The most mundane things have become ways for us to cling to Hashem!

And now, specifically on this Shabbos, the Rav decided that he wanted shelishi, and he

asked to give me the maftir!

That's right – on that very Shabbos, when it was so important to me to get maftir l'ilui nishmas my mother, when I had given in to another person. I gave in, but in Shamayim they hadn't given in on my maftir. I was zocheh to carry out this important minhag and to give my mother in Shamayim double the nachas. This is not a one-time story.

One year on Rosh Hashanah, after I'd already arranged with the gaba'im which aliyah I was to receive, it turned out that another person was sure he was supposed to receive that aliyah. I gave in, and when I got to the shul in Ramat Gan, they gave me exactly the aliyah I had given up.

One never loses out from giving in!

very tight and it would be hard to make such a shopping trip right then.





Hashem's Wonderful & Incredible World

A plant-derived compound, created by Hashem, was shown in a recent study to kill strains of tuberculosis that were resistant to existing therapies. Baruch Hashem!

The compound was found in a plant native to North America, and was not only able to suppress dormant TB bacteria from resurfacing but also didn't damage the gut microbiome.

Tuberculosis is Hashem's second-leading killer of humans from an infectious disease worldwide, and has been developing resistance to many of the antibiotics previously used to treat it.

Caused by a species of bacteria that invades the respiratory system called Mycobacterium tuberculosis, it can also affect the heart, brain, and spinal column.

A new study published in the journal Anti-inflammatory Nutraceuticals and Chronic Diseases, found that Hashem's sanguinarine, a derivative of bloodroot, a wildflower found in North America, could combat multidrug-resistant tuberculosis (MRTB) after being genetically modified to reduce its natural toxicity.

TB is treated with multiple medications over a 6-month period, exposing the human organism to substantial weakening. By contrast, the sanguinarine selectively targeted the bacteria responsible for MRTB, leaving harmless and beneficial bacteria intact.

However, in its natural form, sanguinarine is toxic to human cells, so Dr. Jim Sun, senior author and assistant professor at the University of British Columbia's Department of Microbiology and Immunology, led a team to B'syata D'Shamya, genetically

reduce the toxicity of the phytochemical while increasing its potency as a tuberculosis killer.

This resulted in the creation of 35 new derivatives, two of which—BPD9 and BPD6—showed over 90% inhibition of 8 different forms of Mycobacterium tuberculosis, 3 that were particularly virulent, and 5 that were resistant to existing drugs.

"TB treatment takes six months because the bacteria can 'hibernate' in your lungs until reactivated. Most antibiotics work best against actively growing bacteria, but BPD9 seems to be able to stop dormant bacteria from coming back to life," explained Dr. Sun.

It took just 8 days to significantly reduce the quantity of MRTB and other TB strains in mice treated with BPD9, delighting the research team, who nonetheless say that more work needs to be done to lower the compounds' toxicity and conducting additional tests on drug-resistant strains of TB-causing bacteria.

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

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There is a lot going on with a simple sneeze; there is a sudden intake of air, chest muscles that are contracting and compressing the lungs to prepare to release the air and eyes that seal tightly shut. There is an additional fascinating action that takes place before a sneeze. We have to remember that many of the tiny germs and particles are quite strongly embedded in our noses and are not ready to move so fast. Even a powerful gust of air may not have the ability to dislodge them from where they are stuck. There are tiny microscopic hairs that are constantly moving and beating together to move the mucus from one place to another. It has been discovered that right before a sneeze the tiny hairs beat at a quicker pace than they usually beat. Perhaps this is in order to loosen the mucus and prepare it for the sneeze. When the powerful sneeze comes and clears out the nasal passage it will have a more efficient effect if the contents are loosened before. The movement of these microscopic hairs ensures that the strong wind of the sneeze will overpower the stickiness of the mucus and will accomplish its job to do an immediate cleanup and remove from the nasal passage everything there that has to be removed.

Let's take a closer look at the power that Hashem gave to a sneeze. When we sneeze and air gets shot out of the body, the traveling air can reach the unbelievable speed of 100 miles per hour. That is very fast, can you imagine if we would occasionally receive the ability to run that fast? There is nothing like that in the human body. Even a powerful cough can only reach around a half of that speed. As a result of the great speed and pressure of the sneeze - up to a 100,000 germs and particles get expelled from the nose. It is because there are so many particles and bacteria that have to leave that Hashem gave the sneeze such a powerful force. A cough, which does not have such a large number of things that it has to drive away - was not given the same force. A cough only expels up to 3,000 germs and particles - that is much less than the amount that the sneeze expels.

Just to bring out the wonder of the sneeze, if we were never exposed to it and we heard that there is a tribe in Africa that can suddenly breathe out so many germs from their bodies in one quick movement, everyone would marvel at the phenomena. But like so many of the Niflaos Haborei, we are used to it and take it for granted. Let us pay attention and appreciate this wonderful gift of the sneeze.


The Amazing Construction of the Honeybees Honeycomb (all done while in the dark!) Article 42

The distances from one cell wall to the other is 5.2 millimeters. The thickness (or should I say thinness) of each cell wall is just 0.073 of one millimeter, (with a tolerance of error of no more than 0.002 millimeter, which is really, really a tiny, tiny margin of error)! To understand these numbers a little better, we must know that one inch is a little over 25 millimeters, and .073 of one millimeter is about .003 of one inch. For a better perspective, an average sheet of copy paper is 0.1 of one millimeter, and the cell wall is .073 of one millimeter. Another way to grasp the thinness of .003 of an inch is to know that it is about the width of a human hair! What truly astounding precision! Economy in the use of building material is thus taken to the utmost limit. Human craftsmen could never do work of this nature without the use of special carpenter tools.

So, the question is, how can the bee shape the cells with such accuracy, without any tools? The answer is that Hashem put in to them built in "tools" that enable the job to get done. Firstly, the have special, very sensitive thick bristle hairs by their neck area (see picture 1 by the neck area). These bristles have tremendous sensitivity, and somehow it enables them to be able to detect the exact line of gravity. Meaning, it can tell what is an exactly flat line and it can tell by how many degrees something is not flat.

So, who needs a ruler when you can have such special built-in machinery!

FASCINATING? READ ON!

This point has been proven experimentally. These bristle hairs were put out of action by coating the bristles with a warm mixture of wax and rosin which hardened on cooling and by which they were completely immobilized. They took bees that were in a building stage of their life cycle and they all immediately gathered together, but nothing happened. They behaved like workmen whose tools have been confiscated: they did not work. Mind you, the gumming up of their neck bristles had clearly not impaired their general well-being, because the flying-out and food gathering activities of the hive were still normal. Nor was there a reduction in their production of wax, but the flakes just dropped to the ground, unused. In one such experiment which observed the bees over a whole months time, no more than three pitiful little cells with irregular walls were produced during the first two weeks. Then came a heat wave. The coating substance started to melt, and the tips of the sensory hairs reappeared. The result was that the bees, within the next four days, after producing some irregular transitional shapes, managed once more to build more or less normal shaped cells.

Now we need to figure out how the bees are able figure out the thickness of the cell walls. How could they keep to the exact thickness of 0.073 millimeters on a consistent basis? As was written in a scientific article, "one might think that the workers had received a thorough training in physical mechanics"! However, be-



cause of its complexity, only the basic principle involved will be briefly explained here.

