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


מכתב ברכה וחיזוק מזקני ראשי ישיבות באמעריקא

They ran to the sign to look at the last illustration prepared for them with love by Hashem!

When we started discussing the details of the phone book, we reached the conclusion that the work was not as complex as I'd initially thought. I needed to simply call each person and wait for him to pick up, to ask him if he had another number and if the address we had was correct. Although this is time-consuming, we didn't have to call everyone in one day. We could do it calmly, speaking to the older adults at their own pace and the younger ones at a different pace. The task was not running away, and the lists would wait patiently for me from one day to the next, from one evening to the next.

I started to call, and everyone answered me happily that they wanted to be part of the family phone book.

Thus, I moved down the list, from one name to the next – uncles and cousins and brothers and sisters, and...Mendy. Mendy is my brother. He hadn't come to the party – not to this last party and not to the previous one. We never see him, and we have no idea exactly where he is and what he's doing. If there is anyone who knew what Mendy's

been up to, apparently, he felt it's better that we not know at all. Now, I was sitting with the phone numbers of the entire family and thinking to myself, should I call Mendy or not? How would he react to seeing my phone number on his screen? Would he pick up, or would he slam down the phone? Would he be happy, or would he grit his teeth? My experience from previous attempts was not very positive, but perhaps, nevertheless, he deserved to feel a part of the family... I decided to call the number I had for him, in the slight hope that it had not changed over the years. I finished dialing, and then, after a few rings, Mendy answered! "Hello, how are you?" I said with brotherly love and affection. He answered appropriately, in a calm, friendly voice. He told me a few nice things, and I also shared some things with him. If someone were listening in, he could have thought that we speak to each other every Monday and

Thursday.

In the end, I told him about the family phone book and asked him if he wanted us to put his phone number in it. "I'm not interested," he told me. "Don't put my number in. I don't want it."

No problem. Not terrible. At least we'd spoken, and that was a lot. It seemed it was worth it to do this more often, so he'd remember his family and his roots, so he would know that he had a place to return to.

The day after that conversation, I went to visit my mother, and then, with a smile, I told her, "Best regards from Mendy!"

My mother heard this, and her faced turned colors. She became pale and almost fell over and fainted. I had not expected such an intense reaction; I had not even planned in advance to tell her about this totally natural, almost casual conversation. It came out spontaneously, without



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a lot of thought.

I went on to tell my mother the background of our conversation and about the phone book we wanted to put together, but the storm did not abate. Ima succeeded in saying only one sentence, "Are you serious? Is it true what you're saying?" I could not understand what was happening here. What was so exciting about this dry news I had brought her? What happened?

And this is what my dear mother told me:

"For so many years I've been davening for him and investing so many kochos in him. Not a day passes that I don't shed tears for him. I go to mekomos kedoshim; I plead for him; whatever could possibly be done, I do.

My mother wasn't telling me news. We knew about the countless tefillos and all the tears she shed. She had called us all to the task as well. From time to time, she would organize all sorts of good kabbalos that everyone would take upon themselves, and she'd divide sefer Tehillim among the family members.

She went on to tell me that recently she'd started going to the kever of one of the tzaddikim, with the goal of completing forty consecutive days at his kever. She did this with mesirus nefesh, in heat and in cold.

Today she felt she was falling apart. She'd been davening so much. A mother's heart only wanted to see her son coming home, at least just to see him. Her heart was broken and shattered. Today she was sitting at home with her Sefer Tehillim, and she cried, "Ribbono shel Olam, I am davening so much and crying so much. Please send me a sign that

You hear, that You are listening, that all the tefillos are not getting lost, that the tears are not being spilled for nothing, but that they are coming to You and that You are gathering them."

This is what my mother told me, revealing her broken-heartedness and the tefillos that were pouring forth from the depths of her neshamah.

In the end she said, "I had just finished davening, and then you came in and gave me regards from Shamayim!" (Kav Hashgacha Pratis)

My grandparents z'l had many incredible stories from the 1930s and 1940s.

In the early 2000s, one of our family friends Lenny came over with a camera, and interviewed them, recording almost 4 hours of them telling their stories, family history and other memories. He created several DVDs and gave copies to me and various members of our family. After my grandparents passed away, those DVDs became a family treasure.

After my parents passed away, around 2011, I wanted to turn the raw interview into a watchable set of highlight stories and clips, like a memoir of my grandparents' stories. I reached out to my friend who works in video production and was between jobs, and I sent him my copy of the DVD to edit and turn into a shorter watchable video. He started working on it, but got a job soon after and put the project on pause.

About a year later (2012-ish), I wanted to push the project forward again, so I asked my friend to send me the DVD back. He sadly said he couldn't find it! He had lost the copy I had sent him.

No worries - I reached out to my sister for her copy. She also sadly said that she had lost her copy as well and couldn't find it.

A bit more worried, I reached out to my aunt, and she had also apparently lost her copy as well. I also reached out to the family friend Lenny who had made the DVDs in the first place, and he also could not find a copy.

All copies of the DVD were lost. I was devastated.

A year later, I got motivated to search again, so I reached out to my friend, my sister, my aunt, etc.. - still nothing.

Every year, for almost 10 years, I would try another round of searching, but the DVDs were really gone. We looked in so many places, but they were all lost. I gave up hope of ever finding any copy again.

Around 2020/2021, I got interested in family genealogy and it re-kindled my desire to find those DVDs with all the family history stories. My Rebbe, Rav Eli Yelen, had been speaking about bitachon for many years and how Hashem is Hakol Yachol. So, I sat down one day, and asked Hashem directly to find the DVDs, even though they had been lost completely for 10 years. "You know where they are and You could find them for me!"

A week later, I decided to do another round of hishtadlus to search for the DVDs. I texted my friend asking him if he could look again. (Remember it has been 10 years since he lost my original copy.) No reply. I called my sister; she still didn't know where her copy was. I called my aunt; she still didn't know where her copy was, but suggested I try calling the family friend Lenny.

