This really shocking scene was followed by an even more peculiar one. As he started saying Kaddish he stuttered, swallowed and jumbled the words.

After Mincha, everyone tried to figure out what exactly it was all about. Slowly the story was pieced together and the righteousness of the Alter was revealed. A gentleman in the town became a mourner, and due to his poor reading skills, when he went to the Amud he read the words with great difficulty and was terribly embarrassed.

The Alter showed him that even he can have trouble before the Amud sometimes due to nervousness. In this way, the Alter embarrassed himself to alleviate the pain of another.

Hints & Answers* Halacha Challenge: The Sefer Shemiras Shabbos Kehilchosa (55:8) writes, "Lechatchila, one should make sure that the challah is completely whole. Therefore, one should remove the challah's sticker only after cutting the challah, in order that the challah should be whole at the time of the Hamotzi blessing." And in the footnote, the author writes, "And when removing the sticker, one should remove a little bit of challah with it, in order not to cut the letters on the sticker." RHYME: "united". RIDDLE: Sefer Torah scrolls. When they leave the Aron Kodesh (at least 4 times each week) they are taken to the right side of the Aron Kodesh, and when are returned, they are returned from the left side of the Aron Kodesh. TRIVIA: 1. Ki Savo (Devorim 27:2). 2. Yaakov Avinu. When he was sleeping, Hashem folded the entire Land of Israel under him. See Rashi to Bereishis 28:13 SHMITTA: TRUE. 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Halacha Challenge







After making Kiddush, Abba asked everyone to go wash for hamotzi. Shortly afterwards, a long line was formed by the kitchen sink. Yaakov left Be'er Sheva and went to Charan [Bereishis 28:10]

Midrash Rabba (68:2) teaches that on his journey to Charan, Yaakov Avinu said: אַשַא עיני אָל הָהָרִים מאָין יבא עוָרי - I raise my eyes...where will my נורי come from? [Tehillim 121:2] (As insightful side note, peirush Maharzu says that all 15 of Shir Hama'alos in Tehillim originated from Yaakov Avinu.) The Midrash explains that עורי (lit. helper) that Yaakov was asking about was his future wife. As we know, the Torah refers to Adam's wife as עור כנגדו. After asking himself the question "where will my עור כנגדו come from", Yaakov answered to himself: 'עַנְרִי מֵעָם ה' - My עוָרִי will come from Hashem.

Then, the Midrash expounds on the concept of finding one's zivug:

"Rabbi Avahu began the drasha with a verse from Mishlei [19:14]: "A house and wealth are an inheritance from fathers, but a wise woman is from Hashem."

'Rebbi Pinchas said in the name of Rebbi Avahu: We find in Torah, in Prophets and in Writings that a man's wife is [given to him] only from [the direct hashgacha of] HaKadosh Boruch Hu.

'From where do we learn it in the Torah? From the verse (Bereishis 24) 'Lavan and Besuel answered and said: The matter came from Hashem."

'In the Prophets, in learn it from the verse (Shoftim 14:4) "And his father and mother did not know that it was from Hashem...".

"In the Writings, we learn it from the verse (Mishlei 19:14) "A house and wealth are an inheritance from fathers, but a wise woman is from Hashem."

Eitz Yosef explains the last part of that Midrash in the following way: משכלת - The virtues of one's wife are not by chance. Rather, "A wise woman is from Hashem."

With this we can understand what the Midrash said initially: "A man's wife is only from [direct hashgacha of] HaKadosh Boruch Hu." — i.e., Everything about a man's wife is a gift to him from the Ribbono Shel Olam.
