After I finished the shiur, someone told me that it was R' Nosson's yartzeit!

Later on, I got to yeshiva and for no apparent reason, one of my talmidim showed me a short clip of him holding a baby lion. That was after I spoke about lion cubs that very morning!

I felt that Hashem was showing me that He was happy with what I was doing!



What Hashem Cares About Most

"אחה א-ל רואי" — You are Hashem Who sees" (Bereishis 16:13). Rashi explains, "You see the shame of the shamed." But we know that the Borei Olam sees absolutely everything. He knows everything that is done, both openly and in secret. Nothing is hidden from Him. So why does it mention here specifically that Hashem sees "the shame of the shamed"?

Hashem certainly sees everything. But what does He care about most? People's disgrace and embarrassment. "He sees the shame of the shamed!" That's what Hashem cares about

Special Siyata D'Shmaya

יַּנְעָיָנְיָה - And she (Hagar) saw that she conceived and her mistress (Sarah) became belittled in her eyes" (Bereishis 16:4).

As punishment for this, she was sent away from Avraham's house. But as soon as Hagar was in the desert, she suddenly saw malachim coming toward her (see Rashi). Why did she merit to see malachim?

Although she was being punished, right now she was disgraced. She had been Avraham's wife, honored and respected, and now she was all alone! She was sent away, disgraced and embarrassed. Someone in such a situation is treated differently. Min haShamayim, they take interest in him, worry about him, and help him. Malachim came to Hagar and gave her honor.

Hagar understood this, and that's why she praised Hashem and said, "אתה א-ל רואי — You are Hashem Who sees - רואה בֶּעְלבוֹן, הֻעלוֹבִים - "You see the shame of those who were ashamed.





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Hashem created our nose with a perfect combination of being both hard and soft – to ensure that it doesn't get broken and also so it can function constantly.

How did Hashem arrange this perfect balance? Is our nose made out of hard bone or not? Our nose was created with 2 different substances – bone and cartilage. Bone is very hard – it cannot bend. For example, the forearm is a long bone and if too much pressure is put on it then it will break. Cartilage is also bone but it is a much softer version, it can bend without breaking.

The upper 3rd of the nose is made from hard bone – this is the part which is right next to our face and does not protrude too much. Therefore this part has both advantages – it is very strong and it's a solid base that the rest of the nose is built off.

The bottom 2/3rds of the nose is cartilage – the soft bone. So despite the fact that this part protrudes a lot from the face - it doesn't get broken.

We can compare this to silicon which is soft and flexible – yet it retains its shape. It's quite hard to break, due to its flexibility. There is actually not only one type of cartage in our nose but 5 different types of cartilage with varying strengths and flexibility. Wow, thank You, Hashem!

Chapter 8: Enjoying Torah in Olam Hazeh

In this chapter we will discuss many of the pleasures that come from learning Torah, from being connected to Hashem, and from keeping His mitzvos. Additionally, we will see an explanation of what makes studying Torah so sweet.

Sweeter Than Honey

When a person thinks about Torah, one of the first things that comes to his mind is the great mitzvah of Talmud Torah. Obligatory at all times, this mitzvah is the central theme in every frum man's life, from age three and on. Although Chazal refer to Torah study as a "yoke," Dovid Hamelech described Torah as "sweeter than honey and dripping honeycombs." The Ohr Hachaim (Devarim 26:11) wrote that if a person would feel the sweetness and pleasure of learning Torah, he would chase after it like a madman, and a whole world filled with gold and silver would seem like nothing to him!

This teaches us that when Hashem commanded us to learn Torah constantly, He was expressing His desire for us to have this amazing pleasure all the time!

But what exactly is so sweet about learning Torah? This is an important question, because the answer will help one know what to expect from his learning and recognize the sweetness when he experiences it. There may be many explanations for what makes Torah study so sweet. The following is one of them:

A person must know that the most important possession


he has is his own mind (See Toras Avigdor, Parshas Korach 2—Your Mind Is Forever). The human mind is the seat of a person's character and is intended by Hashem to be a receptacle for a vast storehouse of knowledge. Completely empty at birth, the neshamah/mind steadily fills up with knowledge learned from one's experiences and studies



throughout his lifetime.

To a Jew, "Torah" means knowledge, clarity, and understanding. The word "Torah" means "teaching," and Torah is compared to light, as the pasuk says, 'For a mitzvah is a candle and the Torah, a light' (Mishlei 6:23). If one correctly fulfills the mitzvah of studying Torah, he will amass a vast amount of Torah wisdom over the course of his life. This wisdom will bring him to recognize Hashem and follow in His ways, meaning to perfect his character traits — which are very raw from birth.

When a person eventually passes from this world, he leaves his body behind. All that remains is his neshamah: his mind, with the accumu-



lated knowledge of a lifetime, his character (which was molded by that knowledge), and the choices he made in his life. This is the true merchandise of Olam Hazeh.

If the person utilized his time here correctly, he will bring his bonanza of wisdom and character perfection to Olam Haba, where it will provide him with immense pleasure for all of eternity.

If, however, he accumulated the wrong type of knowledge (and sinful experiences), he will have wasted his life, and will arrive in Olam Haba with nothing but a collection of useless, very embarrassing data.

Now we can begin to understand the immense importance of a person's knowledge: It is the basis for his entire life, forming his character and deeply affecting all the decisions he will make throughout his life. And it's the only thing that he can take with him when he leaves the world. With this in mind, let's talk about one of the earliest stages of a person's life: The 'Why' stage.

HASHEM'S Amazing Universe

The Amazing "Waggle Language" of the Honey Bee. (and how a certain Wasp has taught us how to make paper!) Article 44

Continued from last week

Now, let's analyze this a bit. The first question we must ask is how do the bees actually know how far the patch of flowers is from the hive, so that they can communicate that distance?

Do they have an odometer to calculate the distance traveled? Do they have a tape measure?

Truthfully, scientists aren't 100% sure. Nevertheless, experiments seem to indicate that the bees are able to tell how far they have flown from the effort that they need to expand for that particular distance of flight. That alone is quite amazing! Imagine that you want to know how far you have just jogged. Would you be able to figure it out from the how tired you were after the jog? I don't think so, but bees can!

How is it possible? In addition, since it has been determined that each waggle means a certain amount of distance, so lets think about this. The bee expanded a certain amount of effort traveling from the flower back to the hive. Lets say it figures out that the distance is 3000 meters. So, with 30 meters per waggle, IT JUST DOES THE MATH AND FIGURES OUT THAT IT NEEDS TO DO 100 WAGGLES! Excuse me? Are you telling me that the bee can do math? I gave an "easy" math example. What if it was 1,100 meters? The bee would need to divide 1,100 by 30 and come up with the answer that it needs to do exactly 37 waggles! No way! How in the world can the bee figure this out?

