: It was Erev Shabbos right before the Z'man and my sink was stuffed. It was overflowing and as hard as I tried to fix it, it wouldn't drain. It was too late to call a plumber and I couldn't go into Shabbos without a working sink. I didn't know what to do. I was thinking, what does Hashem want from me? I realized that 'I' was trying to fix the sink! I cant do it. However if all I do is the motions and I realize that the outcome is from Hashem, then it is whole different story. With that I tried unclogging the sink with the mindset that all I am doing is the motions, like a puppet, and it is Hashem really doing the outcome. Seconds later it started working!

A Yungerman shared: I was in the supermarket and the lines were endless. I was in a huge rush and I could not afford to wait on line for twenty minutes. I was thinking that anyhow I need to come onto Hashem to take the items, go to the checkout counter and bring the stuff home. So if I need to rely on Him for all that, I might as well turn to Him to help me get out of the store in a flash. How will it happen? That's not my department.

Just then the manager went to a new checkout counter, sat himself down and called me over. He told me, "I see that the line is really long. Come over here." Out of all the people waiting on the lines he called me over. I got out of there in a flash!

• How will my perspective change if I know I am just doing the hand motions when it comes to Parnassa, Chinuch, studying for a test or learning a Blatt Gemara?

• The Alter of Novardak never asked if I am able to do it, but if it's the right thing. If it's the right thing it means Hashem will give me the means to do it. What can I take on to do with knowing that it's really Hashem running the show, and I only have to 'play' my part?

• If I know all my accomplishments is Hashem, not me; how will this help me feel towards someone who didn't achieve the same results?

You, on the other hand, are telling me that you constantly have this feeling, and that your problem is how you can free yourself from it. Your inner neshamah has such a longing to Hashem and wants so badly to have that association. That is something so special, and that's why I'm so blown away."

Every Yid, in every situation and in every level that he finds himself, has that inner desire toward Hashem and His mitzvos. We might not be aware of it, and it might not be on the forefront of our minds, but it's there. The feeling that this young man had is something that us observant Yidden might take for granted, but we all have it. In every situation and level that we find ourselves in, our neshamah yearns for it. The neshamah of every Yid contains a desire and a yearning toward Torah and mitzvos.

These words deeply penetrated the young man's heart, and they reignited in him the spark to start observing Torah and mitzvos. Today, he is a respectable yungerman, learning and growing to great heights.

"DON'T LET IT GO"

When we have problems, we seek the guidance of the gedolei Torah in how to deal with them. Someone wrote to the Avnei Nezer, zt"l, asking guidance for the problem he was encountering. He was worried about that he wasn't feeling close to Hashem. What should he do to gain this feeling?

The Avnei Nezer replied, "I ask from you one thing: Don't tell anyone that you have this problem. Don't tell anyone that you feel distant from Hashem and that it bothers you, unlike what we find by other problems.

"By other problems, Chazal relate from a pasuk in Mishlei that if a person has a worry, he should tell other people about it (Mishlei 12:25). He should share his worries with a good friend. Often, that helps the person deal with the problem. The burden feels easier to bear after sharing it with others.

"This one, however, I request that you should not share your worry with anyone. I want the fact that you feel distant from Hashem to bother you for your entire life. You should alway seek Hashem. If you speak it over with other people, you may cool off, and that's why you must avoid discussing this 'problem' with others." As a bachur, R' Elazar Tzadok learned in the Chevron Yeshiva, and he was very close to the Chazon Ish. Once when he was at the home of the Chazon Ish, the Chazon Ish told him, "Lazer, Lazer, do you really think that observant Yidden who, r"l, go off the derech all of a sudden take off their yarmulka? No! It

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

One of the most valuable items to R' Yankel Galinsky was a letter that he had received. What's the story behind this letter? And what made it so treasured?

There were many tasks that the Chazon Ish needed to be done on behalf of Klal Yisrael. He many times approached R' Yankel for the task, since he was a Novardoker, and the students of the Novardok Yeshiva were known for their brazenness in serving Hashem. So, when he had tasks that required great boldness, R' Yankel was the man. On some occasions, the Chazon Ish sent him to pull people out of the Arab Quarter or the like, and R' Yankel devotedly did these



seemingly impossible tasks.

such letters, when the Chazon Ish requested him do such a mission, he called R' Yankel "Yedidi" — my friend. R' Yankel cherished this letter greatly. He saved this treasured letter for a staggering twenty-five-years among his personal possessions. He even requested in his tzavaah, will, that it should accompany him in his grave. That is how much he cherished that letter.

He explained the reason for attachment to the letter as follows: When he'll come to Shamayim, he is not sure what type of Olam Haba they'll grant him. But if he comes with that letter, they'll see that



one he's the "friend" of the Chazon Ish, and these they'll grant him a special place.



Many years later, when he returned one day from Shacharis, he took the letter, ripped it up, and threw it out. This bothered his talmidim: "Why is he ripping that precious letter of his? It was so treasured by him. Why would he throw it in the wastebasket?"