The bee presses her mandibles (mouth part) against the cell wall with a very specific amount of pressure (see figure 1) and thereby it produces a very specific amount of indentation (See figure 2). When she withdraws her mandibles (figure 3), the wall bounces back to its original shape (figure 4). During this process, she is also examining that section of the wall with the tips of her antennae. These tips are endowed with special sensory organs. The antennae are placed onto the wall. Their antennae then registers the speed of the bouncing back movement of the wall. How quickly it will bounce back depends entirely on the thickness of the wall and that "bounce back" registers on the tips of the antennae, thereby giving it a very accurate reading of the thickness of the wall!!!

Let's now analyze this amazing feat. Firstly, they must have a built-in knowledge of EXACTLY how much to push the wall out, and a built-in knowledge of how quickly the wall must bounce back, in order to be able to calculate if it's the correct thickness or not! Where in the world did they learn this from? If, it's the incorrect thickness, it will either be faster or slower than the correct speed! If the wall is too thick, they will shave some wax off and then measure the bounce again. If it's too thin, it will add wax, and then measure it again. It's interesting to note that when the tips of the antennae were experimentally removed, this abruptly put an end to the bee's precision work. The bee still managed the basic architecture of the cells, but the walls got either too thin, or, more often, too thick.

So, the next question is – with what super precise, micro (or nano) electric superconductor chip can they measure the speed of the movement??? Do they have some internal speedometer in them? Do they have a radar machine that can clock the speed? How it can figure out the actual speed that it is bouncing back is absolutely amazing!! How is all this possible?!

How in the world can it know all the exact measurements that are needed, and then, how in the world can they actually go about to measure them?!

Hashem has made this most wonderous little bee with amazing abilities. We humans, that need all types of tools to measure these types of things are amazed, and baffled at what the little bee can accomplish without tools! ONLY our great CREATOR, Hashem, could give all these abilities to our little bee.

Bees are one of the many, many live machines that Hashem has put into His world to accomplish various purposes (like making honey and pollinating trees and plants). How wonderous are Your works Hashem!!!

They are all made with amazing wisdom!

But most times, when we purchase something new, our focus will almost immediately shift to some other object in a never-ending cycle of desire, purchase, and disappointment! Is there any point in spending your hard-earned money on something if it will not provide you with the satisfaction you want?

But there is hope: we can train ourselves to enjoy what we already have (and everyone—especially a Yid)—has a lot to enjoy. Through "strength-of-mind training," a person can develop himself to be able to focus on and enjoy what he presently has.

This concept is central to becoming happy. And since happiness is the purpose of life, it may be one of the most important things to learn!

It also might be the secret to the events that took place many years ago in a beautiful garden in the east of Eden, on the very first day of Adam and Chava's life.

The Garden Revisited

Let us revisit the events of that fateful first day in Gan Eden: Hashem had created a wonderful world and an even more amazing garden. As we saw earlier, Hashem's intention was to bestow happiness on Adam and Chava, and He didn't hold anything back. He gave the first couple everything

One fruit.




only focusing on what he can't have, he will not notice all the good he has. It will simply pass him by, unseen.

As the glorious lights of Tishrei fade away and we enter the cold winter months, we warm ourselves by the blazing fire that we kindled in our hearts during those special days. The light of these flames will help us navigate the darkness, and utilize these months to their utmost. What is the purpose of the winter months? The Vilna Gaon in *Megilas Esther* (2:12–13) says that the year is divided into two parts: During the winter months, we focus on ridding ourselves of cravings and desires – our *ta'avos*. The second half of the year, the summer months, is when we have the *Yomim Tovim* and the special *mitzvos aseh shehazman grammah*.

That being the case, now that we are beginning the winter, how should we take control of our *ta'avos*? The first step is to realize that it is the animalistic tendencies of our human body that urges us to chase materialistic pleasures. Our *heilegeh Neshama* is not interested in them and if we listen to it, we would realize that true happiness comes from serving Hashem. Yes, we should enjoy this world, but for the purpose of elevating it to spirituality. The greatest way to do so is to thank Hashem for all that He is giving us. In the month of Tishrei we understood clearly why we were sent to this world, and this truth is still in our minds. Let us now actually live that way, and thank Hashem for the greatest present of all – good health.

Let us take for example healthy kidneys. Rav Eliyahu Ristomy writes in his amazing sefer (*Oros Eliyahu*) that once his kidney function dropped majorly and his body was filled with an excess of 12 liters (over 3 gallons) of liquid! Then, miraculously, they started working again, and all the extra fluid drained out naturally. "Every day that everything works properly in our bodies we should make a *seudas Yom Tov*, as there is nothing as precious as being healthy and able to serve Hashem," he writes. Did you even know that such a thing that could happen to a person? In fact, more than 661,000 Americans have kidney failure, and of these, 468,000 are on dialysis. After one year, patients on dialysis have a 20–25 percent mortality rate, with a five-year mortality rate of 68 percent. Close to one hundred thousand people in the United States alone are waiting for a kidney, and more than four million worldwide. And you have two healthy kidneys, not one!

Here is a little bit about the two kidneys that Hashem in His infinite kindness created us with. Each one is approximately the size of a pear and weighs 150 grams (a third of a pound). Each day, they filter approximately 150 quarts of blood and expel the poisonous wastes through the urine. The kidneys contain more than 2 million microscopic filter tubes which, if laid out end to end would be 12 miles long! It is fascinating to note that even though our kidneys filter a tremendous amount of blood, there is no need to replace the filters. That would be necessary with other machines, yet our kidneys function without any parts needing to be replaced! Besides for the filtration of the blood, the kidneys also: Produce hormones that help control blood pressure, produce red blood cells, keep bones strong and healthy by manufacturing vitamin D, control potassium intake, monitor the amount of sugar and salt in the body, and monitor the amount of fluid in the body. We must be filled with gratitude to Hashem for working kidneys! People who need dialysis can tell you how much pain and suffering they endure.

So, take a moment before you say Asher Yatzar and realize what your kidneys are doing for you. It will be a different beracha!

vraham avinu encouraged many to believe in Hashem, despite the fact that avodah zarah was so rampant in his generation. How was he able to achieve this?

Our parashah tells us, 'he planted an eshel in Be'er Sheva and there he proclaimed the name of Hashem, G-D of the universe' (21:33).

Chazal (Sotah 10a) explain that he established a resting place for travelers. Some say that an eshel is an inn, others say that it is an orchard, but all agree that it was a place for tired travelers to get some respite.

When these travelers got a chance to rest and enjoy a hearty meal, they wouldn't leave before wanting to thank their generous host. After all, he really went out of his way to provide so many with the provisions they needed. However, Avraham exclaimed 'don't thank me, did you eat from my food? Really you ate from

Hashem's food; you need to thank Him!' He taught them how Hashem created the Universe and everything we enjoy, results from Him. In this way they would leave with the heightened awareness that everything is from Hashem and would offer praise and thanks before they left. In this manner, many left their idolatrous practices and instead believed in Hashem.

It should be noted that these guests were eager to express appreciation, and for sure wouldn't have left before saying thank you. However, Avraham was reminding them to look beyond the surface: you think I caused these beautiful trees to grow that you ate its fruit, did I create these animals from whom you partook of its meat etc. There is a Creator Who constantly sustains the world and gives life and sustenance to all beings. All benefit we have in this world result from Him so we must express our appreciation. This is why the verse specifies 'Hashem G-D of the Universe', since Avraham's hospitality helped all the passersby become aware that Hashem is in con-

trol of every aspect of the Universe

This lesson that Avraham taught his guests is really a model for all of us. As Chazal (Berachos 58a) teach "a good guest is one who says, 'look how much effort the host put in taking care of me, how much meat, wine and bread he gave to me. All that trouble that he went to was only for me!" The Maharsha explains that this refers to us. We are all guests in this world and need to strive to be 'good guests', appreciating all the incredible good that Hashem constantly gives us. There is a tendency to take the things we are used to for granted, such as air, food, water

etc. However, we need to try and appreciate how all these are gifts from Hashem and there are so many stages that occur to enable us to benefit from them.