In addition, how do all these bees know how to keep these calculations in their brain? Since they don't write anything down, how can they hold the accurate calculations in their mind and then convey those calculations to their fellow bees? This indicates some form of memory in the bees! Okay, so that tells us how they know how far the flowers are from the hive, but how do they know how to figure out how many degrees off the flowers are, in comparison to the sun? For them to communicate how much to the right or the left of the sun the flowers are, they must UNDERSTAND the CONCEPT of using the sun as a "centerpiece/landmark" so to speak, from which to measure how many degrees the flowers are to the right or left of the sun. HOW IS IT POSSIBLE FOR THEM TO FIGURE OUT THESE MEASUREMENTS, WITHOUT ANY MEASURING TOOLS? They just look up into the sky and figure out how many degrees it is off to the left or right of the sun? Can YOU do that? In addition, THEY ALSO KNOW HOW TO FIGURE OUT WHERE THE SUN HAS MOVED TO (the sun keeps moving) and they can adjust their calculations with that KNOWLEDGE. Do YOU have that ability? Of course

THIS IS INCREDIBLE!

not, but the bee has that ability to make such moving calculations!!! It's mind boggling! If they were to be off by just a little with their calculations, that can throw off the measurements by many hundreds of meters and that wouldn't work for the bees.

It's all an IMMENSE MIRACLE of Hashem Who put all this knowledge and all these calculations into the tiny bee's puny little brain!

Once again, we see how Hashem has filled His world with fantastic miracles all around us.

There's another interesting thing to know about honey bees. Bees strive to keep their hive temperature at about 97 degrees Fahrenheit. For any hive to survive they need to know how to cool down the hive if it gets too hot, otherwise they would dehydrate and completely die out. But, have no fear. If it gets much hotter than the 97 degrees, the bees have a "solution". They will go and gather a lot of water. They will then lay the water down on any available surface in the hive and then they fan the water with their wings. This cools off the hive through evaporation, much like we feel cooled off when a breeze goes over our damp skin which causes evaporation. So, we need to ask two questions. WHO taught them this crucial survival mechanism how to cool off the hive? They would have needed to "know" this "trick" from day one, otherwise no hive would ever have survived. Secondly, HOW in the world do they know when the temperature reaches the desired 97 degrees Fahrenheit? Does it have a thermometer to measure the degrees in the hive? Then how does it know the temperature inside the hive? Here's another example of the tremendous amount of knowledge and ability that Hashem has put into the puny little bee brain! Putting all the articles we have written about the honey bee together shows us the enormous abilities and "knowledge" that Hashem has to put into the honey bee for it to function properly. Of course, things are much, much, much more complicated than what we have written, but even the little we have written about shows us how great is Hashem's abilities and how great is His wisdom!!

Finally, we will end with a different bee, which is actually a wasp. This wasp is from where we humans have learned how to make paper!!! Yes, paper! Guess what, they are called paper wasps!

They make the paper from very small particles of wood which the wasp shaves off with their mandibles from trees, or wooden beams, or boards. Then they add their saliva to it and it forms a liquidly paste. While it's still moist they form the hexagon cells and then it dries into a paper like material! Mankind learned to make paper



from wooden fibers, and they have discovered a binding material (similar to the saliva of the wasp) that turns it into paper. What in the world gave the wasp this idea???

Hashem did!

There are many more interesting types of nests that bees and wasps make. Perhaps we will write an article at a later date about them, but for now, BE"H, I will be moving on to the fascinating spider!

Miketz-Chanukah

When the brothers returned to Egypt with Binyamin, Yosef served for them an extravagant feast. Delicious foods were served and the finest wines flowed like water. A fascinating comment of Rashi tells us that this feast was actually the first time that the brothers drank wine since Yosef was sold. This calls for an explanation. Why did they all of a sudden drink wine now? They refrained from drinking wine as an expression of mourning for the loss of Yosef and from their perspective Yosef was still lost. It was beyond their wildest dreams that Yosef was actually hosting their meal!

The Netziv brings a fascinating explanation. He teaches that the reason why the brothers partook in this meal and drank wine was because they considered it to be a seudas hodayah, a meal of thanksgiv-

ing to Hashem! Originally, they were accused of being spies but now it became evident that Yosef believed their story, and was acting friendly towards them. They were so full of gratitude to Hashem that they treated this meal as a seudas hodayah, celebrating heartily and drinking wine. Even though their salvation wasn't complete and Binyomin and Shimon hadn't been safely returned

home, they were still extremely appreciative that things seemed to be turning in their favor and they thanked Hashem for each step of the way.

In the times of the Beis Hamikdash, gratitude was expressed by bringing a korban todah, along with forty loaves and a grand feast, as a public display of gratitude. Since the brothers celebrated their seudas hodayah before the korban todah, they chose wine as a medium to express their gratitude. This is alluded to in the verse in Tehillim, "I will raise up the cup of salvations and call out in the name of Hashem" (116:12). Wine is considered a distinguished beverage, so drinking it at a public gathering, can be a great way of expressing gratitude. (Haemek Davar 43:34)

Making a public display of gratitude is in fact a key aspect of Chanukah. We don't just commemorate the great salvation that happened to us but we publicly thank Hashem for this, known as pirsumai nisah. Therefore, the Menorah should be placed where everyone can see it and can be lit as long as it still can be seen by others. Also, even though everyone lights at home, we also light in Shul to publicize the miracle even more. If one only has the option to purchase wine for kiddush or oil for the candles, he should purchase oil since pirsumai nisah is more important.

We see from all the above examples, how pirsumai nisah plays such an important role in the laws of the candle lighting, since this is really the essence of Chanukah. It is not enough that we feel gratitude for the incredible salvations, but we must publicize the miracle; spreading to the world Hashem's incredible goodness. We can make use of this idea in our own lives too. Whenever we experience a salvation, we can make a reminder of this as a way of publicizing

this to whoever sees. As we see in the following powerful story.

There was once a gabbai tzedakah who was sent by his community in Eretz Yisrael to Europe to raise funds. When he visited Italy, he was hosted by a distinguished philanthropist who lived in an extravagant mansion. The gabbai tzedakah was overwhelmed upon seeing the opulence of his home. The chan-

deliers were made of the finest crystal, there were intricate tapestries and ornate marble floors. He noticed that in the breakfront there was a beautiful solid gold Menorah, but to his surprise there were some broken pieces of a glass bottle lying next to it. "Why are there broken bottle pieces in your breakfront?" he asked his host curiously, "they look very out of place in such a well-kept home." "Well, I would like you to know that they are the most important thing in this house" the host replied, "everything I have is because of these bottles."