He turned to them and said: "While I was davening, something caught my attention. Toward the end of the birchos k'rias Shema, we discuss the various nissim, miracles, that Hashem performed when we were leaving Mitzrayim. We start by mentioning how Hashem killed the bechorim, and redeemed His firstborn, referring to the Yidden, "v'zeidim tibata," that the wicked ones drowned, and "v'yedidim he'evarta," and the beloved He crossed through the Yam Suf.

"As soon as I read this last one, I was overtaken with joy and happiness. I saw that I'm called the 'beloved of Hashem.' When I thought about it, it dawned on me: how can I treasure that letter that declares that I'm the friend of the Chazon Ish when I have a letter stating that I'm the friend of Hashem? That brings my association to a new level.

"It filled me with such joy that I simply do not need the letter of the Chazon Ish to ensure me of this comfort of being the yedid of the Chazon Ish. All that I could have, I get from being the yedid of 'Hashem.""

Purim — A Day of Boundless Joy

Perhaps one of the most perplexing days in the Jewish calendar is Purim. Purim is a day when all of our usual standards of behavior seem to be abrogated. It is a day marked by incredible, unbridled rejoicing and complete drunk-

enness to the point of "ad d'lo yada bein arur Haman l'baruch Mordechai." This seems to defy everything we would expect from a sacred Jewish day. What is the place of such limitless merrymaking on this most meaningful day?



Furthermore, the joy of Purim seems to clash with a number of other established rules. For instance, the Gemara teaches us (Berachos 31a), "Rabbi Yochanan says in the name of Rabbi Shimon ben Yochai: It is forbidden for a person to fill his mouth with laughter in this world, as the pasuk says, 'Then our mouths will be filled with laughter and our tongues with song.' When will this take place? When 'the nations will declare: Hashem has done great things with these people.'" Until our final Geulah, we are forbidden to display complete, unfettered joy. But then how can we be permitted to lose ourselves in the drunkenness and revelry of Purim?

The explanation of Yosef Lekach (9:23) for the requirement of ad d'lo yada makes the mystery grow even deeper. Yosef Lekach explains that on Purim Chazal wanted us to forget our suffering in exile and the pain of the Churban, instead rejoicing over the fact that Hashem exercised His hashgachah over us even after the Shechinah had departed. But Chazal did not want to command us explicitly to forget the destruction of Yerushalayim, so they phrased the halachah as a requirement to lose our understanding of the difference between Mordechai and Haman, who were diametric opposites. If we reach that level of intoxication, we will certainly be unaware of the tribulations of galus.

Yosef Lekach's approach is truly astounding. How can a Jew ever forget the destruction of Yerushalayim, even for a moment? We are all familiar with the pesukim in which Dovid Hamelech cries (Tehillim 137:5-6), "If I forget you, Jerusalem, may my right hand forgot its cunning. May my tongue cleave to my palate if I do not remember you, if I do not recall Jerusalem at the height of my joy." Yet Shaa-

rei Teshuvah (Orach Chaim siman 695) quotes Mor u'Ketziah, who rules that there is no requirement to recall the Churban at the seudah of Purim. Furthermore, some authorities maintain that during the month of Adar, one should place a sign bearing the words

Mishenichnas Adar marbim b'simchah over the section of the wall that is left unpainted as a commemoration of the Churban. Why would there be such a drastic turnaround on Purim that we are actually required to forget it?

A fascinating resolution from the sefer Egeres Hapurim paints the revelry of Purim in an entirely new light. Rabbeinu Bechaye writes in Kad Hakemach that the entirety of Megillas Esther represents an allusion to future events. Just as many non-Jews converted to Judaism during the times of Mordechai and Esther, the nations of the world will abandon their false religions in the future, at the time of the Geulah, and serve Hashem. Just as Haman's nefarious plot against Klal Yisrael was miraculously reversed and the Jews became dominant, in the future as well, the Jewish people will go from being oppressed and downtrodden to being the most exalted and respected nation in the world.

The miracle of Purim, in other words, generated an awesome revelation of Hashem's honor. The Jewish people's salvation from Haman's decree caused the entire world to recognize our special relationship with Hashem, foreshadowing the events that will take place when Mashiach comes at last. Thus, Purim is a day when we experience a microcosm of the future Geulah. That being the case, it is entirely fitting that Chazal instituted the halachah of ad d'lo yada on Purim. As the Gemara clearly states, the prohibition of unadulterated joy applies only until all the nations of the world acknowledge Hashem's sovereignty, but on Purim, we are essentially catapulted into the future era when that will have already taken place. We can also understand how we can be commanded to forget the Churban on this day, for the joy of Purim is itself a celebration of the Geulah and the rebuilding of the Beis Hamikdash. The most fundamental aspect of the Geulah is that it is a time of kiddush Hashem, when Hashem's honor and glory will be revealed to the entire world, and on Purim we celebrate such a revelation.

