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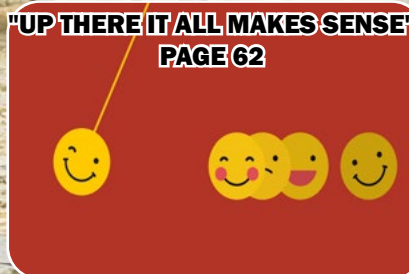

SAVED BY HASHEM



I was a bochor, and on my way to Flatbush from Monsey one Thursday night. I don't remember if I was going to a Modzitzer yahrtzeit tisch or Rav Miller's Thursday night shiur, but I know it was one of those two. I was flying down the FDR Drive, in a hurry to get there on time. My speed was around 70 mph, and I was amazed that there was no traffic so far on my trip. I really disliked traffic with a passion, and hoped with all intensity to avoid it. Things were going unexpectedly smoothly, and I was very happy about. I davened that it would last and maybe I'd actually get there on time...

After a short while of light-speed, traffic-free race-car driving, I saw

I was quickly approaching the dreaded FDR parking lot. There was no alternate route that I knew of, and it was before GPS days, so I just lined up with everyone else in a stop-and-go traffic jam. Then, suddenly, after about a minute or so of driving 1 mile an hour, the front of my car suddenly popped up about a foot and crashed back down. After that, the car wouldn't drive. The gas revved, but the wheels didn't go anymore. I rolled into a safe spot on the side of the highway where the road turned to the right, near the Tri-Borough Bridge (now the RFK Bridge) exit, and coasted to a stop, beside the busy stop-and-go FDR wilderness. I got out of the car, went around to the front, looked at the tires, and, not knowing anything about cars, got back into the car and asked Ha-shem to keep me safe from who knows who and what I was stuck in the middle of. Then I called AAA, ordered a tow, and waited (It was amazing how many Yidden stopped to ask me if I needed help).

Finally, the tow truck came, and the guy agreed to give me a ride back to my dorm, and then he dropped off the car at my mechanic. I was very annoyed to have missed the yahrtzeit tisch (or Rav Miller, tztz"l), and I had no idea what was with my car and how much it would cost to fix. I went to bed.

The next day, after morning seder, I called the mechanic and briefed him on my car that was brought in during the middle of the night. He said he'd check it out. After afternoon seder, I called him back, anxious to know what in the world happened to my car. What he told me was incredible.

He said, "Do you remember a few months ago, when I told you that you had a hole in the front axle?"

"Uh- Yes," I responded. I forgot to fix it.

"You didn't get it fixed, did you?"

"Uh- no. I forgot about that." Uh-oh....

"Well, the front end of your car popped up because the axle broke in half, and it pole-vaulted into the ground and popped the car up."

"Wow. How much will that cost to fix?"

"Not worth it. Get a new car."

"Uh," that was a shock. Then I thought for a second, and asked, "What would've happened if the axle would've broken while I was going 70 mph?"

"We'll, that's when the entire car pops up and goes flying 10-20 feet into the air, you spin around a few

times, come crashing down onto somebody, and people get killed..."

"Wow."

Only a minute before the car broke, I actually was flying down the FDR at 70 mph! I had only been in traffic for a minute- Hashem literally saved my life with the traffic! Ma-mish a nes!

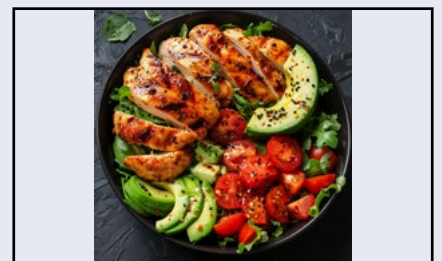

In Parshas Devorim, Moshe gathered the Bnei Yisroel. He told them not to be afraid as they go to conquer Eretz Yisroel. Moshe reviewed what happened to Bnei Yisroel during their years in the midbar. Here are a few of them: He mentioned that he appointed Shoftim (judges) to help him judge the yidden. He reminded the yidden about when they won against Sichon and Og, of the spies they sent to Eretz Yisroel and of how they no longer wanted to move there after hearing their negative report. He told Yehoshua, the next leader of the yidden, not to be afraid of any enemies.

Rav Paysach Krohn shared that a famous professional (whose name he shared publicly with permission) went to HaGaon HaRav Yosef Shalom Elyashiv ZITL and watched him learning with incredible devotion and legendary Hasmada. This professional then began to cry, and said to Rav Elyashiv, "I tried so hard for years, but I simply do not know how to learn. I can't even understand a line of Gemara! How I wish I could be learning day and night and understanding the meaning of the Gemara's timeless words!"

R' Elyashiv replied (translated from Yiddish), "Your 'Yiddeshe Treirin' 'Jewish tears' are worth more than all of my learning!" Meaning your crying that you can't learn is so precious and valuable to Hashem! Your desire and Ratzon that you wish you could learn is Kodesh Kodoshim. This professional shared that he felt so valuable and important after hearing those words directly from R' Elyashiv! It literally changed his life! He now learns as much as he could and appreciates how super special every word of his learning is!

HaGaon Rav Aharon Leib Shteinman ZITL once asked a bachur who had gone off the Derech and was scheduled to marry an אינו יהודי girl if he had ever had any moments of תשובה thoughts of Teshuva over the past few years. The Bachur responded that he had thought of Teshuva for a few minutes over the years. Rav Aharon Leib replied, "I

Rav Zilberstein asks, 'Why is making people happy enough to make a person a בני עולם הבא?'



He answers, quoting a Sefer from the previous generations, that the entire experience of Olam Haba is one of pure unadulterated Simcha, and real everlasting joy, experiencing the highest level of endless Simcha forever and ever. In this world, however, things are not perfect and we don't experience complete and total Simcha. These clowns were bringing people to a very high level of Simcha even in this world and they therefore deserve, מדה כנגד מדה, to receive the endless happiness and infinite Simcha of Olam Haba, and they therefore are בני עולם הבא.