The host went on to explain that he was learning very well in Yeshivah when he was younger, and he planned to continue for a long time. One day, he received a letter from his grandfather telling him that the family business was struggling and asking for him to come and help. He decided to temporarily leave Yeshivah and assist his grandfather. Unfortunately, his grandfather passed away suddenly from a heart attack, leaving him

to singlehandedly run the business. He opened many new branches and the business skyrocketed. However, his dedication to his Judaism began to dwindle and he eventually left the path of Torah.



Praising Hashem Keeps Us Going

We are now in the middle of Chanuka, the great Yom Tov of "Giving Thanks," so let us discover a new way to infuse Asher Yatzar with life. Last week we cited Rav Pincus who explained that the reason why Hashem created our bodies with the need to use the restroom several times a day is that it is important to constantly remember that Hashem is the source of life and health. Thanking Him for those fabulous presents will be a reason why IY"H He will give us more.

The truth is that praising and thanking Hashem is our job in this world and a vital component of life. The *Navi Yeshaya* (43:21) tells us, "*Am zu yatzarti li, tehilasi yesapeiru*—I fashioned this people for Myself, that they should declare my praise!" Perhaps Hashem created the human body with this need in order to give us the opportunity throughout the entire day to say this *beracha* properly, and fulfill the purpose for which we were created!

Rav Pincus in *She'arim B'tefilla* (page 57 in the Hebrew version) cites a fascinating Medrash (*Yalkut Shemoni,* Yehoshua 22, quoted by Rashi in Yehoshua 10:12). The *pasuk* says (Tehillim 113:3) " – ממזרח שמש-עד מבואו, מהולל שם ה' (Tehillim 113:3) " – from the rising of the sun to its setting, Hashem's Name is praised." When Yehoshua stood in Giv'on and wanted the

sun to stop, he did not tell the sun to stop moving. Rather he said שמש" "בגבעון דום" – be silent. The reason being that as the sun is travelling, it is saying praises to Hashem, and that is what gives it the ability to move across the sky. Therefore, Yehoshua told the sun to be quiet and stop saying praises, so that it would not be able to continue moving. The Medrash then relates how the sun argued with Yehoshua until it finally says, "If I will be quiet who will say praises to Hashem?" To which Yehoshua answered "You be silent and I will say praises instead of you!"



Rav Pincus says that we see from here that the sun gets its strength from

saying praises to Hashem, and if it stops, it loses its ability to move. But it is not only the sun – all the *malachim* and every living creature only exist through saying praises to Hashem. We say in the third *hallelukah* of *pesukei d'zimrah*. *Hallelu es Hashem min hashamayim*." The bright blue skies praise Hashem. "*Halleluhu kol malachav*." Multitudes of holy *malachim* sing His glory. "*Halleluhu shemesh v'yareyach*."The massive bright sun, the beautiful, glowing moon, trillions of stars – they are also praising Hashem. The young men and also maidens, old men and youths – they all sing *shira* to Hashem – as singing to Hashem is the fountain of life, and one who stops, is disconnected.

This should give us an entirely new outlook on Asher Yatzar. Until now, if we were in the middle of doing something important and we get a message from our body that causes us to momentarily pause what we were doing, we may have gotten frustrated and think "why now?" But now we realize that this is actually a personal request from Hashem to praise Him at this very moment – which gives us the ability to continue to function and exist!

of Chanukah. Is Chanukah called a Yom Tov? Absolutely! The Gemara calls it Yom Tov. However, the description of this Yom tov is "Lehodos u'lehallel".

There is a big discussion what is the definition of Lehodos. Rashi seems to hold that saying "al hanissim" is what the Gemara is referring to. The Rambam and others seem to say that the word Hodaah is referring to the lighting of the Menora.

The obvious question on the Rambam is why

does the Gemara talk in riddles? Why doesn't the Gemara say straight out to light the Chanukah candles?

I believe the answer is that when we are standing by the Menora we are not merely lighting candles. We are admitting [which is one of the definitions of "Hodaah"] that Hashem has performed a great miracle for us.

This concept is known as "Pirsumei nissa." This means that we are publicizing and acknowledging that Hashem has done great miracles for us.

I believe that Rabbi Schwab explains that the Modim that we say on a daily basis means that we acknowledge all the good that Hashem does to us throughout the day.

Rav Uren Reich Shlit"a elaborates on this train of thought. He says something fascinating. He gives a mashal to bring out the concept.

Imagine an old man is walking in the street and the wind is howling. As a result, he trips and he drops his package. A young man who was passing by catches him. The old man thanks him profusely.

Then the young man goes and picks up his packages, and again the old man thanks him profusely.

Then the young man gets him a chair and the old man once again thanks him very much.

Then the young man offers him a drink to which the old man gratefully accepts. Again, the old man starts bentching him.

The young man asks the older man why he keeps thanking him. He already thanked him at the beginning. The old man smiled and tells him, "You keep doing different favors for me and I need to recognize

each favor individually."

Similarly, says Rav Uren, Hashem is constantly doing Chassadim for us every second of the day. Each breath that we take is a gift from Hashem, so ultimately, we should be praising Hashem nonstop.

However, our Chachamim understood that it

may be difficult for some people to thank Hashem on every breath, so they gave us the bracha of Modim to say three times day. This gives us an opportunity to thank Hashem for all the chassadim that He is doing for us the entire day.


Getting back to Chanukah, when we light the Menora we are also admitting to the miracles of the wars that Hashem fought for us. We are acknowledging that it was Hashem that fought our wars.

The truth is that we have gone through a year loaded with unbelievable mind-boggling open miracles that Hashem has been performing for Klal Yisroel, and especially in Eretz Yisroel.



Tens of thousands of rockets, drones and missiles were fired toward Eretz Yisroel from Gaza, Lebanon, Iran and Yemen and the casualties and deaths were so few.

I heard that a war specialist analyzed all the attacks that happened over the past year and he said that according to the statistics of the deaths and casualties that should have happened c"v, the actual deaths and casualties was close to 0%.



However, we do have an explanation and we say this three times a day "v'al nisecha shebichol yom". Hashem is making tremendous miracles for Klal Yisroel as we can see with our own eyes.