Purim teaches us that not only must we constantly strive to create kiddush Hashem, but we should be incredibly overjoyed when it takes place. Kiddush Hashem should be a source of more joy to us than any other accomplishment in the world. Our great forebear Avraham Avinu taught us this lesson, as well. After Avraham succeeded in vanquishing the mighty army of the four kings, the king of Sodom offered him the rights to the enormous bounty from the war, but Avraham flatly refused to accept any of it. Malbim



explains that Avraham's sole objective in life was to bring awareness of Hashem and His Providence to the world. His victory over the kings demonstrated conclusively to the world that Hashem is its true King, and that accomplishment was the greatest reward he could ever expect. There was no reason for him to derive any other benefit from his victory,

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since he had already achieved the exclusive goal of his life.

In our days, as well, there have been great people who mastered this attitude. Rabbi Shmuel Bloom relates that Rabbi Moshe Sherer appeared before Congress in 1961 to testify in favor of government-funded financial aid for pri-

vate and parochial schools. When he returned from Washington, Rav Aharon Kotler zt"l greeted him with great excitement. "Even more important than the funds that yeshivos will receive because of your testimony," the gadol hador told the legendary askan, "is the fact that you have removed

a chillul Hashem. The liberal Jews in America have promulgated the notion that only Catholics support religious education, whereas Jews are opposed to it. That very idea is a

terrible chillul Hashem. But now Americans know that religious Jews are in favor of religious education, and that is a great kiddush Hashem."

Yeshivos throughout the country were in dire need of the vital infusion of financial support that Rabbi Sherer's testimony was meant to bring about. But for Rav Aharon Kotler, that was not the primary benefit of Rabbi Sherer's actions. The reason to rejoice was simply that a kid-



dush Hashem had been created. What could be more important than that?

> Purim is a day when we celebrate the massive kiddush Hashem of the victory over Amalek, the primary detractors from kavod Shamayim. The avodah of Purim is to express the fact that a Jew experiences true joy only when there is kiddush Hashem. Therefore, kiddush Hashem should be at the forefront of our consciousness on this day; it should be the sole object of our concerns. The unbridled festivity of the day, the drunkenness and the atmosphere of unchecked celebration do create a significant danger of chillul Hashem. We must be careful to use such a powerful day in the right way and conduct ourselves in a way that can lead only to kiddush Hashem. Then, perhaps, we will usher in the era when Hashem's honor is fully evident to the entire world.



A Drink of Life

Last week we saw that with a little thought we can turn daily aspects of life into opportunities of *simcha*. Let us take for example the pleasure of drinking a cup of water.

In days of old, if you wanted a cup of water in the middle of the night and your water jug



was empty, you would need to get dressed, put on a heavy coat, and go out into the cold and darkness. Then you would need to draw up water into a bucket from the well, or crank it out with a hand pump. After that you would filter the water from the sand and sediments, and sometimes even boil it to remove the germs and bacteria. Yet today, we just need to open the faucet and out comes



clean delicious water. So, our first step to simcha is while we are filling up the cup. Think about how easy it is to get this basic pleasure of life.

Next, let us focus on the great pleasure of drinking water. First, your mouth was so dry and now the soothing elixir will take away that uncomfortable feeling. If you were hot and worn out, you will be overtaken by a refreshing feeling. Then pay attention to the fact that when you swallow, the water goes down your throat painlessly. I am sure you remember what it felt like to swallow when you had a sore throat. Even though you probably have food inside your stomach, Hashem created a wonderous system that filters out the water and delivers it smoothly and swiftly, in the precise amounts, to every part of the body. Approximately 60% of our body is water, so it is very vital for our existence. Now, too much of a good thing is not good, and can even be damaging. Therefore, Hashem instilled an automatic gauge which ensures that any excess water gets sent to a special "container", where it waits for us to find a convenient time and place to remove it from our body. For most of us, this is a painless process, which we don't give any thought to. But the truth is that there are people who are scared to drink water, knowing that when they will need to expel the excess from their body it will be a very painful and difficult process. Yet, we merely pick up that glass of water and empty its contents without any hesitation!

Drinking water is like drinking wine! If we would bear this in mind while saying the beracha of *shehakol*, we would get more drunk with real, everlasting happiness, than a drunkard gets from a bottle of wine. A simple cup of water would put us in good spirits and help us discover more of these wonderful pleasures and joys of daily life.

Every cup of water is an opportunity to: 1) Think about how thankful you are to Hashem for this life-saving elixir and for the wonderous mechanisms of the body that absorbs it and sends it to where it is most needed. 2) Say the beracha of *shehakol*



with that *kavana*. 3) To keep these thoughts in mind until you finish the cup, you can also imagine the water spreading life throughout your body.

yet I am unhappy. You have nothing and you radiate simcha! Why is this so?"





