By thus passing up the opportunity to gain a financial bargain he succeeded in gaining a bargain of a mitzvah of helping a fellow Jew.

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

**Hints & Answers\* SHABBOS SHAILA**: The *Rama* (O.C. 262) writes: "One should get dressed in Shabbos clothes right after taking a bath on *erev* Shabbos. Doing that is an honor to Shabbos." **RHYME**: "heart" **RIDDLE**: 1. A rainbow. 2. Na'ama. 3. Shem. (Rashi comments that because Shem covered his father Noach with a garment, his descendants merited the mitzva tzitzis.) 4. Midrash tells that the pole which Haman was hung on came from the beam of Noach's ark.

When to put on Shabbos Clothes on Erev Shabbos



Akiva came home from yeshiva on a Friday afternoon, excited to get ready for Shabbos. He decided to take a shower right away, so that he would not rush into Shabbos.

Before going into the shower room, he asked his older brother Chaim: "Do you know where my Shabbos suit is?"

"I do," replied Chaim, "But why do you need it now?!"

"I want to put it on right after the shower," answered Akiva.

"But Shabbos, is only in four hours! You might get your suit dirty before Shabbos comes! Put your Shabbos suit about an hour or so before Shabbos." said Chaim.

Citing the holy writings of the *Gedolim* of previous generations, the *Sefas Emes* (Noach, 5635, איתא ד"ד) writes: "Noach's ark (תיבה) is every word (תיבה) of Torah and tefilla."

That means that every word of Torah and *tefilla* has the power to bring a salvation of a magnitude that Noach's ark brought.

If you'll keep that in mind when you *daven* and learn, you will treasure every word of your *tefilla* and Torah.

### Ask Around Your Shabbos Table


Which merit saved Noach from the flood? Rav Chaim Shmulevitz אל" points out even the fact that the Jewish nation would emerge from Noach was not enough to save him. Rather, says Rav Chaim, the only thing that was powerful enough to save Noach was און, as the verse says:

יה קנח קציני ה' - But Noach found favor in the eyes of Hashem.

Ask around your Shabbos table: What can a person do to gain הן in Hashem's eyes.

**An Answer:** In Sichos MusarRav Chaim Shmulevitz writes that one of the secrets of gaining  $\pi$  in Hashem's eyes is to be humble, as Shlomo HaMelech wrote in Mishlei (3:34):

אָם־לַלְצִים הָוּא־יָלִיץ וְלְצְנָיִים וְלָצְנָיִים יִתָּן־חָזָן - If [one goes] to the scoffers, he will scoff; but [if he goes] to the humble, he evokes grace.



The Torah reveals to us why the Generation of the Flood was destroyed: לְּבָרְקָלְאָה הָאָרֶץ הָמָט מְפְנֵיהֶם *for the earth has become full of robbery because of them.* The world became a place where people did not care for the well being of others! In the eyes of the Creator of the World, such a world lacks its purpose and essence. Therefore, the "father" of the new generation (i.e., Noach) needed to begin building the new world on the basis of הסד (kindness). Hence, Noach was given a critical task: for the entire year, day in and day out, he was to be constantly involved in doing הסד - namely, feeding the animals. Therefore, הסד is the foundation of the world that we live in!

You probably know that on erev Shabbos one should put on special clothes in honor of Shabbos. But did you know what you should do right after putting on Shabbos clothes? The *Shulchan Aruch* (O.C. 262:3) writes: "And [on erev Shabbos] one should put on nice clothes, and [then] <u>rejoice</u> from the fact that Shabbos is arriving."