It is clear that Hashem is protecting Eretz Yis-

roel above the laws of nature.

This is what Chanukah is about. We light the

candles and we proclaim that yes, Hashem makes tremendous miracles for us even in the Galus. We acknowledge that we are in Hashem's hands and He is fighting for us.

We know that Hashem Has promised that when Moshiach comes He will once again make for His beloved nation

miracles and amazing wonders.

Chanukah is a time that Hashem has performed miracles. Chanukah is a time that Klal Yisoel acknowledges all the miracles and love that Hashem has for His children.

Let's be zoche this Chanukah to participate in the kindling of the Menorah in the Bais Hamikdash as we will sing with much joy "Haneiros Hallalu" and Al Hanissim Amein.



In the late 1960s, there was a middle-aged man named Rav Yitzchok who was experiencing terrible stomach pains. The pains persisted for several days. He went and consulted with his doctor, who sent him to a specialist in Mount Sinai Hospital who ran a series of tests.

A week later, Rav Yitzchok was called back to the doctor's office to discuss the results. The doctor informed him that the results didn't look good, and that he only had a minute chance of survival. While Rav Yitzchok was trying to digest the news, the doctor added, "And I opine that you take your four remaining weeks, gather together your final wishes, and instruct your family how to distribute your possessions, because this is it."

Rav Yitzchok was unwilling to just settle with this heartbreaking news, "A Yid is never hopeless," echoed in his mind. He remembered numerous stories of people with similar diagnoses who, after davening and learning, saw impressive *yeshuos*. With that mindset, he mustered the courage to ask the doctor, with tears streaming down his cheeks, "Is there no solution? Is there no way to survive?!"

"There is *one* option," replied the doctor, "but I do *not* recommend it. It's an invasive procedure with a *very low* rate of success. Even if you decide to undergo the surgery, your lifespan will be extended no more than an-

other six months. Nothing more than that. And your quality-of-life during those six months won't be a dream. You'll be bedridden and connected to a respirator, which is no fun. I don't see any purpose in such a life. Rather, take your remaining time in this world, fly to Europe, explore the museums and attractions, and enjoy your final few weeks."

Rav Yitzchok thanked the doctor for his advice and made his way to the *posek ha'dor*, **Reb Moshe Feinstein**, to discuss the matter.

Reb Moshe looked over all the details of the *shaila* before sharing his *da'as Torah*. "First, you must know that the mindset of the doctor is coming from the secular view of life," Reb Moshe went on to explain, "but that is not *hashkafas haTorah*. The secular world sees life for its pleasure, and thus a life *void* of pleasure is *worthless*.

"We, on the other hand, know that life is a preparation for the World to Come, and in a short time, a person can gain himself invaluable reward. So, before determining if to stretch life or not, we must primarily understand what we are dealing with."

"With that being the case," Reb Moshe then ruled, "it's worth undergoing surgery just so you can put on tefillin even once more! Surely if you'll also be able to daven thereafter. And besides, you must also consider the chance of outliving the six-month forecast. To his utter shock, he saw his doctor wearing a yarmulka and *peiyos* — something he hadn't had when Rav Yitzchok last saw him! He knew the doctor was Jewish, but he certainly hadn't come off as religious in any way or form. Rav Yitzchok couldn't resist, and he told the doctor, "*Tischadesh* on your new appearance!"

The doctor responded, "It's all credited to you. That ruling of Reb Moshe left me restless. How can a Rabbi undertake such a ruling and instruct a fellow Jew to endure such a procedure? He surely understands what the patient will be facing. I decided that I must pay a visit to this Rabbi.

"I entered his home in the Lower East Side and was then greeted with the Rav's enlightening smile and sat down. William Abood was a partner in FXCM, a large trading firm on Wall Street, where people from around the globe would exchange their money. All their business brought in a great profit, and he used his wealth smartly: He was very generous when distributing tzedakah, and he was the go-to address for many organizations. For example, R' Zechariah Wallerstein went to him to help cover the mounting budget for his high school, Ohr Naava.

One day, Abood's whole enterprise went under. When the English currency dropped, his company continued trading it without coverage. In a short time, his multi-million-dollar company went bankrupt, to the point that it suddenly became illegal to exchange funds with them. In a short few minutes, he had nothing left but some pressing court cases.

Sometime later, R' Wallerstein approached William and asked him how he was able to move on with this misfortune. He went from being a wealthy individual to having nothing; how was he continuing after such a downturn? R' Wallerstein was known for approaching people who faced life-challenges and probing them as to how they overcame them. When he then would speak with his students, who also faced serious challenges, he would be able to relay how others with similar challenges overcame them.

"Let me tell you something," came William's reply. "In the 1990s, I worked at a small firm here in Manhattan, which had a total of thirty traders. There was one large table where all thirty of us sat. I grew very close to the employee on my right; we worked together for years, and we developed a very warm relationship.

"One day, he was offered to manage a trading firm from a company who wanted to become the *biggest in the world*. His friend received notice that the growing corporation was looking for a man suitable for the great task, and he was chosen. 'You can hire a staff of whatever size you want,' he was told. 'Anything so that we can build up this project."

This friend had sought out many helpers to assist him, and William was excited about it. The new firm was even offering open checks to their new workers — something quite tempting. When the day came for his friend to take along his new team with him, William realized that he was not one of them. This "friend" hired fifteen of the thirty members of their firm, leaving out his close friend. William was no doubt frustrated at the unexpected shutout.

Had I been hired then, I would be long forgotten, with no one to continue my name."

One grandchild, Baruch, knew what was really cooking. He knew how his grandfather really felt about no longer being able to attend his usual *minyanim* he so much liked. He was thus a bit shocked at how R' Zidell had responded "Baruch Hashem" despite all that.

"It's good to be alive," continued R' Zidell. "If we are alive, we must be appreciative and thankful for Hashem always returning our *neshama*. There's nothing that we can complain about!!"

Baruch was overtaken by the words he was hearing. R' Zidell was an old-time student of Yeshivas Chaim Berlin, and he more or less had nothing to his *Olam Hazeh*. He was barely eating due to the side-effects of some of his medicines, and his regular *sedarim* were now very minimal. Of friends, too, he had nothing, yet he remembered "dai la'adam she'hu chai — it suffices that one's alive." With that mindset, he was always upbeat, and whenever he was asked how he was doing, he responded that he is doing great.

A very chashuva friend and Rav by the name of Harav Hagaon Hagadol Rav Ariel Rabin Shlita, a Rav in Staten Island, told me



Use the incredible power of חנוכה for the rest of your life!