The Torah Obligation to Enjoy Olam Hazeh

A New Perspective

In addition to the lesson of Gan Eden, there are other pesukim in the Torah that teach us that Hashem wants people to be happy and enjoy their lives in this world. One is the pasuk in Parshas Bereishis (1:31), which says that Hashem declared that the world is very good. Now, why did the Torah take the time to tell us Hashem's opinion of the world? Rav Miller explained that this is so we should share Hashem's opinion. In other words, Hashem told us that He thinks our world

is very good so that we should train ourselves to think the same way!

In the book The Beginning, Rav Miller explained an important princi-



ple for understanding the Torah: When the Torah says something is "very good," it means it is good to the greatest degree possible. In Rav Miller's words, "'Very good' in Hashem's language means 'endlessly good.'" (Rav Avigdor Miller, The Beginning, p. 57). We therefore see that Hashem's opinion is that Olam Hazeh is incredibly, amazingly, endlessly good — and that He wants us to feel this way, too! Now, thinking that this world is endlessly good does not mean to think that the world is merely a very useful place. It means that we must feel with all our heart that the world is the most amazing, wonderful place, and that we are extremely lucky to be here! In other words, it is a Torah mitzvah for us

to greatly enjoy life in Olam Hazeh; it is what Hashem wants from every person!

More Torah Sources

In addition to the above, other sources in the Torah clearly teach us that a person is meant to enjoy life. Here are some of them:

1. The pasuk in sefer Mishlei (15:15) says,

'וְטוֹב לֵב- מִשְׁתֶה תָמִיד.'

"For



good-hearted person, [life is a] constant banquet."

It's surely an obligation for every person to have a good heart, and this means that Hashem desires that our lives should feel as exciting and fun as a great big banquet! This is clear proof that Hashem wants us to enjoy our lives to the fullest!

2. The pasuk in Mishlei (11:17) says,

'גמָל נַפְשׂו- אִיש חָסֶד.'

"One who gives to his soul is a man of kindness."


This means that it's a mitzvah of chessed to do kind things to oneself, including giving oneself food and drink (Sefer Chareidim 66:124). It's thus a mitzvah of chessed to give oneself an enjoyable time.

3. The mishnah in Pirkei Avos (4:1) teaches,

'אֵיזֶהּו עָשִיר הַשָּמֵחַ בְחֶלְקֿו'.'

Many people translate these words to mean: "Who is wealthy? One who is satisfied with his lot." However, the word הַשָּׁמֵח does not mean "one who is satisfied." A good English translation of simchah might be "one who is joyful." This mishnah is not teaching that to be wealthy, a person must merely be content. Rather, he must merely be content. Rather, he must rejoice and delight in what he has! He must be in a state of simchah because of his lot!

From all these sources we learn that Hashem wants a person to enjoy life in this world with simchah and happiness from beginning



to end. Not only that, there are even enjoyments that Hashem will reward us for having, since, as we know, some of the mitzvos require us to enjoy gashmiyus pleasures — for example, the mitzvos of oneg Shabbos and oneg Yom Tov, and simchas Yom Tov. In the coming sections we will discuss more concepts that demonstrate that Hashem wants us to enjoy our lives very much.

The Sweetest Marror

ble, chazeres (romaine lettuce) is the most preferred one? Why, it's not bitter at all! Shouldn't it be the least preferable of



All the various sounds that humans produce are through the vocal cords. How does this happen? How do two small flaps of muscle create sounds and noises?

The way the vocal cords produce sound is through vibration. An example that we are familiar with of this phenomena, is guitar strings. Even though the physical build of vocal cords is quite different than guitar strings, they both share the same concept in producing sounds. When you pluck a guitar string which is tightly strung, it quickly vibrates by shaking back and forth. The sound of its vibrations bounces off the hollow of the guitar, creating sound. The vocal cords that Hakadosh Baruch Hu gifted us with, produces sound in the same fashion. The muscle tissue that partially covers the opening of the air pipe vibrates rapidly when we speak or sing. Vibrations rebound and resonate in the voice box, delivering sound.

Hashem in his infinite wisdom created man compact. Everything takes us a minimal amount of space. So while the hollow of a guitar can easily be two feet long, the voice box is only two inches long. This is so much more convenient than having a cavity the size of a guitar in our necks or in the top of our chest. The voice box also doubles as serving as part of the windpipe which we're constantly are breathing with. There's no specific box which is designated for voice and sound. Rather, it's the wind pipe which also serves as an echo cham-

ber to produce sound. Such amazing chachmah!



Let's continue studying together Hakadosh Baruch Hu's amazing creation called sound. It's the vibrations of the muscle tissue that's referred to as vocal cords, which produce sound. How many times do our vocal cords vibrate when we speak? How much activity is taking place inside our necks when we talk? You might be like me, amazed to find out the number of vibrations. Every time we speak our vocal cords vibrate over 100 times per second! That's a hundred cycles of vibra-

tion in which each cycle records a moving forward and backward.

