

of getting it, but if Hakadosh Baruch Hu helps, even a non-Jew can be the shaliach.

I work during the day, he related. At 2 p.m. there's a minyan for Minchah in the shul located across the street from the store where I work. This is a main street and it's very wide, unlike anything you'd see in Eretz Yisrael. One day, close to 2 p.m., I wanted to cross the street so I could daven with a minyan, and I saw that the entire street was blocked. Uniformed guards were walking around importantly, barriers were set up over the entire width of the street, and there were no vehicles on the scene other than a police car. I tried to cross the street, but one of the security guards stopped me immediately. "No crossing here!"

"Why?"

"The president is going to be passing here now!" Nu, if the president has to pass on this street that is indeed important, but I had something even more important to do. I needed to daven with a minyan! Two p.m. was approaching, and I had to cross that street! I had to! I could have said, That's the situation; there's nothing to do. The president needs to pass here, and I will daven biyechidus, because I have no way of getting to shul. But, I thought, while the president is the most important non-Jew in the United States, and he is certainly an influential person, Hakadosh Baruch Hu is the King of all kings, and His influence is far greater than anything imaginable. I am going to daven to Him, and He will certainly help me get to shul.

I told the officer, "I want to speak to the man who is in charge here" – the head security guard. The policeman pointed to a huge soldier and said, "There he is." I went over to him and asked, "How long does this street need to be closed?" "Until the president passes by," he said.

"I want to cross the street," I told him.

"There is no entry."

"But I must!"

"What do you mean, you must? There are many people who want to pass here now. You aren't different from any



of them."

"But I must cross, because there, across the street," I pointed at the shul, "there is a synagogue, and I must go to pray there at two o'clock."

The non-Jew's expression shifted, and he told me,

"Okay you can go, but only for prayer! Not for anything else!"

I nodded my head. He informed all the security guards who stood where I would be walking that they were to open the barriers for me, and I crossed the street. There were other people who wanted to pass, but the head security guard did not allow them to under any circumstances. I was the only one who was given permission to cross, and only one way, and only in order to pray.

What would be after Minchah? I had no clue. I didn't want to be stuck, but first, I had to daven. With a minyan. The excitement over the president's passing by and all the hectic preparations around him aroused me to daven with kavanah before the King of all kings. I had received permission to daven to Him, and the fact that only I had been allowed to cross the street was a

sign from Shamayim that Hakadosh Baruch Hu wanted my tefillos, and He opened the barriers for me so that I could get to a minyan.

After Minchah all the barriers were removed, since the president had already passed. "You lost out," someone told me. "You didn't get to see the president!" But I knew that I hadn't lost anything. The truth was the exact opposite — I had gained worlds. I had davened. [Kav Hashgacha Pratis]

### PESACH NEEDS PROVIDED



I am a Yid from London. It was on Erev Pesach 5756 – quite some time ago – when I was twelve and a half. We would clean the house well, and then we would wait to go out shopping. In our house we knew that if we wanted something new, we'd have to wait for Pesach. Then you could get everything – shoes, clothing, kippah, tzitzis,

and a suit. Games – not for everyone, but nonetheless, a new game was one of the things we'd buy before Pesach. As children, this was a special experience for us, and we waited anxiously for our parents to call us and say that it was time to go to the store.

We dared not ask.

In truth, even if we could ask, that year we knew that asking wouldn't help. I was a very curious boy, and despite the strict chinuch of our home, I had my ways of understanding things. I understood that the financial situation in the house was difficult. It seemed my parents were scraping the bottom of the barrel just in order to provide our basic needs.

How would they be able to buy everything we needed for Pesach?

We were advancing nicely with the cleaning. My father took out several cartons of old documents and decided it was time to throw them out. But he wanted to keep the looseleaf binder and the folders, as they were in good condition and could be used again. "Michel," Abba called to me, "can you please take the documents out of the folders?" I was happy to do so. I enjoy such jobs. I could peek at the documents and see all sorts of interesting things, and I also like to deal with papers and files. It was just the

job for me. I sat down near the cartons and started working. There were orders for merchandise, deliveries, dates. Nothing interesting there. Another file, another folder, and suddenly I saw a banknote sticking out of one of the folders. I leafed through the file and discovered it was filled with banknotes of various denominations. I counted them and discovered that there were 800 pounds there!

That is a really large sum.

I was very excited. I called my sister and told her, "I think we'll be able to go out shopping today. Look what I found."

She was just as excited as I was. We went upstairs to our parents' room together. I could hear Abba and Ima talking. Ima was saying, "We need shoes for Michel, Shima'le, and Raizy. We need new socks for everyone. And what about wine and matzos?"

"Yes, yes, it's all really important," Abba said. "I'm breaking my head trying to figure out where we'll get the money for all these things."

At that moment I wanted to burst into the room with the 800 pounds, but I was a product of my British chinuch, and I would not dare to do so.