The חנוכה חנוכה has a beautiful message: Every day a person should praise הקב"ה (or write) 1 goodness of his life. The next day he should praise for something else without stopping to continue praising for yesterday's goodness. This should go on and on for 8 days until you have 8 מעלות altogether in front of you.

The goal of

this column is to explain the reason of minhagim. But of course everyone is doing what's right and everyone should proudly keep to their family minhag.

There are many different way to serve Hashem and different kehilos put their focus on different things.

We all have different personalities and different methods to combat the yezter hara.

THERE IS NO RIGHT AND NO WRONG. NO ONE IS HIGHER ANS NO ONE IS LOWER. To Hashem it makes no difference if one served him with a shtreimel or bend down hat. It's just as big of a difference to Him as if one's shoe size is a 10 or 10.5.

He loves us all equally. We are all tzaddkim and will be getting the same Olam Haba. What is important to Him is that we all fulfill our unique purpose in life and we feel positive in our hearts about people who are different than us.

Examples of being different than the goyim:

1. Chasidim don't wear a short jacket, because that is seen as a western, modern, non-Jewish form of dress. Rather, they wear long jackets. On weekdays they wear a long jacket called a rekel. On Shabbos they wear a fancier jacket with a belt and designs, called a bekeshe.

2. Chasidim don't wear a tie. A tie is considered to be a form of modern ed dress, which chasidim avoid.

3. Chasidim wear an "up hat," not a "down hat." A "down hat" is the typical fedora that Litvish Jews wear, with the brim down. This was a style of hat that was also worn by the non-Jews. Therefore, Chasidim wear a hat with the brim up, in order to be different. One popular type of Chasidish hat is the felt hat, which is called a "samet." There are two different types: the hoicher samet, which is

4. Chasidim in Europe used to wear short pants, to differentiate themselves from the non-Jews, who wore long pants. Nowadays, most chasidim only wear short pants on Shabbos. They usually wear them together with special white socks, known as veisse zacken.

taller, and the flatshiger samet, which is flatter.

- 5. Many chasidim don't wear a wristwatch, because it's a sign of modernity. Rather, they wear a pocket watch. Others do wear a wristwatch, but purposely wear it on their right hand, in order to be different from the modern world which wears it on the left hand.
- Examples of following the tradition:
- 1. A kasket is a felt cap that Jews used to wear in Europe. Now, many chasidic boys wear them on Shabbos.
- 2. Lubavitcher Chasidim pinch their hats into three corners, because that's the type of hat that the last Lubavitcher Rebbe had. They also don't wear a shtreimel, unlike other chasidim, because the last Lubavitcher Rebbe didn't wear one.

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

Meanwhile up in the tree there was a hunter who saw what was going on and he shot the lion in the head a few times until the lion was dead. The hunter then saw the fellow jumping up and down kissing his stick. The hunter climbed down from the tree and told the fellow, "You think it was your stick that saved you? It was my shooting the animal that saved you."

The same is the person who thinks that it was his hishtadlus that gave him koach or money or health or anything else.

This is the biggest nisayon of hishtadlus to separate the fact that 'I did hishtadlus,' from the real Source and cause for my Hatzlacha! Don't be like the fool who kisses the stick!

In Parshas Mikeitz, Pharoh was disturbed by his strange dreams and was dissatisfied with the interpretations of his wise men. He had actually dreamed the interpretations as well, and had forgotten them; that's why he knew he wasn't hearing the truth.

Finally, the Sar HaMashkim told him about Yosef. Upon seeing Yosef, Pharoh remarked, "I've heard that you're a man full of wisdom, who knows how to interpret dreams. Can you tell me what my dreams mean?" Yosef responded that it was not his own wisdom, but rather Hashem's. He explained to Pharoh that it was a mistake to rely on him because all his wisdom comes from Hashem. Yosef would only be able to transmit the knowledge that Hashem would insert into his brain, so to speak.

HaRav Yechiel Perr, zt"l, asks: What lesson can we learn from Yosef emphasizing that all his wisdom is only from the Ribono Shel Olam? He answers: Yosef understood that Pharoh was relying on him for his wisdom and talent. Yosef explained that Pharoh's reliance would ensure that Yosef would not ed in explaining Pharoh's dream. The Passuk says אל יתהלל-חכם בחכמתו – even the smartest man should not rely on his own intelligence. Without Hashem's help a person cannot understand anything! We may not believe in our own kochos; we must take Teva out of the picture and put Hashem there instead. Only then can we hope to be successful.

The Shevatim relayed to Yaakov Avinu the whole conversation they had with the Egyptian ruler, who had asked them if they had any more brothers. Upon hearing that they did, the ruler had ordered them to bring their youngest brother down to Mitzrayim. Yaakov responded to the Shevatim with the words, "למה הרעותם לי"-why did you harm me?"

The Medrash Rabba writes that except for this one instance, Yaakov Avinu never spoke devarim beteilim in his life. The Chofetz Chaim asks why this question of Yaakov was considered devarim beteilim? He explains that in reality, there is no such thing as one person harming another; therefore, Yaakov Avinu should not have responded by blaming them.

Do not say to another person, "Why did you mess me up?" When Yidden are attacked, R"L, do not react with, "Anti-Semites!" Such responses indicate that you are forgetting that people are just puppets with no intrinsic power of their own. Everything that happens is perfectly designed by HaKadosh Baruch Hu for the benefit of his Creation, and is therefore the best thing that could have happened.

Evasive Landlord

I am renting a house. Whenever something needs to be fixed, I ask my landlord to take care of it. However, he always tries to get out of paying and he claims that it is not his responsibility.

My friends tell me, "If you want to get anything from your landlord, you have to keep pressuring him until you get what you want." Is that the correct approach?

A We live in a society that gives us the message that in order to succeed, we must fight for our rights.

While it is true that you do not have to be a pushover, and there certainly is a time and place that you can—and should—respectfully and diplomatically request to be listened to, nonetheless, if you are not receiving cooperation, applying force or pressure is not the Torah way.

The Gemara teaches us that the correct approach when faced with resistance is not to make a Machlokes. The Chofetz Chaim says that if you are Mevatter for the sake of shalom and pay for repairs from your own pocket, not only will you be reimbursed



for all the money you laid out, but Hashem will repay you double!

Therefore, instead of following the futile approach of the outside world (including the advice of well-meaning friends) which robs you of your Simchas HaChaim and decreases your quality of life, take the advice of Chazal who are truly interested in helping you. You will benefit financially and emotionally, both in this world and in Olam Habah.