I called Lenny, who was happy to hear from me as I had not spoken to him for a few years. I told him I was looking for the DVDs again, and he promptly responded, "Yes I have a copy right here in my desk drawer!" I was stunned. The next day I drove to his house to pick up the DVD. It was a real copy, just like I remember, with my grandparents; names written in pen on the DVD label - Ariel and Hanna Stiebel, 2001.

I was worried maybe the DVD was scratched and wouldn't work after all these years, but when I played the DVD, it worked perfectly, and I started watching my grandparents' interview and all their stories. So amazing.

I took a picture of the screen and texted my friend again, who still hadn't responded to my text

the day before. I wrote to him "I found a copy!!". He responded a few seconds later, "I FOUND



MY COPY TOO! I'll send it back to you." I couldn't believe it.

Later that same day, unrelated to the DVDs completely, I found out that a different, very old family friend had gotten cancer and barely survived, but was doing well now. I had not spoken to him in probably 20 years, but I gave him a call to check how he was doing. We schmoozed for a few minutes and hung up. I decided to text him some photos of my kids, since he had never seen or met them. He responded, "David, it's so nice to see you all grown up and with your own family. I actually have a copy of a video of your grandparents that I've been meaning to send you for many years. I'm going to put it in the mail right now so you can have it."

After 10 years and complete despair of ever finding a copy of my grandparents' video, Hashem gave me 3 copies in the span of 24 hours! He's truly Hakol Yachol!

Not long after that her grandmother called her up "out of the blue" and said that she was


sponsoring a Sukkah for them!

avail. At that point, her mother called Chaveiram and asked if by any chance there were any Chaveirim members around?



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
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waiting for two and a half weeks for a specific worker, and he finally came today. I feel so hugged and kissed by Hashem!"



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'e sneeze often and it's considered normal to sneeze 4 times a day. More than this would be a sign of an allergy or a condition. It would be expected that we would sneeze equally at all parts of the day. It shouldn't matter if it's the morning or the night, if we are alert or fast asleep. We would expect our sneezing to be more or less equally divided, after all we are breathing in all types of particles during all hours of the day. Let's think about this for a moment, when was the last time you were woken up from a deep sleep from the sound of an explosion, a sneeze. You were totally relaxed, maybe even enjoying a good dream - then you suddenly woke up to a big boom. You probably don't recall such a situation. That's because it doesn't usually happen. Hashem arranged that when we sleep - we don't sneeze. This is despite the fact that we spend quite a significant part of our day sleeping. Even if we spend a third of the day or more sleeping, no sneezing takes place during that period. All of our sneezing, which is an important health function, takes place during our waking

Let's examine this point a little bit more, why is this important? Why did Hashem create us like this? Additionally let's try to understand a little, how does this work? If we would sneeze during our sleep that would mean that very often our night's sleep would be interrupted once or twice. A night's sleep that is interrupted does not refresh us the same way that an uninterrupted night's sleep does. Besides for that, when we wake up in middle of the night, we have to fall back asleep - for many people it is a process which is not so simple, it can take time.

Anyone who has to wake up a few times in the middle of the night to tend to a newborn baby will identify easily with the difference between sleeping a straight night or having it broken up. Hashem, in His kindness, set up our system in a way that we can sleep undisturbed and rejuvenate our bodies without having our sleep broken up.


The way that Hashem set up this phenomenon is that our sneeze is stimulated by a specific nerve. There is also a voluntary muscle movement that happens when we sneeze - that means muscle movement that we are involved in making happen, for example - the sudden large intake of air that we inhale right before we sneeze and other muscle movement. When we are sleeping, our nerves and muscles are also resting and are inactive, there is nothing to stimulate us to get that sneeze going. So even if many foreign particles are inhaled during our sleeping hours we are able to remain sleeping peacefully and calmly.

I have a friend who used the method of contrasting good with bad in an amazing way to help him appreciate one of Hashem's greatest gifts—the gift of eyesight:

During the Coronavirus quarantine in the spring of 2020, my friend had been thinking about how to appreciate and enjoy Hashem's gift of eyesight. It bothered him that he took such an unspeakably wonderful thing for granted.

One morning his alarm clock woke him up. He had not even opened his eyes when he suddenly had an idea: His family was still asleep. Why not try to experience what life is like for a blind person? Surely that would help him appreciate his eyesight! Quarantine was the perfect opportunity for this, as he could not go to shul anyway and he did not need to help the children get ready for school.

So, keeping his eyes shut, he quietly got out of bed. Crouching down, he slowly felt his way around his room until he found a scarf, which he wrapped tightly around his eyes to make sure

he would not peek.

Then, he began to gather his clothing together. It was not easy. Although he was able to find most of his clothes by feeling his way to the dresser, he could not remember where he had put his shoes the night before. He wracked his brain, trying to remember where he had left them as he crawled around, sweeping the floor with his arms, while trying not to bump into obstacles or wake up his wife.

Finally, he found the shoes and carefully made his way to the bathroom.


But the challenges continued. He had to feel to find each thing, avoid putting on his clothes backwards, and locate his own toothbrush and use toothpaste—and not, by accident, diaper rash cream.

Finally, he was dressed.

He carefully made his way into the hallway, hoping he would not be noticed. He located his jacket and tallis bag and made his way to an empty room to dayen.

After putting on his tallis and tefillin, he began to say brachos by heart. When he reached the brachah of "pokei'ach ivrim"—thanking Hashem for

giving sight to the blind—he removed his blindfold and opened his eyes to the dazzling sunlight pouring in through the windows.



It had taken him forty-five minutes to do what could have taken ten. But he will likely never forget the glorious feelings of happiness and thankfulness that he felt upon opening his eyes that bright sunny morning.

To ingrain this type of appreciation in one's child, one can play a game where the child is blindfolded and then directed to accomplish certain challenging tasks, such as getting a cup and filling it with water or finding his shoes and putting them on the correct feet. This will help him recognize what a phenomenal gift his eyesight is, and greatly increase his happiness and enjoyment of life.

Then Yitzchak desired to bless Eisav before his passing, he asked him: Bring the delicacies which I love..." (27:4). Surely, this is very hard to understand. After all, these blessings were a prophecy that would have such tremendous spiritual significance in shaping the future. Therefore, one would think that it would be more appropriate for Yitzchak to spend the day with fasting, immersing in the mikveh and reciting Tehillim. Yet instead, we see that he asked his son to cook for him his favorite dish! This is very perplexing. What is the meaning behind all this?