I stood outside and knocked on the door until I was give permission to enter.



"What do you need?" my father asked.

I said nothing, but simply showed my father the money. He was amazed. "What's this? Where is it from?"

"I found it in one of the folders you asked me to empty out."

My father got emotional. "Hodu la-Hashem ki tov!" and he immediately started giving instructions. "Take it and go buy shoes, clothing, and everything you need." The revachah had come in one shot. He even gave each of us pocket money.

When the excitement died down, my father remembered where the money had come from.

Ten years earlier, my father had owned



a fish store. He would order merchandise from a fish vendor in the marketplace, who would bring the fish late at night, when my father wasn't there to pay him. So Abba would prepare the money to give him and would leave it in a folder on the counter, and the vendor would take the money himself. During the final week before the shop closed, Abba prepared the money in the folder, but ultimately he didn't order the fish. The vendor never came, and the money remained. Eventually, the folder with the money was put into a carton with other folders, and now, when my father asked me to empty it, the treasure was revealed.

It was amazing to realize that Hakadosh Baruch Hu had watched over our money for that Erev Pesach, when Abba was in a real pinch, and He had arranged that Abba would want to throw out the cartons...

Baruch Hashem, our Pesach needs were amply met. [Kav Hashgacha Pratis]

## IT DISAPPEARED IN HIS POCKET

I knew that the envelope was supposed to come. It contained payment for a certain job that I had done, and I was waiting impatiently for the money. I called the messenger who was



supposed to bring me the envelope, and I asked him when I could expect him.





# **Eyebrows**







And if some water happens to penetrate that first line of defense, so now we have eyelashes that naturally bow upwards, and those little droplets can be easily eliminated—in the blink of an eye. # Living With Appreciation R' Daniel Shasha

e of the mitzvos discussed in our parashah is rlah. It is forbidden to eat from any fruit tree during its first three years of growth. In the fourth year, the fruits have a special holy status and must be eaten in Yerushalayim or redeemed (19:23). Subsequently, it is permitted to eat the fruit from the tree. What is the reason behind this mitzvah?

The Ramban answers with something beautiful. He explains that the basis behind this mitzvah is appreciation! It is essential that we attribute the fact that we have delicious fruits to Hashem and praise Him first, before we benefit from them. Therefore, during the first three years, when the fruits are not yet so developed, we are for-

bidden from eating them, since we have not yet had the opportunity to praise Hashem for the best fruits. Only in the fourth year, when the crops have fully developed, we are commanded to take them to Yerushalayim or redeem them. This is a way of praising Hashem for our delicious new fruits and recognizing that all is a gift from Him, before we benefit from them!

We learn from the mitzvah of orlah that everything we have is such a precious gift from Hashem, and it is essential to express gratitude before benefiting. This is also the reason why we are commanded to recite berachos before we eat and drink. As Chazal teach, "it

is forbidden to benefit from this world until we recite a berachah" (Berachos 35a). Each bite we take from an apple, each sip of coffee we enjoy, is such a priceless gift. Reciting berachos is the perfect way of expressing appreciation, showing how thankful we are to our loving caring Father, for His unlim-

ited gifts. After all, Hashem could have just given us a simple pill which contains all the nutrients we need. In His great love, He gave us such a large variety of delicious foods and drinks, just to enjoy. Pausing and saying a berachah with a bit more thought can go a long way.

# **Chizuk Corner**

am writing this article a week before Pesach during the chodesh of geula, I am wondering if this article will still be applicable at all. You see the article that I am writing is about mesiras nefesh, and the one of the things that won't exist when Moshiach comes is this amazing trait of mesiras nefesh.

This is for two reasons. Firstly, when Moshiach comes there will be such an outpouring amount of love that will be coming from Hashem and from Klal Yisroel, so there will be no room for mesiras nefesh.

Let me give an example. Before Moshiach if there would be a tremendous storm, and despite the storm a Yid heads out to shul getting drenched, this is an act of mesiras nefesh. However, once Moshiach comes and we feel the love of Hashem and we feel the how precious it is to daven, it won't much of a challenge. Just like it wouldn't be a

challenge to pick up a hundred million dollars in such weather.

Furthermore, as the Rambam teaches us when Moshiach comes we will have a life full of menucha. We will have many servants and goodness will flow as the Rambam elaborates. In addition we won't have a Yetzer Hara..

The purpose of this article is to recognize how much mesiras nefesh that we do each and every day. In fact we do it so frequently, that we can take it for granted.

Story: Rav Yehuda Mandel Shlita was once speaking with a couple over the phone. They had called Rav Yehuda with regards to two job opportunities that came their way.

The wife explained to Rav Yehuda that one job had more opportunity with her paycheck, while the other one was less lucrative but more ehrlich.

During their discussion the wife mentioned that in truth there was another amazing paying job but wasn't up to her standards of tzniyus. Rabbi Mandel sensed that this woman didn't appreciate the great sacrifice that she did.