Nun Gimmel Hey Shin - Nissim happen to all Yidden! Chanukah is such an exciting time! It's a time of Nissim and miracles. Can you create a Chanukah book with eight pages of Nissim that have happened to you this past year? Here are some examples to get you started: If you are reading this and you see with your eyes - remember that's a Nes! If you have a heart that is beating - remember that's a Nes. You can also include stories of how you asked Hashem for something and got answered. Al Nisecha Shebichol Yom - Every day we have miracles and we can thank Hashem for them. Everything we have is straight from Hashem. Hashem loves us, cares for us, protects us, and keeps giving us good. May you and all the people you know be Zoche to more and more Nissem L'maleh Min Hateva every single second of every single day forever!

I was davening: Hashem, "Please look at your holy and pure Yidden." Chanukah is the time that we set aside to recognize Nissim and connect to thanking Hashem for miracles. Chanukah is celebrated by a lot of Yidden that don't know about other parts of Yidishkeit. This is so profound because Rabbi Avigdor Miller zt"l talks about the way we can "give back" to Hashem is by recognizing and thanking Hashem! "Hashem, see how your people recognize Your miracles and thank You for them. In this Zechus please keep showering the entire Jewish nation with billions of miracles and brochos!"

Hashem is Kulo Tov and Brocha. Let's all get involved and spread enjoyment and excitement. We can draw out pictures of these Tovos with our family/friends/students/neighbors and clients. In this way, we can pump people up by helping them feel grateful in so many ways.

Ahava Rabba! Pumping people up

One of the ways to pump people up is to play games with them. Did you know that Hashem made humans have a need for fun and by providing that need you build Ahava, Achvah, Shalom and Reius. People of all ages need to have fun. This includes children and adults.

Fun can include dancing, singing, and playing games. Playing open ended games using creativity supports mind expansion. This expansion is very healthy for all people to engage in.

Story:

Many times, I have people who are going through different challenges in relationships come to sessions. This can include relationships between parent and child, spouse and spouse or teacher and student. One of the main things I tell them to add is a fun component. I share how they can get excited and have fun in so many ways using expansion. This changes the dynamic of the relationship because you are connecting about something that is not personal and you are doing exclusively as a giver to promote the friendship and joy. The more fun and laughter in the games, the better.

Expansion games include an open-ended element, having fun, and a game where everyone automatically is right no matter what they share. For example: everyone say something you are grateful for that starts with the first letter of your name, no matter what you say, you are right. And if the three-year-old says a random word that doesn't start with the first letter of his name we still make it an amazing response and he is right! Another example is turning on the music and having one person be the leader and everyone follows their dance moves! When there is an adult that joins in- it

is more meaningful and fun for the children.

There was a family that came, that had been through some very challenging Nisyonos. It seems that all the members of the family were having a very hard time with each other. They started playing one fun game/activity/dance a day and the dynamic shifted. This is because they now are building a new relationship based on this open-ended expansion and fun where everyone is right no matter what. After having fun for about two weeks, many of the other components shifted for the better as well.

I just love to try to give people support and chizuk. As an aside: Doing for others makes us feel so good ourselves and fills our own emotional bank account!

Idea: It's so easy to share love with other people.

- Go out with a friend for one hour on or around Chanukah. If you don't have one hour you can go out for 20 minutes
- Make a Chanukah set up for your spouse/child/grandmother/student/employee as a surprise. You can use things from the dollar tree. The main thing is that your sincerity is in it.
- Text or call random people to wish them Happy Chanukah!
- Bring added fun into the house by playing one of the games below:

Eight ways to use paper plates for a fun Chanukah game

1. Heads up: You will need paper plates, markers or crayons and Kichel cards. (You can make your own cards by writing down Jewish experiences on small pieces of paper – experiences include dancing at a wedding, eating herring at a kiddush, playing Guitar in Tzfas, waiting in line at the airport, Bentching Licht etc.)

Everyone chooses one card. No one

shares their card and everyone only knows what it says on their card. All players simultaneously place their paper plate on their heads and draw a picture of what it said on the card they received. For added fun, use a two-minute timer and everyone has to race the clock. Then all the players remove the plates and everyone has to guess what they drew. Once people have had time to smile, laugh, and guess, you can create a pile of the players cards so the players will have multiple choices to choose from.

2. The menorah plate: What you need: ten paper plates, string, markers.

Cut eight paper plates in half. Place them in a horizontal line making a huge menorah. Tape them together in the line. Use two plates for the Shamash. Add string for the wicks. Draw or write all over the plates your favorite things. Include your favorite places, foods, toys, people and all other things you like. Remember Hashem loves us and wants us to enjoy all of our favorite things.

- 3. Hide the plates: What you need: Eight paper plates and markers. Draw Chanukah pictures on eight plates. Hide the plates around the house. Then have everyone else find them.
- Wind chimes: What you need: Paper plates, pipe cleaners, bells from dollar tree, empty water bottles. Roll one plate up and tape it together. Leave a hole and both ends of the roll. Add a few bells to a pipe cleaner. Create three pipe cleaners with bells. Twist all three pipe cleaners together on the top. Attach the pipe cleaner to the inside of the plate using tape. Move the wind chime to hear the sound. Use empty water bottles to tap on your arms and create a beat. Dance and sing and thank Hashem for all his great Nissim that have happened to you recently.
- 5. The name game: What you need: Paper plates and crayons. Write the letter of your first name on a paper plate. See how many things you can thank Hashem for that begin with that letter. Write or draw the things you thought of on your plate.

- 6. The dreidel plate game: What you need: one paper plate, one crayon, one dreidel. Draw eight circles on the paper plate. Fill in each circle with different numbers such as 10, 100, 1,000, 1,000,000. (Using very high numbers creates more laughing moments) Each player spins the dreidel on the plate. See what circle it landed near and how many points you get. Play a few rounds and then add up the points. Give everyone who plays a surprise prize.
- Donut plates. What you need: paper plates, markers, glitter, gel pens, colored paper, scissors, glue. Every player gets one paper plate. Use the added supplies to create your own flavor donut. You can cut out a hole in the middle of the plate for the hole in the donut. Every donut has to be different. Have the youngest player say what flavor they want to create, then the second to youngest says what flavor they are creating. As you get to the older members it will be harder and harder to think of ideas. This is the fun part: come up with very original flavors for your donut. You can do sprinkles, jelly, chocolate, pink icing, white icing. Then get creative how about a jelly bean flavored donut. Use expressive arts supplies and have a blast.
- 8. Story plates: What you need: paper plates and one Spring Hill Times paper. Each player finds one amazing story in the Spring Hill Times to draw out on their plate. Everyone guesses what story they are drawing out. If no one can guess then the person who drew it shares what the story was.