The Ramban (25:34) teaches that Yitzchak knew that asking Eisav to bring him his favorite meat and to go to all the effort to prepare it, would increase his love for him. His gratitude for the great effort

involved would motivate him to give a more heartfelt blessing. So, he felt that the most ideal way for him to be in the correct frame of mind to convey these significant blessings, would be through feelings of gratitude. Therefore, he specifically asked his son to go to all the effort of hunting and preparing his favorite dish. Just

so he will have feelings of gratitude and then be able to channel it into the berachah. Phenomenal! (Explained by Rav Simchah Zisel Broide, Sam Derech Toldos)

We see this idea, that blessings motivated by gratitude carry more weight, in other times in Tanach too.

One example is in sefer Malachim where the Navi Elisha was hosted by the ishah Shunamis. She went to great lengths to make sure that he was comfortable, to the extent that they built and furnished a room for him whenever he will be visiting the area and needed a place to stay. Unfortunately, the couple were childless for many years and they longed for the day when they will have a child of their own. As a result of Elisha's great gratitude for all they did for him, he gave them a heartfelt bera-

chah that they would have a son in a year. Indeed, this came into fruition and a year later they were blessed with a son. We can make use of this idea too. For example, if someone does us a favor we can contemplate how much we appreciated what they did and then give them a heartfelt blessing. Our Tzadikim were very particular about this, as we see in the following story.

Rabbi Chatzkel Levenstein, the renowned mashgiach of Mir, was extremely grateful to a certain individual who helped the yeshivah escape to Shanghai during WWII. By a series of great miracles, the Yeshivah was able to successfully escape and was the only Yeshivah from Europe that was still functioning during the war. A while later, this man traveled to Eretz Yisrael to ask

the mashgiach for a berachah. Unfortunately, they had been married for 12 years without having children. Rav Chatzkel was so appreciative to this man for the efforts he went to of saving the Yeshivah that he gave him an extremely heartfelt brachah that he would be blessed with a son in that year. Indeed, a year later, they celebrated their son's bris milah!



Rabbi Avigdor Miller teaches that we can also use this idea when we recite berachos to Hashem. Before, we recite a berachah we should try and contemplate Hashem's incredible kindness for giving us this piece of food. Countless steps occurred to produce just one piece of food, and without food we would not be alive. Moreover, Hashem could have just given us a pill with all the nutrients we need, yet in His abundant kindness He gave us a wide array of delicious foods, with different tastes and textures! We should try and feel gratitude when we eat and subsequently channel these feelings into love for Hashem. This will make our experience of saying a berachah far more powerful than just lip service.

Did you notice that garbage truck driving down the street? It holds a lot of garbage, doesn't it? So, if I told you that you eat that amount of food every year, you might be shocked. I saw recently that an average person eats approximately 4 pounds of food on a regular weekday. On Shabbos we eat much more, which means that we eat

around 40 pounds every week. That comes out to be around 160 pounds a month which can fill the garbage container outside your home. By the end of the year, you will have eaten almost one ton of food – the volume of a regular garbage truck. After 100 years of life that will be 100 tons of food, which is literally the size of a mountain of garbage in the local garbage dump.

When I read that, the first thought which entered my mind was how much chesed Hashem is performing on a constant basis. As we say in *bentching*, בהן את העולם כולו בטובו בהן ובחסד וברחמים – Hashem, in His Goodness, feeds the entire world with grace,

kindness and mercy! Hashem is giving this amount of food to over 8



billion human beings! And this is besides the food He gives to the twenty quintillion (= 20 billion billion) known living creatures who need to eat constantly. Many of these species are huge animals that consume phenomenal amounts of food. עולם הסד יבנה – it is a world full of chesed. If we think about this we will be overwhelmed with feelings of joy! The Master of the Universe, Who bestows so much good on the world, is our Father in Heaven, and He cares for each and every one of us personally.

Now the big question is, what happens to that tremendous amount of food that we place in our mouths? Where does it go? In many homes there is a garbage disposal under the sink. You flip the switch and its sharp blades shred and pulverize any junk that may be stuck in the pipes. But like all physical matters, eventually the blades or motor stop working. The average lifespan of a garbage disposal is 10 - 12 years, and it certainly cannot chop up even a fraction of the food that we eat in one year without getting worn out. On the other hand, Hashem created us with a digestive system that churns, chops, pulverizes and breaks down our food to molecular particles! All this is done without motors or metal blades. In most cases, a person's system faithfully digests tons of food for 80 to 90 years without stopping! We don't even feel all that is going on inside of us. This amazing system separates the good from the bad, sending what we need to all parts of the body, and expelling the waste in a respectable manner. So, Hashem doesn't just give us food, He also deals with what has to happen to it.

We all know how careful the medical staff in the hospital needs to be to avoid germs and bacteria. They constantly wipe their hands with alcohol-based hand disinfectants and clean all surfaces with strong cleaning agents. Special gloves are used and many precautions are taken. But when it comes to eating, our food may have billions of bacteria and germs, yet we ingest it into our bodies without a care in the world. Indeed, Hashem has also protected us from these dangers. Our digestive system is lined with mucus to catch the germs, and strong acids to kill bacteria. Not only that, different parts of the food, such as protein and fat, require different chemicals to break them down, and our bodies provide each and every one of them. No need to bring in huge chemical tankers with special precautions and hazardous liquid signs, Hashem has provided us with everything. If we think about this before we say Asher Yatzar, it will take on a new light!

Eretz Yisroel and Bavel

-When the first Beis Hamikdash was destroyed by the Babylonians, the Jewish

people were exiled to Bavel for seventy years. However, after this period was over, Bavel was conquered by the Persian Empire, and the Persian king Koresh gave permission for the Jews to rebuild the Beis Hamikdash. Koresh's son, Artachshasta, gave permission to Ezra Hasofer to go there and lead the people in their efforts. When Ezra went to Eretz Yisroel, he brought many Jews with him. However, not everyone returned. Some Jews had become accustomed to living in Bavel and were unwilling to leave. From this point on, there were now two Jewish communities: one in Eretz Yisroel, and one in Bavel. These were the two main Jewish communities for around a thousand years.