Rabbi Mandel told her "One second! Do you realize what a sacrifice you did for Hashem by turning down that job?" There was a moment and silence and the woman acknowledged it.

At that point Rabbi Mandel gave her a heartfelt bracha that she should find the most amazing job ever. Sure enough with lightning speed against all odds she got a fantastic job that had all the advantages.

Rav Mandel explained to his talmidim that despite the fact that she was moser nefesh for Hashem, she didn't have the proper zechus. That's because she didn't fully appreciate the fact that she was moser nefesh for Hashem.

Mesiras nefesh is an act that shows our great love that we have for Hashem, and we would like to point out how many of us do it each day throughout the day. Let's begin.

Our children - As we mentioned in previous articles taking care of our children is a tremendous act of meiras nefesh. These children are Hashem's children as well and therefore, taking care of our children by day and night is a great constant sacrifice for Hashem.

The workforce - Many people work many difficult hours to feed their families, who are Hashem's children as we explained. This is an act of mesiras nefesh.

Our phones - If one has a device for business or other, and installs a filter which slows the phone down and limits the capabilities, this is a huge sacrifice.

If someone gives up his device (or doesn't purchases it at the beginning) he is walking around throughout his days full of mesiras nefesh. Mi kiamcha Yisroel.

Shacharis - Many people wake up in the wee hours of the morning to daven. Many people wake up even earlier to learn before davening (tribute to Kollel Ohr Shmuel). It's literally mind boggling. We should

be full of joy as we are bringing Hashem such a nachas ruach.

Mincha - Each day right in the middle of a hectic work day, people drop whatever they are doing and head to the Shul to connect to their loving creator and sustainer - Hashem. It's fascinating if you think about it.

Maariv - Despite an exhausting day and we are ready to head to our bed, we go to Shul to reconnect to Hashem once again. Truthfully, one can daven at home, but Yisroel are ke-

doshim and they go to Shul to daven Maariv to bring Hashem a nachas ruach.

In general, tefillah is an expression of mesiras nefesh, because the act of focusing one's mind on Hashem and nothing else takes a great deal of mesiras nefesh.

Learning Torah - Yidden everywhere make time to learn in the morning and at night. Many working people sneak some time in middle of their hectic day. This is mesiras nefesh to be connected to the Torah and Hashem.

Many Bachurim and Yungerleit learn all day with intensity as they delve into the depth of the Gemara or Halacha. Many don't eat much as they are intensely connected to the Torah. They disconnect from world pleasures. This is the ultimate mesiras nefesh.

Tznius – Although many people may take it for granted, it is truly mesiras nefesh for a woman living in 5784 to dress appropriately, especially in the summer. It's no wonder that Chazal say that the Geulah will come in the zechus of the nashim.

All of the above are a just a few example how a Yid's days are packed with mesiras nefesh for Hashem.

Yes Klal Yisroel is wonderful and getting ready for Moshiach. Let's grab as many diamonds and we will take these diamonds with us to Yerushalayim to reap the benefits of all the sacrifices that we have done throughout the Galus for our loving Father.

When Moshiach comes we will appreciate even more all our sacrifices and the entire world will praise Hashem for all the Chessed that He will bestow us. As it says "Hallelu es Hashem kol goyim etc. ki gavar aleinu chasdo", very very soon Amen.

id you ever wonder what A Star Teacher means? What is the meaning of that word "star?"

UNDERRATED - Some will tell you that people tend to underrate educators in their service that they offer. Just like the stars are seemingly tiny, but in reality, they are enormous, and way brighter than the sun. Same goes for teachers.

GLOW-IN-THE-DARK - Others will say, "Rebbes are like the stars that shine only at night. Only Chas V'Shaloim in the seemingly darkness of tough times, and trying situations with the education of challenging children, that's when people suddenly realize what the Rebbes are really doing for their children.

"BEYOND - ALL"- A more positive line will be "Rebbes are unreachable and Chashuv and above all, like the stars"!

There is Rashi that quotes a Chazal that uses the same analogy of stars, regarding Hashem's love towards the Shevatim, that He Shows in the Toirah at the beginning of Parshas Shmois. Rashi says there "To let it be known, His love towards them [the Shevatim], that they are like the stars, which Hashem brings out and in, with a counting, and with [calling] their names". Rashi then quotes a Pasuk from the Sefer Yeshaya, to prove this.

I always wondered what was the meaning in those words of Chazal. We all understand why Hashem loves Tzaddikim, but why does Hashem love the stars, more than all His other creations? We don't find anywhere that Hashem calls each and every one of other created bodies, with a name and with a counting. I've asked many Talmidei Chachamim, and searched Seforim for an answer, but I haven't found any answer to this ques-

I have an idea which may be an answer to this question.

Hashem's Ratzoin to create this world was because of two reasons:

#1 - To Bestow His Goodness to others.