Bonus game: Create a food menorah on a paper plate. We used snackers, licorice and chocolate chips but you can use any food you have in the house to create a menorah!

Bonus game: Each player creates one carnival booth for everyone in the family to enjoy. Here are some ideas of booths.

- Menorah surprise: Have one thing hidden under eight large colorful cups set up as a Menorah
- Have a Chanukah coloring sheet
 - Magic bottles use empty wa-

ter bottles and add inside all sorts of gemstones and beads found at the dollar store. Then add water and seal shut.

- ❖ Knock down the menorah. Add food coloring to empty water bottles. Fill each water bottle with water and tape shut. Use the colored water bottles to form a menorah. Use a ball and see how many candles you can knock down just like by bowling.
- Dreidel tape mirror maze. Create a dreidel on the floor out of tape. Use a mirror to step on the tape line without looking down.
- Throw the dreidel on the sponge: set up sponges and have the players throw the dreidels and try to land on the sponges.
- Thank You, Hashem, poster. Have a poster with 100 boxes. Each person fills in as many boxes as they say out loud things they thank Hashem for.
- ❖ Throw the beanbags on the dreidel. Make a huge dreidel out of oaktag. Try to throw the beanbags on the dreidel.
- ❖ Write a Chanukah picture and bring to a Friend
- Light up spooky house: Create a small room into a spooky house. Use flashlights, dress up gear and art supplies.

As an adult, I try to sing this song all the time! I try to change up the motions or dance steps as I sing this song. This creates a function called expansion. When we add change to something while we are singing, it helps solidify the feelings associated with it. The more times we sing and add a small change, the more neural pathways we have connected to what we are doing. This helps it become more integrated into our beings.

Feeling Hashem's Love!

I was at the bank and one of the people who worked there asked me, "Are you making money these days?" I said, "I never make money. G-d is putting money into everyone's accounts." They asked three times and I kept repeating the same thing. I said "I never make money. G-d is putting money into all of our accounts. Its 100 percent G-d." Illuminating Words of Chazal

"Everything about Hashem, His Torah and His world is supposed to bring out positive emotions and help us have a healthy relationship with Hashem." Rav Yehuda Mandel

In Toras Avigdor in Parshas Toldos, it says that Yitzchok would not have chosen even Rav Akiva Eiger or the Ramban to give the brachos, because they weren't perfect enough. If they weren't perfect enough, then for sure I would not be perfect enough.

It made me feel down reading it, seeing how important it is to be perfect, and I'm so far from perfection. I felt like I belonged more in the class with Eisav than with Yaakov c"v.

The answer is exactly the opposite. It's the most soothing feeling, and I loved this Toras Avigdor. I loved it because I walked away with positive feelings and positive emotions, and I'll explain to you why.

Why do people feel rejected? Because they feel like they have to be perfect. You think you're not Mr. Perfect, and because of that you feel like a second-class citizen.

Well, zagt R' Yerucham in Daas Torah yud tes a mesorah from R' Chaim Vital b'shem the Arizal, that in the earlier generations HaKadosh Baruch Hu expected perfection and wanted them to be perfect. That was their tafkid and that

was their tachlis. The reason why is because when you start in the beginning of the chain then Hashem expects more of a person because that's going to be maaseh avos siman labanim. That's going to last all the way until today. That means that till today the reason why we're shteiging and thriving is because the Avos

were shleimus – Avraham, Yitzchok and Yaakov. Because if Hashem would have started the chain with not perfect people, then we wouldn't be around today.

So that's what Hashem expected from them and that's why they had to live up to. And that's why Eisav, even though, on the outside nobody would have realized his imperfection, but

Hashem with a magnifying glass needed him to be perfect in order for Klal Yisrael to shteig and thrive like we are like never before. Every block and every building in wherever we are there's another beis medrash, another kollel, another cheder, another bais Yaakov. It's ayom v'nora that Klal Yisrael is in galus 2,000 years and this is all from because we started from having shleimus of Avos hekedoshim.

Which leads us to point number two, that Hashem expected shleimus from them, but not nowadays. Hashem doesn't expect shleimus from us. R' Gershon Leibman told my Rebbi that Hashem doesn't really have any expecta-

> tions on us, so whatever we do is kulo great, kulo gevaldik, kulo amazing.

> In the biography on R' Yaakov Galinsky, it says the same thing in the name of the Chofetz Chaim. The Chofetz Chaim brought it out with a story that a baker came over to the Chofetz Chaim and said you know, nobody likes my

bread. This one complains and says it's stale, this one complains it's not fresh, this one complains it's half-baked. Everyone has a problem, and I can't make any money.

Then it was during the war and Chofetz Chaim met him and he had a big smile on his face. And the Chofetz Chaim said why are you so happy? He said, "I have such a successful business."



The Chofetz Chaim said, "What changed?" The baker explained, "During a war, people don't care if the bread is stale, if it's rotten, if it's moldy, they'll just eat whatever they can get. They take it and they want doubles and triples."

Zagt the Chofetz Chaim, that's the difference. In the olden days Hashem wanted perfection, but nowadays it's as if Hashem says okay I don't have any expectations from you. I don't care if your bread is moldy, if it's rotten, if it's spoiled, I don't care if it's smelly, I don't care if it's ugly or dirty, I'll take whatever you're able to give. And when it's during the war time, zagt the Chofetz Chaim, people just want doubles and triples. People are so hungry that by them every drop of food is like a golden luxury.

That's why, zagt R' Yerucham from R' Chaim Vital b'shem the Arizal, our avodah nowadays, our imperfect avodah is far greater in Hashem's eyes than Tannaim and Amoraim. To the extent that R' Yerucham says don't repeat this too many times, because then you're going to become a baal gaavah. But nowadays, as R' Yehuda Mandel my Rebbi says over, don't

stop saying this, because maybe one day we'll believe it. We don't believe it, but the truth is that our avoda is greater than Amoraim and Tannaim because we are so far removed from Hashem, we don't have any real tangible relationship with Hashem. Hashem, like R' Avigdor Miller says, is more like the Name in the siddur, an abstract concept. And still we're serving Hashem like never before, that brings Hashem so much nachas.

So that which really leads us to what R' Dan, the einekel of R' Chatzkal, brings in his sefer Shaarei Geula from R' Chatzkal, that lucky is the person who lives in today's generation because every aveira we do Hashem is dan l'kaf zechus. Hashem says what can I expect from people nowadays. And every mitzvah that we do Hashem magnifies it a thousand times more. Ashrei to the person who is born in today's generation!