For example, it is very easy to go to our local store and purchase a loaf of bread, without thinking too much about it. Yet, when we take a

step back and contemplate, we will be mesmerized by all the many factors that went into it. For example, the sun evaporates water from the ocean and then clouds are formed. These clouds move inland and then showers all our fields with rain. This helps cause the seeds of wheat to grow. The wheat is than ground into flour and mixed with water to form dough. It is than baked and eventually reaches the shelves in the store! What's more, all we need to do is to take it off the shelf and pay for it!

As Ben Zomah taught, Adam Harishon had to go through ten stages just until he was in a position to bake, such as plowing, planting and harvesting. Yet we wake up and everything is available! (Berachos 58a) We can learn from Avraham to see beyond the surface and attribute every benefit that we partake from, back to Hashem.

One way we can do this is by trying to have more Kavanah when we recite berachos, as we see in the following story:



One time Rabbi Yisrael Salanter was in a café in Paris with some of his students. He ordered a cup of water, but to his surprise it was an exorbitant sum. After politely asking the waiter why the price was so high, he was told 'by drinking in this café you are not just paying for your beverage, you are paying for the comfortable and attractive furniture, exquisite paintings, the impressive cups, the relaxing music and the spectacular garden.'

Rabbi Salanter told his students that he now gained a true awareness of the ideal way to express our gratitude to Hashem. It is essential that we try and focus on all the details that were involved. For example, when we say shehakol over a cup of water, we are not only thank-

ing Hashem for the water but for all the thousands of factors that went into it's production. Water vapor is evaporated into the air and condensates causing it to come down as rain. This is collected in a reservoir and then sent to factories. The water is than distilled and purified, to be fit for drinking. It is than sent through pipes to many different locations. Then at the ease of opening a tap, we could enjoy delicious clean water wherever we are! This aside from the many factors that resulted in creating the cup/bottle! Each time we say the words shehakol nihyeh bidvaroh, we are expressing our appreciation for the countless factors that went into this food/beverage. How incredible!

One evening a few months ago I was on my way back from Miami to New Jersey and my plane deplaned after takeoff - at the last second because of a broken part. I really had to get back to NJ for a meeting that was sche<mark>duled the</mark> next morning. Once we got off the plane, I went to a counter and explained the situation but they said "sorry there is no one who can help you at all and there are no more flights until tomorrow night". I asked them if I can board the plane to Boston that I noticed was leaving shortly (and then I would get a ride to New Jersey). They said "sorry that plane is ready for take-off and no one can board anymore". I asked to speak to someone else and they just said "sorry". Then, I decided I am not even seeing any people in front of me as it's ONLY Hashem in front of me. I said Hakol Yochol and asked an agent if I can go on the plane to

Boston and she said sure. However, the system didn't allow them to add me to that plane since that flight was about to take off. Three people starting working to get me on the flight that was about to take off. And I was just thinking it's not the people it's only Hashem. ONLY Hashem. Finally, they gave me a ticket. I ran to the gate that was a little further down and once again thought it's not them just Hashem. They let me on and as I sat down to catch my breath, the plane took off. Soon after a stewardess came over to ask what happened and why I came on so late. I explained that I was on a plane to New Jersey that got deplaned and that I needed to get back for a meeting so I am going to Boston. And I will be getting a ride from will Boston to New Jersey. She turned to me and said "that's impossible. You could not have left that plane and ten minutes later be on this plane that was about to take off!!!"

Nothing is impossible for Hashem. If you need something just turn to Him like a child to a father and say "you are my father this is what I need and I know You and only You Hashem can give it to me!"

- In the story above before we deplaned, I was concerned because as we started to take off there were really strange sounds on the plane and lights started flashing. We came right back down the runway and they were working for a while deciding if they would fix the issue and send us back off or deplane us. I was in touch with Rabbi Golumbeck and I asked him "should I daven to just take off and the plane would be perfect or should I daven to deplane. He said what will make you happier and calmer at this point? I said at this point the plane really didn't seem safe so I would rather deplane. So, I had Bitochon we would deplane within a few minutes and we did.
- Over Sukkos there was a 1.5 year who decided she did not want to eat. I sat her on my lap and sang songs of how she is the best and Hashem loves her. I had in mind only Hashem can make her eat. I put food on the spoon and then just put the spoon down knowing there was no pressure. I would just ask Hashem to help. She ate the cake, meat and cucumbers with no problem.


People call me regarding children that are "picky

right now with what they eat"- I rely on Hashem to help them eat more foods. I was thinking about how one of the things we do with food is a Mashal to other things. One of the things we do for the puppet show Hishtadlus (which is not what makes it work at all- it's only Hashem) is that we take all the pressure off the child. I allow the child to have ice cream or cake the same time as their meal-they don't have to earn the ice cream by eating other foods first- meaning we make eating Geshmak- the act of the meal is super fun- eating is about cake and ice cream and chicken and string beans. It's all part of the fun experience of eating. I was thinking in Yidishkeit Hashem wants us to feel joy and "eat cake and ice cream" (in a safe healthy way), go on trips to the park and ocean, and laugh and have a good time at the same time as whatever other challenges are happening, Hashem wants us to enjoy life and have zero pressure because He is right by our side at all times 24/7/365 and he is our loving, caring Father and best friend. Of course, there are Torah guidelines and limits. And limits create safety and health in a person. In this point we are focusing on finding joy no matter what else is happening.

I took these pictures on my walk! It's in Hashem's amusement park that I went to on Chol Hamoed. Can you imagine yourself dancing in the colorful leaves while singing and thanking Hashem! Now can you dance and sing to Hashem wherever you are? Creating a game of finding the beauty in Hashem's gorgeous world helps us solidify the experience, thus making it a real part of us.

A LIFE WITH BITACHON ON THE PARSHA

THE TRUE NISAYON OF THE AKEIDA

In this week's Parsha, Hashem commands Avrohom Avinu, "Take your beloved son Yitzchok, and sacrifice him to Me." Chazal count this as the 10th and greatest nisayon of Avrohom Avinu.

The Chasam Sofer asks, why is this nisayon considered so great that it goes down as the greatest nisayon? Didn't Hashem tell him clearly what he has to do? Of course Avrohom would do it? Yes, it is a challenge, but to consider this 'the' nisayon? What's the Pshat?

Reb Dovid Bleicher Zt"l writes a beautiful explanation in the name of his Rebbi the Alter of Novardik zy"a. Rashi brings down from Chazal that the Yetzer Hara was Mekatreig on Avrohom Avinu and he said to the Ribono Shel Oilam, "Look at Avrohom Avinu! He didn't bring any karbanos to You even though he made so many seudos for himself. How could that be? Your beloved Avrohom Avinu didn't bring You any korbonos? Why are You so in awe of him? How great can he be already if he didn't do this even once?"

Hashem answered back "You say Avrohom Avinu shouldn't be so beloved because he hasn't brought Me any karboanos? Well, I will show you how devoted he is! I will tell him to bring his own son Yitzchok as a karban and he will gladly do it!"