#2 - To have people create a Dira B'tachtonim, a Place of Dwelling, for His Holiness, in a mundane world.

There are Seforim that tie both reasons together. By the means of Hashem Bestowing His Goodness to this world, people will thank, appreciate, and connect to Hashem, down here in all situations. Thereby they'll bring the realization of Hashem's Presence, and Goodness, in



all situations, regardless where, and in what, they find themselves. By doing that, they'll be Zoiche to a much greater Goodness from Hashem, to the everlasting Schar in Oilam Habbah!

Hashem set up this world in a form of sending down His Shefa through the Mazalois, which are seen as sets of stars. Most of the world receives their Shefa in this way, except for the B'nai Yisroel who aren't bound to the Mazalois, and they can receive their Shefa directly from Hashem. By the means of their Tefilois, and Maasim Toivim, they merit Shefa straight from Hashem!

My idea is that Hashem loves the stars since He sends His Goodness to this world through them (so to speak). This is Hashem's "Derech Hatoiv L'Heitiv"! He Does this with using the stars, so He therefore loves the stars!

The Yidden receive their Shefa by their

davening, and Maasim Toivim, so they are the ones who Hashem loves, for bringing forth into this world His Shefa Toiv, and Goodness, to them and to others, by the means of their good deeds.

Hashem therefore loves the YIDDEN TZADDIKIM in the same way that He loves the stars!

Now we go to the Melamdei Tinoikois, who by teaching Toirah, bring forth the merit, for life and Everlasting Goodness, for their Talmidim, and for others. That'll be in Oilam Habah-The World To Come, which will last forever! SO OF-COURSE THEY'RE LIKE THE STARS!

The Pasuk refers to them as stars, Ka'Kochavim L'oilum Vaed-Like stars, but FOREVER!

We now have a new understanding of the term "A Star Teacher"!

This Purim in the second Adar, I noticed from afar, (it was actually up close) A Rebbe well known as a superstar, delivering Mishloiach Manois not with his own motorcar, nor from a Rent-A-Car, but get this. . . by hanging them from his bike's handlebar! Now this Rebbe can teach a few-hour seminar, with all his teaching repertoire, he's a Rebbe with a capital "R", teaching Toirah B'taharah as a clean reservoir, A real star, way above par, more Chashuv by far, than most others are. Yet with no car, driving on the street tar, all he needed was his bike's bar, and his feelings this didn't at all char, and his heart bears no scar. The father assumed that the rebbi was giving him the standard introduction before he dropped the bomb on



what Shlomie was really like, but the rebbi just continued praising Shlomie to no end.

Understandably, the father was shocked. "Is he sure that he's talking about my son?" the father thought. "I hadn't known this about him. All I know about him is that he is such a troublemaker."

"Are you sure you have the right Shlomie?" the father asked the rebbi.

"Of course," the rebbi replied. "Shlomie is my pride student."

Well, the father was assured that there was no mistake, and thus he went home very happy to have been spared the embarrassment he had been expecting. But what made him even happier was the fact that the son he thought was a failure was essentially succeeding. By far, this was more exciting than anything else.

R' Chatzkel replied with sharp words: "This generation has a sickness. No one praises anyone else. People don't express to each other how they are respected. The only time they do so is by a sheva brachos. And now you're coming to uproot that too? It is the only thing left over from the days in which compliments were given freely, and we must not get rid of it."

From the words of R' Chatzkel, we see a powerful thing. We need inner pride, and he was not going to let it go, however much it may have been over-exaggerated when delivered.

## **OVERCOMING CHALLENGES**

An ordinary-looking fellow in Boro Park was super successful in sh'miras einayim, guarding his eyes. His success was out of the norm, and this envied his friend. "Do you perhaps have no yetzer hara," the friend asked him, "allowing you to withstand this challenge? How do you succeed to reach such milestones against such a strong yetzer hara?"



"No," the man responded. "That is not the case. I have a yetzer hara."

"Do you perhaps have a weaker yetzer hara, allowing you to withstand the challenge?"

"No," he confirmed. "I have an ordinary yetzer hara like any other person. I have the same challenges that everyone has. Sometimes it's easier, and sometimes it's very hard." "So, how do you succeed in such an outstanding way?"

"Although that drunk bachur was clueless as to what he'd told me the very next day, nonetheless, his inspiration stayed with me all this time, reminding me who I am and preventing me from any downfalls."

More Than Meets the Eye

odern science has taught us that there is far more to the physical world than we can see, but scientists were not always so knowledgeable. Take, for instance, the case of Ignaz Sem-



melweiss, a German physician in the mid-nineteenth century who noticed that patients appeared to be contracting deadly diseases after being examined by doctors who had handled cadavers. Semmelweiss began insisting that medical interns wash their hands after performing autopsies, and the result was an immediate, sharp decline in the incidence of fatal illnesses among their patients.