- Ezra brought all of the talmidei chachomim with him. Therefore, in his time, the Jewish community in Eretz Yisroel was greater in Torah than the one in Bavel. This continued throughout the period of the Tannaim. However, there were some exceptions. For example, the Gemara Pesachim 66a describes how the chachomim had a question in the laws of Korban Pesach, and nobody was able to resolve it, until Hillel arrived from Bavel, and answered the question. Then, they immediately appointed him as the nasi of the Sanhedrin. However, after the time of the Mishna, things changed. Around this time, the Roman Empire, which controlled Eretz Yisroel, became Christian. They persecuted the Jews, and it was very difficult to live in Eretz Yisroel. Therefore, most of the chachomim moved to Bavel, and during the period of the Amoraim, Bavel was the greater Jewish community in terms of Torah learning. There are two versions of the Talmud: the Yerushalmi and the Bavli. The Talmud Yerushalmi was edited by Rabbi Yochanan, who was an early Amora. Due to the persecutions in Eretz Yisroel, it became difficult to learn Torah there. That's why the Yerushalmi is shorter, and less clear. The Bavli was written many generations later, and is longer, and more clearly edited. That's why the Talmud Bavli is the gemara that's mostly studied today.

- After the period of the Amoraim was the period of the Geonim. There were two major yeshivos in Bavel: Sura and Pumbedisa. The Geonim were the Roshei Yeshivos of these yeshivos, and they were considered to be the leaders of the Jewish people. They were the

experts in the Talmud, and also in halacha. However, at the same time, there was also a smaller community in Eretz Yisroel. The chachomim of Fretz Yisroel had a different focus. They were known for their expertise in Tanach. Some of these chachomim were known as the Baalei Mesorah. They knew every word in Tanach, and

> how it should be spelled. They are also the ones who created the nekudos and the trup notes that we



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use today. The actual pronunciation of the Torah and the notes to sing it are a tradition M'sinai. They only invented the signs that tell us how they should be pronounced or sung.

- A couple of major disputes between the chachomim of Eretz Yisroel and Bavel (in general the opinion of the Chachmei Bavel was ultimately accepted):

1. The Gemara Megillah 29b says that in Eretz Yisroel they had a system where they finished reading the Torah once every three years. It was only in Bavel that the Torah was broken into parshios so that the Torah was completed once every year. Nowadays, everyone uses this division.

2. In the year 921 there was a major dispute in the Jewish world about the calendar. Rav Aharon ben Meir was the head of the yeshiva in Eretz Yisroel. He had a different calculation than the Geonim in Bavel. According to his calculations, the Yom Tovim would



2. In the year 921 there was a major dispute in the Jewish world about the calendar. Rav Aharon ben Meir was the head of the yeshiva in Eretz Yisroel. He had a different calculation than the Geonim in Bavel. According to his calculations, the Yom Tovim would be two days earlier than according to the Chachomim in Bavel. He claimed that as the head of the yeshiva in Eretz Yisroel, he was the highest authority, and everyone had to follow him. The Geonim realized that this machlokes could split the Jewish people, as they would be keeping the Yom Tovim on different days. Rav Saadiah Gaon wrote against Rav Aharon ben Meir, and successfully refuted him. After only a couple of years, the dispute died out, and everyone followed the calendar of the Geonim in Bavel.

- Slowly, Jews started moving to other communities, such as in Europe and Africa. However, they still turned to the Geonim in Bavel as their halachic authorities. There is a story brought in the Iggeres of Rav Sherira Gaon that there was a boat with four rabbis, who were traveling to collect money for the yeshivos in Bavel. They were captured by pirates and ransomed by various Jewish communities (one in Spain, one in Egypt, one in Tunisia, and the fourth is unknown). This was the beginning of the period of the Rishonim, when the far-flung Jewish communities started having their own rabbonim and yeshivos, and they stopped turning to Bavel as their authority. Now, the Jewish world became much more spread out.

These are the sons of Yishmael, and these are their names in their open cities and in their walled cities, twelve princes to their nations. (Breishis 25:16)



And Eisav said to Yaakov, "Pour into [me] some of this red, red [pottage], for I am faint"; he was therefore named Edom. (Breishis 25:30)

Sometimes when reading these narratives in the Torah we are tempted to focus on the many details of family dynamics between brothers competing for their father's attention. There are valuable life lessons that can have a direct impact on the way we live

our lives and raise our families.

However, let us take a step back. There is a much bigger picture here that is worth trying to grasp. I am always struck when reading about these accounts in the Torah. The picture is so wide and the perspective is so deep that once perceived it's hard not to feel totally enveloped by its profundity. Let me explain!

Here we are being told about a few local personalities and their idiosyncrasies, their quirks, foibles, and faults. These ones opt out of the blessed path and these choose themselves into the Jewish People and the promises granted to Avraham.

Yishmael and Eisav both fathered nations that would be major players till today and until the end of history. Let me ask you, "Which family around today will be important 5 years from now? Whose progeny will be prominent? Who will still be heralded 10 or 100 years from now? No one knows. We don't know about next year or the next political cycle. Some will rise and others will fall and most will be swept away by the broom of history and forgotten, even though they make noise and attract the headlines today. No one can tell, no one! Now take a look at what is being spelled out here with sober eyes.

One evening at the dinner table on a regular weekday evening my youngest son, who was all of six years old at the time, asked without any prompting, "Will Avraham Avinu be known 1,000 years from now?" We chuckled and looked at him with amazement. We laughed because the term, "1,000 years" coming out of the mouth of someone so young seemed way out of proportion. We looked with amazement because it is a very profound question. I told him, "Yes! Avraham has been known for the past 3,700 year and there is no reason to believe that he will be any less important as time goes by." Who could have known all of this back then!? The Torah is clearly not a history book about the past. Out of the realm of history we are treated to current events in a way that no human could have known, predicted, or orchestrated. The Torah is remarkable!