So, it comes out that the cause of the Akeida was because Avrohom Avinu never brought a karban. This caused him to face this great challenge.

Therefore, says the Alter, the nisayon of Avrohom Avinu was that he could have been full of terrible regret and grief and bitterly said to himself the entire way, "Oy! Look what kind of trouble I got myself into! If only I would have brought karbanos, I could have avoided this whole ordeal. Now I am stuck with bringing Yitzchok to the Akeida and I'm going to lose my beloved son! Oish! What did I do to myself? I am to be blamed for this whole tumult and crisis!"

But no! Instead of this, Avrohom went with the attitude of, "What was, was! This is what Hashem wants from me right now. It is my current Mitzva that I must focus on doing b'shleimus and I am going to do it with tremendous joy! I won't make any cheshbonos of what could have been." With that Avrohom Avinu went to the Akeida with an incredible simcha shel mitzva and without any regrets. He did it wholeheartedly.

This was the great nisayon of the Akeida and Avrohom Avinu passed it with flying colors.

Says the Alter of Novardik, that we need to learn from this, that a person should never say "If only I would have, should have and could have done things differently, then I wouldn't be stuck in my situation." No! Never harp on the past. Instead, move forward and say "Whatever happened up until now is what Hashem wanted. All results and outcomes are from Hashem. My job is to learn from my mistakes for the future. But never to be full of grief about my past in a way that brings out negativity."

The following message came in:

We are a couple that had shalom bayis issues for many years. Recently we started listening to a life with Bitachon. We internalized that everything that happens is because Hashem wants it to happen, and there is no one else to blame. Wherever a person finds himself is perfect. We took upon ourselves a kabala that we will never ever say we should have, would have or could have. We call it nivul peh! With this we never blame each other for anything that happened no matter whose fault it was and how how negatively it affected us. We only look in one direction: Forward!

Our Shalom Bayis has sky rocketed since then and is now better than ever before!

The biggest trap of the Yetzer Hara is to make us depressed about our past! But it's chazer treif!

A mother called me up feeling heartbroken. Her daughter goes to a school that has parallel classes and for some reason she felt like it would be better for her daughter to switch over to the other class. After she was transferred this mother realized that it was a terrible mistake for several reasons. Her daughter misses all her friends from her old class and the teacher in the new class wasn't a good fit. The school refused to switch her back. The mother felt terrible that she caused her daughter such harm and she doesn't know what to do with herself. I told her, "Your problem is, that you think you are in control of what happens in this world. But no! That is the furthest thing from the truth! Because Hashem runs the world and He is the One that put her in the other class. So obviously that is what if best for her. Yes, you're mechuyav to use your seichel and make the best decision, but the outcome and end result is exactly what Hashem wanted and it would have happened anyway. You cant have an affect on any human being!"

Internalizing the lesson:

Next time something bad happens or I confront a challenge and it seems like it was my very own fault, I will realize that this is my personal nisayon of akeidas Yitzchok. I will be mekabeil the task at hand and the situation I find myself in with Simcha, and not look back. I will just do the mission at hand with a smile, knowing that this is what Hashem wants from me now. My cheshbon hanefesh will only focus on how to improve for the future and I won't harp on the past. Would have and could have will not be in my dictionary.

Still Doing a World of Good

And HASHEM said, "Shall I conceal from Avraham what I am doing? And Avraham will become a great and powerful nation, and all the nations of the world will be blessed in him. For I have known him because he commands his sons and

his household after him, that they should keep the way of HASH-EM to perform righteousness and justice, in order that HASHEM bring upon Avraham that which He spoke concerning him." (Breishis 18:17-19)

And Sarah said, "G-d has made joy for me; whoever hears will rejoice over me." And she said, "Who would have said to Avraham that Sarah would nurse children, for I have borne a son to his old age!" (Breishis 21:6-7)



Sarah would nurse children: Why is "children" in the plural? On the day of the feast, the princesses brought their children with them, and she nursed them, for they were saying, "Sarah did not give birth, but brought in a foundling from the street."

- Rashi

Why did HASHEM need to tell HASHEM about the destruction of Sodom in advance? The verse spells out the reason. It is somewhat clear but there are some important questions here. Avraham is a "partner" with HASHEM and he will instruct future generations in the ways of HASHEM. It needs to be clear to Avraham, so he could educate future generations that the elimination of Sodom was not even slightly unjust. That's the simple approach.

However, as a result of Avraham's hearing about the impending doom he launches into a lengthy prayer and dialogue with HASHEM, pleading his case for saving people of those condemned cities. Ultimately, he is unsuccessful and his prayer seems to be for no benefit. Why would HASHEM invite Avraham to engage in an exercise in futility like praying for a hopeless situation?! Is that how one deals with a trusted "partner"?

I heard an answer to this question, years back. No prayer goes unanswered. It was because Avraham would have righteous progeny that would be going in the ways of HASHEM. Sure, HASHEM prompted him to Daven but his prayers did not go for naught. They would be necessary to protect and preserve future generations in ways that we could never know. This may help account for the longevity and incredible durability of the Jewish People.

Similarly, we find that Sarah was barren and when she finally had a child, Yizchok, she declared, "Who would have said to Avraham that Sarah would nurse children..." That's peculiar! Sarah had only one child. Why does the Torah say "children", plural. Rashi explains that people from all over came to verify that Sarah had really given birth and so they brought their children to nurse by Sarah.

Here's another approach! Rashi explains why HASHEM made it so that the great mothers of the Jewish People were initially barren. He says that, "HASHEM desires the Tefillos of Tzadikim". What does that mean? From the beginning of creation, we find that HASHEM did not bring rain until there was a man to pray for and appreciate it. Certain life ingredients are not delivered unless there is a prior prayer, a requesting, entreating agent!

The Talmud tells us that HASHEM says about Chanina Ben Dosa, "Chanina My son, he survives on a handful of carobs, from week to week and yet the whole world is sustained through his prayers". That means that the poorest man who is praying for survival is actually feeding the world with his Tefillos. Amazing!

Sarah was praying for a child and the world was being populated with "children" due to the powerful appeal of her prayers. She is responsible for the blessing of children in the world, and her prayers were not just the people of her time but for future generations as well.

No prayer is lost! Every prayer is answered. Not long ago, we lost a very dear friend. A world of Tehillim and Tefillos were launched to forestall what was happening but it happened anyway. I am sure many were disappointed thinking their prayers were not answered. At the Shiva I felt comfortable enough to share with the family and those who had organized the recitation of all those Tehillim, that the Niftar had lived a generous and selfless life and not one of those prayers was lost. They are being delivered, in his merit, to special places at critical times and they're still doing a world of good!

During these weeks we read the Parshiyos that introduce us to our incredible forefather Avraham Avinu.

The truth is that when we study the life of Avraham Avinu, we cannot help but being awed by all the chesed, love and the mesiras nefesh that he displayed.

We are told by the chachamim that we are supposed to emulate the ways of our Avos; we are supposed to follow their footsteps. In fact, this is one of the reasons why the Torah highlights these stories, so that we can learn from them.

The obvious question is that the more we study the parshiyos, the more we recognize how our forefathers were tremendous giants beyond our comprehension. Their actions seem to be out of our reach. We may feel like small ants.

Example of their greatness are the legendary hachnasas orchim of Avraham – how he treated every person who walked through his door as a king, with love and devotion.