If we translate that into regular life conversation, that means that if we talk for ten minutes, then our vocal cords vibrated well over 60,000 times. The number we used of 100 vibrations per second is actually starting at the low end. It's the amount that's used in low pitched voices that men usually talk in. Women who usually speak at a higher pitch, vibrate close to 200 cycles per second. And children, who speak at a very high pitch, vibrate in the area of 300 vibrations per second. That means, in a ten minute conversation with a child, he's vibrating over 180,000 times.

Hashem put so much movement and activity into the production of our speech that we are not even aware of. So many pieces work together so perfectly.

The Amazing Electric Eel!

This article will focus on the fish called the electric eel. Officially it's not an eel, but a fish, however, since it looks like an eel, the name stuck. So be it. Now, this fish has some very unique structures that generate the electricity. These structures take up 80% of their body.

The electric eel has three large organs used to generate electricity.


The main organ is light purple in the below picture, the Hunter's organ is light green, and the Sach's organ is yellow. The brown on top, going across the length of the body, are its muscles used for moving around to propel the electric eel forward. The head area is the 20% of the body that holds all the important other organs.

80% is taken up by 3 electric organs and the rest of the organs are in the front 20% part of the electric eel. the Hunter's organ can be combined or work alone, and make medium to extremely high voltage charges. As high at 680 volts can be generated, which is plenty and it can easily cause heart failure to a large crocodile, very quickly. A regular electric house socket is 120 volts and if you ever by accident got slightly electrocuted, you know that it's already a nice punch at 120 volts. On each side of the electric eel there's about 70 stacks of 5,000 - 10,000 flat electrocyte cells in each stack. That's what these three organs are made of. There can be over half a million electrocytes in one electric eel.

EVERY SINGLE ELOCROCYTE is connected to the nervous system. While each electrocyte, when signaled gives off only a small amount of electricity, like .08 to .15 percent of one volt, when all the electrocytes are trigged off at EXACTLY the same time to work properly. Now, I know very little about these things, but I am intelligent enough to understand that this needs a very clever and creative plan for it to work. It needs the correct setup of the electrocyte cells, with the positively and negatively charged particles all arranged in the correct order, and connections from the neurons must reach every single of the half a million electrocytes for them to be activated when needed. Otherwise, it just won't work. These stacks of electrocytes are anything but an accident that's for sure!

Using just the Sach's organ, low amounts of volts are generated, which helps them move around and it also can help them find prey in the nearby vicinity through a process of electrolocation.

How much voltage is used will determine what it can do with it. But, without going into the details, they



Now, the electricity can be low voltage, 25 volts, medium voltage at 100+ volts, and high voltage at 600+ volts! The Sach's organ is use to produce the low voltage. It's used to scavenge around for prey, and to search its environment to find out what's there. The Main organ and - it creates a huge amount of voltage. The electric charges come out at great speeds. When at high charge, it can pulsate as fast as 500 pulses per second! Obviously, the electrocytes must be stacked in a very precise way to allow successful electricity generation. There's the positively charged parts and negatively charged parts that MUST be set up correctly for it can avoid potential large predators by zapping them with high voltage shocks. They can use them to find prey, and once the prey is located, they can stun the prey. They can actually freeze the prey's muscles for a few seconds, which

gives them enough time to suck up the small stunned fish. Sometimes, from afar, it will give a quick double burst of electricity into its local vicinity, called a doublet, and it causes in nearby potential prey a twitch in their muscles which helps to give away the prey's location.

Truthfully, there's much more to explain about the way all the electrocut-



ing works, but that's not my focus. My focus is to think about this a little deeper. Firstly, can an accident set up half a million electrocytes all in the correct order? The positive sides and the negative sides all have to be set up correctly or it will break up the voltage flow and that will break up the voltage continuity thereby lowering the full voltage considerably. That all half a million are set up correctly is quite a miracle.

The fact that the neurons of the spine, that provide the important signals of activation, are connected to all half a million electrocytes in a way that the signal reaches all of them, at exactly the same millisecond (a millisecond is one thousandth of a second) is quite amazing! Signals that are sent as fast as one per two thousandth of one second, with as many as 500 pulsating signals sent PER SECOND, trust me, is also no accident!

But here's the main thing to think

about. Can an accident "know" ANY-THING about the simple existence of electricity? Do any animals know what electricity is? Would it "know" of the potential of using electricity as a method to detect and catch prey? Of course not. That's IMPOS-SIBLE! Would an accident HAVE THE SLIGHTEST CLUE how to generate electricity? I read articles about how it works and it's far from simple, that's for sure.

Can an accident know ANYTHING about the concept positive charged particles and negative charged particles?

Can it know how to use them in a way that it could be made to enable them to generate electricity?

Can an accident know that it will need to pass sodium ions between the positive and negative charges in order to create the flow of the electric charge? These sodium ions need to be waiting on standby to be sum-

> moned at any millisecond to be ready to


flow in. Can an accident know that this must be prearranged for the electricity to be generated? Last I checked, ACCIDENTS CAN'T COM-PREHEND ANY-THING!