From Yishmael emanated a large nation with a current population of perhaps 1.5 billion people, and from Edom too a largely religious grouping has grown to approximately 1.5 billion people. These from Yishmael would adhere to the Lunar calendar of 354 days in a year while the descendants of Eisav would be obedient to the Solar calendar of 365 ¼ days a year. The Jewish People keep a Lunar calendar that adjusts to the Solar calendar so that Pesach comes out in Chodesh Aviv, the spring. The children of Yishmael rest on Fridays and the children of Eisav moved their day of rest to Sunday. No one disputes that Shabbos is Shabbos. They just backed away from that day. The Jewish People keep Shabbos, as the verse states, "And the Children of Israel keep the Shabbos, to make the Shabbos for generations, an eternal covenant between Me and between the Children of Israel. It's an eternal sign!" Can we have a bigger sign than that?

The name Eisav comes from ASU "doing". Eisav is a classic builder, conqueror, and doer in this world. The essence of Yishmael's name is SHEMA, listening. Their focus is very much on the next world. There is a bizarre ideal to martyr oneself and exit this world quickly to discover some imagined pleasure in another realm. The Jewish People have understood that the Next World is called the World to Come. It comes from what we did in this world. It's the explanation and expansion of what we accomplished in this world. If one acted kindly then kindliness awaits them but if one caused suffering then that cruelty will be heaped upon them. When the Jewish People accepted the Torah we said, "Naaseh v' Nishma" – "We will do (in this world) and then we'll understand (the ultimate results in the world to come). Thousands of Good Shabbos! years ago the Torah described the world around us.

THE QUOTE: The Rambam in his Sefer Hamitzvos lists among the מצוות לא תעשה (negative Mitzvos), not to have fear when at war. If one did have fear when going to war, he would have to return from the battlefield as it says (Devarim 20:8), "Who is the one who fears and is weak of heart, let him go and return to his house."

THE LESSON: What makes this so incredible and amazing is that Hashem does not want to have to have any fear, to the extent that He made מצוות (negative Mitzvos), not to have fear when at war. The only fear Hashem wants us to have in our life is יראת שמים – Reverence and Fear of Hashem, which will prevent us from doing anything wrong. That is the ONLY fear that Hashem wants to have. All other fears Hashem wants us to get rid of!

THE STORY: The following STORY I heard from HARAV AVROHOM CHAIM FOYER Shlit"a;

In Russia, there was once a Chossid who approached his Rebbe the דר" and said, "Rebbe, I need Chizuk in Tefillah!" The Rebbe asked the Chossid "Why do you suddenly need chizzuk in Tefillah?" The Chossid replied with a story. "Seven years ago, I was pass-

ing a courthouse and I heard torturous screams coming from inside the building. Curios to see what was happening, I went inside. I saw how there was young gentile there who was getting heavy lashes on his bare back and was bleeding and screaming in pain. I went over to one of the people standing by and asked him why this fellow was deserving of such

heavy blows. The one I asked explained to me that the fellow was a soldier in the Czar's army, and when he was on duty, one of his ears got frozen solid from the freezing cold.

Bewildered I asked him, "I do not understand, such loyalty to the Czar that he worked in the ice cold to the extent that his ear froze! I would give this soldier a medal for his devoted work and here he is getting punished for it?!!" I could not understand, but he explained it to me.

"You see, he said, when you are working under

the Czar, you have the mindset that you are in such awe and trepidation that your blood needs to be bubbling from the fear of the Czar. If a soldier's ear could possibly freeze while working under the Czar of Russia it is a sign that he doesn't realize and comprehend who he is standing in front of."

The chossid continued, "After hearing this I thought to myself, if this is the attitude one has live toward the czar a king of flesh and blood all the more so I need to have a feeling a trepidation when I stand in front of the Rebono Shel Oilum when I daven. After this story I had a tremendous chizuk in my Tefillah and when I would daven, I would stand in awe and fear of Hashem, like an eved stand in front of his master. However, now it is already seven years later, and I feel I need chizuk in my Davening again, so that is why I came to the Rebbe to ask for chizuk in Tefillah.

THE LESSON:

What can we learn from this story?

True, our ears don't freeze when we daven. But we face many distractions. A phone, for example, can distract someone, or stam, it is very easy to

> space out. We learn from this story to try not to space out all the time or be busy with other thingswhile standing in front of Hashem.

This soldier was not even standing directly in front of the Czar, whereas when we daven, we are standing Mamesh in front of Hashem.

A BIG Difference

THERE IS A MAJOR DIFFERENCE to keep in mind between working for the Czar and serving Hashem. Hashem only want to shower us with good and He loves us more than we love ourselves. Therefore, when we stand in front of Hashem in Tefillah it is not just as an eved stand in fear and trepidation in front of his master. Rather it is also like a child standing in front of the most generous, capable, loving and caring Father and Retzono Yisborach L'heitiv

The Zera Shimshon says that when Yitzchak Avinu tells Eisav to find an animal and prepare a meal, Rivka tells Yaakov, "Right here in our yard I have an animal. Go take it quickly and prepare a meal for your father."

When Yaakov Avinu brings Yitzchak his meal, Yitzchak asks him, "How did you do it so quickly?" Yaakov replies, "כי הקרה ד' אלק-ך" – Hashem placed the animal in front of me."

The Zera Shimshon asks, "Why isn't this statement a lie? The animal was not placed in front of Yaakov by Hashem- it was living in Yitzchak and Rivka's yard. It belonged to them."

The Zera Shimshon answers that the Possuk is coming to teach us a fundamental lesson. There is nothing "natural" about this world. Teva does not exist! There is no such thing as, "Oh, I had an animal in my yard, so I went to get it, and that's why it's here." If you have an animal in your yard, it's because Hashem put it there.

The Chofetz Chaim explains that when the Torah describes a particular trait of one of the Avos, we understand that Hashem considers it his most exalted Middah. Yaakov is described as an Ish Tam. According to the Pele Yoetz, this means that Yaakov Avinu lived with Emunah and Bitachon throughout his long, confusing, and difficult life. His complete trust in Hashem despite the challenges was his most important attribute in the eyes of Hashem.