What about the legendary Akeidas Yitzchok?! It is mind-boggling and astonishing how Avraham went to shecht his only son, whom he waited for, for so many years, and despite that, did it with such alacrity and love for Hashem.

So, how can we relate to these actions; how can we emulate them when we feel so small compared to them?

So, let me explain with a personal story and a mashal, so we can get an appreciation for our avoda of going in the ways of our forefathers.

This past Sukkos, I spent yom tov with my parents. On the first day of yom tov, my father approached me and told me that he was blown away by the bracha that my five-year-old child said. My father was floored how my son said his bracha so slowly and clearly.

Obviously, like all fathers I blushed and took lots of pride and nachas from this compliment.

However, truthfully speaking I do put an avoda into my brachos. I say them out loud and try to concentrate on my brachos. I actually have a five step kavana program for the brachos that I make throughout the day, and I will share it with you. Here goes.

- 1. Baruch Hashem is the source of all the bracha in our life, and in the world. According to Reb Avigdor Miller the word baruch comes from the word berech which is to bow and humble ourselves. Perhaps we can merge the two explanations, that when we recognize that Hashem is the source of all our blessings, then we become humbled.
- 2. Ata When we say Ata, we internalize that we are talking directly to Hashem, and Hashem is close by, listening to every word. If you think about it, you will be filled with joy. What an awesome zechus!
- 3. Hashem Elokeinu I try to think the perush of the names of Hashem (brought down in Halacha that He is the Master of all and the All Powerful). The truth is that when we say Elokeinu, our spirits should soar, as we are stating that He is ours.
- 4. Melech Haolam Hashem is the King of the world, and He is my King as well. At this point we are doing Malchiyos similar to Rosh Hashanah, which is huge.
- 5. Conclusion of Bracha At this point we get busy thanking and praising Hashem for the wonderful fruits, vegetables or any other pleasure that we are about to experience. This also includes brachos on mitzvos as well.

Getting back to our story, one may wonder why I became so excited over my five year old's Bracha. After all, it doesn't compare to the brachos that adults make?

The obvious answer is that while it is true that at my age, brachos should be on an elevated level and not merely saying the words, but for his age, it was beautiful. In fact, I don't expect anything more than that, and this gave me great nachas.

Furthermore, the fact that he is trying to mimic me gives me additional pleasure from the fact

that he is going in my footsteps.

Getting back to us, of course it is impossible to be like our forefathers, as they were giants beyond our imagination. However, as we are explaining, in every situation that we find ourselves, "I can be the very best me" by following in their footsteps and learning from the ways that they have paved for us.

Furthermore, the mere fact that we go in their footsteps, brings nachas to our forefathers. More importantly, it brings a great nachas ruach to our loving Father, Hashem, and what can be sweeter than that?

Let us bring this out with a mashal from Rav Shimshon Pinkus zt"l.

Imagine a child has a party in yeshiva. One of the candies that he receives is his favorite candy that he loves immensely.

Instead of eating it, with an ironclad will, he decides that he is saving that candy for his father.

When his father comes home, the boy takes his favorite candy and hands it to his father and tells him that he saved it especially for him. Now, his father doesn't enjoy candies at all, but this candy is the most delicious candy in the world, and we can understand why.

It is for two reasons: The father takes pleasure from the mere fact that his son is thinking about him at a party. Moreover, the fact that the son took the thing that meant most to him and gave it to his father, brings a tremendous nachas to the father.

Similarly, when we take something that is beloved to us and give it away to keep our relationship with Hashem strong, this is our personal akeida, on our level.

There is a fascinating Midrash that poses the following question: Which test of Avraham was greater – Lech Lecha or the Akeida? And the Midrash concludes it was the Akeida.

However, the question is astonishing; how can we endeavor to compare leaving his hometown to bringing his only son as a Korban?!

Based on what we are saying, it is beautiful. At the time of the Akeida, Avraham Avinu was a giant, as he had gone through life, and had triumphed over nine tests already. On the other hand, at the time of the test of Lech Lecha, while not nearly as difficult, at the same time, Avraham wasn't nearly as great yet. So, the challenge may have been the equivalent of the akeida.

Similarly, we also, have our challenges which may seem trivial compared to the tests of Avraham Avinnu, yet, are massive achievements according to our level.

The times of Moshiach!

This brings us to our current situation. All of us can hear the footsteps of Moshiach. Yes, we are looking forward to reuniting with our Loving Caring Father as never before.

> At the same time, for some of us, there can be a challenge, as it entails leaving behind the place where we grew up, which is difficult.

> The good news is that Avraham Avinu already paved the way for us, and we will follow in his footsteps, and happily look forward to returning to our true home in Yerushalay-



im.

I would like to conclude, my friends, that when we have this attitude, it brings a great nachas ruach to Hashem, and this itself can usher in the geula.

Furthermore, Avraham understood that when he arrives in Eretz Yisroel, things would become much rosier, as Hashem had promised to him. Yet, the reason he went, was because this is what Hashem wanted – the Ratzon Hashem. We can also have this attitude, that although we know that we will gain immensely from having Moshiach, we still ask Hashem to take us back so that His Kingdom is restored to its glory.

Let us meet in Yerushalayim very soon, and we will proudly tell our forefathers that yes, we followed in their footsteps and HERE WE ARE!

THE QUOTE: "It says in Mishlei (29:25), A person's fear will cause his falling, whereas the one who trusts in Hashem will be elevated. Which means that where no problem previously existed, a person's fear will cause a problem to develop. In contrast, if a person trusts in Hashem he will be rescued from a problem that already existed.

THE LESSON: What makes this so incredible and amazing is that Hashem loves each and every one of us so much that He even gave us an incentive not to worry or be afraid. Hashem made it that if we rely on Him and trust in Him and we do not worry and do not have anxiety, that itself will protect us from harm coming our way. It's a win win situation. We get a close kesher with Hashem, we gain a worry-free life and we have the BEST protection shayach in the gantza velt!!

DID YOU KNOW that אהבה is gematria אחד?

The reason is because the more ONE, the more connected you feel with another person, the more אהבה you will have toward the person. It is pashut. Therefore, the same applies toward Hashem, the closer connected we feel to Hashem, the more we will have and feel toward Hashem as well! Another point is that the more you love someone, the more you will shower praises on them. So too, the more you love Hashem, the more you will praise Hashem as well. You will praise what Hashem made. You will not stop praising His Torah hakedoshah, His world, His everything, His people! Also, the more you love someone the more you will not be worried that they will harm you chas V'shalom. So too by loving Hashem that itself will take away a lot of our worries.

BESIDES FOR LOVING HASHEM in our hearts, there is also a way to show Hashem we love Him with our actions. The Mesilas Yesharem tells us the secret. The regular day-in-day-out acts that we do in our Avodas Hashem is definitely required. However, that does not necessarily show our true love to Hashem. Which actions show that we really want a close relationship with Hashem and that we "love" Hashem? It's the little additions that we put effort into our Yiddishkeit that are not even expected of us. Just to give an example; say your second seder ends at 7:00 and you say, "Hashem I am staying until 7:02 because I love you." Those are two minutes of complete greatness.