So therefore, because we don't have to meet expectations, we don't have to serve Hashem with an ol and a burden and a pressure. Our avodas Hashem can be relaxed, with menuchas hanefesh!

The Bitachon Perspective

Q & A with Rabbi Zevy Golombeck By R' Shalom Yedidya Klatzko

Q. I am scared of the dark. Is that considered a lack of bitachon, or can I say that this is the personality Hashem gave me?

A. There are many kinds of fears that Hashem created people with, such as being scared of the dark, fear of heights, fear of dogs, stage fright, claustrophobia etc. Since, this is an inborn nature, it does not indicate that you are lacking in bitachon.

Nonetheless, it is possible to minimize these fears by means of doing exercises in bitachon.

If you are scared of the dark, contemplate: what makes you panic? You feel insecure. You don't know what's behind the darkness. If you're scared of heights, you feel insecure being so high up in the air; what if you fall?

Your exercise is: when in such a situation that you feel like panicking, realize that you are in Hashem's hands and you're completely protected. There is no difference to Hashem whether it's light or dark. The same Hashem that's protecting you when you're on the ground is protecting you when you're high up in the air. The same idea applies to all other fears.

Q. I grew up in a certain neighborhood, and I like the school I go to, and I have lots of friends. Recently, my parents decided that our family is going to move to a new neighborhood.

I am very apprehensive about the move; I'm concerned that I won't adjust to the new community and I'll have a hard time acclimating.

What is emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. The reason you're nervous is because you think, 'the reason I'm settled where I am is because I 'happen' to enjoy the school and I 'happened' to have found friends. Now that my family is relocating, perhaps I won't be able to adapt to my new community'.

However, the truth is, the reason you were settled in your prior community is not because of the circumstances. It was because Hashem, your loving father, was looking out for you and gave you friends and a good school.

Hashem is not limited by circumstances. Hashem is directing your family to move to a new neighborhood, and he will continue looking after your needs and find you wonderful friends, just as he did in

former neighborhood.

And the more you realize that all the good in your life is orchestrated by Hakadosh Baruch Hu, the more relaxed you will be. And Hashem will reward you by helping you adjust in the smoothest way possible.




Later that day, the Stiepler realized that his daughter was referring to a different Chaim, Rav Chaim Kluft, a grandson!

I have no satisfaction in my work or in my learning.

Please help!

The reason why you feel this way is because we all come from a different world where we were near Hashem and were in a state of pure bliss. We felt infinite love, acceptance and comfort.

Now that the neshama is confined to a physical body it lost all that and will never feel complete satisfaction until it's once back close to Hashem.

Start realizing that everything in your life is Hashem. Everything in your life is His love. Make every experience you go through a way of connecting. Be obsessed with Him day and night and your life will become completely transformed!







Let us imagine for just a few minutes that the world as we know it would turn on its head, and automatic functions, such as breathing, blinking, and swallowing, would require conscious thought to occur...

Life would be exceptionally difficult. People would need to think about each breath (talk about labored breathing!) This constant preoccupation would distract them from all other activities, making it difficult to converse, work, daven, learn, etc.

When deeply involved in an activity, people might forget to breathe. Eventually, they would faint or turn blue from lack of oxygen. At that point, they would quickly command their lungs to breathe, but they would again forget a few moments later... If they stopped breathing for too long, it might be too late to be revived, c"v. Oxygen deprivation could cause serious brain damage. If a child forgot to breathe for five minutes, he could be damaged for life...

People would stare unblinkingly, causing their eyes to dry out and sting. Eventually, the lack of oxygen in the eye lens could lead to vision problems or even blindness c"v. Not blinking can also cause a buildup of particles and debris in the eye, which is irritating and could lead to infection. Conducting a conversation with an unblinking friend would also be quite awkward.

When the body gets very hot, it sweats to prevent heatstroke. People would forget to produce sweat, making exercising or being in the sun very dangerous. Even if they would remember, people generally dislike the feeling of sweat and would therefore not produce it.

Similarly, when the body is too cold,

it shivers or produces goosebumps to preserve body heat. Since people would forget or refuse to do this, many common situations, such as walking outside on a cold day without proper protection, playing in the snow, or swimming in cold water could be lethal.

When trying to eat, people would be forced to coordinate their breathing and swallowing reflexes. If they would forget to breathe while eating, it would be terribly dangerous. If they would forget to command their mouth to swallow, they would likely try speaking with food still in their mouths. This could lead to a mess at best and choking at worst. If people would accidentally breathe and swallow at the same time, they could easily choke...

Since eating would require such intense concentration, people would no longer talk over food. Simchos such as weddings, brissim, and kiddushim would be silent affairs as everyone busied themselves with their food. Alternatively, people simply wouldn't eat in public...

People would need to sleep with oxygen masks so they could breathe while they sleep. This would be expensive and uncomfortable. If c"v someone forgot to put it on one night, they wouldn't wake up the next morning...

Parents would be beside themselves with worry about their children's breathing and swallowing habits. The constant anxiety would wear down their emotional and physical health.

Since babies can't will themselves to do anything, they would need to be hooked up to oxygen tanks and feeding tubes from birth. They would also need consistent eye drops to prevent dryness from lack of blinking. This would be expensive, time-consuming, and nerve-wracking for the parents.

These machines would interfere with the natural bonding that mothers have when feeding their babies. They would also prevent normal physical growth. Babies would try to turn over and crawl but would knock down the machines in the interim. This would c"v cause them to stop breathing.

As they would mature, they would need tons of physical therapy to teach them about breathing, swallowing, and blinking. They would be dependent on their machines until they would mature enough to be trusted to breathe on their own and eat safely. What a sad existence!

In short, if automatic functions required thought, people would be dying left and right due to simple forgetfulness; people would be emotional wrecks and unable to concentrate on even the simplest tasks.

Who utilized incredible wisdom to designate certain functions as automatic so that even the tiniest baby automatically knows to breathe, swallow, blink, shiver, and sweat when necessary? Who implanted in the human brain the chochma to know exactly when and how much to execute each function? Hakadosh Baruch Hu, our loving, caring Father, that's Who! Thank You, Hashem, for enabling us to live in comfort as our bodies perform so many complicated tasks without our conscious input, 24/7, 365! We love You, Hashem!

- * The bochurim may have many complaints about the yeshiva. Perhaps they may have bogged down the staff with all of their concerns.

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





















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