So, the Electric eel is another one of Hashem's miraculous creatures with their electric producing capacity. How amazing are Your works Hashem! (There are a few other water creatures that can generate some electricity, but none come close to the voltage power of the electric eel. Each of these creatures are also miracles of Hashem!)

Now we can discuss some other points about the electric eel. Another important fact that must be known is that these electric eels have very poor eyesight. They also hunt at night which makes that a bigger problem. The water is also typically murky and muddy. So, Hashem gave them this method of finding prey with their electricity. They also don't have upper teeth so they need to be able to disable the fish so that they can easily suck in the fish through their mouths.


In addition, being they live in such muddy waters, the waters are very low in oxygen so Hashem made it that they can, and actually usually do, breathe air. They have gills, but typically the water won't provide enough oxygen, so they need to breathe air. Even though they have no lungs, their mouths are heavily vascularized (which means it has a lot of blood vessels) with folds that increase the surface area, allowing them to breathe air and get enough oxygen entering these folds and then going into the blood stream. This is a miraculous extra oxygen capturing apparatus, found only in some fish.

Another point that is important is as follows: We said that the electric organs take up 80% of the length of theelectric eelbody. The main visceral

(vital) organs, which are the soft internal organs of the body, including the lungs, the heart, and the organs of the digestive, excretory, and circulatory systems, had to be "moved" to the front 20% of the body. long, nevertheless, the typical structure of a fish (see picture below) has these organs spread out nicely along about 80% of the body for effective functioning. Now, in the electric eel, they "supposedly" got squished into the front 20% of the The author can be body, while the electric organs were supposedly being developed by accident. Now, can an accident go and perfectly readjust, replant and squish all the organs into a new cramped space that it wasn't in before, and/or have to shrink the organs that were supposedly much larger at one time, and still function 100%? Of course not! It's completely ridiculous!

The electric eel was created with their main organs proportionately smaller in size and in its correct, yet smaller space than usual, in the front 20% of the Electric eel, and they function perfectly while Hashem put the electric organs in the rest of the body.

A typical fish with its organs spaced nicely across 80% the body.



A VISIT TO R' DANIEL!

Recap: A most amazing piece of information that is too good to be true, came to our attention! That here in New York lives a very old man, who is the last known remaining living Yid who left Mitzrayim. His name is R' Daniel and he is from Shevet Don. When he left Mitzrayim, he was a 15-year-old boy and today he is 3349 years old! He lives today with his great-great-great-grandchildren in Monsey, New York. The Spring Hill Times has been granted the rare privilege of being able to interview him from time to time.

It was a beautiful winter (almost Spring) morning and we excitingly went to visit R' Daniel. We had been looking forward all winter to this interview!

When we came into his house, we found him hunched over a Megilas Esther. It was amazing to see someone who experienced the Purim story firsthand, studying the Megilah.

When he noticed us, he gave us a huge warm shalom aleichim and jumped up and ran to the kitchen. He came back two minutes later with a twinkle in his eyes holding delicious Hamentaschen and coffee for us! He was so happy to serve us! He was literally dancing!

We then had a most fascinating interview.

Spring Hill Times: How can we expect someone to be happy during the month of Adar. There is so much pain in the world.

Every second that every cell of your body and the bodies of your close ones are functioning normally is full of countless miracles and kindnesses. Any so called 'bad' is completely nullified so many times over.

In addition, there is no such thing as bad. Everything that a person goes through is good for him. It's all a tikun for the person.

The Spring Hill Times: But isn't Hashem angry and upset at Klal Yisrael and the world? Are we really deserving of His good?

R' Daniel: Hashem loves Klal Yisrael. He has k'vyachol no greater joy than giving you the world! He thinks about each and every one of us 24/7 365 days a year. He is constantly thinking, k'vyachol, "What else can I do for my children."

The Spring Hill Times: But don't we do aveiros?

R' Daniel: Hashem's love has nothing to do with how many mitzvos you do or how many aveiros. He loves you because you are His child.

The Spring Hill Times: So why does He sometimes do painful things to us if He loves us? I wouldn't want my child to have pain.

R' Daniel: It's all to make the person into a better person and to give him a tikun so that he could get as much good as possible. In fact every Neshama, before it came down to this world, was shown exactly what they were going to go through, and it happily agrees! Because in Shamayim it's clear that everything is good. So when things are painful and sad to the body the person is experiencing something good in a painful way.

The Spring Hill Times: Where in Persia did you live? Did you personally know Mordechai?

R' Daniel: I lived in Shushan Habira. I actually lived a block and a half away from Mordechai. We davened in the same shul!

The Spring Hill Times: Can you please tell us something special you remember about him.

R' Daniel: I remember how the entire city was petrified of Haman. He was so powerful! But Mordechai just laughed at him. I remember a line he used to use often, "He is just a puppet. He is nothing more than a busted balloon." Mordechai wasn't nispael from a human being. When everyone else was frightened to death from just seeing Haman, Mordechai wouldn't even turn to look at him!