The Midrash explains that the reason Yitzchak Avinu became blind is because it was Yitzchak who requested that Hashem give Klal Yisroel some pain in this world. Yitzchok understood that Yissurim cleanse the Neshama like soap and shampoo and the Neshama arrives to the Next World completely pure, ready to enjoy the bliss of Olam Haba.

Hashem was pleased with this request and He fulfilled it, starting with Yitzchak Avinu. Obviously, blindness was the perfect cleanser for Yitzchok's Neshama.

live in a tiny basement apartment. There are hardly any windows, and it feels like I'm in a dungeon. To make matters worse, my neighbor just extended his house, blocking the small amount of sunlight that used to reach me. The overall 'feel' of the apartment is very dark and depressing. What is the Emunah and Bitachon perspective about this?

If your discomfort comes from living in a dark basement apartment, you are being saved from car accidents and trips to the hospital, R"L. In fact, Hashem has a policy of rewarding those who appreciate His gifts by giving them even more to enjoy and granting them even more opportunities to thank Him. By being grateful in your current situation, you will enable Hashem to shower you with His open kindness, chessed and rachamim!

STORIES with a spark

Reb Yitzchak Skurnik shared the following story:

couple of years ago my father-in-law developed a serious medical condition. They had to do a surgery which compromised his immune system. After the surgery he felt extremely weak. It got so bad that the doctors estimated he had only six months to live.

"Shortly thereafter, my father-in-law came down with a very bad infection. The doctors said he needed a very extensive surgery in order to survive. However, since he was in such poor health, the head doctor ruled out surgery.

"One night I was taking a shift in the hospital with my father- inlaw, and we were listening to Rabbi Ephraim Wachsman's song, 'I believe in Hashem.' Then one of the doctors (a big atheist) walked in. When he heard the words, "I believe in Hashem, I trust in Hashem," he turned to me and asked, 'Why in the world are you playing these songs? You really think Hashem is going to help you? Sorry, there is no such thing.' Then he left.

"It was in the middle of the night and I had a headache, so I stepped out to the Bikur Cholim room to get something for the pain. There I met a frum doctor and I described the situation. I told him that I really want them to do the surgery on my father-in-law, even if the other doctors said it was impossible for him to survive. According to Teva, they might be right, but if we went with Emunah and Bitachon, Hashem could certainly send my father-in-law a Refuah Shelaimah.

"The doctor told me, 'Okay, I will speak to the head doctor on your behalf. Though I must tell you; I really do not think there is any point in doing the surgery. It really is impossible that your father- in-law will come out alive.'

"The doctor was true to his word, and he spoke to the head doctor. The head doctor came in and told me, 'I'll tell you the

truth. If your father-in-law were a gentile, there is no way I would agree to do the surgery. But since he is a Jew, my experience is that Jews don't operate according to the laws of nature. Therefore, I'm willing to give it a chance.'

"After the surgery the atheist doctor who had told us not to operate, came over to me and said emotionally, 'There is only one reason your father- in-law is alive today: it can only be that there is a G-d. I will never consider myself an atheist again.'


"It is now over two years later. My fatherin-law is still with us. He has no immune system. He has been exposed to Covid and other diseases, but he is still alive!"

This is a concept I talk to clients about "enjoy the ride in Hashem's beautiful wonderful world." Hashem gave us a wonderful ride. Each moment we can stop for a second and think, Thank You, Hashem, I can walk. Thank You, Hashem, I can see. Thank You, Hashem, for the gorgeous sky. Thank Hashem for the colored leaves. Thank Hashem for the bright sun. Thank Hashem for an interesting bird you pass. Thank Hashem for the waves crashing over the ocean and for the sunsets.

Story:

There was a young adult who said she never felt the feeling of fun in her life. I took her to see Hashem's gorgeous sunsets. We saw sunsets at the beach with waves crashing. We saw sunsets at the park through the trees and we saw sunsets out of my kitchen window. We checked the trees and ground for all different color leaves and went running through the leaves. We watched the waves crashing and found interesting birds outside. Then we would practice imagining we were at these gor-

geous sights to make the feeling part of us. The young adult said this made her feel alive and she felt full inside and the feeling of fun.

It is such an amazing joyous feeling to feel Hashem's gorgeous world in your bones. No matter where you live you can always look up at the sky and see a clear blue sky or clouds moving or a colorful sunset. And if you're fortunate to live near trees or an ocean sit for a few moments and contemplate how good Hashem is and how glorious the world is. Once you feel joy inside of you- spread the feeling with those around you. Share the joy and Simcha of being alive in Hashem's magnificent world.

And if you are not near an ocean, take a moment to imagine the feeling of being at one. If you are not near trees and flowers, take a moment to image the feeling of being near trees swaying in the wind or near colorful flowers that smell delicious. Feel yourself encased in Hashem's goodness and love every single day!

I just love to try to give people support and chizuk. As an aside: Doing for others makes us feel so good ourselves and fills our own emotional bank account!

Idea: It's so easy to share love with other people.

- Pump yourself up by dancing out of appreciation for Hashems gorgeous world.
- Pump yourself up by singing to Hashem while imagining you are in your favorite nature scene.
- Notice the clouds in the sky, the colorful leaves, the sunsets, the rain drops, the snow flakes, the ocean, the trees and feel your bones fill with love for Hashem: The One and only Creator of this delicious world!

- ❖ Share this delight with your children, spouse, friends, charvusas, neighbors, students, clients, Shul members, and everyone else around you.
- Share this delight by sharing how you feel as opposed to telling others how to feel. For example: I am just feeling so much joy seeing these beautiful clouds Hashem made, and how they are moving with such perfection and fascination. This makes the person wonder and contemplate and then perhaps decide to get involved in this action and feeling. Telling another person how to feel can make them not as interested. A deep sense of HeartTsharing comes from genuinely sharing about yourself in this way with no pressure for them to follow.
 - * Talk about Hashem's glorious world often.
- Spread joy by turning on music in your homes and adding a joyful step to your move.
- ❖ Talk to Hashem often, as He is our Father and best Friend.

As an adult, I try to sing this song all the time! I try to change up the motions or dance steps as I sing this song. This creates a function called expansion. When we add change to something while we are singing, it helps solidify the feelings associated with it. The more times we sing and add a small change, the more neural pathways we have connected to what we are doing. This helps it become more integrated into us.