Semmelweiss's colleagues, however, refused to accept his explanation for the transmission of disease. Medical science had yet to recognize the existence of germs too small for the eye to see, and doctors felt that diseases could be attributed to a variety of factors. Physicians took umbrage at the suggestion that they were somehow transferring diseases due to the failure to wash their hands, and Semmelweiss was ridiculed, lost his position, and was ultimate-

ly confined to an asylum, where he died. Years later, medical science recognized that Semmelweiss had actually been ahead of his time.

As Jews, we should be well aware of the fact that far more exists in the world than our physical eyes can see. The Ramban speaks of "the accursed Greek and his wicked students, who believe only in what their eyes see." We must recognize that what is visible to us is only

a tiny fraction of what actually exists — and just as the physical world itself contains many microscopic elements that we cannot observe, there is also a vast spiritual dimension that is beyond our ability to perceive.



Maintaining this aware-

ness, however, is no small feat. The popular adages that "seeing is believing" and "a picture is worth a thousand words" reflect the power that our visual input wields over our perceptions. We learn about spiritual realities, about kedushah and tumah, about malachim and Olam Haba, but our knowledge of these phenomena is often buried under an onslaught of sensory input from the material world. We may know about the spiritual realm, but we see the physical with our own eyes. How can we train ourselves to see past the material trappings of this world?

We are all trained from the earliest age to cover our eyes when we recite the first pasuk of Kerias Shema. The Chasam Sofer (in Parashas Behaaloscha) explains that every human being is equipped with spiritual "eyes" that enable him to perceive things that are holy and spiritual in nature, but his physical "eyes," with their view of the world, create a barri-

er that blocks those spiritual perceptions. The way to open one's spiritual "eyes" is to turn off, even for a brief moment, the input from one's physical sense of sight, thus creating a heightened awareness of ruchniyus.

Thus, we find that after being blinded in one eye by Hashem, the wicked Bilam proclaimed (Bamidbar 24:3-4), "The words of the man whose eye is closed; the words of he who hears the

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sayings of G-d." Bilam linked his ability to "hear" the words of Hashem with his inability to see because, as the Kli Yakar explains, "The vision of the heart and the ordinary vision of the eyes contradict each other; when one is strong, the other will be weakened."

In today's day and age, we are constantly faced with the nisayon of using our sense of sight properly. The modern world is filled with improper sights, and we are often called upon to close our eyes, quite literally, in order to avoid seeing images that may leave permanent stains on our souls. These nisyonos can be difficult, even overwhelming, but it is incumbent on us to keep in mind that when we divert our gazes from the physical world, we actually gain even greater vision — we gain the ability to perceive the spiritual world.

A frum businessman, Reb Leizer (name changed), was once approached by his excited non-Jewish partner, who had a story to share. "I recently no-

ticed another Orthodox Jew in a public place," the partner told Reb Leizer, "and there were some sights passing by that I knew you would consider inappropriate. I knew from my experience with you that an Orthodox Jew would try to avoid looking at these things, and I watched that man to see how he would react. Sure enough, whenever something inappropriate passed by, the man placed a book in front of his face until he was sure that it was gone!"


This story is a credit to that anonymous Jew whom the non-Jew observed, but it is also a credit to Reb Leizer himself. Clearly, Reb Leizer has given his partner the impression that Jews live with a different reality, in which their behavior is not governed exclusively by that which is visible.

As Jews, we believe in an entire world that cannot be seen with our human eyes. Let us remember that the hidden world will become much more "visible" to us when we exercise caution with the use of our sense of sight.

That has to be your goal and your focus and your life's career!


# Gold Mines

# Thank Him Through Staying Healthy

Recently I had the zechus to drive Rav Shimon Galai shlit" a to Kiryat Sefer for Shabbos. During the ride he mentioned that for over 50 years he has been on a very healthy diet and way of living. He did not make a big deal out of it, but I understood that he was saying that taking care of our health is a good *hishtadlus* for being able to serve Hashem properly. Indeed, the Rambam (*Hilchos De'os* 4:1,14) and *Tur* (cited by *Mishnah Berurah* 155:11) write that we have a mitzvah to take care of our health through eating properly and exercising so that we will be healthy and strong to do the *mitzvos* of Hashem.



I would like to give an additional reason to watch our health. Dovid Hamelech said (Tehillim 35:10) כל עצמותי תאמרנה ד' מי כמוך – All my bones shall say: Hashem, who is like You? The Midrash (Yalkut Shemoni Tehillim 623) explains that Dovid was saying "I will praise You with every limb and perform mitzvos with each one!" Perhaps we can take this a step further. We have mentioned many times that when we say Asher Yatzar we are thanking Hashem for a healthy body. However, one of the greatest ways to show appreciation for a present is to take care of it! Hashem has granted us with an abundance of delicious and scrumptious foods, through which we can feel His love and come closer to Him. But at the same time, too much good is not good. So, don't just skip that extra piece of cake so that you will fit into the suit you bought for Pesach. Think how you want to show Hashem appreciation for the

healthy body He gave you through trying to stay healthy! We IY"H have many years ahead of us to serve Him, and avoiding an excess of fatty, processed foods will help us to do so without needing doctor visits, operations, and hospitalizations.