I gave one tiny tiny example but there are hundreds of examples that each person can think of, where in their life they can show true love and dedication to Hashem. These small "extras" can be phrased, "The cinnamon mint tea moments of our life." What do I mean? Rav Shmuel Barron Shlit"a coined this phrase and brought out this Yesod from the Mesilas Yesharim with an incredible Mashel:

THE MASHEL: THERE WAS ONCE A YID who came home late one night from his friend's Chasuna. He was on the phone talking to someone about the wedding and he said, "You won't believe it, they had my favorite tea in the world by the Chasunah - cinnamon mint tea. I had one cup, then I had a second cup and then I gulped down a third... I must have drunk twenty cups of cinnamon mint tea..." Meanwhile his son was sitting in the next room and he overheard the entire conversation. A few weeks later the father was not feeling well and all that they had in the house was some cheap simple tea. The father was lying in bed and asked his son if he could make him a tea. The son dashed out of the house without




his father knowing and bought a box of cinnamon mint tea. He ran home, prepared the tea and handed it to his father. The father thanked the son, made a bracha and took a sip. The father could not believe what he was tasting. He was utterly shocked! He said to his son, "Cinnamon mint tea? How did you know it's my favorite tea?!" I am sure he wanted to give his son a big kiss on his cheek...

This is the yesod. Doing the unexpected is extremely valuable and that is what the Mesilas Yesharim says shows true Ahavas Hashem.



So he said he'll see you right now." And in no time, she took them to an examining room, and then the doctor came right in to see them - with the best service, better than ever!



#1867: This story was called in by a very, very choshuva yungerman by the name of R' Yehoshua Wax. He had applied to a sleep-away camp for one of his children and was told that in order for them to reserve a slot, he had to pay the entire camp tuition up front,

\$2,000.

"They want ALL the money right now?" he thought. "Where am I going to come up with an extra \$2,000 out of the blue? They aren't even letting me pay in installments. What should I do?"

It was very, very important that she find it by the next day as she didn't know how she would manage without it. She spent a long time checking every place she could think of, combing the whole area, and turning everything upside down, but it was nowhere to be found.

Then she had a thought: "Who's in charge of finding my phone? You think it's my eyes? No, it's my loving, caring Father, HaKadosh Boruch Hu, the Ribono Shel Olam. The Bitachon Perspective

Q & A with Rabbi Zevy Golombeck Typed by R' Shalom Yedidya Klatzko

Q: Chazal say that when we are faced with nisyonos and challenges, we should examine our actions.


You said over on the hotline that the action we should do teshuva for is that we didn't feel loved, cared for, watched and protected. That's the biggest teshuva in the whole world. Where is this concept brought down? What's the Emunah and Bitachon perspective about all this?

A: The first point is that the hotline is based off a mesorah that my Rebbe gave me over from his Rebbe, who gave it over from his Rebbe, all the way back to the Gra.

The second point is that this concept that my Rebbe said over is a davar sichli, because why did Hakadosh Baruch Hu make this world? "Olam chased yibaneh." All Hakadosh Baruch Hu wants to do is give and give and give. The biggest way to give to us is for us to feel loved and protected. That is the only thing that brings true intrinsic simcha. To feel Hashem is taking care of us. We give Him nachas by feeling loved. So get to work on feeling loved!

The biggest issue nowadays is that people don't walk around feeling loved, watched and protected. Therefore, it's the most important thing is to fix up.

The third point is that the Gemara in the end of meseches Makkos says that the Yidden used to be machmir in all taryag mitzvos but they saw that it was too hard to do. So they knocked it down to one mitzvah, "Tzadik b'emunaso yichyeh." The Gra says that that this is the mitzvah of living with Bitachon! Therefore, that's what we should be putting our kochos into. They asked the Gra which pasuk in the whole tanach describes what it means to live with "Tzadik beemunaso yichyeh." The Gra said the pasuk "Nafshi kigamul allei imo." A baby feels loved, watched, and protected. That's the translation of Bitachon! To feel like a baby in his mothers arms! So you see clearly that is the best teshuva to feel loved, watched, and protected.



Illuminating Words of Chazal

"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Ray Yehuda Mandel

The Gemara in Yuma 9b says that Reish Lakish was swimming in the Yardan river. Rabba Bar Chana put out his hand, but Reish Lakish refused to take it. Reish Lakish said, "G-d hates you people from Bavel. Because you (your grandfathers) didn't come up to Eretz Yisrael during the time of Ezra, which prevented Hashraas HaShechina."

We hear on 'A Life with Bitachon' to always take people out of the picture and put Hashem there. Why was Reish Lakish blaming people? In addition, why did he distance himself and say that Hashem hates them? We know that Hashem doesn't hate anyone. And why is he blaming Rabba Bar Chana for something his great grandfathers did? How can we view this Chazal in a positive way?



Before we can understand what chazal is saying, the first thing is to understand what the chazal is NOT saying. That's always the alef beis. Whenever it seems like a chazal is negative, that's a red flag. That means you're learning the wrong peshat.

To say Hashem hates us – there's no such thing. The Meshech Chochma in Parshas Bo says that Hashem loves every yid. Every yid! Hashem doesn't hate any yid! There's no such thing, the Meshech Chochma says. So for sure it doesn't mean that Hashem hates us.

Second of all, there's no such thing that one human being could affect somebody else's life. It can't be "because my grandfather did this, now I have to suffer." We can't lose out because of another human being. Nobody can affect us. Nobody can harm us.

To say it was bad that the Shechina didn't go back to Eretz Yisrael and Klal Yisrael had to be in galus for longer, to say that there was less Shechina amongst Klal Yisrael, is bad, that also can't be. It says a halacha in Shulchan Aruch that everything is good. The Ramchal explains that the reason why it's good if there's less Shechina and there's more hester panim, is because that

gives Hashem more nachas ruach that we're able to serve Hashem despite the hester panim. That's why in a certain sense we're bigger than Amoraim and Tannaim, because the Amoraim and Tannaim saw the Shechina, and even though that's great and gevaldik, that doesn't come to our level – that we don't see Hashem and still we serve Hashem. So the less Shechina, the more hester panim, just makes Klal Yisrael even bigger and gives Hashem more nachas ruach. So galus is not b'dieved, galus is l'chatchila! As my Rebbi said over from his Rebbeim, everything in yiddishkeit is l'chatchila. Galus is l'chatchila. This that Klal Yisrael didn't go back to Eretz Yisrael, it was all part of Hashem's Master Plan. The Gra says, when Hashem created the world He wanted everything that happened. The Gra says it was perfect, it's what Hashem wanted. When Hashem created the world He knew what was going to happen and He wanted it to happen and it's merumaz in the Torah that it's going to happen. It's a chelek of Torah. And everything is good and kevod Shamayim is going to come out of everything.

Now that we see what peshat is not, let's see what peshat is yes. In the Mesivta gemara, it explains that Reish Lakish didn't want to stretch out his hand to allow Rabba Bar Chana to help him because you're not supposed to be mishtamesh with a talmid chacham. But Reish Lakish didn't want to say that, because he held that that would be gaavah to show off how he's so makpid not to be mishtamesh a talmid chacham. Reish Lakish didn't want to become a baal gaavah. So therefore he gave a different reason he didn't want to do it. Obviously, Reish Lakish wanted Raba Bar Chana to hear that reason, and there's a lot to learn from that reason.

But before we get to that reason, it's important to realize that that actual reason Reish Lakish didn't stretch out his hand was because Raba Bar Chana was so chaviv in his eyes. He was so chashuv that even though Raba Bar Chana was willing to help him, he said I don't want to be mishtamesh a talmid chacham as it would be a bizui talmid chacham. That's what the Mesivta brings down.