The Spring Hill Times: Unbelievable! Did that change after the gezeira of Haman and Acheishveirosh that all the Yidden were to be killed?

R' Daniel: Not one iota! Mordechai knew that the gezaira was from Hashem. He didn't even make a move when Haman passed by. He realized right from the start, that it's a gezeira from Shamayim. Haman was just the messenger.


The Spring Hill Times: Can you please tell us how it was to fast for three days straight? Was it difficult?

It may sound unbelievable, but I actually had to have someone tie me down, because I was afraid I wouldn't be able to hold myself back from eating matzah... and I wasn't the only one!

I'll tell you an interesting thought that went through my head at that time. After tasting the bitterness of the night without mitzvas, I thought to myself, "I wonder if the same thing is happening in Shamayim. It's a night that Hashem too waits for all year long. Tonight is the night that we usually show Him so much love. Perhaps Hashem was saying the same thing, "This night without the beautiful mitzvas is something I can't afford to lose... Klal Yisrael is just too dear to me..."

greatest teshuva in history. Shouldn't that be our focus?

A. One of the main yesodos of Purim is to realize that Haman is just a puppet. Everything that happens in this world

is just a puppet show, and as we know from looking at the advertisement in the Spring Hill Times, when you realize that everything is a puppet show, you won't be angry at others.

And that's actually how to understand the halacha of "ad dloh yada," the halacha that you're not supposed to know the difference between arur haman and baruch Mordechai. This halacha is difficult to understand. You shouldn't know the difference between baruch Mordechai and arur Haman?



Aren't Mordechai and Haman opposites? Haman is the biggest rasha and Mordechai is the biggest tzadik! Their titles are Haman harasha and Mordechai hatzadik! 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

reach the point of "ad d'loh yada" we drink or go to sleep. What does sleeping have to do with Purim? Furthermore, we have a minhag to dress up. What's this dressing up all about? What does this have to do with the yom tov of Purim?

The answer to these questions is that the avodas hayom of Purim is to realize there's no Mordechai, there's no Haman, it's all Hashem, and everything that Hashem is doing is all for our very best interests and benefit. Like we see that Haman was the best kiruv organization, he caused klal Yisrael to do teshuva. We see nowadays the same thing unfolding, that Hamas was the best teshuva



and kiruv organization. They were able to be meorer Yidden that were anti-religious and anti-frum, and from one day to the next, all these people are being mekabel krias shema, Shabbos, tznius, chavrusos. The amount of teshuva that Hamas caused Klal Yisrael to do is ayom v'norah. That's why there's a halacha that we shouldn't know the difference between arur Haman and baruch Mordechai. Similarly, that's why there's the halacha to dress up. Dressing up shows that it's all one big puppet show. Just like behind the mask it's



somebody else, so we're teaching you that behind the story of Purim is Hashem.

That's the whole theme of Purim. That's why we go to sleep or get drunk. Sleeping is the biggest raayah of the yesod that we focus on Hashem and not on people. Because what's the point of sleeping on Purim and what's the point of sleeping in general? Sleep is to demonstrate that we're willing to put ourselves in a state where we won't be able to watch ourselves or protect ourselves, but we trust that there are no harmful people in the world, there's only Hashem, and Hashem is the only One watching us and protecting us. And that's the point of sleeping and that's the point of drinking. Drinking and sleeping shows us that we can't take care of

ourselves, and we're relying on Hashem to take care of us.

So now that we know that all the questions are takka the theme of Purim, now back to the questions. So, what's the answer? Why are we stamping by Haman and why are we having hatred towards a rasha if he's just a puppet? And we're saying ad dlo yada, we shouldn't know the difference?

The answer is that the translation of middos means measurement, a balance. In order to grow and shteig, a person has to know how to juggle. They have to know how to juggle two emotions at the same time. So therefore, yes, the translation of bechira is that all actions are Hashem, but the thought process is the human being. A Life with Bitachon focuses on and teaches that any action that you see, attribute that action to Hashem. But at the same time, you have to understand that a person has bechira in the thought process. And Haman had a very evil thought process. It's important and good to focus that Haman was a rasha and that we wipe out his name, because a human being is motivated by hating ra. When you hate ra, you're going to want to do good. That's how human beings work.



So when it comes to hating Haman, you have to have a balance. You have to re-

alize that his thought process was evil and we want to wipe it out, and that it's a mitzvah to hate a rasha, to motivate you to do good and have good retzonos. At the same time, when you see what the results were of Haman's actions, you have to recognize that the outcome was amazing.

Similarly, there was a gadol who went through the Holocaust, and he never spoke of anything the Germans did. He didn't want to make people think that there was a koach in the Germans. He didn't want to focus on feeling hatred toward the Germans, because it would be coming because he'd think that they had done something to him and that would take away his emunah. So, he decided only to focus that everything was Hashem, and therefore all he saw was Hashem. So, when they asked him do you have any trauma or hatred to the Germans, he said I don't know of any Germans. I never saw any Germans; I only saw Hashem.