Feeling Hashem's Love!

This ocean picture reminds me how much Hashem loves me! It made me feel a strong feeling of Hashleich Al Hashem Yeahuvcha Viho Yechalkilecha. Cast your burdens on Hashem and He will provide for you. I left the ocean feeling like I was able to just throw all my burdens on Hashem and feel fantastic.

It also made me feel like Hashem made this world for me. Bishvlie Nivra Haolum! We need to take time to talk to ourselves and take care of ourselves. This can help us have time to develop our relationship with Hashem. We have a Pirchei Lev program that is filled with bi-weekly lessons to help children expand their thinking and emotional regulation. The program is in the framework of Toradik themes and the level six of the program is all about teaching children Bishvieli Nivra Haoulm.

We want to feel so connected to Hashem and feel this whole entire world was created because Hashem wants me to enjoy and feel good inside. Hashem loves me endlessly.

Cast your burden on Hashem. He will bail you out. This is IF you turn to Hashem and realize there is no one to go to besides Hashem! In Ritzei it says Hashem wants us, He loves us and wants us like a father to a child.

- My joints were really hurting. I heard Rabbi Bloch when he was on an interview together with Rabbi Eisemann share: Say with your full heart and soul loudly: Hashem Tzevakos Ashrei Adom Botaiach Bach for one hour- for anything you need. I tried this and kept repeating the Possuk as many times as possible and when I was finished, I was in no pain.

Another time the joint pain was really painful so I decided to say Hakol Yochol very loud and intentionally for three minutes. I set a timer and when it rang, I was still in pain so I set the timer for another three minutes. I did this 4 times for a total of 12 minutes and the pain disappeared!

I was on my way to the ocean one day with a leased car and it was making a lot of sounds when I was braking. I said hakol yochel and it felt dangerous to drive so I called Chaveirim and they said I should go to a mechanic. I was not going to have any time after going to the mechanic to go back to the ocean so I said: Thank you Hashem for this disturbance to my day and also thank you that I am alive and well. And also thank you Hashem for the mechanic. I also thought Hashem can give me the same extra peace of mind at

the mechanic than I would have at the ocean. I felt so calm and relaxed knowing Hashem plans the footsteps of man and this is where I was meant to be. A huge Nes was that at the mechanic, they found a huge "rock" stuck in the brake. He took it out and he didn't charge me and that was it. I went to a park nearby – Thank You, Hashem - and felt Hashem's loving kindness. I felt my neck and back (that were in pain) aencased with Hashem's love starting to get better and better by the second.

Q & A with Rabbi Zevy Golombeck By R' Shalom Yedidya Klatzko


Q: I suffer tremendously from kaas; I get angry at my family and children. I am working so hard on it and wish I could be a good, loving, caring father, but I am far from it. As much as I try not to get angry, I have such a hard time controlling myself, and I keep on falling. It makes me so upset, and now I feel tzebrachen and tzeklapt. What's the Emunah and Bitachon perspective about all this?

A: The Rebbeinu Yona says that the biggest and most important mitzvah is to appreciate yourself; to hold of yourself; to fargin yourself. To understand that, 'Yes. I am human. Being human means that you fall.' That is how Hakadosh Baruch Hu made you! The point of this world is not to knock yourself. The point is adaraba to say, "I am the best father in the world! My children are so lucky to have me! You know why? Because I'm a father that cares about doing the right thing! I'm working on myself to do the right thing!" Just by working on yourself, that makes you the best father, more than anyone else! Hakdosh Baruch Hu says that He is going to give us flaws. He wants to see if we are working on ourselves and doing our daily exercises. If we are, we are fulfilling the purpose of why we were created!

You want your children to feel loved, watched and protected?

Feelings come from our loving, caring Hakadosh Baruch Hu, the Ribono Shel Olam. He is in charge of how your children feel.

Tell Hakadosh Baruch Hu, that you want your children to feel loved, cared for, watched and protected even though you get angry and scream at them! Turn it into a business. Whenever you get angry, apologize and give them a compliment and affection afterwards! Show them that even though you got angry, you still love them!

Illuminating Words of Chazal

"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Rav Yehuda Mandel

Q: We know Hashem does everything. How could it be that the earth disobeyed Hashem's command and grew trees that the wood didn't taste like the fruit? Was it up to the earth to create something as it chooses? We know that Hashem alone created everything. How do we understand this Chazal?

A: Of course everything is Hashem! Hashem wanted the trees to do exactly what they did. So what does it mean that it was really supposed to taste like the tree and then it didn't?

Hashem is trying to show you what He really wanted, but I'maaseh the world couldn't survive like that. So let's first see what He wanted, why He wanted it like that, and why the world can't be like that.

Hashem wanted the trees to taste like the fruit to show how much pleasure Hashem wants to give us. Hashem wants us to not only be able to eat from the fruit, we should be able to go and start snacking on the whole tree! Hashem is saying, I

want the whole thing to be full of pleasure, full of geshmak. You should eat everything. That's what Hashem is trying to teach us. That's why He created this world – for us to enjoy, for us to have pleasure, for us to have geshmak. It says in the Yerushalmi, "asid litein din v'cheshbon" for each type of fruit you didn't taste. Because that's why this world is made, to feel loved by Hashem, to feel cared for.

R' Yehuda Mandel said everyone is supposed to take one Chazal and make it their Chazal. You know which Chazal he chose? The one that says Hashem is going to judge you if you don't taste from all the delicious, yummy, scrumptious food. Because Hashem wants us to have pleasure. That's why it's as if Hashem is saying, "Really I want the tree to taste like the fruit so you should have not just the fruit, but you

should be able to eat from the whole thing.

Can you imagine, R' Avigdor Miller says, if you would have a sefer made out of chocolate? You would eat up the whole sefer! Which is going to bring us to point number two. That is why Hashem made it that a tree couldn't taste like the fruit, because if the tree would taste like the fruit you know what would happen? We'd eat up the whole tree and then there wouldn't

be any fruits left... So it's gufa because Hashem wants to give us pleasure, and since if He would give us too much pleasure we would eat up all the trees and then we wouldn't have any fruits, so therefore Hashem couldn't make the tree taste like the fruit.