Hashem has also blessed our generation with many amenities and conveniences that make our lives comfortable and easy, without the need

for too much physical exertion. One story she mentioned was about a childless woman who had a child after 20 years after she started to learn two Halachos a day. The Rebbetzin also told a woman, who had two older single daughters, to learn two halachos each day and shortly afterwards they both became engaged. In another story, the Rebbetzin told a family to learn it, and their mother, who had a malignant growth, totally recovered!

Sometime after reading this letter, I started telling others to learn the Halachos and many people reported the miracles Hashem did for them. This showed me that it is not just a Segulah; it's a method to accomplish what nothing else can. Imagine the impact one will have on his children when they witness their parents learning it. Hashem helps people in what they need.

After hearing many stories, my wife asked me, "How come it works for everyone and not for us? We have three children in shidduchim for years and nothing has happened with them, despite your learning the two daily Halachos."

I told her it was because she was not learning it. She began learning it, and after about six weeks, our second son became engaged. About three weeks later, our oldest son became engaged as well. We were in shock!

Before the Vort of my oldest son, someone in my yeshiva suggested that a brother of his brother-in-law might be a good match for our daughter. At this point our daughter was dating for close to three years. About six weeks later they became engaged. Before making our first wedding, we had three children engaged! It was a miracle from Hashem. (I personally heard over 400 shidduchim stories, even one who was over 50 years old!)

With Siyata D'Shmaya, I have accumulated many miraculous stories of people who didn't have children for many years and stories of people who have recovered from major illnesses. I have a story of a woman who called me up and told me that she and her husband have been doing it for 30 years and they have 14 children, all married without issues in shidduchim. One Rebbi had his 18,000 tax debt forgiven by the government, another person's daughter's life was saved, and at least four people were saved from terrible car accidents. One experienced a miraculous birth that shocked even the top heart specialist, and another saw a difficult child that made a great turnaround. Anyone can see the great miracles of Hashem.

R' Isser Zalman Meltzer zt"I wrote that if a person does not learn the laws on a regular basis, even if he had learned them before, he cannot guard himself properly against speaking Lashon Hara. One who learns them regularly becomes a greater and better person and receives extra help from Hashem. The Chofetz Chaim quotes from the Yerushalmi, that the sin of Lashon Hara is equal to all sins combined; so if one is careful he gets tremendous merit. Dovid Hamelech himself tells us in Tehillim that someone who wants life should guard himself from Lashon Hara.

Continued from page 22 The Zohar teaches that when we say a berachah with kavanah, we will be showered with an abundance of blessing. There are many stories of those who undertook to say berachos with more kavanah and saw yeshuos: the following beautiful excerpt is just one example.

A man who suffered greatly from a severe illness went to discuss his predicament with the Biala Rebbe. "I am really suffering", he said: "each day I am coughing so much, life has just gotten so hard." These words had barely come out of his mouth when he had another big coughing fit. After it passed, he tearfully begged the Rebbe for advice which could help heal him. "This is what I recommend," the Rebbe said caringly. "Accept upon yourself to recite berachos, with more kavanah. Before you recite a berachah, pause and contemplate that you are standing in front of Hashem. Then try to concentrate on the meaning of the words: the basic translation is enough."

He resolved to do this and from then onwards, his berachos were said slowly and intently. The next time he went for an appointment, the doctor was in shock! Tests revealed that his severe condition had completely

ashem created us with a special internal passage from our throat to our nose to enable us to smell our food even after it enters our mouth. If not for this internal passage, we would not be able to smell our food at all after it enters our mouth. Because our lips seal our mouth shut. Our lips seal so tightly that it makes the cavity of our mouth air tight and waterproof, nothing goes in our mouth and nothing goes out. So if we just relied on the external opening of our nose, we would not be able to smell anything after we close our mouth to chew.

That is why the internal passage is so important for our smell and the taste of our food – which is contingent on the smell.

When we chew our food we receive more taste from it. There are two reasons for this; one is because the crushed, broken food covers a larger area in our mouth which gives it more contact and access to numerous taste buds. An additional reason is that chewing releases molecules that travel to our smell receptors in our nose. Chewing helps us taste and chewing helps us smell.

The more we chew, the more we receive enjoyment from what we are eating. If Hashem would not have created us with an internal passage to our sense of smell then all of the molecules of smell that get released when we chew, would not benefit us and give us enjoyment.

This wondrous system that Hashem set up is not only a boost for our enjoyment; it is also very beneficial for our health. We eat to sustain and nourish our body; an important part of healthy eating is to chew our food thoroughly. Food that is not sufficiently chewed does not digest

well. Eating too fast can cause feelings of bloating, heart burn, cramps and other ailments.