To end off, a person has to be a juggler and weigh out these two concepts, on the one hand focus on the rasha's bechira in the thought process, which is evil, and hate it. On the other hand, recognize that his actions are from Hashem. Now that we know that we have to be a juggler and balance both emotions, which one should you focus on more? So, everyone has to know themselves, whatever makes them a bigger, better, happier, healthier person. Whatever brings them more menuchas hanefesh and simchas hachaim. Whatever brings them a closer connection to Hashem.

Q. Whenever I point out to my husband something that he needs to correct, he doesn't respond well. He takes it personally and becomes defensive. It feels like there's no one to talk to.

A. Having to suffer from your husband's flaws without having anyone to talk to is certainly frustrating. But there really is someone who you could talk to: Hakadosh Baruch Hu.

The truth is, your husband's issues are not being caused by your husband. No human being could affect you whatsoever. Your husband, with all his flaws, was tailor made by the 'Master Tailor' Hakadosh Baruch Hu to be the best possible husband for you. You're given the opportunity to work on your relationship with him, to strengthen your trust in Hashem and it's good for your overall tikkun haneshama.

Certainly, you should learn techniques on how to express your point in a sensitive way. But always remember, your primary focus should not be on fixing your husband. It should be on fixing yourself and your relationship with Hashem.

And the more you put Hakadosh Baruch Hu into the picture and take your husband out of the picture, Hashem will show you how to navigate your situation in the best possible way.

Q. We know that the shechina only dwells in a house where shalom bayis pervades.

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Unfortunately, I am in a marriage which a special סייעתא דישמיא to restore shalom includes friction and machlokes. But I, too, want to have the shechina in my house.

A. The presence of the shechina doesn't require having the result of shalom. It requires putting in effort to have shalom.

One exercise to achieve shalom is: put Hashem into the picture: When you wake



up in the morning, say, "Hakadosh Baruch Hu, You are in charge of emotions. Please help us feel אהבה ואחוה towards each other".

Another exercise: in your mind, envision your shalom bayis is improving. Imagine that you and your spouse are speaking to each other kindly and respectfully. Positive thinking activates a koach in the briah that can have a concrete effect.

When you do exercises to create shalom, not only will the shechinah want to reside with you, but your efforts will also give you to your home.

Q. My wife makes decisions without consulting with me, even major ones. As the husband, I'm supposed to be the leader, and I feel bad that my wife decides things on her own. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. The ba'alei mussar teach us that whenever something is bothering us, we have to zoom in to our emotions and discover what's the root.

Ninety-five percent of the time we will discover that what's really bothering us is that our kavod was hurt.

In your situation, the main thing that's bothering you is that your wife doesn't value your opinion. In other words: your kavod was injured.

The way to stop caring about your kavod is by, internalizing that הכבוד הבל הבלים. What is kavod after all? Nothing at all! It doesn't give you money and it doesn't give you health. It doesn't make you happy. It doesn't make you calm. It's just an illusion.

If you're worried that your wife is making major decisions without you, and could cause you harm, remember: no human being can affect you one iota. Whatever was nigzar for you will happen regardless of your wife's decisions.

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Hashem Returns Retainers



I'm a yungerman who learns in Bais Medrash Gavoha. I want to share a hashgacha pratis story

that happened to me.

At night, I wear retainers, and I take them off before I eat breakfast. Since I am in Yeshiva for breakfast, I put them in a paper towel and into my jacket pocket.

One day, at the beginning of first seder, I decided that I wanted to wear my retainers also during first seder. I had put them into my jacket pocket but I didn't feel my retainers. I kept checking my pockets and they weren't there! It never happened to me before. It's always there in the pocket where I put it.

I was about to retrace my steps to see if perhaps I dropped them, but I remembered that there was an olam that was mekabel to learn the first half an hour of seder b'ritzifus, so I couldn't go then. I thought to myself that I want to go as soon as I can because its a very big dining room with many people and many workers, and things get moved around. In addition, my retainers were wrapped in a paper towel and would just look like a piece of garbage which could easily get thrown out. But if Hashem wants me to find it I'm going to find it."

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45 minutes after that, when I felt my chavrusa and I were at a stopping point,

At that point, I went out to the dining room, and Baruch Hashem, the retainers were right there, right where we had breakfast! They were in a paper towel on the floor! I found it! It was such hashgacha pratis that they didn't get

thrown out or moved. It was also such hashgacha pratis that Hashem put the thought into my head that I should wear the retainers that morning, because I almost never wear them during first seder! Usually, I only wear them at night. That morning when I lost them, Hashem put it into my head that I should go put them during first seder so that I would realize that they were lost! If I wouldn't have wanted to put them on in the morning, then I would only have realized at night that I didn't have them. Obviously by then, it would already be long gone.