Now, let's go to what Reish Lakish was trying to tell him. Reish Lakish was saying: because your grandfather didn't go up to Eretz Yisrael, that caused a miut in the shechina. You have to have an attitude that Hashem was upset about it, you have to have an attitude that Hashem hates it. Every yid has to be a juggler with the truth and the attitude. The truth is that Hashem wanted everything to happen exactly the way it happened, but Hashem wants us to have a certain attitude. He wants us to have an attitude that He was upset that Klal Yisrael didn't go up to Eretz Yisrael, He was upset because it caused that the shechina didn't fully come back. Which means Klal Yisrael should say, oyyyy, Tatty, we're missing You! We love You so much! Which is exactly the purpose of what Klal Yisrael is supposed to be doing in galus. That's what we're here for, to go around and to show the world that Hashem, we're missing You for two thousand years and we love You and we can't wait to see You and we're so excited to connect with You and we're so excited to bond with You! That is what we're doing here in galus. We live with hester panim but we're still telling the world how much we love Hashem, that's what we're doing here in galus.

So Reish Lakish was telling him, you have to have an attitude that Hakadosh Baruch Hu hates it that your ancestors didn't go back. You know why? Because that means that now the Shechina didn't come back in its full glory and there's hes-

ter panim. Your job is to fill up that gap and be marbeh kevod Shamayim. You have to go around speaking to the tzibbur how much we love Hashem and how important it is to feel Hashem and how important it is to build a relationship with Hashem. Because we don't have the zechus of seeing Hashem in His full glory, we have to go above and beyond to bring Hashem into our life and make Him real and tangible, which gives Hakadosh Baruch Hu the greatest nachas ruach. Even though there's hester panim, and even though it looks like He's closing the curtain on us, say, "Hashem, we can't get enough of You. We can't stop thinking about You. We just love You more and more! We're always thinking about You!" That is the point! The point is Hashem is saying, Klal Yisrael, show Me how much you love Me, how much you can't stop thinking about Me, and how much it bothers you that there's no full glory!

That is the message that Reish Lakish is telling him. Reish Lakish was saying, if this happened through your grandfather, if Hashem made hester panim come through your grandfather, that is a sign that your tafkid and tikkun in this world is to go to the opposite extreme and be marbeh kevod Shamayim. Bring kiddush Shem Shamayim b'rabim. Teach the world. Focus on relationship with Hashem, on making Hashem real and tangible. Be marbeh more gilui shechina. Do things that will be marbeh more kevod Shamayim.

Bottom line is that Hashem loves everyone and Hashem wanted everything to happen and everything is l'chatchila. And Reish Lakish was just telling him, your tafkid is to undo what your grandfather did. Your grandfather was a gorem for hester panim, now your job is to spread the word, to go extreme in ribui kevod Shamayim. Go around talking about Hashem, go around feeling loved by Hashem, go around making Hashem real and tangible. Go around to Klal Yisrael and show them how much we love Klal Yisrael and we miss You Hashem. We miss Him. Say oy we miss Him, we don't have Him. That's your tafkid. There's a tafkid in this world. People's tafkidim, there are people who their tafkid is to go extreme in being marbeh kevod Shamayim, to making Hashem real. And that's what Reish Lakish was telling him. That you have to undo what your grandfather did, that's your tafkid!

THE TRAVELING CHOLENT

Editor's note: We printed, two weeks ago, in issue 119, an amazing Mi K'amcha Yisrael and Hashgacha Pratis story that took place in Neve Ya'akov.

Here is part 2:

Dear Editor:

I don't usually get to see your publication, but tonight my friend (from Neve Ya'akov) read to me the story "Food for an Army" (Parshas Noach) As soon as he started, I said that that story was about my son! He is the '18-year-old bochur from the community! I was happy to see the story, and as soon as I got home I showed it to my son. He told me there's even more to the story, and I heard it again from the man who organized the whole thing:

Even though they gave away a lot of food before shabbos, there was a giant pot of cholent which they couldn't give away. The organizer was taking his family to Beit Shemesh for Shabbos, so he was desperately trying to find someone in Neve Ya'akov who could use or take the cholent. He couldn't find anybody, so he had no choice but to take the cholent with him to Beit Shemesh, where maybe he would find a taker.

On the way, he spoke to someone on the phone who said he could use the cholent in Beit Shemesh, but in the end he never arrived to take it.

So the family just left it on the hotplate overnight Leil Shabbos, hoping maybe they would come Shabbos morning to take it. But nobody came for the Cholent.

After shacharis, the man decided to stay in the shul and learn for a while. He hoped that maybe the person who wanted the Cholent would come find him there. He was finally about to go home and make Kiddush, when he saw someone who looked like he was in charge of food in the shul.

He went over to him and asked him (as a last hope) if perhaps he needed a giant cholent.

The person hugged him and said that he was a 'shaliach from Hashem'!

What's the story?

He has a family of 12 and they were hosting for Shabbos 42 Beis Ya'akov girls. They rented out the hall in the shul for the meals, but something happened to their cholent and it got completely spoiled. He had no idea what he was going to do!

They then brought over the big cholent from the man's house to the shul for the Shabbos day meal. It turns out they ate the entire thing, instead of going hungry!

This is the cholent that was planned for people from the South coming to Neve Ya'akov, and ended up in Beit Shemesh

feeding 42 girls from Beis Ya'akov. Chasdei Hashem!


R' Yossi Greenberg* needed to go to the airport but

The following story has been heard firsthand from a Yiddishe soldier:

HaGaon HaRav Yitzchok Dovid Grossman Shlita from Migdal Ohr heard in passing from 'Lieutenant M.' during the Second Lebanon War that six hundred Yiddishe soldiers, drained and exhausted from heavy combat, needed a good place to refresh and recharge on their day off.

"What's the problem? 600 soldiers? They should all come, of course, let them come to Migdal Ohr! We have plenty of room!"

Upon their arrival, Rav Grossman greeted them warmly, "Boys, I suggest that the first thing you do is take a dip in the pool and freshen up. In the meantime, we will make you something to eat."

Within minutes the tables were set with cold refreshing watermelon, cakes, and beverages, followed by

cheeses, fresh vegetables, and soft rolls.

"Out of the pool, get dressed and eat something." Piles of new clothing appeared, as if from nowhere, for everyone to freshen up.

Rav Grossman sat with everyone and laughed, "Have a great time, boys! This evening, I will put on the most spectacular performance you have ever seen."

A few months before the war began, Rav Grossman had been offered a new Sefer Torah by a generous friend from France. Rav Grossman immediately made arrangements that the grand Hachnasas Sefer Torah should take place that very night. All the soldiers participated in the completion of writing the Torah. While the Torah was carefully laid on the table, Rav Grossman addressed the soldiers:

"Each one of you should daven that the zechus of writing a letter in the Sefer Torah will protect you in battle, great sparks of Kedusha emanate from these sacred letters and disperse around you, creating a protective shield which will keep you safe and bring you home safely."

After the completion of the Torah, the ceremony continued. Leading the procession was a decorated car with multi-colored lights strung all over it.

600 soldiers and thousands of the town residents

marched and danced in the procession, a loudspeaker accompanying them, playing heartzig Yiddishe Niggunim.

As the event came to a close, Rav Grossman approached every soldier and kissed him while placing a half-shekel coin in his hand saying, "Shluichei mitzvah are not harmed." Rav Grossman concluded, "When you return, with Hashem's help, healthy and unharmed, you will fulfill this mission that I am placing upon you, and you will donate this money to Tzedaka."