## Illuminating Words of Chazal


"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Ray Yehuda Mandel

Question: The last mishnah in Kidushin talks about how when one has a job, if he is sick or old and can't work, he dies from starvation; however, someone who learns, the Torah provides for him etc..

We hear on 'A Life with Bitachon' that parnasah is not from the job, only from Hashem, and here it seems the Mishnah is teaching us the opposite?

In addition, is the mishnah telling everyone who works to be scared and worried that one day their parnasah will fail and they will die from starvation?

In addition we say in benching and in Ashrei that Hashem provides for everyone and takes care of everyone. Here the mishna seems to be saying that if a person gets sick or old, Hashem Who is the ultimate Rachum just lets him die from starvation. How can this be?



Another question we have to answer is that the pasuk in Ashrei is also another shver kasha. Poseich es yadecha umasbia Ichol chair ratzon, Hashem gives food to everybody? We know there are third-world countries where there are people walking in the street and they just die from starvation. So the pasuk in Ashrei seems to be contradicting the metzius. The metzius shows us that people are dying from starvation. So what's going on? How do we understand this?

Furthermore, we always hear on A Life With Bitachon that the job is not what brings in parnassa anyway. So what's it saying in Kiddushin that it has to do with your job, if you don't have a job a person can die? Actually, mineihu bei, in the Mishna itself it says that when it comes to looking for a job, just pick any job because it makes no difference what job you do, it will have all the same results.

Additionally, in bentching, we always say tamid lo chasar lanu, so we thank Hashem. Hashem never ever made it that we were lacking any food! So every single person says in bentching tamid lo chasar lanu. So the question is, what does this mean? We do find people who are hungry and starving?

Since we have a lot of questions and a lot of confusion and a lot of stiras and a lot of contradictions, we're going to explain how everything goes together. The way it works is like this. Of course there's no such thing that because somebody was too weak to work now he's going to die from starvation. Such a thing is impossible! It's not the job that brings in parnassa, it's Hashem. What the Mishna is coming to tell you is that if a person lives al pi derecho hateva, if a person lives thinking that it's his job that's giving him his parnassa, so if it was nigzar on Rosh Hashana that he'll have food for ninety years of his life, do you know what Hashem is going to do? At age ninety Hashem is going to make him sick and he's not going to be able to work anymore, and then he'll die.

Now, at the same time we all know that it doesn't have to be like that either, because we see people who are too sick to work and Hashem supplies them anyway. But all kall panim, this is called b'ofen teva. Teva says that if a person is too shvach, in the olden days that's the way it worked. Nowadays it doesn't really work like that anymore. Nowadays where we live we have organizations and government programs, so the concept that the Mishna is talking about doesn't even really apply to us now nowadays. In the olden days, or in third-world countries, there were no government programs and there were no organizations, so if a person didn't have any money he could die from starvation. That's the way it worked in the olden days.



Let's say Hashem says that a person should live till he's ninety years old, so at ninety he's going to become sick and it's going to look bderech hateva he can't work and because he can't work, now he's going to die. And if you ask somebody why did he die, they'll tell you because he couldn't work and therefore he died from starvation. That's the way it looks, cause and effect. Really, it's exactly the opposite! Because it was nigzar on Rosh Hashana he should live for ninety years, so at year ninety, Hashem does everything al pi teva, He plays hide and seek, so Hashem makes it look like, okay ninety years old someone is sick and can't work so he'll die. Really it's the opposite way around.

However, comes along Reb Meir and says, even if it was nigzar for someone to live until ninety, but with Torah – ki heim chayeinu vorech yameinu! – when we learn Torah that gives arichus yamim. So now he'll live until 100 years old. Takea look at our gedolei hador, it's unbelievable! R' Aharon Leib Steinman and he ate mamash nothing, no exercise, and he lived arichus yamim! The doctors said about R' Aharon Leib that it makes no sense that he's living, they can't even explain it al pi teva. So how was he living? The teretz is the Torah gave him arichus yamim!

R' Elyashiv also. At age forty the doctors said it's impossible for him to live a couple more weeks because his heart was working less than half of how a normal heart works, and R' Elyashiv lived more than all those doctors. So many gedolim lived into the hundreds. R' Aharon Leib, R' Shach... These were yidden who didn't do any exercise, didn't take care, they didn't have all that we have, and they still had strength. How did they live? The teretz is ki heim chayeinu vorech yameinu - the Torah is what gives a person arichus yamim!

So Reb Meir is saying that even though at age ninety he's supposed to die, but because he's learning Torah, he's going to have arichus yamim, he's going to live for an extra ten more years. So that explains the

Mishna in Kiddushin. That redecides how long a person make it al pi that day he'll to support himself and al pi to die because of his parnas-At the same time Reb Meir is a zechus that overcomes the yamim.