Chazal mean that really Hashem wanted the trees to taste like the fruit, that's l'chatchila. Why? To give us more pleasure and more pleasure and more pleasure. But, technically speaking, if that happens we're going to run into big problems – there's not going to be any more fruits. If there's no more fruits, then what's going to be? Hashem wants to shower us with so many delicacies.

So therefore, bottom line is that Hashem wants to give us pleasure and more and more pleasure. But if Hashem would give us too much pleasure, then we would end up with no pleasure. So Hashem had to make boundaries. He had to make the tree not taste good. Like this we won't eat the tree, the tree would grow fruits and the fruits would be delicious.

HOW HASHEM SAVED AN ENTIRE VILLAGE MIRACULOUS SALVATION IN KFAR MAIMON – A HEAVEN SENT ARMY

Rabbi Fohrman (founder of Aleph Beta Academy for teaching and disseminating Torah) was visiting evacuees from Kfar Maimon at a hotel in Israel. One of them told him how it happened that their settlement did not suffer any casualties, even though it is situated back to back with Be'eri and other settlements that came under attack on Shabbat Simchat Torah.

"We were in shul that morning

when we heard the sirens go off with incessant rocket attacks. Our Rav told us to go home, go into the safe room and turn on the radio. We learned that terrorists had infiltrated the communities. At the time, we thought that it was just a few dozen and had no idea that it was an invasion of over 2000 Hamas terrorists.

Although every settlement has a volunteer group to defend itself, for some inexplicable reason the army had taken away the guns from Kfar Maimon, so we were literally were unarmed.

I created a plan with my four sons

how to defend ourselves if terrorists come to the door. I took them into the kitchen and told them to each take the longest knife they could find and station themselves near the door. Maybe if one or two terrorists came in we would be able to overcome them and my wife and daughter would escape through the back door.

Meanwhile, news was coming in that a band of forty heavily armed terrorists had gathered outside the Yishuv and getting reading to blast

their way in. We made an emergency call to the army to send us back-up. IDF replied, "We have no-one to send you". All IDF forces were in pitch battle with terrorists in Be'eri, the next-door kibbutz.

At that point, an army helicopter came overhead flying low on its way to Be'eri. The terrorists massed at the gate saw the helicopter and sensed an opportunity. One of them fired an anti-tank missile at the helicopter. It brought the helicopter down, the helicopter crashed to the ground but did not explode, its doors opened and 25 IDF soldiers came pouring out and immediately took up positions as they saw these 40 terrorists. The helicopter exploded without harming anyone. In the ensuing fierce gun battle which lasted four hours, the soldiers eliminated all forty terrorists with no IDF casualties.

That is why my family and I are here to tell the story to you."





It bothers me a lot when I see people who don't keep Torah and Mitzvos. It feels like they are messing up Hashem's world. Please help!

- 1. The number one thing you need to realize is that you are looking at the physical body. The body is just a coat. It's the not the person! The person is a neshama which part of Hashem and is above and beyond anything you can comprehend.
- 2. 99.9% of these people grew up in non-frum homes. Or they grew up in homes where they felt that Hashem hated them c"v. Had Hashem decided to put you in those same families, you would be exactly like them c"v!

Obviously, Hashem has a plan and purpose for everything. And it's not your business to judge and condemn.

3. Show them that you care about them. Show them the beauty of Torah and Mitzvos in gentle manner. Tell them how much Hashem loves them. Draw them closer to Hashem in a pleasant way.







Let us imagine for just a few minutes that the world as we know it would turn on its head, and people would suddenly have the ability to see invisible things, like germs...

Life would be terrifying! Everywhere one looked, nasty-looking germs would be lurking, ready to spread disease.

People would walk around with full-fledged Corona gear. The more relaxed people would wear masks and gloves. The more fearful ones would be decked out in face shields and HAZMAT suits. Since these suits trap heat, the wearers would be at risk for heatstroke c"v. Additionally, the suits restrict movement, causing clumsiness.

People would refuse to open their mouths in case some germs would enter their throats. This would prevent people from davening, learning, singing, shmoozing, and doing anything else that requires opening one's mouth. People would literally walk around with a notepad and pen to communicate with others. Of course, smiling requires stretching the lips, which may cause some germs to enter, so no smiling would be allowed either. Then again, people would be wearing masks anyway...

The masses of crawling bacteria found on all foods would disgust people to the point that they would prefer to starve rather than eat it. Despite the fact that many bacteria are beneficial, such as those found in yogurt, people would not be able to bring themselves to swallow the bacteria. Drinking water would have the same issue, leading to dehydration c"v.

People would be nervous from all the germs on their skin and would spend many hours in the shower futilely trying to rub them off. However, the shower water also contains bacteria...

All this hand and body washing would lead to terribly chapped and bleeding skin, necessitating endless visits to the dermatologist and various expensive creams.

Hypochondria would be the most diagnosed condition in the world; therapists would be busy day and night trying to calm the populace. People would be constantly popping tranquilizers, but every time they would see bacteria, they would be afraid all over again...

Children would sense their parents' anxiety and would therefore be extremely anxious as well. They would consistently wake up with nightmares of the "big, bad germs" chasing them and making them sick.

People would self-diagnose! As soon as they would see strep bacteria on their skin, they would take medication for strep throat. A few minutes later, they would see other bacteria and take medication for that as well. The antibiotic overdoses would cause major harm to the body c"v.

People would buy Lysol and never stop spraying. This would cause tremendous damage, ranging from throat irritation to chemical poisoning, c"v.

Social life would come to an abrupt halt, as people would be too fearful of contracting their friends' germs to socialize. Coughing or sneezing without a mask on would be a capital crime. Everyone would berate the poor person for his extreme carelessness and thoughtlessness in spreading germs.

The lack of socialization would be especially harmful to children, who need to play with others for proper emotional development.

In short, if germs were visible, people would not be able to eat, drink, talk, sing, daven, learn, socialize, sneeze, cough, breathe...

Who knew that certain elements needed to be concealed from the human eye in order for people to live healthy, functional lives?