A moment before they returned to Lebanon Rav Grossman told everyone, "In the zechus that you said Shema and put on tefillin, wrote a letter in the Torah, and are Shluichei mitzvah, I promise you, that you will all return safe and sound. None of you will be wounded or killed."

Two weeks later around midnight, Rav Grossman

received a phone call. "Rav, your Bracha has come true!" exclaimed the commander over the phone. "Shockingly, everyone is safe and we are on our way to you. We will be there by two in the morning." Rav Grossman immediately contacted the kitchen staff and asked them to prepare a meal while he worked to organize a band.

At 2:30 a.m. the soldiers disembarked from the buses,

each one carrying 60 kilos of equipment on his back. The band started playing music and the soldiers approached Rav Grossman, each one lovingly received with a hug and a kiss. This continued for two hours. "I felt as I had never felt before," recalls Rav Grossman. "Each one told me his personal Neis."

The list of Nissim was endless! There were so many Nissim that happened to everyone. Everyone felt so loved, cared for, watched and protected by Hashem!

Hashem is doing Nissim for us at every moment, whether we realize it or not! Hashem is protecting us in an unimaginable way! Keep thanking Hashem nonstop for all of the Chesed He has done for you and you will see even more Chesed, Rachamim and Yeshuos from Hashem!







People would go to work and return a few hours later after being fired for thinking negatively about the boss.

Children would go to school and come home in tears from their teachers' impatient thoughts and the insulting comments their classmates thought.

Friends would get together and leave in a huff from the negative remarks in their friends' brains.

People would slowly start self-quarantining, not from Corona, but from fear of thinking the wrong thing.

Daily life would grind to a halt, with less and less people venturing out.

Even at home, there would be no Shalom Bayis; husbands and wives would be clapping their hands to their foreheads all day, but it would be too late to take back the hurtful comment they thought.

Even when the comment wasn't intended to be mean, there would be so many misunderstandings from reading other people's thoughts that it wouldn't even matter; people wouldn't bother to clarify.

Parents' impatient thoughts would be read by their kids even if they acted kind and patient on the outside.

There would be zero privacy between people. Even positive actions would become known to others, thereby lessening the schar. The concept of doing something lishmah wouldn't exist.

People would constantly be oiver the issurim of lashon hora, onaas devarim, rechilus, machlokes, etc., even before they would have a chance to think if it's appropriate or not say it!

Strangers would be able to read thoughts of aveiros or embarrassing incidents in other people's minds. As a result, people would constantly feel humiliated and their self-esteem would be crushed to the ground.

People would be so depressed from all the hurt and embarrassment caused by their thoughts that they would not be able to function.

They might go to therapists to help themselves, but the therapists would be suffering from the same problem! And even if not, there's a very good chance that the client would get hurt from the therapist's thoughts!

Going to the grocery would be an emotionally and spiritually dangerous, mortifying task that no one would agree to. The resultant self-isolation would lead to many emotional problems.

Almost no one would get into school because they would reveal negative information about themselves in their heads during the interview or they would think an insult about the interviewer.

Dates would never work out, because each person would feel so self-conscious about being analyzed by the other. Sensitive information would be unintentionally revealed throughout the date.

In public places, there would be so many people's thoughts crowding around each person's head. No one would be able to think properly and they would walk away with a huge migraine.

During a shiur or public speech, the speaker would get so mixed up from everyone else's thoughts that he wouldn't be able to deliver the speech. Even if he somehow managed to give over the material, no one would be able to hear him because of all the background thoughts.

One time, however, he was in for a surprise. Rav Aharon Leib lifted his eyes and said, "Rav Lipa, since you're going to America, I'll make a deal with you!"

Before Rav Lipa could inquire as to the type of business Rav Aharon Leib was interested in making, Rav Aharon Leib told him that the deal was indeed serious — one that Rav Lipa stood to potentially make one million dollars! "During your travels to America, you'll meet up with many wealthy people. If you meet one of them who's as wealthy as I am, I'll give you a million dollars cash."

Rav Aharon Leib stood up from his seat, took Rav Lipa by the hand, and proceeded to walk him around the house. In gashmiyus, I'm not lacking anything, and in ruchniyus, I try to do what's required of me. So, if you're able to find someone better off than me, you'll be a million dollars richer!"

Rav Lipa got on the plane with Rav Aharon Leib's words ringing in his ears. He decided to search out and find if there really was a Yid in America richer than Rav Aharon Leib. Sure enough, he went around and met many wealthy people — millionaires and even billionaires — but none of them could testify that they were happy or content with their lot.

One told Rav Lipa how every time he earns a million dollars, he's pained that he didn't work harder and bring in two. Another revealed how his life is nothing but worry and fear — to the point that his young son needed an armed guard to escort him to school lest he get kidnapped for ransom! Every wealthy philanthropist he met complained about the tremendous yoke he carried on his shoulders, about the headaches, the ungratefulness, and the constant pressures that filled his life.

On the course of his trip, Rav Lipa came to one person's

mansion that was so big that Rav Lipa had to drive six minutes from the front gate just to get to the man's office. In the middle of the meeting, the gvir turned to Rav Lipa and said, "If you promise me a month of peace and serenity, I'll write you a check for three million dollars!"

On his flight back to Eretz Yisrael, a millionaire confided to Rav Lipa: "All my friends only care about my money. I'm alone without any companions. I can't trust anyone, not even my close family. All of them only honor and flatter me just because of their personal interests. Nobody in the world sincerely cares about me."

Throughout his journey, Rav Lipa thought to himself, "How can I tell these wealthy people that in Bnei Brak, on 5 Rechov Chazon Ish, in an old, dilapidated house, there's a happy Yid who's richer than any of them?" Nowhere in Rav Lipa's travels did he meet anyone as wealthy as Rav Aharon Leib, and thus he resigned himself that he wouldn't be getting his promised million dollars. However, he did ask Rav Aharon Leib if, when he traveled again to New York, if the deal was still "live," and the rosh yeshiva agreed.

OOPS, ITS GONE

On that second trip to New York, Rav Lipa ran into Rav Uri Zohar, who was one of the previous generations best known mezakei rabim. Rav Lipa told Rav Uri all about the deal he'd made with Rav Aharon Leib to find someone richer than the Rosh Yeshiva.

After a few moments, Rav Uri happily announced, "Rav Lipa, you've just won the 'lottery!' You can return to Rav Aharon Leib and tell him that you met someone richer than him. He was never part of the 'outside world,' but I came from there, and therefore I know how much richer I am. I know how much meaning and purpose lies in a Torah life verses the empty joy that occupies the "outside world." Coming from there make me wealthier than Rav Aharon Leib!"

The two then jokingly quibbled over how much percentage Rav Uri should get for helping Rav Lipa to his million dollars. Before they parted, though, Rav Uri turned to Rav Lipa and said, "You know what? I think I might be wrong. Go back and tell Rav Aharon Leib that while I originally thought I was the wealthier one, I've changed my mind and think that he's the richer one.

"I'll tell you why: Every time I come into Rav Aharon Leib's house, whatever hour it may be, I see the rosh yeshiva sitting in the same position — his body upright, his tzitzis upon him, his hat on his head, and a pillow behind his head to prop him up. Where in the entire world would you find someone who sits like that even when nobody is around? Only someone who lives with a constant awareness of Hashem's presence. That person is the richest man in the world, and there's nobody more content than him anywhere on the globe." When Rav Lipa returned to Eretz Yisrael, he admitted to Rav Aharon Leib that he hadn't found anyone as wealthy as the rosh yeshiva.