The answer is the same exact type of answer. What happens in Ashrei is Hashem says how long a person is going to live. A person is supposed to live a certain amount of years, that's even without bitachon. Let's say a person is supposed to live fifty years, Hashem will give him food for fifty years. Now if a person dies from starvation, that means now he's supposed to die.

Ah, the possuk in Ashrei says something to do with bitachon. You're right, because with bitchon, let's say he was supposed to die at ninety years old so Hashem will give him food for ninety years, but with bitachon he'll live an extra ten years, he'll live till 100 years.

So that's the pesukim in Ashrei. With bitachon, you'll live 100 years, without bitachon he'll live the regular ninety years he was supposed to live.

Bentching also – tamid lo chasar lanu – Hashem never lacked us. But we do see people lacking? The teretz is because as long as we're supposed to be living Hashem will give us everything we need.

So at the end of the day, the answers to all these question is that it looks like people die of starvation, but really that's not true, it's the other way around. Zechus HaTorah will give you arichus yamim and zechus of bitachon, even afilu rasha and he doesn't have any Torah or mitzvos – bitachon itself will give a person arichus yamim and will give him food even if he's not deserving.

## Bitachon Perspective

Q. My father is not on speaking terms with one of my brothers. It breaks my heart to see that my father and brother are not on speaking terms. What's the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

**A.** Throughout our existence in Olam Hazeh, we must adopt the mentality that the only ones who truly exist are 'Hashem and I', and everyone else in our lives are backdrop. Hashem placed them in our lives to test us: are we going to utilize them in a way that brings us closer to Hashem or further from Him.

When we see seemingly unfortunate things happening to people who are dear to us, Hashem is testing us to see whether we will be knocked off-balance. Or are we going to retain our equilibrium knowing that Hashem is perfect, and He is acting out of love and rachmanus towards each and every person, although we may not see how.

When you understand that the only true reality is you and Hashem, you won't take your family situation to heart in a negative way. Instead, you will view your family members as actors in Hashem's play who are staged to test your reaction. And you'll utilize your circumstances to strengthen your belief that Hashem is perfect and He's running a perfect world.

Now, this that we affirm that whatever is happening is part of Hashem's perfect plan, is only in regards to the past and present. However, regarding the future, you should say, 'Hakadosh Baruch Hu, You are in charge of emotions and You could cause there to be shalom. You can make it that two people who are not on speaking terms, will decide to make peace with each other, and shalom will be restored'.

Q. Unfortunately, my parents do not get along. Every day I witness my parents arguing and saying hurtful things to each other. How can I remain a healthy child while experiencing such behavior every day?

**A.** Just like you understand that in order to stay safe, you must never get involved in your parents' argument on a physical level. Similarly, in order to stay emotionally sheltered, you should train yourself not to get involved on an emotional level as well.

One exercise you can do not to take your situation to heart, is to realize that Hashem put each person in his specific situation because that is what he needs for his individual tikkun haneshama.

All the trauma you've experienced until now by living with parents who did not get along is what your neshama needs.

For the future, your avodah is to do exer-

cises not to be nispoel from what you see.

When you see your parents quarreling, imagine that you are watching a puppet show. They are just actors in the play that was staged by your loving and caring father Hakadosh Baruch Hu, because this is what you need to experience.

The more you realize that your situation is tailored for you by Hakadosh Baruch Hu, the more you will see how things will turn out in the most beautiful manner. And any pain that you are experiencing serves as a kapparah for your aveiros.

Furthermore, don't be satisfied by merely making peace with your situation, rather go the next step and 'turn it into a business'

Utilize your experience as a lifelong lesson how important it is to get along with other people.

Make it your mission to show the world what it means to interact with others in a manner of darkei no'am. When you are with other people, make it your business to be extra warm and friendly. By doing this, you are utilizing a potential setback as a springboard to become a truly accomplished and important person

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#### **Child Accepted to Cheder**



We were warned that getting our son into a local Cheder will be a challenge and to get him into a great

school would be nearly impossible. So, about a year ago, we went to our Rav who told us which two schools would be best for us and our son. We were denied a place as both schools did not have enough space for us. When this school year started and we

still didn't have a Cheder (or playgroup) for our son, the nearly nine months of waiting nearly crushed our hopes. Not having anything else to lose, I sponsored a Shiur in a kollel in Eretz Yisroel, "the second Seder Kollel" as a Z'chus for my son to be able to get into the right Cheder and to learn Torah on the highest level. That was on a Thursday. Friday afternoon, my choveshe vet low key father-in-law shlita met this Menahel after an early mincha and after talking with him on our behalf for only a few minutes, the menahel gave us a commitment that my son can go to his Cheder the following year! #### **Baruch Shomea Tefila!**


I have a story of Hashgacha Pratis I would like to share with The Spring Hill Times readers.

Thank you for this beautiful paper that we can publicize Kevod Shamayim Berabim!!


